Riverside County Youth Commission Annual Report 2012-2013

In its role to initiate and support projects and services involving young people in Riverside County, the Commission shall provide advice, assistance and recommendations to the Board of Supervisors and all County Department heads. They shall work to anticipate the educational, recreational, and cultural needs of the youth of this county, and work to ensure the coordination of community resources in order to improve the quality of life for all its youth.

Listed below are key projects that the Youth Commission of 2012-2013 accomplished throughout the year. The Commission would also like to thank the community for their constant support through their endeavors and dedication to the youth in Riverside County.

• 15th Annual Youth Commission Retreat- August 2012

The 15th Annual Youth Commission Retreat was held August 1 at the Edward Dean Museum in Cherry Valley. Motivational speaker Dee Hankins provided the keynote and leadership workshops for this event. Mr. Hankins helped youth learn valuable leadership, communication and team-building skills. Council members were also given the opportunity to meet and network with YAC members from all five districts.

• Youth In Government Day –October 2012

The 14th annual Youth in Government Day was an exciting and important day for council members that participated. The event is an Annual Youth Commission Event, and provides a unique learning opportunity where participants are matched with County employees and spend the day learning from one another. Each participant was provided with a chance to job shadow a county employee and find out more about local government and the wide array of occupational opportunities that the County offers. Council members were able to job shadow positions in various departments including the offices of: Superior Court, Public Defender, Waste Management, Flood Control, Animal Services, Code Enforcement, Fire Department and the Board of Supervisors. The event was very successful and was the highlight of the year for many of the participants.

• "Stuff the Bus" Operation SafeHouse-November 2012

Each year, Operation SafeHouse shelters more than 600 teens in need of a safe place to stay. The house provides emergency shelter, intervention and outreach services to youth in crisis. By providing a warm caring environment, youth can address their problems and are offered positive alternatives to becoming victims of the streets.

Like many other nonprofits, the organization has been facing decreases in donations and grants while needs are increasing. In response, SafeHouse and Riverside Transit Agency, a partner agency, brainstormed ways to meet those needs. RTA suggested to "Stuff the Bus;" this event drives buses around downtown Riverside to gather donations of pillows, blankets, bathroom tissue, paper towels, toothbrushes, cleaning supplies and food. Each of the five districts assisted with the program by organizing their own supplies drive.

• 13th Annual Youth Summit-March 2013

Riverside County's Youth Commission held their Thirteenth Annual Youth Summit at the University of California, Riverside. The objective of this annual event is to create an avenue where Riverside County youth can discuss issues that affect their lives and community. Each year a theme is selected based on feedback from previous participants. This year students were given the opportunity to enjoy workshops focusing on Tolerance, Personal Safety & Self-Defense, and Distracted and Driving. Tiana Tozer served as the keynote speaker; Tiana inspired students to use compassion before they judge their peers based on stereotypes.

• 10th Annual Fourth District Youth In Government Day- April 2013

YAC coordinated Youth in Government Day, pairing high school students with 45 county employees. Students shadowed Superior Court Judges Victoria Cameron and James Hawkins, rode along with public safety agencies, witnessed court trials, hiked through the Desert Mountains and got a glimpse into the rewarding career choices available in public service. After six hours of seeing county government in action, students regrouped to discuss their experiences. Participating departments included Superior Court, Cal Fire, Sheriff's Department, District Attorney's Office, Probation, Economic Development Agency, Parks and Recreation, Mental Health, Transportation and Land Management, Social Services, Law Offices of the Public Defender, Office on Aging and the Environmental Health Agency.

Riverside County First District Youth Advisory Council Annual Report 2012-2013

The Youth Advisory Council is a representative student body from the high schools in the First District of Riverside County. High Schools that are located within the First District include: Alvord, Arlington, Bethel Christian, California Lutheran, Citrus Hill, Corner Stone Christian, Elsinore, Hillcrest, John W. North, Keith McCarthy Academy, Lakeside, La Sierra, Lincoln, Martin Luther King, Notre Dame, Ortega Continuation, Poly, Raincross-Independent, Riverside Christian, Sherman Indian, Temescal Canyon, and Woodcrest Christian High School.

