

### COMMUNITY FOOD PANTRY OF MURRIETA 2 NO HAND TREASURES THRIFT STORE COMMUNITY OUTREACH CENTER OF THE VALLEY

Dear Supervisors:

The Community Food Pantry of Murrieta would like to thank you for your continued support of CDBG funds. Your support has made a dramatic difference in the lives of the Murrieta residents we help.

In 1997 the Community Food Pantry of Murrieta was formed and a group of committed volunteers representing all ages, ethnicities and faiths, who share the same commitment to serve the needs of the community, started collecting donations of food from markets, organizations and individuals.

The Community Food Pantry of Murrieta provides nutritious emergency food at no cost to those residents in Murrieta, Winchester/French Valley; through our "Healthy Food for Healthy Family" program; whose personal resources are limited and who are unable to provide adequately for themselves and their families and the homeless.

Our Family Outreach program provides Family Resources: facilitating, networking and providing diverse support resources with other city, county, federal, social services in the area; with applications, information and assistance to those needing services beyond the scope of our programs.

In January 2008 we moved to 38444 Sky Canyon Dr., #170, Murrieta to a 14,260 sq.ft.fFacility thus providing the COMMUNITY OUTREACH CENTER OF THE VALLEY: COMMUNITY FOOD PANTRY OF MURRIETA and 2<sup>ND</sup> HAND TREASURES THRIFT STORE with the necessary space in order to provide the following programs.

Due to the extreme and direr economic conditions the Murrieta, Winchester/French Valley areas have been one of the hardest hit areas in Riverside County and the nation. Food prices, Gas prices, Loss of jobs due to construction/ businesses/stores closing (over 2,000 jobs have been lost in our valley alone). Foreclosures have forced many families to become homeless. Over 4,000 homes are in foreclosure just in the city of Murrieta.

We have gone from assisting 5 families in 1997 to now doing 455 families a week!!!!! It is a day to day job just to purchase and process enough food to help these families each week.

We just had a 73 year old woman collapse in our arms as she walked in, sobbing,, that she had not eaten for days, except for a few pieces of toast. We had a family of four come in, the father had lost his business and 5 employees and they only had oatmeal to eat for a week!!!

We are also networking with Project Touch. This organization is now providing temporary shelter to homeless as well as hot meals. We help them by donating food items for the hot meals and also clothing and items as needed.

Our goal: <u>WHEN THE HUNGRY ARE FED</u>. We are here to help assist those who are out of work, on food stamps, fixed or low-income, grandparents who are taking care of their grandchildren, elderly on fixed income, families whose parents work seasonal jobs, disable and homebound, homeless and victims of abuse. Families who have lost their jobs and homes make up the <u>NEW HOMELESS</u>, as we have over 120 families living with families and friends who now do not have a permanent address. We have several homes with 11 members, even one with four adults and (14) fourteen children.

We are the <u>only Community Outreach Center</u> in the valley offering services, programs and assistance as the Temecula office has closed.

### This is a critical situation.

This project and the expansion will be in the number of families coming to us in need of food and referral information. Last year we had 995 families (unduplicated number) registered at the food pantry. To date we have 1,100 families registered and we still have three months to go.

The number of families we serve has continued to grow. In 1999-2000 we served 3,250 families

In 2009-2010 we served 20,052 families

In the fiscal year 1999-2000 we provided 90,272 meals to a total of 12,896 people. In the fiscal year 2009-2010 we provided 1,107,558 meals to a total of 63,289 people. Since 1997 we have handed out 3,454,019 meals.

The operation has grown from 6 to over 300 community volunteers representing all ages, ethnic groups and faiths who share the same commitment to serve the needs of the community. They collectively volunteered more than 62,000 hours of service last year. All volunteers work together toward our common goal of service to the community.

