SUBJECT: County Historic Landmark Designation - District I/I

HISTORICAL INFORMATION: The Tank House was used to pump hot mineral/sulfur spring water into a health spa complex. It was built in 1880 and originally located at 116 Lakeshore Dr., Lake Elsinore. The Tank was built as one story structure with a second floor added in 1930. The Tank House probably supplied water to Leeman's Resort which had a warm mineral swimming pool, and solarium. The property was sold in the 1990's to Charles and Carma Saathoff, and the resort was re-named Panacea Resort and Health Spa. This unique building is small and narrow (8 feet by 20 feet). It was dismantled and reconstructed near the Santa Fe Railroad Station on West Graham. People are drawn to it by its singular appearance. It is a touchstone for Lake Elsinore and its heritage (at one time) of over 300 wells and springs.