Listed below are key projects that the Youth Advisory Council of 2012-2013 accomplished throughout the year. The council would also like to thank the community for their constant support through their endeavors and dedication to the youth in Riverside County.

• Deleo Regional Sports Park Grand Opening- August 2012

Youth council members attended the grand opening at Deleo Regional Sports Park in Temescal Valley. They helped assist with set-up and tear down of booths and assisted in cleaning up after the event. YAC members were thrilled that they were part of the grand opening and its wonderful addition to the Temescal Valley community.

• Movie in the Park - August 2012

YAC members participated in the Movie in the Park event at Wildrose Park in Temescal Valley. They brought their lawn chairs and blankets to watch the movie Lorax. There were pre-show activities for the kids that youth council members were able to assist and lead. Overall, this was an enjoyable event for the YAC members to attend before the beginning of the school year.

• Mariachi Festival – September 2012

The Youth Advisory Council volunteered their services at the Mariachi Festival. This event was held at Fairmount Park in Riverside. The event featured live mariachi performances and even a "wild or mild" salsa contest. YAC members helped volunteers set up and tear down booths. They also picked up trash around the park to keep it clean. This was an exciting event for the YAC members.

• The Lisa Project - September 2012

The Youth Advisory Council participated in the Lisa Project. This was a free multi-sensory exhibit held at the Galleria at Tyler Mall in Riverside. The goals of this project are to enhance awareness of child abuse in our county and to encourage families to adopt abused children. YAC really enjoyed this event and were very touched emotionally by this experience. This helped them become more aware of what is happening around them.

• Keep Riverside Clean and Beautiful - October 2012

The Youth Advisory Council participated in the "Keep Riverside Clean and Beautiful" Santa Ana River and Fairmont Park Watershed Cleanup. A total of four YAC members participated and helped clean up the area.

Members devoted most of their time to handing out waters and snacks to the hard working volunteers and helped feed 450 volunteers with food from Farmer Boys. The YAC members that were able to donate their time had a lot of fun helping with this great event and they heard nothing but praise from everyone including the KRCB workers.

• Riverside Citrus Classic Bike Ride- October 2012

The Youth Advisory Council was invited to help out at the 3rd annual "Riverside Citrus Bike Ride". The YAC was extremely excited to help with this noble cause of fundraising money for education. A total of 12 YAC members willingly and readily agreed to get their hands dirty to help. Much time was spent working and assisting at the bike valet. In the end, the YAC members had a great time helping all the bikers that were riding for education.

• Halloween Harvest Festival Trunk or Treat- October 2012

The Youth Advisory Council participated in Temescal Valley's Halloween Trunk or Treat event. The 6 YAC members that attended had a plethora of fun. The YAC members that attended helped run the multiple Halloween booths and some even ran the bouncy jumpers. This event was a great experience because the YAC had the chance to interact with the Temescal Valley community and pass out candy before Halloween.

Good Hope Halloween Fun- October 2012

Eight YAC members volunteered their services for the Good Hope community for Halloween. YAC members enjoyed being in charge of the arts and crafts booths that were open to the children. At this event, the YAC also unloaded pumpkins from a trailer to put in the event's pumpkin patch. Best of all, the YAC were allowed to take a pumpkin home.

• Stuff the Bus Scavenger Hunt/Operation Safe house - October 2012

The Youth Advisory Council asked First District residents of Lake Hills community to donate items for Operation SafeHouse. The SafeHouse provides emergency shelter, intervention and outreach services each year to more than 600 runaway, homeless and other youth in crisis. During the scavenger hunt, YAC collected items including paper towels, napkins, toilet paper, shower gel, toothbrushes and canned food.

