**SUBJECT:** Adoption of Resolution No. 2010-091 Authorizing the Planning Department to Submit a Grant Application to the California Department of Parks and Recreation

**RECOMMENDED MOTION:** That the Board of Supervisors adopt Resolution No. 2010-091, which authorizes Planning to sign and submit a grant application to the California Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation (OHMVR) for \$205,000 to prepare the required documents and conduct the necessary environmental analysis to develop an Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) Recreation Park.

**BACKGROUND:** Riverside County has limited legal Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) areas available for public use. Consequently, illegal riding has adversely affected not only lands designated for conservation, but also properties that may contain cultural resources as well as special-status plants and animals. By developing a managed OHV recreation park, County residents and visitors will be able to have a quality OHV experience while conserving and protecting cultural and biological resources. Furthermore, by providing a legal and accessible OHV riding area, Riverside County can then enforce current and future laws that will improve quality of life for residents as well as increase the recreational opportunities for OHV users.

#### **BACKGROUND** (continued):

On March 21, 2006, the Board of Supervisors established a five member OHV Commission in response to the needs of the OHV community in Riverside County. The Commission's purpose is to advise and make recommendations to the Board concerning (1) identification of candidate sites for OHV use, (2) input on related site acquisition issues, and (3) public outreach for educational and informational purposes. Initially, the Commission recommended three sites for further assessment; however, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has offered to lease one site at no cost pending submittal and approval of a draft site development plan. This site, known as "Drop 31," is adjacent to the All American Canal, also known as the Coachella Canal, which irrigates farming areas to the west. Access to the area is from 72nd Avenue in the community of North Shore with a crossing at Drop 31.

Planning is requesting authorization to submit a planning proposal to OHMVR Division to prepare the required BLM documents for the development of an OHV park on public and private lands and to conduct the associated environmental analysis to determine potential environmental impacts resulting from project development and appropriate mitigation measures to reduce identified impacts to less than significant levels.

The California Department of Parks and Recreation is currently accepting applications for the 2009/10 OHV Grants and Cooperative Agreements Program. The current application will begin Phase II of the County's efforts to develop a multiple use OHV Recreation Park. The grant application will be matched by existing Planning staff time as well as in-kind services by the OHV Commissioners. In addition, discussions are underway with the Economic Development Agency (EDA) to acquire the private property that is surrounded by the aforementioned BLM land. Planning will search for future grant opportunities for construction and long-term maintenance and operation of the OHV Recreation Park.

# AUTHORIZING SUBMITTAL OF A GRANT APPLICATION FOR CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION DIVISION OF OFF-HIGHWAY MOTOR VEHICLE RECREATION FUNDS

WHEREAS, this Project, as described in Exhibit A, appears on, or is in conformance with this jurisdiction's adopted general or master plan and is compatible with the land use plans of those jurisdictions immediately surrounding the Project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Riverside County Board of Supervisors hereby:

- 1. Approves the filing of an Application(s) for an Off-Highway Vehicle Grant; and

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#### A. Statement of Planning Objectives

The Riverside County Planning Department is submitting a planning proposal to prepare the required Bureau of Land Management (BLM) documents for development of a multiple use Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) Recreation Park on public and private lands and to conduct the associated environmental analysis. Presently, Riverside County has limited legal OHV areas available for public use. Consequently, illegal riding has adversely affected not only lands designated for conservation, but also properties that may contain special-status plants and animals. Likewise, the impact on cultural resources as a result of illegal OHV use in some areas has resulted in negative impacts and destruction of these resources. By developing managed OHV recreation parks, County residents and visitors will be able to have a quality OHV experience while conserving and protecting cultural and biological resources. Furthermore, by providing a legal and accessible OHV riding area, Riverside County can then enforce current and future laws that will improve quality of life for residents as well as increase the recreational opportunities for OHV users. The project would fund the preparation of a draft site development plan and assess resource concerns to determine potential environmental impacts resulting from project development and appropriate mitigation measures to reduce identified impacts to less than significant levels.

#### B. Relation of Proposed Project to OHV Recreation

Statistics indicate Riverside County accounts for 96,034 off-highway registrations, 8.7% of the total State's registrations, and ranks third in California behind Los Angeles and San Diego Counties; however, Riverside County ranks seventh in the amount of funding received due to its limited legal OHV riding areas. Riverside County received \$46,389.82 whereas San Bernardino County, ranking fourth in the State for registered OHV's, received \$141,876.42 – more than triple the amount of funds while having 6,249 fewer registered vehicles. Imperial County, ranking 25th in the State for registered OHV's, ranks first in the amount of funds received due to large OHV riding areas available within that County.

