#### Riverside County Youth Commission Annual Report 2013-2014

In its role to initiate and support projects and services involving young people in Riverside County, the Commission shall provide advice, assistance and recommendations to the Board of Supervisors and all County department heads. The Commission shall work to anticipate the educational, recreational, and cultural needs of the youth of this county, and work to ensure the coordination of community resources in order to improve the quality of life for all its youth.

Listed below are key projects that the Youth Commission of 2013-2014 accomplished. The Commission would also like to thank the community for their constant support through their endeavors and dedication to the youth in Riverside County.

#### • 16<sup>th</sup> Annual Youth Commission Retreat – August 2013

The 16<sup>th</sup> Annual Youth Commission Retreat was held August 1 at the Cove Waterpark in Jurupa Valley. Motivational speaker Michael Costigan provided the keynote and leadership workshops for this event. Mr. Costigan helped youth learn valuable leadership, communication and team-building skills. Council members were also given the opportunity to meet and network with YAC members from all five districts.

#### • Youth in Government Day – October 2013

The 15<sup>th</sup> annual Youth in Government Day was an exciting and important day for council members. The event is an annual Youth Commission event, and provides a unique learning opportunity where participants are matched with County employees and spend the day learning from one another. Each participant was provided with a chance to job shadow a county employee and find out more about local government and the wide array of occupational opportunities that the County offers. Council members were able to job shadow positions in various departments including the offices of: Superior Court, Public Defender, Waste Management, Flood Control, Animal Services, Code Enforcement, Fire Department and the Board of Supervisors. The event was very successful and was the highlight of the year for many of the participants.

#### • "Stuff the Bus" Operation SafeHouse – November 2013

Each year, Operation SafeHouse shelters more than 600 teens in need of a safe place to stay. The house provides emergency shelter, intervention and outreach services to youth in crisis. By staying in a warm caring environment, youth can address their problems and are offered positive alternatives to becoming victims of the streets.

Like many other nonprofits, the organization has been facing decreases in donations and grants while needs are increasing. In response, SafeHouse and Riverside Transit Agency, a partner agency, brainstormed ways to meet those needs. RTA suggested buses travel around downtown Riverside to gather donations of pillows, blankets, bathroom tissue, paper towels, toothbrushes, cleaning supplies and food. Each of the five districts assisted with the program by organizing their own supplies drive.

#### • 14<sup>th</sup> Annual Youth Summit – March 2014

Riverside County's Youth Commission held its Fourteenth Annual Youth Summit at the Riverside Convention Center. The objective of this annual event is to create an avenue where Riverside County youth can discuss issues that affect their lives and community. Each year a theme is selected based on feedback from previous participants. This year students were given the opportunity to enjoy workshops focusing on drug and alcohol awareness, child and elderly abuse, and suicide prevention. Cary Trivanovich served as the keynote speaker; Cary inspired students to think about the consequences of their actions.

#### • 11<sup>th</sup> Annual Fourth District Youth In Government Day – April 2014

YAC coordinated Youth in Government Day, pairing high school students with county employees. The event is held for those in the eastern portion of the county and was the largest version of the event to date. After six hours of seeing county government in action, students regrouped to discuss their experiences. Participating departments included Cal Fire, Sheriff's Department, District Attorney's Office, Board of Supervisors, Probation, Economic Development Agency, Parks and Recreation, Mental Health, Transportation and Land Management, Social Services, Law Offices of the Public Defender, Office on Aging and the Environmental Health Agency.

#### Riverside County First District Youth Advisory Council Annual Report 2013-2014

The First District Youth Advisory Council is a representative student body from the high schools in that district. High schools that are located within the First District include: Alvord, Arlington, Bethel Christian, California Lutheran, Citrus Hill, Corner Stone Christian, Elsinore, Hillcrest, John W. North, Keith McCarthy Academy, Lakeside, La Sierra, Lincoln, Martin Luther King, Notre Dame, Ortega Continuation, Poly, Raincross-Independent, Riverside Christian, Sherman Indian, Temescal Canyon, and Woodcrest Christian High School.

Listed below are key projects that the Youth Advisory Council of 2013-2014 accomplished throughout the year. The council would also like to thank the community for their constant support through their endeavors and dedication to the youth in Riverside County.

