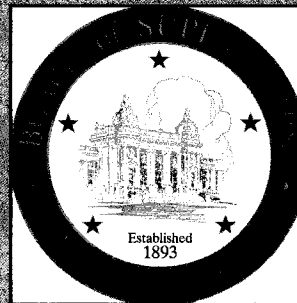

The MHB consists solely of a group of consumer advocates who's aim is to educate, advocate for ready access to services, and guide consumers through the mental health system.

The MHB is committed to ensuring that culturally competent services are provided to all people of ethnic, cultural, racial and linguistic backgrounds through program review and appropriate recommendations.

EXECUTIVE REPORT

The Mental Health Board (MHB) would like to thank the Board of Supervisors for their continuing support of the needs of the Department of Mental Health (DMH). With this support, the Department continues to provide effective and efficient mental health services to the citizens of Riverside County.

The California Welfare and Institutions (W&I) Code 5604.2 mandates the Mental Health Board to review the services of the county's mental health system and assess those programs to make sure they meet our citizens needs. The MHB meets ten months of the year; August and December have been designated as "Dark" months. However, if a need for a meeting arises, an emergency meeting can be called. The Executive Committee meets the Tuesday following each MHB meeting, and is tasked with reviewing the MHB meeting notes and establishing the agenda for the following MHB meeting. The Executive Committee consists of the MHB Chair, Vice Chair, Board Secretary, Mental Health Director or his Designee, and the MHB/DMH Liaison. The Board requires that each member participate in at least one of the Board's "standing committees" and/or attend the California Association of Local Mental Health Boards/Commissions (CALMHB/C). The standing committees submit monthly reports which update the MHB on it's activities. Site visits are conducted by the MHB, regional boards, and committee members to ensure that the consumer's needs are adequately met. During the visits, board members have the opportunity to evaluate the services provided, and program staff have a chance to provide recommendations for improvement.

Jerry Wengerd, Department of Mental Health Director, keeps the MHB apprised of the State and County Budget discussions and the effects that they might have on the services rendered. The department provides monthly presentations on innovative programs and the services provided.

The MHB receives monthly updates on Proposition 63 "Mental Health Services Act" (MHSA) and on the services provided as a result of this act. The MHSA

Manager, Mr. Bill Brenneman L.C.S.W., keeps the Board informed of the implementation of the Act's five different components, and the status of those programs currently in place. The Board has placed great emphasis on the budgets and funding streams which support MHSA.

Under Proposition 63, the MHB is mandated to hold public hearings on any new program or annual update. Each program or update must be publically posted for a minimum of thirty days before public hearings can be held.

The subjects and dates of the Public Hearings held this past year are as follows:

◆ Innovation - July 6, 2011

Riverside County DMH requested \$2.5 million to conduct a four year pilot Older Adults Program as part of the MHSA Innovation component. This Program is testing a new integrated service delivery model for Riverside County DMH by establishing an Older Adult Self-Management Team for consumer engagement and self-management support through intensive coordinated physical and mental health care.

◆ FY12/13 Plan Update - April 4, 2012

The Plan Update is submitted in accordance with MHSA regulations which requires County DMH to submit a three year Program and Expenditure Plan and update it on an annual basis. For FY12/13 Riverside County enhanced, expanded, and continued with existing, previously approved MHSA programs. The Plan Update provides an Implementation Update for the activities and programs conducted during FY10/11, and also provides a Forecast of Anticipated Programs and Goals for FY12/13.

◆ Perris Family Apartment Housing Project - May 2, 2012

Community Stakeholders had an opportunity to provide comments to the MHB on the Perris Family Apartments Project on May 2, 2012. The Perris Family Apartments is a proposed new construction affordable multi-family housing community located in the City of Perris which will include fifteen supportive housing units for TAY (transitional age youth), adults, and older adults with a mental health diagnosis. Perris Family Apartments is consistent with the Riverside County DMH MHSA Community Services and Supports (CCS) Plan and the County's adopted 10-Year Plan to end homelessness, both of which seek to expand the capacity of safe, affordable permanent independent housing.

As the W&I Code dictates, the MHB is responsible for reviewing contracts pursuant to W&I Code section 5650. Any contract falling under this code is discussed and then voted upon by the MHB, if a quorum is present.

Riverside County covers a large geographical area. Due to its size, the County has appointed three regional boards to ensure that the MHB is kept informed and connected with all Riverside County citizens. These regional boards are located in the Western, Mid County, and Desert Regions of Riverside County. As MHB Chair, I would like to thank those members of the regional boards who make all aware of the community's needs by submitting monthly reports of their regions to the MHB.

The MHB anticipates that you will be pleased with the report to follow. Through the efforts of the MHB and DMH, the services provided to the mentally ill consumers of Riverside County are some of the best offered by any county mental health agency, as the MHB takes great pride in meeting it's obligations and responsibilities to the citizens of Riverside County.