After the scavenger hunt, the YAC members and the Youth Coordinator provided a pizza social for those at the SafeHouse. The teens shared their stories with the council members, which left everyone deeply touched. YAC has resolved to visit SafeHouse more often and help encourage those living there to continue moving forward.

Hope Food Drive at Albertson's - November 2012

YAC collected two boxes full of canned goods for H.O.P.E (Helping Our People of Elsinore) at the Albertson's in Lake Elsinore. The organization is always in need of items to continue serving the community. After the event, the council went to H.O.P.E to drop off the food and were greeted with gratitude for the work they had done.

- Lakeland Village Community Clean-up Day November 2012

 The Youth Advisory Council volunteered their services to Lakeland Village Community by signing in the constituents who were dropping off their trash. YAC also directed traffic into this event to make sure the event was as organized and successful as possible.
- Mead Valley's 6th Annual Breakfast With Santa and His Elves-December 2012
 On this special day, Mead Valley families came together, shared breakfast and took a picture with Santa. Children made arts and crafts in "Santa's Workshop," participated in "Reindeer Games" and received prizes from council members. YAC members wore elf hats while assisting the community's youth and had a terrific time. A total of 500 Mead Valley residents attended this event.
- Deleo Regional Sports Park Winter Wonderland December 2012

 11 YAC members attended the Winter Wonderland event. We had some YAC volunteer their services at the Snowman jumper and others volunteer at the ice skating rink. There were even a few YAC members who ran the real snow play area. This was a fun event and provided the surrounding Temescal Valley community with Christmas activities and arts and crafts. There was even a Christmas train. Overall, this event was successful because it brought the Christmas spirit to many families.
- Riverside County Anti-Human Sex Trafficking Documentary at CBU- January 2013
 This event was provided by Riverside County and Operation Safehouse. This
 documentary, held at California Baptist University, brought awareness to the community
 about the real dangers of sex trafficking. This documentary was based on a true story of
 Carissa Phelps, who is a survivor of human sex trafficking. YAC was very eager to
 participate in this event. With 8 YAC members total volunteering their time to help direct
 people and sign them in to the event. Overall, the YAC members were touched by the
 event.
- Janet Goeske Senior Center "Valentine's Day" Event- February 2013
 11 YAC members volunteered at the Janet Goeske Senior Center in Riverside. YAC members made homemade Valentine's Day cards for the seniors and passed them out that day. They also brought Valentine's Day cookies for the seniors to enjoy. After passing out the cards and goodies, the YAC conversed with the seniors in the art room and the bingo room. The seniors were very elated that the YAC came to visit them.

• Adopt-A-Trail Event at Hartford Springs- March 2013

5 YAC members participated in this event. Many of them worked with hoes, shovels, and rakes to amend the trail pathways. The trails also needed to be cleaned up due to a lot of trash. The YAC worked very hard at this event to make sure the trail was clean and leveled for their fellow community to enjoy.

• SafeHouse Hangout-March 2013

The SafeHouse provides emergency shelter, intervention and outreach services to runaway, homeless and other youth in crisis. At this event, council members brought pizza and soda to share with SafeHouse members. After they ate, council members played Dance 4 on Wii, basketball, among other games. Everyone got well-acquainted with each other by sharing school and family experiences. Council members really enjoyed this event and plan on coming back next term.

• Janet Goeske Gala Event- April 2013

10 YAC volunteers participated in the annual Janet Goeske Senior Gala Event. This event featured a show just like "Dancing with the Stars" where judges included Mayor Rusty Baily and Supervisor Jeffries. At this event, YAC members helped sign people in and also helped organized the live auction that was conducted after the show. Other YAC members were guards over the VIP sections and some even sold cheerleading pom poms for the event. Overall, this event was one of the YAC's favorite events they attended this council year.

• Keep Riverside Clean & Beautiful Litter Graffiti Abatement Clean Up- April 2013 YAC members volunteered their time picking up trash in the local Riverside community. Most importantly, they helped remove unwanted graffiti from poles and street signs. They were given gloves and yellow shirts to wear while cleaning. YAC partnered with "Mormon Helping Hands" to make this event successful.