#### • Adopt-a-Trail - August 2013

Youth council members attended the Adopt-A-Trail event in Mead Valley to prepare for the upcoming Mead Valley Community Center grand opening. Many of them worked with hoes, shovels, and rakes to amend the trail pathways. One of the YAC members even used a weed whacker to remove the weeds. The YAC worked very hard at this event to make sure the trail was clean and leveled for the fellow community to enjoy.

#### Mead Valley Grand Opening - August 2013

YAC members participated in the Mead Valley Community Center grand opening. They helped assist with this great event by hosting booths and serving food to the community. Overall, the YAC members including those members who live in the area, enjoyed this event.

#### • EDA Flier Distribution – September 2013

The Youth Advisory Council helped the Economic Development Agency distribute fliers to local Mead Valley residents. The council members helped EDA spread the word throughout the community about EDA's Beautification program, which encourages residents to clean up their property.

#### • Mariachi Festival - September 2013

The Youth Advisory Council volunteered at the annual Mariachi Festival. This event was held at Fairmount Park in Riverside. The event featured live mariachi performances and participation from many different businesses including Sam's Club. YAC members helped the volunteers set up and tear down booths. They also picked up trash around the park to help keep the area clean.

#### • Keep Riverside Clean and Beautiful - October 2013

The Youth Advisory Council participated in the "Keep Riverside Clean and Beautiful" event. This event was at the Santa Ana River and Fairmont Park Watershed Cleanup. YAC members spent a lot of the time handing out water and snacks to the hard working volunteers and at the end of the day fed many volunteers with hotdogs and chips.

#### • Halloween Trunk or Treat- October 2013

The Youth Advisory Council participated in Temescal Valley's Halloween Trunk or Treat event. The six YAC members that attended helped run the multiple Halloween booths and some even ran the bouncy jumpers. This event was a great experience because the YAC had the chance to interact with the Temescal Valley community and pass out candy to the little kids before Halloween.

#### • Operation SafeHouse "Stuff the Bus/Scavenger Hunt" - October 2013

The Youth Advisory Council asked First District residents of Woodcrest community to donate items for Operation Safehouse. Additionally, the council created a scavenger hunt, where YAC collected items including paper towels, napkins, toilet paper, shower gel, toothbrushes and canned food. After the scavenger hunt, 11 YAC members picked up pizza and drove over to SafeHouse to have lunch with the teens in crisis. They all had a poignant experience at SafeHouse because the teens took the opportunity to share their touching stories.

#### • Hope Food Drive at Albertson's - November 2013

YAC collected multiple bags full of canned goods for H.O.P.E (Helping Our People of Elsinore) at the Albertson's in Lake Elsinore. The organization is always in need of items to continue serving the community. Grocery shoppers were more than happy to help the cause and were encouraging of YAC's efforts.

- Mead Valley's 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Breakfast With Santa and His Elves December 2013
  On this special day, Mead Valley families came together, shared breakfast and took a picture with Santa and his sleigh. Children made arts and crafts in "Santa's Workshop," participated in "Reindeer Games" and received prizes from council members. YAC members wore elf hats and reindeer hats while assisting the community's youth and had a terrific time. Many Mead Valley residents attended this event along with an honored visit from Supervisor Jeffries. A wide variety of volunteers from various agencies assisted the community with this wonderful event. C
- Good Hope's 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Breakfast With Santa and His Elves December 2013
  On this special day, Good Hope families came together, shared breakfast and took a picture with Santa and his sleigh. Children made arts and crafts in "Santa's Workshop," participated in "Reindeer Games" and received prizes from council members. YAC members wore elf hats and reindeer hats while assisting the community's youth, making for an overall terrific time. Many Good Hope residents attended this event along with an honored visit from Supervisor Jeffries.

#### • KRCB Lunar Festival – January 2014

YAC members helped assist with the annual Lunar Festival. At this event, YAC members volunteered at many of the arts and crafts booths that were available for the children in the community. The YAC members helped children make paper lanterns and paper fans. This event was a great opportunity for the Youth Council members to learn more about the Asian Culture.