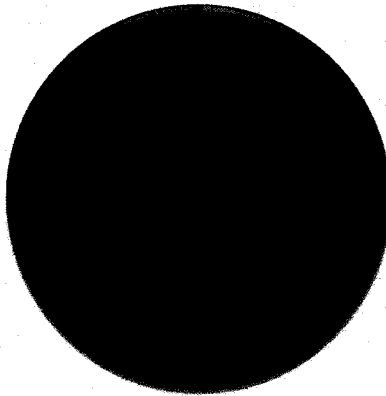
Composition of Board

The Mental Health Board (MHB) for the County of Riverside shall consist of 16 members appointed by the Board of Supervisors in accordance with Welfare and Institutions Code, Section 5604, as amended by Chapter 1374. One member of the MHB will be a member of the Board of Supervisors or his/her formal designee. Fifty percent (50%) of the board membership shall be consumers, or the parents, spouse, sibling, or adult children of consumers who are receiving or have received mental health services. At least twenty percent (20%) of the total membership shall be consumers, and at least twenty percent (20%) shall be families of consumers. Each member of the Board of Supervisors shall appoint three persons from their district to the MHB.

The MHB for the County of Riverside also consist of three Regional Mental Health Boards: Western, Mid-County, and Desert. The purpose of the Regional Mental Health Boards is to serve in an advisory capacity to the Regional Managers and the MHB, and to ensure that all County mental health programs and services of the respective geographical areas are responsive to community needs. The Regional Boards convey the goals and programs of service to the community, and represent and serve as a two-way communication link between the regional service and the general public, key segments of the community, and geographic areas within the county. Each Regional MHB focuses on specific Supervisorial Districts. The Western Regional Board addresses Supervisorial Districts 1, 2 and parts of 5. The Mid-County Regional Board concentrates on Districts 1, 3, and parts of 5, and the Desert Regional Board focuses on Districts 4 and parts of 5.

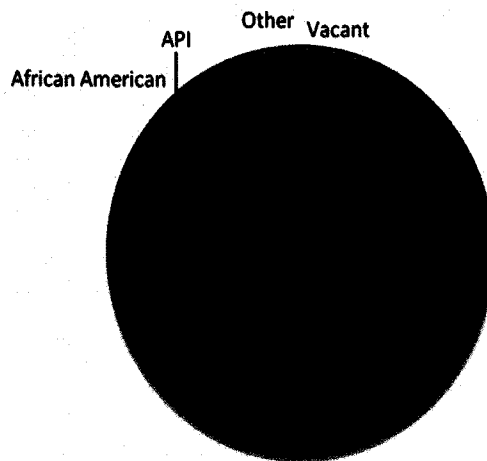

Housing Committee Report

July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012

The Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) provides specific funds for the purpose of creating permanent supportive housing for people that are homeless or at risk of homelessness and have a chronic, persistent, and disabling mental health condition. The Riverside County Department of Mental Health (DMH) has implemented a balanced county-wide strategy to ensure that housing opportunities are provided across its three service delivery regions and that the housing opportunities address the housing needs of adults, older adults, and transition age youth (TAY). All MHSA units that were completed and made available were occupied by eligible mental health consumers within thirty days of their availability. Currently, all MHSA units that are available are occupied. Turnover of the units has been very low, and the vacancy time for any unit that becomes available is less than two weeks.

DMH has adopted a successful model for implementing its permanent supportive housing program that is now operational in four different apartment communities across Riverside County. All communities are staffed by a full time case manager employed by the DMH. The case manager has a separate, on-site office that allows for meetings and discussions to take place privately with mental health consumers. The community room and common area facilities are also available to mental health consumers for learning sessions and group wellness and recovery activities. The following communities are currently open, staffed by a full time case manager, and are fully occupied:

- ◆ **Rancho Dorado** - This is a 150 unit community located in the City of Moreno Valley which provides fifteen MHSA units, scattered throughout the site, for all mental health consumers. Rancho Dorado opened in 2010.
- ◆ **Vintage at Snowberry** - This is a 224 unit senior community located in the City of Riverside which provides fifteen MHSA units, scattered throughout the site, for older adult mental health consumers. Vintage at Snowberry opened in 2011.
- ◆ **Legacy** - Located in the City of Thousand Palms, this is a 75 unit community providing fifteen MHSA units, scattered throughout the site, for all mental health consumers. Legacy opened in May 2012.
- ◆ **The Vineyards at Menifee** - This is an 80 unit senior community located in the City of Menifee which provides fifteen MHSA units, scattered throughout

the site, for older adult mental health consumers. The Vineyards at Menifee opened in May 2012.

The production of housing units is a process that involves the input of numerous construction, development, finance, and legal professionals, and can span a period of years. The change and instability in the financial community in recent years, and the elimination of redevelopment agencies as a source of gap funding for the development of affordable housing have both contributed to a slower pace of the production of MHSA units. More recently, activity has increased, and applications for funding were processed in FY 2012 for the following MHSA units:

- ◆ **Verbena Crossing** - This is a 96 unit community located in the City of Desert Hot Springs which provides fifteen MHSA units, scattered throughout the site, for all mental health consumers, and is an acquisition/rehabilitation project that is expected to open in 2013.
- ◆ **Cedar Glen** - This is a 50 unit community located in the City of Riverside, providing fifteen MHSA units scattered throughout the site, for all mental health consumers. Cedar Glen is expected to open in 2014.