• OpCo: Operation Community - September 20112

The Youth Advisory Council members were very committed to setting out and helping all those in need, with a particular focus for children of the Riverside community. OpCo had a main focus on awareness and bringing awareness through their participation in events or awareness within their own schools. The committee was flexible and willing to help in all areas and held their primary focus on their community.

She stated that the council worked to prepare approximately 400 bags and folders for the Annual Youth Summit Event. The second district is appreciative for all council members who attended the workday as they worked so diligently and came together as a team to ensure the success of the Youth Summit.

• Operation SafeHouse Ice Cream Social – March 2013

Operation Community decided to host a social with the teens of Operation SafeHouse. The event was amongst one of the most favored of the year as council members were allowed to fully engage and interact with youth much like themselves.

The day was dedicated to ice breakers, bonding over ice cream, and playing Just Dance. Overall, the members enjoyed themselves, learned to empathize, and said that there was more to gain in their participation for the day than they could have expected.

Volunteers helped provide support in keeping Riverside clean and beautiful by participating in a Riverside cleanup of about 900 volunteers. Members enjoyed the event as they were able to bond with their council all the while serving the community and the environment.

• End of the Year Dinner – May 2013

Council members enjoyed dinner with Supervisor Tavaglione and staff, as they celebrated the end of the YAC term. During the event, council members received special certificates for their dedication and volunteerism. The Council members commemorated immediate past Youth Coordinator, Tiffany Estevez, for her years of service and wished her luck in her future endeavors. All seniors were recognized for the accomplishments and contributions and shared their plans for the future. Overall, it was an enjoyable event and the members really had fun celebrating the term year.

• Global Youth Summit – May 2013

The summit was an exhibition of global issues, including a series of workshops conducted by some of the leading grassroots organizations in countless areas from Human Trafficking and Social Conflict to HIV/AIDS Awareness and Environmental Injustices. YAC members were invited to participate in the weekend long conference which was designed to be an unrestricted space of educated dialogue and meaningful conversation on the social issues directly and indirectly affecting our everyday lives.

Riverside County Third District Youth Advisory Council Annual Report 2012-2013

The Youth Advisory Council (YAC) is a representative student body from the high schools in the Third District of Riverside County. Third District YAC is comprised of students from Academy for Applied Academics and Technology, Alessandro, Chaparral, Great Oak, Hemet, Hamilton, Mountain View, San Jacinto, Tahquitz, Temecula Valley, and West Valley high schools.

Listed below are key projects that the Youth Advisory Council of 2012-2013 accomplished throughout the year. The council would also like to thank the community for their constant support through their endeavors and dedication to the youth in Riverside County.

• Third District Inaugural Meeting- September 2012

The first meeting for Third District YAC was on September 13. The council reviewed the goals they set at the Youth Retreat and began planning the types of events they wanted to create to achieve their goals. Elections for Commission Officers were held and the following council members were elected: Caroline Kittle– Commissioner, Itzel Tiscareno- Co-Commissioner, Mayra Tanori– Secretary, Lezza Rubio– Parliamentarian.

• Lisa Project- October 2012

The Lisa Project is a free multi-sensory exhibit about child abuse prevention. The exhibit shows different examples of child abuse and tells the stories of children who have been abused. It focuses on teaching the signs of abuse and how to prevent it. YAC members passed out flyers and bookmarks at their local high schools to promote the event and toured the exhibit in Hemet on October 13.

• Youth In Government Day- October 2012

Third District YAC members participated in the 13th annual Riverside County Youth in Government Day on October 24. Council members shadowed a Riverside County Employee for a day in order to learn about county government and careers. The majority of Third District YAC shadowed employees from the Riverside County Flood Control Department and learned about the various jobs required in flood control including engineering, logistics, environmental science, and waste management.