### We facilitate the following programs:

- Facilitate the monthly disbursement of USDA Surplus Food Commodities from HUD.
- Provide multi-vitamins for children and Centrum/Caltrate for adults through the USA Vitamin Relief Foundation program.
- Distribute toothbrushes in a quarterly basis. To promote healthy hygiene habits.
- Provide baby food and diapers to the SAFE (Safe Alternatives for Everyone) Program.
- Participate in the FAN (Food Assistance Network) Program in conjunction with the Riverside County Department of Public Health.
- Working with Riverside County Department of Public Health and FIRST 5 we hand out fliers regarding vaccinations and other health brochures.
- Facilitate many local programs: IEHOP Healthy Families Health Care, Medically Indigent Services Program, Michelle's Place for free mammograms, Shared Housing and Labor Ready as well as many other programs.
- Work with Red Cross, Welfare, United Way, Murrieta Police and Fire Departments.
- Work with the Foster Care program to help children stay with their parents in a non-violent family situation. Through Riverside County Superior Court we are assisting the Riverside Center for Change, Mental Health System, Inc. We provide food, clothing, house-wears, clothing, baby diapers, furniture and beds.
- This year we have been asked by the SCSEP (Senior Community Service Employment Program) to open our doors to their seniors.

• This year we have been asked by the SCSEP (Senior Community Service Employment Program) to open our doors to their seniors.

### Mentoring to our youth:

- Provide the opportunity for social development in a productive environment for several groups of
  developmentally disabled adults from Care-Rite Recreational Services to work side by side with our
  volunteers. Working in our facility has provided these adults the confidence and skills to be able to
  obtain a paying job. Last year they donated 549 volunteer hours.
- Plan-It Life, Inc. works with students in need of psychiatric help. They volunteer here as a reward which is a confidence builder.
- Great Oaks Bridge group of students also volunteer. Some sort and clean shoes, some sort and put books on the shelves and some hang clothing.
- We provide the opportunity for the Murrieta School District, Linfield Christian School and Dehesa Charter School students the opportunity to do their community service hours.
- The thrift store and food pantry provide to the students from Oak Grove, the opportunity to gain work
  experience and training for the transition from school to a job. Oak Grove is a nonprofit educational
  and residential treatment center for children suffering from psychological, emotional, abuse and neglect.
- Working with Temecula Alternative Sentencing, Superior Court of California, Temecula Probation
  Department, Murrieta Police Department, Probation Dept. Riverside County Alternative Sentencing Program,
  Temecula Youth Accountability Team (YAT), Youth Accountability Board (YAB), San Diego Probation
  Department, Volunteer Center of Riverside and probation officers we accept teens/clients needing to complete
  their court ordered community service hours.

### Our goal is WHEN THE HUNGRY ARE FED.

With just a few bags of food we are able to give those the food of life to go on, to look for work, to get back up on to their feet and to feel better about themselves.

Success? We are successful in that we have been able to provide a service to the community of Murrieta since 1997. We are successful in that we have been able to provide this service, be self sufficient, through the support of the community and donations from organizations like yours.

BUT - we have not been successful in stopping hunger. The results of our evaluation show a continued increase in those needing assistance, especially in this economy

ALL PEOPLE NEED AND WANT TO FEEL GOOD ABOUT THEMSELVES, THE SUPPORT WE OFFER GIVES THEM THE INCENTIVE TO GET UP EVERY DAY AND TO WANT TO LIVE.

### 2011-12 P.A.L. MENTOR PROGRAM OUTLINE

A collaboration by and between
The San Jacinto Police Activities League, The Hemet Police Activities League &
Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District

### Mission:

To positively impact the lives of at-risk youth by providing adult support and learning opportunities that promote character development and life-enhancing values through wholesome recreational and educational activities.

### Philosophy:

By providing youth with consistent, caring mentors, they will learn life skills and develop core values through exposure to educational opportunities and wholesome recreational activities. Mentors will learn how to use teachable moments to exemplify these values.

### Goals/Purpose:

To help young people build character and life skills through exposure to wholesome recreational and educational activities.

Mentors will be part of a team that takes responsibility for each youth. Mentors will spend time with youth to develop a healthy genuine relationship. Mentors will exemplify a positive adult role model. Mentors will invest their time in activities that build character and enhance self esteem, mutual trust, confidence, communication, leadership, teamwork, and perseverance.