Early development activity is underway on an additional housing community that would represent the first MHSA units for all mental health consumers in the Mid-County Region. Currently, there is a great need for permanent supportive housing in this area. Information about the development was presented to consumers and stakeholders through public meetings held in April 2012.

- ◆ **Perris Family Apartments** - This is a 75 unit community located in the City of Perris which provides fifteen MHSA units, scattered throughout the site, for all mental health consumers. It is expected to open in 2015.

DMH is fortunate to be associated with a variety of development partners, including the Riverside County Economic Development Agency, a number of cities in Riverside County, and the County of Riverside (representing developments in unincorporated areas). In addition, the developers of the apartment communities, in which the MHSA units are located, represent a diverse group of not-for-profit and for-profit developers and development entities from Riverside County and northern California. All have extensive experience in the development of affordable housing, and in the management of apartment communities that serve special needs populations.

DMH continues to operate two safe haven, permanent housing programs that focus on engaging chronically homeless adults that suffer from severe mental illness and assists them in accepting housing and support that will end the cycle of homelessness. Both "The Place" in Riverside and "The Path", which is on the campus

of Roy's Resource Center in North Palm Springs, effectively uses peer counselors to engage even the most difficult to reach individuals to accept housing and, eventually, other mental health supports. Each offer a 24/7 Drop-In Center where drop-in guests may shower, receive food, do laundry, and escape severe weather conditions. While there, the peer staff attempt to engage these individuals to accept housing and assist them in accessing housing and other resources. In addition, "The Place" and "The Path" each provide permanent supportive housing for twenty five single adults. The onsite mental health, and other types of support, assist residents to more effectively managing their illness(es) and develop the life skills needed for long term housing success. During the past year, "The Path", located in the Desert Region, provided housing to thirty four chronically homeless individuals. Successfully, 97% of these individuals achieved housing stability, and several Welfare and Institution (W&I) Code 1262 individuals were served in the 24/7 Drop-In Center. "The Place", located in Riverside, housed thirty two chronically homeless individuals. Of these people, 84% achieved housing stability, and 8,422 individuals were served in the 24/7 Drop-In Center.

The Mental Health Board (MHB) Housing Committee finished a community education series that began in FY10/11. The last two presentations focused on the support available to older adults that could assist them to remain in their homes, experience substance abuse recovery, and receive sober living services and resources.

Riverside County DMH is proposing to submit plans for several projects, including the Verbena Crossing and Perris Apartments, in order to receive funding. The Housing Committee serves as key stakeholders in reviewing these MHSA housing development projects. DMH staff provide monthly updates about the grant-funded housing programs to the Housing Committee members. Currently, these include the HUD Shelter Plus Care, Permanent Supportive Housing and Safe Haven program grants, and the Emergency Food and Shelter Program grants. Reported highlights for the FY11/12 include Riverside County DMH assisting 251 formerly homeless or at risk of homeless consumers to live in permanent supportive, affordable housing apartments and facilitate a monthly average of 1,450 nights of emergency housing for primarily adult homeless individuals, including those individuals with children. Thirty percent of those receiving emergency housing were children.