#### • 80's Volunteer Recognition – February 2014

Eleven YAC members participated in this 80's themed event hosted by Riverside County Parks. The Parks Department set up this event to recognize the volunteers for all their hard work and service. The Youth Council members were able to play unlimited miniature golf and were given take home gifts. YAC was truly thankful for Parks display of appreciation.

#### • Good Hope Park Cleanup – April 2014

YAC members helped clean up the Good Hope Park located adjacent to the Good Hope Community Center. Their duties included picking up trash and pulling weeds. Additionally, the council members also took part in some construction. This event was on "Global Youth Service Day" and members were invited by County Parks to help clean up a park in their representative district.

#### • RCRMC Child Abuse Victims Unit – April 2014

YAC members made Easter cards to deliver to the Riverside County Medical Center's Child Abuse Victims Unit. Youth Council members were given a tour of the department and were surprised to hear all the horrific facts of child abuse including the fact that every day 3 out of 4 children that die from abuse are under the age of four. Overall, this event was very informative, and the council members were glad they could shine some light on the department with their Easter cards and snacks.

YAC volunteered at the annual Janet Goeske Senior Gala Event. This event featured a show filled with Motown dances where judges included Mayor Rusty Bailey and Supervisor Jeffries. At this event, YAC members helped sign people in and also helped organized the live auction that was conducted after the show. Listed below are key projects that the Youth Advisory Council of 2013-2014 accomplished throughout the year. The council would also like to thank the community for their constant support through their endeavors and dedication to the youth in Riverside County.

#### • Anza Health and Safety Fair – September 2013

Members of the Third district assisted with the First Annual Anza Valley Health and Safety Fair. The fair was designed to bring the residents in Anza Valley information and resources on health and safety that they did not have access to in their area. Members of Third District YAC assisted in setting up the area, helping vendors, and taking down the fair when it ended.

#### • NAMI Walk – November 2013

YAC members participated in the National Alliance on Mental Illness Walk at Diamond Valley Lake in Hemet. The walk was a charity event to raise awareness about mental illness and help fund mental health services. YAC members collected donations and then participated in the 5k walk.

#### • Stuff the Bus – November 2013

Beginning in September, council members began collecting supplies to donate to Operation SafeHouse. Operation SafeHouse is an emergency shelter that provides help, counseling, and other services to run-away, homeless, and other youth in crisis. Stuff the Bus was a donation drive to gather supplies needed for youth in the shelter. YAC collected supplies through September, October, and November to donate. The council collected one bus full of items to donate to Operation SafeHouse.

#### • Tinsel Triathlon – December 2013

Third District volunteered at the Tinsel Triathlon held at West Valley High School. The council operated a water station for the cycling section of the triathlon, handed out water to cyclists, and cheered them on.

#### • A Brush With Kindness – December 2013

The council worked with Habitat for Humanity to help paint the home of a veteran. Members painted the outside of the home as well as the gutters and trim around the house.

### • Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Christmas Toy Drive – December 2013 The Third District YAC donated toys and money in order to buy children, who are currently being raised by their grandparents within the Third District, presents for the

holidays. Additionally, Third District YAC raised enough funds to buy each family a \$25 grocery store gift card to help with any needed items for Christmas dinner. Third District YAC raised a total of \$727.00 and was able to adopt four families. Each child received between roughly six and twelve toys each depending on the price of the toys. YAC members then got together and helped wrap the presents and deliver the gifts.

#### • Letters to Troops – December 2013

The Third District YAC met in December to spend an evening writing heartfelt thanks and good wishes to wounded soldiers who would be spending the holidays at Walter Reed Medical Center in Washington D.C. Third District YAC members made small paper ornaments and hand-crafted cards created. A majority of the soldiers, many from Riverside County, were injured in Iraq and Afghanistan and would not be able to spend the holidays with their families. Walter Reed asks for cards to be sent each year to remind the soldiers that they are remembered for their service and others are thinking of them during the holidays.

#### • Brush With Kindness – January 2014

YAC participated in a Habitat for Humanity Brush with Kindness event. Third District YAC members assisted other Habitat for Humanity volunteers in doing a yard clean-up which involved weeding, stripping and painting a fence, and gardening.