National Alliance on Mental Illness Walk- October 2012

YAC members participated in the National Alliance on Mental Illness Walk at Diamond Valley Lake in Hemet. The walk was a charity event to raise awareness about mental illness and help fund mental health services. YAC members collected donations and then participated in the 5km walk on October 27th.

• Operation SafeHouse "Stuff the Bus" Donation Drive-November 2012

Beginning in September council members began collecting supplies to donate to Operation SafeHouse. Operation SafeHouse is an emergency shelter that provides help, counseling, and other services to run-away, homeless and other youth in crisis.

Stuff the Bus was a donation drive to gather supplies needed for youth in the shelter. YAC collected supplies through September, October, and November and donated them on November 10th. The council collected over 200 items to donate to Operation SafeHouse.

• Cards for Wounded Soldiers- November/December 2012

Throughout November and December YAC members wrote Christmas cards to wounded soldiers who would be spending the holidays at Walter Reed Medical Center in Washington D.C. A Majority of these soldiers, many from Riverside County, were injured in Iraq and Afghanistan and would not be able to spend the holidays with their families. Walter Reed asks for cards to be sent each year to remind the soldiers that they are remembered for their service and others are thinking of them during the holidays.

• Southwest Regional Detention Center Tour- December 2012

On December 15 the YAC toured the Southwest Regional Detention Center in French Valley. The tour provided council members with information on how the County handles crime as well as the various programs employed to keep the communities in the district safe. The tour led the council members to make it a goal to provide help to outreach programs that help youth who are at risk of going to Juvenile Hall.

• TrueVolution Business/Entrepreneurship Workshop- January 2013

On January 3 Gabriel Maldonado, the founder of TrueVolution, presented a business/entrepreneurship workshop for Third District YAC. TrueVolution provides classes and workshops for youth targeted at leadership. The workshop taught YAC members about what is needed to run a business or project and how to turn their ideas into actual projects.

• Riverside County Anti-Human Trafficking Documentary "Carissa"- January 2013
The Riverside County Ant-Human Trafficking Task Force and Operation SafeHouse presented a screening of the Documentary Carissa on January 17 at California Baptist University. The Documentary was based on the story of Carissa Phelps a victim of sex trafficking. Following the film Carissa Phelps shared her story and explained how people can help to stop sex trafficking. Third District YAC volunteered at the event by helping to direct people to the screening room, signing them in for the event, and passing out literature at the end of the screening.

• Adopt-A-Trail – February 2013

On February 16,Third District YAC participated in a clean-up of their adopted trail at Lake Skinner. Council members cleaned up trash, leaves, and foliage from one of the lakes walking trails. This allowed the council to help improve one of the many public recreation areas within the county for the enjoyment of the community.

• Lamb Canvon Waste Management Facility Tour- April 2013

Members of YAC toured the Lamb Canyon Waste Management Facility on April 3. The tour taught council members about the importance of recycling and the correct way to dispose of hazardous materials.

Members also learned about what the county does to reduce the amount of waste that goes into the landfill through recycling and how the county focuses on environmental concerns. The council found many new ideas for projects that can help clean up their communities.

• California Citrus State Historic Park Earth Day Cleanup- April 2013

Members from Third District participated in a restoration and clean-up project at California Citrus State Historic Park on April 13. Members planted a total of 3 shade trees and cleaned up fallen fruit from the parks citrus grove.

• CA Healthy Kids Survey Review- April 2013

On April 24 YAC reviewed the results from the CA Healthy Kids Survey for Hemet United School District. They provided input on the survey data regarding drug, alcohol, and tobacco use at high schools in the districts. The data was used by the school district in the development of future anti-drug, anti-alcohol, and anti-smoking programs aimed at high school students.

• Global Awareness Summit- May 2013

Members from Third District YAC attended the TrueVolution Global Awareness Summit on May 18th. The Summit focused on how youth can help with global issues including trafficking and social conflict, HIV/AIDS awareness, and Environmental Injustices.