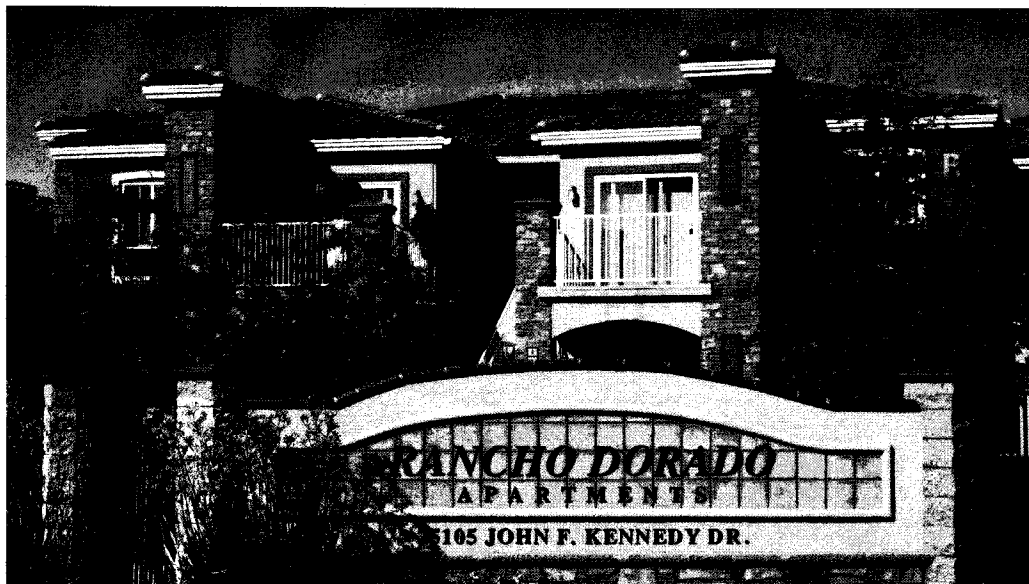

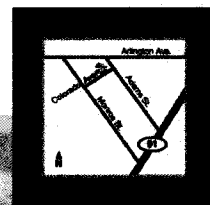

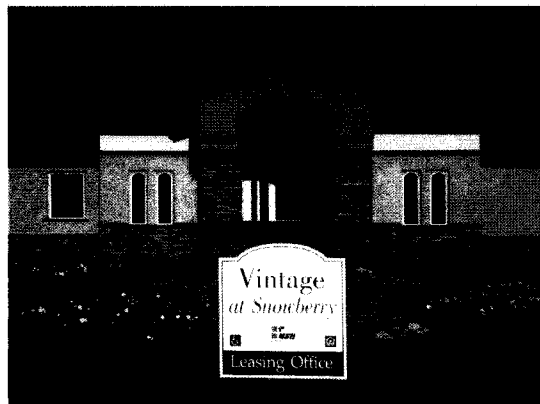


MHSA Permanent Supportive Housing Program 2011 PROJECT

Children's Committee Report

July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012

The Children's Committee has been active and kept informed of items of high priority throughout the past year as several presentations were provided to the Committee. Janine Moore, Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) Coordinator provided a presentation highlighting the statewide projects that are taking place through the California Mental Health Services Authority (CalMHSA). Bill Brenneman, Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) Manager, shared giveaway items from the "Its Up to Us" campaign in Riverside County with the Children's Committee and will be providing information on the Suicide Prevention initiative in the near future. Both Mr. Brenneman and Ms. Moore provided an annual update on MHSA projects and distributed PEI and Workforce Education and Training (WET) packets to the Committee.

David Schoelen, WET Coordinator, distributed the MHSA WET Plan Status Update and "Mental Health Careers: Pathway to Success" pamphlet, and reviewed both items with the Committee. He outlined a number of items for the Children's Committee including: the updating of actions and descriptions, development highlights, and the future direction of the WET program as of February 2012.

Two youth from the California Youth Connection shared their experiences at the California Mental Health Advocates for Children and Youth (CHMACY) with the Children's Committee. Ms. Moore discussed the Statewide Student Mental Health Initiative for K-12, which is contracted with the State. The counties of Riverside, Inyo, Mono, and San Bernardino are participating with school demonstration projects.

Mental Health Services Administrator, David Lundquist, provided a presentation on the collaboration between the Department of Mental Health (DMH) and the Desert Sands Unified School District to develop PEI services identifying at risk youth who are developing serious conduct spectrum disorders. The goal is for PEI to hopefully divert youth from needing serious mental health services in the future.

Committee members also participated in several philanthropic activities throughout the year. Food baskets were assembled during the Thanksgiving season, and members assisted mental health clinics to provide these food baskets or gift certificates for food purchases to needy families throughout the community during the holiday. During the Christmas season, members participated in the annual "snowflake" banner. Decorative snowflakes, displaying the names of needy children who received mental health services in the County, were displayed on the banner. Members selected a snowflake and purchased a gift for the child whose name it contained. The activity was

very successful and a total of 1,038 "snowflake" gifts were distributed over the holiday season.

Throughout the year, the Parent Support and Training Program was a part of the Law Enforcement Training, and participated in the family portion of the training which occurred in March 2012. This portion of the training, with the assistance of the Family Advocate Program, will focus on how to support children who have been 5150ed from schools, defines how the process works, and established how to best assist children once they return to school.

Other information the Committee received throughout the year included that Educate, Equip, Support (ESS) classes will begin in various parts of Riverside County, the Spanish speaking Open Doors Support Group in Riverside ceased due to low participation, and the Rapid Response Team medication follow-up continues to be utilized. The California State Association of Counties (CSAC) merit award was given to the Parent Support and Training Program for their community outreach to parents of children with special needs/behaviors, for on-going parenting education classes and support groups, phone lines, and for continuing support for parents so that they know they are not alone in their struggles. Also, Parent Partner Training has been implemented for the county. A number of individuals from Riverside County were able to attend this year's CMHACY Conference, and Riverside County's Department of Mental Health Children's Services presented two workshops there, "Take'n It to the Street", and "Prevention and Early Intervention for Families with Children 0 - 8 Years Old: Mobile Services and Outreach to Geographically Isolated & High Risk Communities." The workshops were well received, and most of the CMHACY attendees were also able to view one of the new Parent - Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT) mobile units.

By keeping the Mental Health Board (MHB) informed about topics that are being discussed in legislation, members are more readily equipped to advocate for the consumers of Riverside County.

