

ACCEPTANCE OF HIDTA GRANT PROGRAM FUNDS FOR MUTLTIPLE COUNTY INITIATIVES (RMTF, INCH & INCA) BR 10-092 Page 2

BACKGROUND: The U.S. Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) has notified the Riverside County Sheriff's Department that it has been allocated HIDTA Program funds for this year. The proposed grant award period will be from January 1, 2010 through December 31, 2011. County Counsel has approved the award documents as to form.

For over eighteen years, Riverside County has participated in the HIDTA program, which fosters cooperation among law enforcement agencies in their efforts to eliminate drug trafficking locally and nationally. The LA-HIDTA is comprised of the Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, and San Bernardino counties. The Office of National Drug Control Policy and LA-HIDTA have confirmed that Riverside County's allocation for this grant award cycle is \$1,396,405.

Based on this award, grant funds will be distributed among the County project initiatives in the following manner:

Regional Methamphetamine Task Force (RMTF) \$395,843 Inland Narcotics Clearing House (INCH) \$533,786 Inland Crackdown Allied Task Force (INCA) \$466,776

No County match is required.

Operating with a focus throughout the entire LA-HIDTA region, the primary mission of the RMTF is to target major methamphetamine production, distribution, and Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTO) by investigating, disrupting, and arresting person(s) and organizations involved in illicit sales and trafficking of methamphetamine thereby improving the quality of life for all citizens, both regionally and nationally.

Statistics indicate that methamphetamine availability remains a constant concern and narcotic traffickers typically use well-established highways and pipelines to smuggle, ship and move methamphetamine and other illicit narcotics. In an effort to combat the availability of these narcotics, RMTF, using grant funds, will continue the deployment of highway interdiction team, comprised of two narcotic detecting canines and their respective handlers. These teams will be used to identify, disrupt, and arrest DTOs that regularly use these highways and trafficking routes to further their criminal enterprise(s).

In previous years, LA-HIDTA directed RMTF funding for both Riverside and San Bernardino Counties to the Riverside County Sheriff, and we would transfer San Bernardino's share to them. However, starting with this year's grant that practice has been discontinued.

INCH will also aid the task forces by providing connectivity to the Statewide Integrated Narcotics Systems (SINS). Additionally, INCH will assist by providing necessary case support and serve as a clearing house for the dissemination of narcotics related intelligence.

For the first time, per this year's grant budget, Riverside County will use INCH grant funds to pay for two crime analysts. Due to the State's hiring freeze over the last few years, the Department of Justice, a partner in the clearinghouse operations, has obtained crime analyst staff members through a personnel recruiting agency, Strategic Contracting Services (SCS). The County will disburse grant funding to the LA CLEAR, a Los Angeles HIDTA task force, which is purchasing the service from SCS.

Utilization of SCS as the single source provider of this service provides the County maximum flexibility for the deployment of these grant funded positions during this period when we also have determined that the hiring of permanent positions must be curtailed. The Sheriff's Department receives trained analysts whose services can be discontinued at the term of grant funding. In addition, the Department is satisfied that the Strategic's price is reasonable. The average cost for salaries and benefits currently paid a Sheriff's Crime Analysts is \$86,024 per year. SCS will supply an analyst for approximately \$60,000 per year.

INCA, established in 1996, will support the efforts of the State Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement (BNE) in enforcing the controlled substance laws of California. The INCA task force is comprised of numerous law agencies within the jurisdiction of the LA-HIDTA. This cooperative effort, coupled with their ability to jointly work with similar Crackdown Task Forces, has proven to be highly effective in the investigation of DTOs within the region.

The grant also provides funding for an accounting staff position at the Sheriff's Special Investigations Bureau, which the Department is proposing to fill at the Accounting Technician I (AT I) level.

Staff conducted an Internet search, and sought recommendations from other intelligence support managers.

Unique features of the supply/service being requested from this supplier, which no alternative supplier can provide:

Utilization of SCS as the single source provider of this service provides the County maximum flexibility for the deployment of these grant funded positions during this period when we also have determined that the hiring of permanent positions must be curtailed.

Usage of SCS will also allow us the ability to obtain the same unique personnel and services that are provided to Los Angeles County Regional Criminal Information Clearinghouse (LA CLEAR), which is a Cal-DOJ State organization. The intelligence analysts that LA CLEAR provides through Strategic Contracting Services remain a constant necessity throughout the region. To fill these positions is a lengthy, extensive time consuming process, which if delayed can inhibit the effectiveness of the program for Riverside and San Bernardino County law enforcement.

Reasons why my department requires these unique features and what benefit will accrue to the county:

For continuity of the current drug enforcement effort, LA CLEAR has stressed to the Sheriff's Department the importance of retaining the contracted intelligence personnel.

There are no costs to the county for the recruitment, background checks, hiring or training of Strategic Contracting Services personnel. With the contract personnel, the County can immediately terminate their employment when grant funding is no longer available.

Price Reasonableness:

The Sheriff's Department will save money on recruitment and background checks. Further, the average cost for salaries and benefits currently paid a Sheriff's Crime Analysts is \$86,024 per year. SCS will supply an analyst for approximately \$60,000 per year.

GRANT CONDITIONS

A. General Provisions

B. Special Conditions HIDTA Grants

- 2. This award is subject to the requirements in ONDCP's HIDTA Program Policy and Budget Guidance.
- 3. No HIDTA funds shall be used to supplant state or local funds that would otherwise be made available for the same purposes.
- 4. The requirements of 28 CFR Part 23, which pertain to information collection and management of criminal intelligence systems, shall apply to any such systems supported by this award.
- 5. Special accounting and control procedures must govern the use and handling of HIDTA Program funds for confidential expenditures; i.e. the purchase of information, evidence, and services for undercover operations. Those procedures are described in Section 6-12 of the HIDTA Program Policy and Budget Guidance.
- 6. The grant recipient agrees to account for and use program income in accordance with the "Common Rule" and the HIDTA Program Policy and Budget Guidance. Asset forfeiture proceeds generated by the HIDTA-funded initiatives shall not be considered as program income earned by HIDTA grantees.

C. Payment Basis

- 1. A request for Advance or Reimbursement shall be made using the HHS/DPM system (www.dpm.psc.gov). Copies of invoices or payroll registers must accompany the payment confirmation number to provide documentation for the reimbursement request. Requests for advances must be accompanied by details specifying the need for the advance. Documentation of how the advance was spent must be submitted within 21 days before another advance or reimbursement will be approved.
- 2. The HIDTAs, or their respective grantees, must utilize the HIDTA program Financial Management System's (FMS) Disbursement module each time they submit a disbursement request to the NHAC. Requests for payment in the DPM system will not be approved unless the required disbursements have been entered into the FMS. Payments will be made via Electronic Fund Transfer to the award recipient's bank account. The bank must be FDIC insured. The account must be interest bearing.
- 3. Except for interest earned on advances of funds exempt under the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act (31 U.S.C. 6501 et seq.) and the Indian Self-Determination Act (23 U.S.C. 450), grantees and subgrantees shall promptly, but at least quarterly, remit interest earned on advances to HHS/DPM.
