BACKGROUND:

Summary

On November 2, 2004, the California electorate passed Proposition 69, which became law on November 3, 2004. The intent was to clarify existing law and to enable the state's DNA and Forensic Identification Database and Data Bank Program to become a more effective law enforcement tool.

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BACKGROUND:

Summary

Section 76104.6 of the California Government Code established a county DNA Identification Fund for reimbursement of expenditures and administrative costs incurred by the local sheriff or other law enforcement agencies in compliance with Penal Code Section 298.

In general, Proposition 69, as made law in Penal Code Sections 296 (a) and 298, requires law enforcement or custodial agencies, statewide, to collect buccal swab samples, right thumbprints, and a full palm print impression of each hand, and any blood specimens or other biological samples from felony arrestees. Those collections are then forwarded promptly to the Department of Justice for law enforcement identification analysis and entry into the Department of Justice DNA Database.

The Sheriff's Department requests a budgetary establishment within the DNA special fund to facilitate the reimbursement of costs related to collecting biological samples from felony booking detainees entering the County detention facilities during FY 2015-16.

Impact on Citizens and Businesses

Proposition 69 was voted on by the people of California to aid law enforcement by providing the use of the DNA data base and the Data Bank program for the purposes of reducing the number of unsolved crimes, apprehending predators, exonerating persons wrongly accused of crime and identifying human remains.