### **Program Guidelines:**

### Meetings

Youth and adult mentors will meet once a month for group outings for 10 months. Group outings will consist of the following activities:

- 5 Day Recreational Boot Camp in Idyllwild
- Game Nights which will allow mentors and youth to participate in a variety of recreational activities and ice breaker exercises.
- Educational fieldtrip to the Museum of Tolerance in Los Angeles;
- Educational tour to Mt. San Jacinto Community College, University of California Riverside, and the University of Redlands.
- Career Development Workshops including: Creating a Life Plan (which will include short and long term goals and steps to reach them) and Preparing for the Workforce (which will teach youth how to create a resume, fill out an application, how to dress professional and will provide role plays in job interview scenarios).

In addition the pairs will meet for two hours every other week (four hours per month) for 10 months. All pairs will exercise the Buddy System with another Mentor and Mentee pair. In addition to the bi-weekly meetings, mentors and mentees must attend a training session, a program kick-off, and supervisory meetings.

The meetings will take place at Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District facilities in Hemet and San Jacinto.

### Accountability Team

In addition to meetings, an Accountability Team (comprising of the program coordinator and advisors) will complete monthly grade checks and conduct teacher, parent and counselor conferences to monitor youth's progress.

Mentors and mentees must complete written applications and mentors must complete a background check.

### **Benefits:**

- Mentees: The program will help young people to develop important life skills, learn about the world of work, plan for the future, improve school attitudes and performance and build self-confidence.
- Mentors: In addition to providing mentors with the satisfaction of giving back to their community, workplace mentoring can help build company morale, improve employee productivity and contribute to overall job satisfaction.

### Hemet & San Jacinto Police Activities Leagues Youth Boot Camp

### **Project Overview**

This project will provide 50 at risk youth from the Hemet-San Jacinto Valley with an intensive five day recreational boot camp experience in Idyllwild, California. The program is balanced with a combination of:

- Physical Training: squad competitions, obstacle courses, drills, challenging high ropes course and outdoor survival skills.
- Education & Enrichment: guest speakers, career exploration, law enforcement presentations including bomb squad, emergency response helicopter, k-9 unit, visit to Idyllwild Nature Center, and completion of a three paged "Life Plan".

Boot Camp ends with a graduation on the last day.

### Goals & Objectives

The program is designed to strengthen confidence, communication, leadership abilities, and teamwork. In addition, the program forges a bond between local law enforcement officers and at risk youth that can last a lifetime. The Boot Camp Program is an important component of the **Hemet and San Jacinto P.A.L.'s 2011-12 Mentor Program**, which will provide ongoing mentorship after Boot Camp. Once the youth complete the five day Boot Camp Program they will be assigned to an adult mentor and Accountability Team.

### **Expected Outcome**

Past experience has shown that with the Boot Camp experience and continued mentorship, youth show significant improvements in behavior. In addition, youth become more in positive community based programs. Youth are also less likely to be involved in delinquent activity and destructive behavior. The program makes a positive impact in the lives of youth and contributes to the reduction of juvenile crime in the community.

### **Program Evaluations**

Participants, parents and officers will be given **surveys** at the end of the five day camp and asked to provide feedback on all components of the Boot Camp experience. Additionally, P.A.L. will continue to work with each youth after the Boot Camp to determine the effectiveness of the program. In addition, participants, parents and officers will be invited to participate in small **focus groups** to determine the lasting effects of the project.

### **Collaborations**

This is a collaborative effort between the San Jacinto P.A.L., Hemet P.A.L. and Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District. Local law enforcement officers play a significant role in this worthwhile program as the "Drill Instructors." Officers teach drills, physical training and set a sharp tone of discipline and respect. Directors from the Hemet and San Jacinto PAL programs and Valley-Wide comprise the support staff.

### **Funding Request**

Specifically, the requested funding of \$15,000 would be used to cover payroll expenses of law enforcement officers for the 2010 Youth Boot Camp, an important component of the Youth Mentor Program.
