In general, Proposition 69, as made law in Penal Code Sections 296 (a) and 298, requires law enforcement or custodial agencies, statewide, to collect buccal swab samples, right thumbprints, and a full palm print impression of each hand, and any blood specimens or other biological samples collected from felony arrestees be forwarded promptly to the Department of Justice for law enforcement identification analysis and entry into the Department of Justice DNA Database.

Section 76104.6 of the California Government Code establishes a county DNA Identification Fund for reimbursement of expenditures and administrative costs incurred by the local sheriff or other law enforcement agencies in compliance with PC Section 298. An additional dollar for every ten dollars or part thereof is collected in every county for all criminal offenses to bank this fund.

The Sheriff's Department requests that the Board approve a County Executive Office transfer from the County's DNA Identification Fund, in the amount of \$1,012,596, to reimburse the Department for the estimated cost to collect the biological samples from 8,977 felony booking detainees who entered the County detention facilities during FY 2009-10.

As detailed below, staff calculated the collection cost based on actual log data for the period from July 2009 through May 2010 for the personnel devoted to collection tasks at Blythe Jail, Robert Presley Detention Center and Larry Smith Correctional Facility and based on monthly estimates from Indio Jail and Southwest Detention Center. This data was then projected through June 2010. An indirect cost rate of 43.17% was applied to salaries.
