Bud was a Patriot serving in the U.S. Navy prior to his longtime employment with the Riverside Cement Company where he retired from in 1983. As a prominent member of the community, he was actively involved with the Rubidoux Riding Club and rode on numerous trail rides with the DeAnza Trail Caballeros.

Bud was a devoted husband to his wife Lorraine, who preceded him in death, a dedicated father to his son Doug and daughter Diana, and a bighearted grandfather of two and great-grandfather of five. His memory and passionate spirit will live forever in the hearts of those who knew and loved him. He will be deeply missed.

On motion of Supervisor Benoit, seconded by Supervisor Buster, and duly carried by unanimous vote, IT WAS ORDERED that the meeting of Tuesday, August 16, 2011, be adjourned in memory of Dr. Max Harry Weil, 84, a resident of Rancho Mirage and "Father of Critical Care Medicine."

In 1952, Max Harry Weil graduated with an M.D. at the State University of New York, College of Medicine. As a resident physician in 1955, Dr. Weil was involved in creating many innovations, including the first bedside shock cart. In 1958, Dr. Weil and Dr. Herbert Shubin started the first shock ward with monitors.

By 1961, the pair founded the Institute of Critical Care Medicine, a world-renown research and educational center located in the desert since 1991. Work by the institute's researchers has led to the creation of life-saving equipment such as defibrillators and chest compressors and the method used to measure levels of shock.

The 1975 death of Dr. Shubin had a profound impact on Dr. Weil, who was inspired to make CPR training widespread in the community. The Weil Institute's CPR program now trains 2,000 students and 600 adults in the Coachella Valley each year. Dr. Weil's concern for the legal liability of good Samaritans was instrumental in the passage of stronger protections to encourage these courageous acts of kindness to others.

Dr. Weil taught and trained us all to be our brother's and sister's keeper in their time of need. He is survived by his wife, Marianne Posner Weil, daughters Susan Margot Weil and Carol Juliet Weil and four granddaughters. His memory and distinguished service will live forever in the hearts of everyone who knew him. He will be dearly missed.

The Board of Supervisors commemorates his outstanding life.