On March 21, 2006, the Board of Supervisors established a five member OHV Commission to address the needs of the OHV community in Riverside County. The Commission's purpose is to advise and make recommendations to the Board concerning (1) identification of candidate sites for OHV use, (2) input on related site acquisition issues, and (3) public outreach for educational and informational purposes.

The Commission reviewed areas within the County focusing on larger parcels that could be combined with publicly owned properties thereby creating a buffer from nearby land uses and eliminated the following areas from consideration:

- · incorporated cities/spheres of influence;
- areas within the community development foundation of the General Plan;
- · areas within adopted Habitat Conservation Plans;
- · national parks and forests;
- · wilderness areas;
- · military lands;
- · tribal reservations;
- · areas under consideration in H.R. 3682/ S. 2109; and,
- · areas under multiple ownership.

Based on the above criteria, the Commission recommended three sites for further assessment; however, BLM has offered to lease one site at no cost pending submittal and approval of a draft site development plan, to include:

- (a) A statement of the proposed use of lands, a detailed description of the proposed project and a statement describing administration of the tract.
- (b) The anticipated expenditure for development (including source of funds to be used for development).

(c) A map showing the nature and location of facilities, land ownership of the entire project, and access routes. A professionally prepared site plan by a planner or architect is not usually required, but is encouraged and recommended as a means to ensure feasibility of the proposal, both functionally and economically.

This site, know as "Drop 31" is adjacent to the All American Canal, also known as the Coachella Canal, which irrigates the farming areas to the west. Access to the area is from 72nd Avenue in the community of North Shore with a crossing at Drop 31. The site is located adjacent to the North Shore Redevelopment areas and development of a multiple use OHV Recreation Park will further benefit the local communities by bringing revenues to an economically depressed area.

The area has varying topography, with elevation changes in excess of 300 vertical feet, ranging from level desert to canyons, rocky areas and steep ravines, offering varying OHV experiences at multiple skill levels as well as family-oriented activities. Access to the historic Bradshaw Trail is to the south and links the Coachella Valley with eastern portions of the County near Blythe. Currently, BLM allows OHV usage of the site; however, no facilities are available and trails are not marked or maintained. Current zoning also allows for OHV usage and the General Plan designates the area as open space - rural, allowing OHV use.

Types of uses envisioned for this park include:

- · Safety Training
- Motorcycles
- ATV
- Rock Crawling
- · Trail Riding
- · Improved Camping
- Unimproved Camping

The majority of the land within this area is owned by the BLM, comprising approximately 1,500 acres. In addition, a 640-acre privately-owned parcel will be acquired by the County using Economic Development funds. Significant buffers from any residential areas exist due to BLM ownership of several thousand acres to the north, east and south of the site, the Mecca Hills Wilderness to the north and the All American Canal to the west. The closest residential area is more than ½ mile to the southwest. The area is currently used for non-organized OHV usage with few complaints from the community to the west.

In discussions with the BLM to make this area a recognized OHV Recreation Park, BLM would provide the land and the County would provide additional lands, facilities, park maintenance, improved access to the area and multiple levels of camping facilities. By developing an OHV recreation park at this location, residents of Riverside as well as San Bernardino Counties will have a multi-use area that is within 70 miles of three of the top five Counties for OHV registered vehicles within the State.

#### C. Statement of Activities

Project funding will off-set project specific activities which include:

- (1) Preparation of a draft site development plan which meets the above listed BLM requirements.
- (2) Biological and cultural resource assessments along BLM designated OHV routes and existing, unidentified OHV routes.
- (3) Preparation of the appropriate NEPA/CEQA document for public review and comment.

The development of an OHV recreation park would directly address the needs of the OHV community in Riverside County. Public hearings have been held that strongly noted the lack of OHV riding opportunities within the County and the need for a dedicated OHV recreation park that would address the multiple skill levels within the OHV community. The OHV Commission was established to advise the County on future needs and represents not only individuals, but also the OHV industry. Multiple hearings will be held throughout the County during the design phase to assure that the park, when ultimately built, meets the needs of the broader OHV community, not only families, but also those who desire more difficult OHV riding opportunities requiring multiple levels.
