BACKGROUND: Last year Assembly Bill 109 (AB 109) "2011 Criminal Justice Realignment" was signed into law by the Governor. The bill transferred from state government to counties the responsibility for providing a number of public services, including the incarceration of certain felons who would have previously served their custody time in custody in State Prison.

BACKGROUND continued: This change has caused a dramatic rise in the daily headcount of the County Jail system and transferred the need to provide long-time services to facilities that were not designed for this purpose. As of April 2, 2012, 919 of the inmates in the local Riverside County jail system were there because of the changes outlined in AB 109; more than 24% of all inmates in-custody. Of these, 138 inmates were serving sentences of three years or more. In the short time since implementation, these numbers have grown dramatically. If left to continue, the number of inmates in County Jail under the changes caused by AB 109 will totally consume the number of physical beds within a short period of time.
