BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Section 402(p) of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (Clean Water Act), the California Regional Water Quality Control Boards (Regional Boards) have promulgated three separate NPDES Municipal Stormwater Permits (Permits) regulating stormwater runoff within the urbanized areas of the County of Riverside.

Each Permit prescribes certain measures, often referred to as "Best Management Practices" (BMPs) that must be implemented in order that the stormwater runoff associated with new development and significant redevelopment projects complies with the provisions of the Permits and the Clean Water Act. The County of Riverside now requires nearly all new development and significant redevelopment projects to prepare a project-specific Water Quality Management Plan (WQMP) in accordance with the stipulations set forth in the applicable Permit.

In most cases, the project-specific WQMP will require construction of BMPs that capture, infiltrate or otherwise treat stormwater runoff originating from the project site. Responsibility for inspection, operation and maintenance of these structural BMPs is currently delegated, in the case of residential developments, to an individual homeowner or a home owners association (HOA), or, as in the case of commercial developments, an individual property owner or property owners association (POA). HOAs, POAs and individuals typically lack the expertise and wherewithal to effectively inspect, operate and maintain the BMPs. The failure of an individual property owner, HOA or POA to adequately inspect, operate and maintain the BMPs, as prescribed by the Permits, exposes the County to potential enforcement actions including penalties and fines imposed by the Regional Boards. The District has prepared a BMP Handbook, entitled "Design Handbook For Low Impact Development BMPs", that stipulates acceptable BMPs and BMP design criteria. The District has determined that it can provide, or cause to be provided, the necessary BMP maintenance effort and maintenance program oversight at a reasonable cost. A funding mechanism is necessary to offset the increased cost to the District for the BMP maintenance services that are to be provided under the proposed BMP maintenance program.

ESTABLISHMENT OF A WATER QUALITY FACILITIES MAINTENANCE COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT (WQFMCFD) IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE APPLICABLE PROVISIONS OF THE MELLO-ROOS COMMUNITY FACILITIES ACT OF 1982

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 402(p) of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (Clean Water Act), the California Regional Water Quality Control Boards (Regional Boards) have promulgated three separate NPDES Municipal Stormwater Permits (Permits) regulating stormwater runoff within the urbanized areas of the County of Riverside; and

WHEREAS, each Permit prescribes certain measures, often referred to as "Best Management Practices" (BMPs), that must be implemented in order that the stormwater runoff associated with new development and significant redevelopment projects complies with the provisions of the Permits and the Clean Water Act; and

WHEREAS, the County of Riverside now requires nearly all new development and significant redevelopment projects to prepare a project-specific Water Quality Management Plan (WOMP) in accordance with the stipulations set forth in the applicable Permit; and

WHEREAS, in most cases, the project-specific WQMP will require construction of small to medium-sized structures (BMPs) that capture, infiltrate or otherwise treat stormwater runoff originating from the project site; and

WHEREAS, responsibility for inspection, operation and maintenance of these structural BMPs is currently delegated, in the case of residential developments, to an individual homeowner or a home owners association (HOA), or, as in the case of commercial developments, an individual property owner or property owners association (POA); and

WHEREAS, HOAs, POAs and individuals typically lack the expertise and wherewithal to effectively inspect, operate and maintain the BMPs; and

WHEREAS, the failure of an individual property owner, HOA or POA to adequately inspect, operate and maintain the BMPs, as prescribed by the Permits, exposes the County to potential enforcement actions including penalties and fines imposed by the Regional Boards; and

WHEREAS, the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District (District) has prepared a BMP Handbook, entitled "Design Handbook For Low Impact Development BMPs", that stipulates acceptable BMPs and BMP design criteria for new development and significant redevelopment projects; and

WHEREAS, the District has determined that it can provide, or cause to be provided, the necessary BMP maintenance effort and maintenance program oversight at a reasonable cost; and

WHEREAS, a funding mechanism is necessary to offset the increased cost to the District for the BMP maintenance services that are to be provided under the proposed BMP maintenance program; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a study prepared by David Taussig & Associates entitled "Public Maintenance Alternatives Study For the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District" (November 2007), the District has determined that a Mello-Roos Community Facilities District (CFD) is the most appropriate and flexible means of funding the proposed BMP maintenance program; and

WHEREAS, existing HOAs, POAs or individuals that are currently burdened with maintaining structural water quality BMPs will be afforded an opportunity to annex into

the proposed CFD provided that the existing BMPs are reasonably accessible and meet the criteria stipulated in the District's BMP Handbook.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED by the Board of Supervisors of the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District in regular session assembled on May 15, 2012 that:

- 1. The District's publication entitled "Design Handbook For Low Impact Development BMPs" (September 2011), including any subsequent amendments thereto, is hereby adopted as the District's official guidance with regard to BMP design, construction, operation and maintenance. All new development and significant redevelopment projects shall follow and incorporate the criteria stipulated therein to the maximum extent practicable.
- 2. The District's General Manager-Chief Engineer is hereby directed to proceed with the establishment of the WQFMCFD in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 (Chapter 2.5 (commencing with Section 53311) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code).