Goals

“To keep the Mental Health Board informed of legislative activities whether Federal, State, or County”

“To advocate for legislation that would be beneficial to our clients”

Although the Legislative Committee has not been holding meetings regularly throughout the past year, as additional members need to be recruited, the goal of Committee members is to report on any legislative activity found that might concern Riverside County Mental Health. The Legislative Committee currently has a Chair who is actively recruiting for additional members so that it can continue to monitor the internet's various legal websites for proposed legislation that affect the Department of Mental Health's (DMH) ability to deliver services to the clients of Riverside County. The Committee asks board members to search national and local periodicals for any

legislation or change of legislation that would affect services rendered to clients.

It is the intent that the Committee be vigilant, and advise the MHB about any changes to the laws which can affect the homeless programs or the current Individual Education Plan (IEP) Program. The Committee is aware of the ongoing changes to legislation regarding balancing the State's budget. The Committee's intent is to re-energizing its activities and become more proactive to the needs of our clients in Riverside County. Currently, the committee is attempting to acquire at least one additional standing member and establish a definite time for the monthly meetings. Once a definite time is established, the Legislative Committee hopes to obtain more members who will contribute in its efforts.

Veteran's Committee Report

July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012

Mission Statement

“Advise and foster a collaboration of veteran’s families’ and mental health support organizations to address and alleviate the mental health needs of veterans and their families, as well as, recommend and propose related services”

The Veteran's Committee, sponsored by the Riverside County Mental Health Board (MHB) and chaired by a MHB member, is a group of volunteers interested in reducing the stigma of mental illness and improving the quality of life for veterans and their families dealing with mental disorders.

This year, the Veteran's Committee has been very active through a wide variety of activities and community events. The Veteran's Committee continued its efforts to collaborate and assist the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Frontline Project to provide Family-to-Family education and support programs.

The Committee finalized a resource brochure entitled, “War is Hell”, with easy to find references to services available within the County of Riverside. The brochure will be distributed to veterans and their families throughout the County. Douglas Tavieria, the Veterans Services Liaison for Riverside County's Department of Mental Health, has been traveling to various clinics to complete needs assessments for veterans and their families. One of his responsibilities is to collaborate with various local veterans' programs in providing them with information, resources, and funding available to them. He is currently working on the local “Veteran's Resource Guide” which will specifically list Riverside County resources.

The Veteran's Committee participated in the grand opening of the new Veteran's Resource Center at Riverside City College on April 27, 2011, and continues to participate and support the Center. The Center provides services to veterans experiencing psychological mental health issues. It can assist with the academic needs of veterans such as provide extended time periods and quiet places for taking tests, supply special equipment, and much more. The Center has offices for a counselor,

disabled unit representative, financial aid, and other helpful staff. It has state of the art computer software to provide additional services. Veterans can utilize these services, watch television, or simply relax at this location.

On May 15, 2012, the Veteran's Committee participated in Inland Empire Veterans Collaborative on Homelessness Stakeholders' Summit which was held at Behavioral Health Resource Center Auditorium in Rialto. On May 26, 2012, the Committee attended the Military Family Resource Fair held at the Temecula Civic Center. The fair, focused on providing families with information and resources about the programs available to them both on and off a military installation, empowers military families and educates the civilian sector on the military lifestyle and dynamics allowing the service members to focus on the mission or task at hand.

On Saturday, October 29, 2011, the Veteran's Committee participated in the Veteran's Expo which was held in Indio at the Indio Armory. In June 2012, the Committee attended the Veterans Expo planning meeting held in Indio. The Committee will once again participate in the next Veteran's Expo scheduled on October 27, 2012 at the Indio Fair Grounds, and the Committee attended its first planning meeting in June. The 2012 event will bring attention to veterans issues, and connect veterans with the various resources that are available to them.

The Committee participated in Veteran's Day Celebration at the historic Flabob Airport on November 12, 2011. The event brought attention to veteran's issues and connected veterans with their earned benefits.

On February 9, 2012, the Veteran's Committee participated in the Inland Empire Veterans Collaborative on Homelessness Quarterly Summit held at March Reserve Base. This network of public and private organizations share ideas, knowledge, and resources to improve the access to and quality of services for veterans, military personnel, and their families, provide updates on issues, news, and events, allow access to their SharePoint website, and work to increase public awareness of the unique needs of this special segment of the population.

Furthermore, during the last Southern Counties Regional Partnership (SCRIP) conference call, the Veteran's Committee proposed that the SCRIP fund and coordinate the expansion of the Frontline Project across the Southern Counties. This would create a central funding source for instructional and marketing materials for teachers and facilitators. It would establish a network of Frontline teachers and facilitators who could consult with each other and would allow for Kern County to provide their expertise as more is planned for the future.

Lastly, the Veteran's Committee participated in the expansion of the Mental Health Court to include a Veteran's Court component. The Veteran's Court commenced operation on January 5, 2012. It tracks and addresses underlying issues that may be present in the lives of veterans who come before the court on criminal and/or dependency matters. Programs involve monitoring and a team approach to decision making, and includes the participation of a variety of different agencies, such as Probation, Veteran's Assistance Healthcare Systems, and the Department of Mental Health. On March 7, 2012, the Veteran's Committee discussed starting a mentorship program at the Veteran's Court, and work will continue for the remaining part of 2012.