#### • Adopt-a-Trail at Lake Skinner – January 2014

Council members worked with the Adopt-a-Trail program to help provide maintenance to one of the trails around the Lake Skinner Recreation Area in Temecula. This included weeding, trash clean-up, foliage clean-up, and some minor fencing repair.

#### • 2014 Riverside County Fair and Date Festival – January/February 2014

The Third District YAC met and travelled throughout the Third District to distribute posters and informational flyers for the 2014 Riverside County Fair and Date Festival. The Third District YAC members provided information on the event and encouraged locals to attend. Additionally, Third District YAC volunteered at the event by distributing handouts, helping with booths, and giving direction to participants.

#### • Global Youth Service Day at Lake Skinner – April 2014

The Third District YAC participated in Global Youth Service Day and National Volunteer Week by helping to plant a new garden at the Alamos School House located in the Lake Skinner Recreation Area. Global Youth Service Day celebrates and mobilizes the millions of young people who improve their communities through service. The Third District YAC was excited to assist in planting a new garden, full of plants native to the area. The goal was to help re-integrate these plants into the ecology of the Lake Skinner area.

#### • Earth Dance – April 2014

The council members volunteered at Earth Dance, an event geared toward bringing the community together in celebration of Earth Day and National Dance Week. Members of

the community gathered to host booths, dance together, and watch performances with an emphasis on environmental awareness. Additionally, Third District YAC was able to host a booth at this event and invited high school students to learn more information about the Youth Advisory Council and Commission and how they can help make a difference for the youth in Riverside County by joining YAC.

#### • A Flag for Every Hero Flag Placing Ceremony – May 2014

YAC participated in the A Flag for Every Hero Flag Placing Ceremony at the Riverside National Cemetery. With respect and in honor of our fallen soldiers, the Third District YAC placed small American flags at soldier's graves and spent the morning remembering their sacrifice for this country. The Third District YAC felt that this was an important event, reminding all what Memorial Day is all about. The Third District YAC were blessed to have been able to show that the youth of Riverside County appreciate and will never forget the sacrifices made by these brave men and women.

#### • Senior Social at Atria Vintage Hills – June 2014

The Third District YAC worked with Atria Vintage Hills Senior Living Center to host a Senior Social. YAC sought to provide entertainment to the residents by putting on short performances including music, dance, and games. Additionally, the YAC members sat with the residents and spent some time talking with them. YAC members brought hand written letters of appreciation and warm thoughts to give to the residents and were able to show them how valued they are to our community and to the local youth.

#### • National Innovative Communities Conference – June 2014

The council attended the National Innovative Communities Conference. The conference focused on bringing valuable information to local residents, youth, law enforcement, non-profits, faith-based organizations, educators, business proprietors, parents, and policy makers. Third District YAC enjoyed the privilege of learning about various organizations throughout the county and were inspired by how they plan on improving the lives of residents within Riverside County.

- Participate in more events that help to clean up the community such as Adopt-A-Trail, Earth Day, and park clean-ups.

#### Riverside County Fourth District Youth Advisory Council Annual Report 2013-2014

The Fourth District Youth Advisory Council (YAC) identifies youth-related concerns and issues specific to the Fourth District. YAC is comprised of students from Desert Christian Academy and Palm Desert, Palm Springs, Palo Verde, Cathedral City, Shadow Hills, Amistad, and Indio high schools.

Listed are the key projects the 2013-2014 Fourth District Youth Advisory Council accomplished throughout the year. The Fourth District YAC would like to thank the Board of Supervisors for their ongoing support throughout the year

#### • Fourth District Inaugural Meeting – September 2013

The first meeting for the Fourth District Youth Advisory Council was held September 11 for the Coachella Valley Council and on September 9 for the Palo Verde Valley Council. YAC members selected goals to work on throughout the 2013-2014 term. The Coachella Valley Council decided to direct their efforts toward: finding ways to promote environmental awareness and help make 4<sup>th</sup> District a cleaner place, raising awareness on the issues of food insecurity and poverty, working with local organizations to provide support to children experiencing health complications, and creating service projects to promote community safety. The Palo Verde Valley Council decided they wanted to assist with: creating an engaging community for youth, providing help to the less fortunate, supporting and working with "Blythe Cancer Resource Center", promoting the importance of higher education, and finding ways to unite the 4<sup>th</sup> District Youth Advisory Council. Elections for the 2013-2014 officers took place at the first meeting, the results were:

#### • National Coastal Cleanup Day – September 2013

Council members started off the year by partnering with another local youth group from the Esperanza Youth & Family Center. The two groups decided to take part in National Coastal Cleanup Day at Dana Point. YAC was able to clean up the shoreline as well as the connected bridge and park area, collecting a total of 16 buckets full of trash and debris.