General Recommendations:

- Recruit more students from all the high schools in Third District.
- Work more with programs aimed at helping troubled youth such as Operation SafeHouse.
- Participate in more events that help to clean up the community such as Adopt-A-Trail, Earth Day, and park clean-ups.

Riverside County Fourth District Youth Advisory Council Annual Report 2012-2013

The Fourth District Youth Advisory Council (YAC) identifies youth-related concerns and issues specific to the Fourth District. YAC is comprised of students from Desert Christian Academy, Palm Desert, Palm Springs, Palo Verde, Marywood-Palm Valley and Xavier College Preparatory high schools.

Listed are the key projects the 2012-2013 Fourth District Youth Advisory Council accomplished throughout the year. The Fourth District YAC would like to thank the Board of Supervisors for their ongoing support through the year.

• Fourth District Inaugural Meeting- September 2012

The first meeting for the Fourth District Youth Advisory Council was held September 4th for the Coachella Valley Council and on September 5 for the Blythe Council. YAC members selected goals to work on throughout the 2012-2013 term. The Coachella Valley Council decided to direct their efforts toward: support for troops and their families, working with local animal shelters, building relationships with senior citizens, promoting environmental education and raising awareness on substance abuse. The Blythe Council decided they wanted to assist with: improving their local recreation center, helping Steps for the Cure, actively creating cemetery cleanups, supporting Operation SafeHouse and the Blythe Nursing Home. Elections for the 2012-2012 officers took place at the first meeting, the results were:

• Stan and Carolyn Little Conference- October 2012

Coachella Valley YAC members assisted with the Stan & Carolyn Little Early Childhood Education Conference held at the McCallum Theater and College of the Desert. The event was on Saturday, October 6 where council members helped with registration, speaker needs, and clean up.

• American Cancer Society Relay for Life- October 2012

The American Cancer Society held their annual event at Palm Desert High School. YAC members attended the second day of the fundraiser and were on hand to help clean up luminarias and sort through cans of donated food.

• Steps for the Cure- October 2012

The Blythe council volunteered at Blythe Cancer Resource Center's 6th annual "Steps for the Cure" fundraising event on Saturday, October 20. YAC members built a balloon arc, helped with set-up, and teardown. This event helps raise money that directly benefits those in the Blythe community stricken with cancer.

Miss Blythe Pageant- October 2012

Blythe takes great pride in their yearly crowning of Miss Blythe who will go on to compete in the Miss California Pageant. During the 2012 Miss Blythe Pageant held at Palo Verde College, council members were available to assist with set-up and ushering before the show.

• "Trick or Treating" for Canned Goods- October 2012

The weekend prior to Halloween, YAC members in the Coachella Valley came together to go door to door asking for donations of canned goods or other non-perishable food items. All of the items collected were donated to the Office on Aging Grandparents Raising Grandchildren program.

• Can Collection with PV Fire Department – October 2012

In late October, Blythe YAC members assisted the Palo Verde Fire Department with a can collection. Council members rode on fire trucks alongside firefighters and went door to door to ask Blythe community members to donate canned food to their local soup kitchen. Being a holiday season, this was a much needed and appreciated service.

• SafeHouse's Stuff the Bus supplies drive - September - November 2012

Coachella Valley YAC members collected toiletries and household supplies to donate to Operation SafeHouse's Stuff the Bus event on November 8. YAC volunteered at the exhibit on Saturday, November 10 and November 17 where they helped clean all of the audio equipment used for each participant. Council members helped spread the word by passing out bookmarks and fliers throughout the community.

• A Million Thanks Christmas Cards- November 2012

YAC members hosted a Christmas Card Writing Party in which council members wrote cards to stationed military soldiers. Each member was able to decorate and personalize a card and write an appreciative holiday letter to the soldiers. The cards were sent through A Million Thanks, an organization that collects, sorts, and sends letters to those serving home, abroad, or injured in hospitals.