Older Adult System of Care Committee Report

Vision

“We value self-determination and independence of our older adult and culturally diverse consumers. We value pursuit of quality of life.”

Goal

“To enable older adult consumers who are significantly impaired from a mental illness to access the services that will promote empowerment and recovery.”

Older Adults Services seeks to assist consumers in their recovery and maintaining a physically and emotionally healthy lifestyle so that they are able to remain in their home or community based housing for as long as possible. Services are provided by a multi-disciplinary staff with specialized training in evaluating and addressing both mental illness and issues of aging.

The Older Adult System of Care (OASOC) Committee meets monthly on the first Tuesday of each month at noon at Mental Health Administration located at 4095 County Circle Drive, Riverside, CA 92503. Much of the Committee's functions were focused on orientation and training regarding the exciting new programs that will come about from MHSA funding and new program designs and operations that will enhance mental health services in our County.

Several MHSA subjects were addressed during this past year:

- ◆ Full Service Partnerships
- ◆ Peer Support Training and WRAP Wellness Recovery Action Plan
- ◆ Recovery Management
- ◆ Medication Management

Older Adult Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) Program implementations this past year included:

- ◆ Program for Encouraging Active and Rewarding Lives for Seniors (PEARLS)
- ◆ Caregiver Support Group
- ◆ Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CBT) for Late Life Depression
- ◆ Prolonged Therapy for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder
- ◆ Innovation Project: Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (CDSMP)
- ◆ Recovery Learning Center
- ◆ Transportation services available to seniors
- ◆ Housing Programs available to seniors
- ◆ Testimonials from residents in the new Snowberry Apartments
- ◆ Workforce Education and Training
- ◆ IHSS services
- ◆ Specialty Multidisciplinary Aggressive Response Teams (SMART)

In 2011 and 2012, the OASOC Committee continues to be kept abreast of MHSA activity and the mental health needs of the older adult community. Adult System of Care Committee Report

July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012

Mission Statement

“To promote, support, and advocate for high quality and culturally appropriate services for severely and persistently mentally ill adults and their families residing in Riverside County through formal recommendations.”

The Riverside County Department of Mental Health (DMH) serves over 29,000 adult consumers in a variety of settings with a variety of service options. In recent times, changes in funding and service priorities have necessitated changes in service delivery and availability. Meanwhile, the Department has maintained its commitment to high quality and culturally relevant services. In 2011, the Adult System of Care (ASOC) Committee heard of the potential changes, provided feedback to the Mental Health Board about them, and monitored the Department's progress on implementing, improving, and maintaining services for the adult population.

During 2011, the ASOC Committee heard presentations and provided input/feedback on a variety of topics including the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) Plan Update, the MHSA Innovation Recovery Learning Center and Family Room Project, the Bella Vista Housing Project, and the Older Adult MHSA Full Service Partnership program.

In addition, in 2011 the ASOC heard presentations about several program enhancements and newly implemented programs, both County-run and contracted. These included the Promotoras de Salud outreach program, the Blaine Clinic Integrated Healthcare Initiative, AB109 Realignment, and Riverside County Healthcare Program.

For most of 2011, the ASOC Committee did not have an assigned chairperson, and committee meetings were chaired by the Steve Steinberg, the Department Administrator. ASOC Committee members include representatives from eight different agencies/programs in the community, family members, consumers, and DMH Health staff who represent various adult-serving programs. In 2011, attendance was sporadic.

as meetings were rotated monthly between two sites, Riverside and Perris. Because consistent participation by members was hampered by this arrangement, the Committee moved that all meetings be held in one location beginning in January 2012, and a site more centrally located was selected. With more consistent attendance and continued implementation of the Adult Innovation programs, along with other planned changes in service delivery, 2012 promises to be an eventful year for the ASOC Committee.

Criminal Justice Committee Report

Mission Statement

“To facilitate recovery of people who have a serious mental illness in the Criminal Justice System by enhancing programs in our community through collaborative efforts involving all county agencies, the community, and the family.”

The Criminal Justice Committee has twenty active members committed to meeting its goals. Meetings are held the second Wednesday of every other month at 12:00 p.m. at Detention Services located at 3833 10th Street, Riverside, CA 92501.

In the area of Law Enforcement (Crisis Intervention Training), it has created a committee of Mental Health/Riverside County Regional Medical Center professionals who continually review, revise, and present training to Correctional and Patrol employees of the Riverside Sheriff's Department and Police Departments. The Committee's main focus is to train staff, including dispatch and other law enforcement agencies' employees throughout California, who may come into contact with mental health consumers. To date, County, State, and Federal Police representatives have been trained. This training has been very well received, and a permanent schedule has now been established.

The new Electronic Management of Records (ELMR) system was launched in July of 2011. Members, who are Mental Health staff, have participated in several National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) meetings throughout the county, providing information about Mental Health services in the jails and Mental Health Court.