#### • National Night Out – October 2013

National Night Out Against Crime was hosted in Cathedral City by a variety of organizations all focused on promoting a safe lifestyle for families. YAC members were

asked to take part in the event by the District Attorney's Office – Division of Victim Services. During the festivities, YAC members helped with set up and teardown, and oversaw numerous crime prevention related booths and children's activity areas.

#### • Steps for the Cure – October 2013

The Blythe council volunteered at Blythe Cancer Resource Center's 7<sup>th</sup> annual "Steps for the Cure" fundraising event. YAC members built a balloon arc, helped with set up, and teardown. This event helps raise money that directly benefits those in the Blythe community stricken with cancer. Additionally, the council provided free pink lemonade to everyone at the event and created "Flips for a Cure" which helped raise \$40 for the cause.

#### • Trick or Treating for Troops – October 2013

After some research YAC found that things as simple as candy are not always available to the soldiers serving our country. Throughout the month of October, YAC members asked local businesses to provide candy donations that would go towards troops. In addition, on the day of Halloween, YAC members in Blythe and Coachella Valley went door to door asking for candy donations.

#### • Animal Samaritans Walk for the Animals – November 2013

The annual event raises money for the care of Animal Samaritans' homeless shelter animals and its Humane Education program. YAC members were able to help facilitate the "Dog Art Booth" and Kids Zone. The council interacted with both children and animals of the community, promoting animal welfare education, and providing entertainment.

#### • Multicultural Festival – November 2013

A Multicultural Festival was held at the Palo Verde College and featured dancing, music, ethnic foods and informational booths, promoting lifestyles from throughout the world. At the event, Palo Verde Valley YAC collected tickets, monitored doors, and helped direct vendors to their assigned areas.

#### • Grandparents Raising Grandchildren "Adopt A Family" – November 2013

Palo Verde Valley and Coachella Valley YAC each adopted two families from the Riverside County Office on Aging's Grandparents Raising Grandchildren program. The objective was to provide complete Thanksgiving Dinners for their entire family. YAC members collected turkeys, side dishes, desserts, and beverages to feed both families.

#### • Operation SafeHouse's Stuff the Bus – November 2013

Palo Verde Valley and Coachella Valley YAC members placed boxes at their respective schools and local businesses to collect household supplies to donate to Operation SafeHouse's Stuff the Bus event. YAC members collected bags of clothes and much needed toiletries. All of the items that were collected were given to SafeHouse of the Desert during the week of the Stuff the Bus event.

#### • Healing Field – November 2013

YAC felt blessed and honored to take part in the Healing Field flag memorial at Patriot Park. Volunteers came together to remember the lives of all fallen soldiers from the war in Iraq and Afghanistan. Council members placed 8,000 flags and name tags in memory of each individual life lost. This was an experience that each YAC member felt grateful for, ultimately being given the opportunity to see how many have sacrificed.

#### • WE Connect Health Fair – November 2013

Uninsured families in the Eastern Coachella Valley were able to access critical services and learn about new benefits available at the WE Connect Health Care Enrollment and Resource Fair. YAC members were able to assist in the Kids Zone, hand out packages of donated food, and help people share their health story.

#### • Palm Springs Festival of Lights Parade – December 2013

The 22<sup>nd</sup> annual Festival of Lights Parade was held in downtown Palm Springs in early December, helping local residents and tourists ring in the holiday season. YAC was responsible for walking banners and floats down the parade route.

#### • Civil Servants for Santa – December 2013

Each year the Blythe Police Department invites children from low-income families to go shopping for their own Christmas gifts. Palo Verde Valley YAC members helped the event coordinator check children in. YAC also entertained the children by playing games and singing Christmas carols.