• Grandparents Raising Grandchildren "Adopt a Family"- November 2012

Blythe adopted two families in their city, from the Riverside County Office on Aging's Grandparents Raising Grandchildren to provide complete Thanksgiving Dinners for their entire family. YAC members collected turkeys, side dishes, desserts, and beverages to feed both families. The items were then hand delivered by members from the Blythe council.

• Super Pet Adoption- November 2012

Loving All Animal's Super Pet Adoption was held at Whitewater Park on November 18. The goal of the event was to find homes for over 500 animals. Throughout the day, YAC members helped the various animal welfare programs keep the dogs entertained by taking them on walks and giving them one-on-one attention. Council members also organized a photo booth for the newly adopted pets.

Palm Springs Festival of Lights Parade- December 2012

The 21st annual Festival of Lights Parade was held in downtown Palm Springs on December 1 to celebrate the holiday season. YAC was responsible for walking banners in front of floats down the parade route.

• Civil Servants for Santa- December 2012

Each year for Christmas the Blythe Police Department invites children from low-income families to go shopping for their own Christmas gifts. On December 8, Blythe YAC members entertained the kids as they waited for their turn to shop with representatives from the Blythe Police Department.

• For the Children Toy Drive & Holiday Party-November/December 2012

With help from local businesses, YAC members diligently collected more than 100 gifts to make Christmas special for children living in foster homes. The toys were wrapped and distributed to the children at the annual Christmas party of For The Children, a nonprofit that supports foster children. The Christmas party was held at Hotel Zoso in Palm Springs on December 16. In addition to providing gifts, YAC members decorated cookies and did arts and crafts with the kids.

• RCAHT "People are NOT for Sale"- January 2013

Held at the UCR Palm Desert Campus, Jennifer O'Farrell from RCAHT created an avenue where human trafficking within the Riverside County could be discussed. Before the event, YAC made statistics posters to be displayed throughout the meeting. YAC members also helped assemble bracelets and distribute candles.

• Teens for Jeans Campaign- January 2013

During the month of January, the Blythe council ran a drive to collect jeans that would be given to homeless teenagers. Approximately 40 pairs of jeans were collected and donated to Aeropostale, the organization hosting the campaign.

• Christopher's Clubhouse Light of Hope Gala- February 2013

Christopher's Clubhouse, a community safety education and empowerment organization, held their annual awards gala on February 2. The event honors the heroes of the Coachella Valley that are protecting children and families. YAC members helped set-up silent auction items, decorate dinner tables, and coordinate bid sheets.

In an effort to bring more young people to enjoy Fair traditions, YAC members also organized the Fourth Annual High School Competition, featuring a series of funny Fair contests: date pit spitting, "camel" racing, lasso throwing, musical carpets and school spirit. Teams from six high schools competed for the prestigious Date Cup Trophy. YAC members selected the games, acted as referees and awarded trophies to the first, second, and third place teams. Palm Desert High School won the 2013 competition.

• Friday Night Live- February 2013

The Joe Wine Rec Center in Blythe hosted a Friday Night Live on February 22 for 4th-6th graders. YAC members refereed dodge ball games, ran an arts and crafts table, and played leadership games with the kids.

• Game Day at Nursing Care Center- March 2013

The Blythe Nursing Care Center provides activities for their senior citizens every day to keep them lively and positive. On March 9, YAC became involved in their afternoon session and played dominoes and bingo with the residents.

• Baseball Buddies- March 2013

Baseball Buddies is a local group that hosts weekly t-ball games for kids with disabilities. On Mondays throughout March and April Coachella Valley YAC members volunteered their time and helped these kids hit a baseball, run bases and cheer on their teammates.

Out of the Darkness Walk- March 2013

Coachella Valley held its 3rd annual American Foundation for Suicide Prevention's 5k Walk on March 16. At the event YAC members set-up a memorial tree and managed the water and snack booth. This walk allowed YAC members to see just how important community outreach programs are within their valley.