The Family Advocate Program works with family members that are referred to them, and has a resource brochure entitled, “What to Do If a Family Member is Arrested”, available to provide assistance.

Mental Health Court has grown considerably, and is expanding to include more staff in all regional offices due to an increase in the number of referrals received from the Public Defender and Private Attorneys.

Regarding Patton State Hospital and those incompetent to stand trial, the average wait time for a hospital bed is approximately five weeks. Work to continue the partnership with Long Term Care staff to place consumers at our contracted Institute for Mental Disease (IMD) in Sylmar, CA continues.

As a result of the Smith Correctional Facility opening expanding beds, jail expansion was the main focus during the 2011 year. The increase in bed capacity necessitated a mental health plan of action. This action aimed to increase the number of mental health staff needed to address the increase in mental health services in that jail. Staff continues to increase as a result of the plans to create a housing unit specifically for AB109 individuals.

Regarding the budget, Mental Health Detention Services have been allocated the same funding as the previous year, and the hiring of staff is on-going. The budget continues to be an agenda item for the Criminal Justice Committee.

The Department of Mental Health (DMH) staff will provide assessments, crisis intervention, group services (mental health and substance abuse) and medications to individuals who are incarcerated. Departmental staff continues to work with Sheriff Personnel to ensure AB109 individuals are assigned to one or two specific jail locations to improve mental health treatment/services. Staff has already been hired and additional staff are currently in the process of being added. Staff is significantly being increased at the Smith Correctional Facility due to plans that are underway to develop a unit for AB109 mental health clients. Both mental health and substance abuse services will be provided.

Regarding housing, individuals with mental illness and/or those with substance abuse who need residential placement are provided housing by the Department of Mental Health as needed. Although housing is very limited, the Department of Mental Health has expanded some housing programs to meet the needs of the AB109 population.

The Criminal Justice Committee has participated in community events such as the Substance Abuse "Recovery Happens" and the "May is Mental Health Month" events. Also, several presentations regarding Mental Health Court and Detention Services were made to NAMI groups.

For the 2012 year, the Criminal Justice Committee will focus on a number of goals:

♦ **Housing Issues -**

Increase beds and augment Board and Cares including detox, diversion beds such as short-term transitional residential program, board and care beds with or without

special programs such as dual diagnosis, and increase resources for housing for consumers released from jail/prison.

◆ **Training for Law Enforcement Personnel** -

Provide training on crisis intervention to all Riverside County law enforcement and other County agencies including Probation, work towards training more staff and other Law Enforcement agencies, and expand the training curriculum.

◆ **Information System** -

Integrate database to track mental health, medical, and criminal history, and have this information available throughout the County. The Department of Mental Health has already launched the new Electronic Management of Records (ELMR) system which includes the Mental Health Department and contracted services. The next phase of ELMR will be to have a complete electronic chart system.

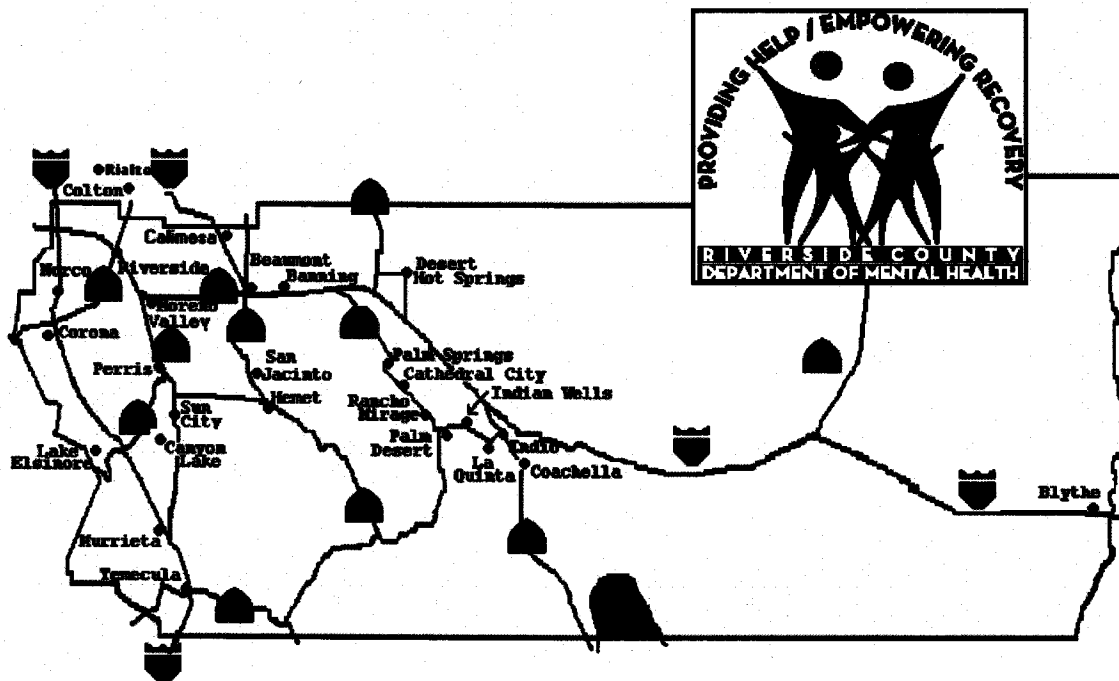

“To support the Mental Health Board Mission with our input, voice, advocacy, and promotion of quality services for the culturally diverse communities of Western Region.”

