SUBJECT: Support of School of Medicine at University of California, Riverside


RECOMMENDED MOTION: That the Board of Supervisors: support the inclusion in the federal Health Resources and Services Administration budget of \$100 million dedicated to the development of new medical schools and direct the Executive Office and the board's advocates in Washington, D.C. to further the Board's action.

BACKGROUND:

The federal budget inclusion of these funds would enable the development of new medical schools in federally designated Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA). Should the \$100 million be included in the final budget, U.C. Riverside would be able to apply for needed funds to assist in the development of the medical school, including construction and facilities.

The UC Riverside School of Medicine would partner with regional hospitals and clinics for its clinical programs and would attract new physicians to practice in the Inland region. It would also encourage high-tech start-up companies and medical related facilities to locate in our communities. And finally, a medical school would improve healthcare dramatically throughout Riverside County.

EDUCATION FOR TOMORROW'S HEALTH CARE

Debate is underway in Washington D.C. on funding allocations for Fiscal Year 2011. The University of California, Riverside School of Medicine stands to be greatly impacted by proposals in both the Senate and the House. Your support is critical in the next two months.

SENATE ADVOCACY

Senators Feinstein and Boxer are currently prioritizing their appropriations requests for Fiscal Year 2011. UC Riverside has submitted a request for \$5 million in support for instructional facilities, including medical simulation laboratory equipment, necessary to open the school.

HOUSE ADVOCACY

House leaders have begun debating President Obama's FY2011 Budget Request. The request included \$7.6 billion for the Health Resources & Services Administration (HRSA) of which \$100 million would be dedicated to the development of new medical schools in federally designated health professional shortage areas.

Should the \$100 million request be included in the final budget, UC Riverside would be able to apply for grants to assist in the development of the medical school including construction and facilities.

Talking Points for Advocacy

- Support the President's HRSA budget request of \$100 million for the development of medical schools.
- Physician shortages are projected at the national, state and regional levels. To minimize the impact of a looming national physician shortage – forecast to be at least 124,000 by 2025 – the American Association of Medical Colleges has called for a 30 percent expansion in medical school enrollments by 2015.
- The School of Medicine at UCR will address the severe physician shortage in Inland Southern California by training a diverse physician workforce and will partner with the region's health care providers, community members, researchers and educators to improve the health of people living in this region.

UCR School of Medicine An Economic Engine for Inland Southern California

Every primary care physician in California has an annual economic impact of nearly \$1 million, in addition to the much-needed medical care they provide.

- Primary care physicians **create jobs, buy goods and services and generate income for other health care providers**, such as hospitals, specialist physicians and nursing facilities.
- Training and retaining more physicians in Inland Southern California will not only address the severe physician shortage. It will also **stimulate the economy in a region with one of the nation's highest unemployment and housing foreclosure rates.**

The School of Medicine at UCR will itself have a transformative impact on the economy of Inland Southern California.

- Medical schools and teaching hospitals in 2008 had a total economic impact in California of **\$41.6 billion and accounted for nearly 235,000 jobs.**
- Nationally, every dollar spent by a medical school/teaching hospital indirectly generates an additional \$1.30 when it is "re-spent" on other business and individuals, resulting in a **total impact of \$2.30 per dollar.**
- The UCR School of Medicine will **directly create hundreds of jobs.** It will also:
 - Generate **construction of more than \$500 million.**
 - Attract to the region **millions of dollars of additional federal research funds.**
 - **Stimulate new business formation in high-tech industries** as discoveries are spun off to develop new pharmaceuticals, medical devices and other health care innovations.
 - Incubate a **new medical nanotechnology industry** in Inland Southern California.
 - Collaborate in the education and training of other health care professionals to **create jobs and meet workforce needs for nurses, pharmacy technicians, physician assistants and laboratory technicians.**