#### • Mecca Festival of Lights Parade – December 2013

YAC members had the opportunity to represent Supervisor Benoit and the 4th District Youth Advisory Council by participating in the Mecca Festival of Lights Parade. They rode inside CAL Fire's utility truck with Santa Clause, bringing seasonal cheer to eastern valley residents.

#### • Harmony Lunch Kitchen – December 2013

Palo Verde Valley YAC volunteered at Harmony Lunch Kitchen on December 23, 30, and 31. There was a maximum of 5 volunteers allowed from YAC to participate in each date, due to its limited ground space. At the event YAC helped serve food, carried guest's plates to the tables, and wiped down tables.

#### • For the Children Toy Drive & Holiday Party – December 2013

With help from local businesses and the 29 Palms Marine Base, YAC members diligently collected more than 300 gifts to make Christmas special for children living in foster homes. The toys were wrapped and distributed to the children at the annual Christmas party of For The Children, a nonprofit that supports foster children. This was the first event both Coachella Valley YAC and Palo Verde YAC got to work together and during the party they helped with set up, created ginger bread houses with the children, and handed out toys. Additionally, YAC decided to donate 100 leftover toys to the Galilee Center in Mecca to help with their annual giveaway.

#### Holiday Arts & Crafts at Desert Regional Medical Center – December 2013

The council was motivated to center a project on children experiencing health problems and reached out to Desert Regional Medical Center to create a holiday themed event. YAC members decorated stockings, snowflakes, and hats with patients at DRMC's Pediatric Unit.

#### • Survivors of Trafficking Speak Out – January 2014

Held at the UCR Palm Desert Campus, Jennifer O'Farrell from RCAHT created an avenue where human trafficking within the Riverside County could be discussed. Before the event, YAC made statistics posters to be displayed throughout the conference. YAC members then helped assemble bracelets and distribute candles.

#### • Cemetery Cleanup – January 2014

Council members visited the local cemetery to help with a much-needed cleanup. At the cemetery, YAC members cleaned head stones, raked leaves, and disposed of tree trimmings.

#### • Graffiti Cleanup – January 2014

YAC members thought it was important to address the graffiti that can be seen in the cities of the Coachella Valley. The council turned to the Economic Development Agency's Graffiti Task Force to help them accomplish this goal. Through this collaboration, YAC was able to scrub, clean, and paint graffiti that had been reported in Desert Hot Springs and Thousand Palms.

#### • Game Day at the Nursing Care Center – January 2014

The Blythe Nursing Center is always in need of volunteers to spend a couple hours with the elderly. YAC visited the Nursing Care Center and became involved with the elderly by playing bingo, dominos, and chess.

#### Riverside County Fair & National Date Festival Events- February 2013

#### o Battle of the Bands

YAC took an active role in the 68<sup>th</sup> Annual Riverside County Fair & National Date Festival, helping to coordinate two unique attractions. YAC held the Fifth Annual Battle of the Bands, where seven local bands competed for the grand prize of top-of-the-line Fender instruments and equipment. The competition was a popular attraction at the Fair and generated great attendance and excellent news coverage. YAC members had a hands-on role in organizing the event and working with judges to ensure the event ran smoothly. The Hive Minds from Palm Springs won the 2014 competition.

#### High School Competition

In an effort to bring more young people to enjoy Fair traditions, YAC members also organized the Fourth Annual High School Competition, featuring a series of funny Fair contests: date pit spitting, "camel" racing, lasso throwing, musical carpets and school spirit. Teams from four high schools competed for the prestigious Date Cup Trophy. YAC members selected the games, acted as referees and awarded trophies to the first, second, and third place teams. Palm Desert High School won the 2014 competition.

#### Love and Care Packages for Troops – February 2014

An organization called Operation Gratitude helps collect care packages filled with snacks, entertainment items and personal letters of appreciation. These items are delivered to U.S. service members deployed in hostile regions, service members' children, and wounded warriors recovering in military hospitals or transition units. Palo Verde Valley YAC helped collect personal care products for a care package that was shipped through Operation Gratitude, which dispersed the care package to U.S. service members deployed in Afghanistan.