The goals of the Western Regional Board (WRB) established during the year include the following:

- ◆ Reduce stigma and increase utilization of services through education and awareness
- ◆ Support the Mission of Riverside County Department of Mental (DMH) to provide high quality care to residents of Western Region

Some of the strategies and activities of the WRB include:

- ◆ Participating in the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Walk and other community activities. WRB members supported the event by fund raising, walking, and volunteering on the day of the event. One member participated in the walk itself while three members reported marketing the event with personal contacts (work, church, friends).
- ◆ Promoting and attending “May is Mental Health Month” (MiMHM) activities by attending/participating in events and attending City Council meetings to accept MiMHM proclamations. All members attended City Council meetings to accept the proclamations of various cities, declare that May is “Mental Health Month”, and promoted awareness. Members attended the “May is Mental Health Month” community event which was supported by both the MHB and DMH, and

encouraged participation in the main MHB and regional boards.

- ◆ WRB members marketed events/information aimed at reducing stigma to local communities, families, and friends. One member focused on outreach in a school district, while another hosted stigma reduction workshops at a local church and Riverside Community College. The WRB Chair participated in "Dare to Be Aware" Conference which was held in downtown Riverside, encouraged recruitment, and provided a presentation on the importance of the mental health boards at a Peer Employment Training at the Young Woman's Christian Association (YWCA).
- ◆ WRB members have become informed advocates of services, and insured that the regional boards perspective and concerns are presented to various committees.
- ◆ Members attend training that would enhance their understanding of DMH services and issues, and attend training to strengthen their understanding/skills as community advocates. Specifically, WRB members participated in board trainings. Two members attended informative workshops hosted by the Housing Committee, and the WRB developed and adopted the Mission and Strategic Plan in October 2011 in an effort to improve understanding of issues and focus on supporting DMH programs and services. Also, two WRB members chaired committees, and other members attended committee meetings to learn of future goals.
- ◆ WRB members conducted site visits to better understand program services and needs. Members were assigned to complete site visits, prepare reports on their findings/suggestions, and submit them to the main MHB. Site visits completed by WRB members include the Recovery Learning Center (RLC), Inpatient Treatment Facility (ISF), and Emergency Treatment Facility/Inpatient Treatment Facility (ETS/ITF). Additional site reviews will be completed in the remaining portion of the 2012 year.

The Mid-County Regional Board (McRB) is a group of interested clients, family and public interest members, and professionals who possess a desire to provide the best possible services to the public.

Through participation in attendance at the main Mental Health Board meetings, special meetings, and training classes specially designed for board members/volunteers, each McRB member is introduced to the full spectrum of Riverside County Mental Health programs and services. Each member is encouraged and expected to become involved with at least one of the many committees designed to help clients. All information gained from attendance at these various meetings is then shared at McRB meetings.

The McRB members visit mental health clinics within the Mid-County Region yearly, complete site reviews, and create reports on the finds/suggestions. This information is shared with the rest of the McRB during board meetings. The reports are then provided to the main MHB. This process helps to keep board members aware of the ongoing mental health operations in the region. Additionally, the monthly board meeting locations are rotated between several clinics where supervisors provide a report of pertinent information. For example, through one such report, the McRB was able to pinpoint the individuals who would benefit from its holiday gift giving efforts. The McRB has also been kept abreast of the new low cost housing being built within the County and of the units available to our clients.

The McRB participated in the annual "May is Mental Health Month" event. The event allows the Board to interact with various City Councils within the district, and promote awareness and stigma reduction. Various cities throughout Riverside County proclaimed "May as Mental Health Month", and McRB members attend various City Council meetings to accept the proclamations from each City Council. The proclamations are then displayed at the "May is Mental Health Month" community event. Also during May, the Perris Health Clinic host a "Creativity Gallery" where the many people who utilize the clinics display and sell their artwork and photography. The

public is invited to attend and participate. With each year, gallery presentations have grown in client participation and attendance by the public, and the McRB has always participated.

This was the second year that the McRB supported the Community Film Series which displayed three documentary mental health films free to the public. The films were informative and impactful.

The Family Hope Center (FHC), an Innovation project in the Mid-County Region, is a new concept for delivering services to those who do not currently receive services. The assistance and opinions of family members are utilized in the recovery process of consumers.

The McRB has also been monitoring the process of finding space to facilitate the Perris Clinic's programs which are funded through the MHSA. Several McRB members serve on the FHC Committee which provides assistance with decisions regarding the project.

The McRB currently has a totally of nine productive members, and is actively recruiting for additional members. Several affiliates, as well as Mental Health staff, attend board meetings on a regular basis.