#### • Friday Night Live – March 2014

YAC visited the Joe Wine Recreation Center for Friday Night Live. At the event, the council played games with the children, facilitated arts and crafts, and played musical chairs for prizes. In addition, the Joe Wine Recreation Center was hosting a Scarf Drive for Troops, in which YAC also participated.

#### Baseball Buddies – March 2014

Baseball Buddies is a local group that hosts weekly t-ball games for children with disabilities. On Mondays throughout March and April, Coachella Valley YAC members volunteered their time and helped the participating kids catch a baseball, run bases, and bat.

#### • Youth Force Cleanup – March 2014

The Clean Youth Force is a program sponsored by Supervisor John J. Benoit which has designated funds to assist eligible representatives of under-resourced nonprofits serving the Coachella Valley and Blythe areas. Council members spent hours in North Shore, cleaning up an illegal dumpsite covered with tires, waste, and household items. They received \$2000 for their efforts, with all proceeds donated to the nonprofit, Christopher's Clubhouse.

#### Rotarians at Work Day Mural Project – April 2014

The Rotary Club, Coachella Valley and Palo Verde Valley YAC painted a mural on a blighted building at former gas station on First Street and Hobsonway in Blythe. Wayne Cusick, the current Rotary Club president and project coordinator, hosted the project and invited YAC to participate. This mural depicts the Palo Verde Valley's desert, farmland, river, mountains, and sky. It was also the first time the Coachella Valley YAC took part in a Blythe project within the last couple of years.

#### • Global Youth Service Day – April 2014

#### Mavflower Park

Palo Verde YAC hosted Global Youth Service Day at Mayflower Park with resources provided by RivCo Parks. At the event, YAC and volunteers spent the morning assembling benches, collecting trash, and debris throughout the park.

#### o Lake Cahuilla

Coachella Valley YAC members joined their fellow districts by partnering with Riverside County Parks to facilitate Global Youth Service Day. YAC members joined other youth volunteers at the Lake Cahuilla Recreation Area, where they helped paint brand new benches for the entire park and gave the children's playground a full cleaning.

#### • Day at the Animal Shelter – May 2014

The Riverside County Department of Animal Services welcomed YAC to spend a few hours playing with the animals at the shelter on a Friday afternoon. The animals don't get enough attention at the shelter, and YAC was honored that they could spend some of their time connecting with the homeless animals in their community.

#### • Pet Toy Drive – May 2014

The Riverside County Department of Animal Services asked the community's help to raise toys for the animals at the shelter in Blythe. YAC created a toy drive to support the local animal shelter. The toys were collected at the May YAC meeting and were delivered when YAC visited the shelter for "Day at the Animal Shelter."

#### • Afternoon Fun at Blythe Recreation Center – May 2014

In an effort to promote higher education, Palo Verde YAC committed their time to working with children at the Joe Wine Recreation Center by helping with homework for the month of May. After assisting the children complete their homework, the council had the opportunity to play games, do arts and crafts, and other activities.

#### • Christopher's Clubhouse Light of Hope Gala – May 2014

Christopher's Clubhouse, a community safety education and empowerment organization, held their annual awards gala in early May. The event honors the heroes of the community that are protecting children and families. YAC members took a vital role in this year's event by helping set up silent auction items, facilitating check-in, decorating dinner tables, coordinating bid sheets and payment, and cleaning up silent auction items.

#### • Jill Grant Memorial Scholarship Car Wash Fundraiser - May 2014

In collaboration with the Palm Desert Youth Committee, YAC members co-hosted a car wash fundraiser at Palm Desert Self-Serve for \$5 a car. A total of \$1000 was raised with all proceeds benefiting the Jill Grant Memorial Scholarship, a fund set-up in the name of a local beloved math teacher who was tragically killed in December.

#### Recruitment

Recruitment for the Fourth District Youth Advisory Council is ongoing through the end of the term and summer. Council members provide contact information of students they recommend for the 2014-2015 council. Youth Advisory Council members have also invited potential applicants to events and meetings during the end of the term. The Fourth District Youth Advisory Council is advertised through local media, Supervisor Benoit's Web site and monthly e-report The Benoit Bulletin, letters to school officials, community leaders and local organizations, and word of mouth.
