BACKGROUND: On March 18, 2003, the Board adopted Board Policy B-23 to protect the privacy of individually identifiable health information, as required by the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA"). On May 03, 2005, Board Policy B-23 was subsequently revised to appoint the Chief Information Security Officer ("CISO") as the County HIPAA Security Officer to protect the security of electronic health information. On December 14, 2010, Board Policy B-23 was further revised to address interim regulations issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS") pursuant to the passage of the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act ("HITECH").

HHS recently issued final regulations to implement HITECH. Effective September 23, 2013, these final regulations necessitate additional revisions to Board Policy B-23, the County's notice of privacy practices, and the County's standard business associate agreement. Specifically, the proposed revisions:

- Require the County to notify the affected individual, HHS, and if applicable, the media regarding breach of unsecured health information;
- Require a valid authorization for use and disclosure related to mental health records and psychotherapy notes, marketing, and sale of health information, unless an exception applies under law;
- Allow the County to use or disclose limited health information for fundraising without an authorization, if legal requirements are satisfied;
- Recognize the individual's right to restrict disclosure of health information to a health plan for payment or health care operation purposes if certain requirements are satisfied;
- Prohibit health plans from using genetic information for underwriting purposes; and,
- Clarify existing HIPAA requirements.

In addition, subject to the Board's approval, the CISO and Human Resources ("HR") mutually agreed to transfer the organizational responsibility for the HIPAA Privacy Official from HR to the CISO. The intent of consolidating oversight of the HIPAA privacy and security functions is to better streamline and coordinate implementation of HIPAA and HITECH within the County.

Exhibit A

Subject:
HEALTH PRIVACY AND SECURITY POLICY

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Policy:

The County creates records of health care to provide quality care and comply with legal requirements. The County understands health information is personal and private, and commits to safeguarding it to the extent reasonably possible. The County shall operate in a manner consistent with federal regulations for safeguarding protected health information and more stringent state law. County departments shall safeguard the confidentiality and integrity of the electronic and non-electronic protected health information they handle, store, process and/or transmit. The law requires the County, as a single covered entity, to:

- Keep individually identifiable health information private;
- Provide notice of legal duties and privacy practices with respect to health information;
- Follow the terms of the notice currently in effect; and,
- With respect to any breach of unsecured protected health information, notify affected individuals, the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services, and prominent media outlets, if applicable.

This policy outlines the limits within which the County will handle individuals' health information. In accordance with federal law, the County will provide a copy of the notice in Attachment 1 outlining this policy to each individual receiving health care and related services from the County, and to participants in certain health plans administered or operated by the County. Where applicable, the County will make the best effort to obtain completed acknowledgements of receipt of this notice from each client, substantially in the form of Attachment 2 of this policy. This notice and acknowledgement may be amended as needed with the approval of the Chief Information Security Officer (CISO), County Counsel and the Executive Officer, and amended copies provided upon request.

A. Use and Disclosure - General

Generally, except as otherwise specified below, the County may use and disclose health information, as allowed under state and federal law:

- 1. For treatment;
- 2. For payment;
- 3. For health care operations;
- 4. For health plan administration, except for genetic information which by law the County health plan may not use or disclose for underwriting purposes; and,
- 5. For fundraising, provided that legal requirements are satisfied.

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B. Use and Disclosure Generally Requiring Authorization

Unless an exception applies under state and/or federal law, the County may use and disclose health information as follows only with a valid authorization:

- 1. From mental health records and psychotherapy notes;
- 2. From or pertaining to some substance abuse treatment programs;
- 3. For marketing; and,
- 4. For sale of health information.

C. Use and Disclosure Requiring an Opportunity to Agree or Object

In certain cases, the County may use and disclose health information as follows only if it informs individuals in advance and provides them the opportunity to agree or object, as allowed under state and federal law:

- 1. For facility directories;
- 2. To individuals involved in the individual's health care or payment for health care; and,
- 3. To assist in disaster relief efforts.

D. Use and Disclosure NOT Requiring Authorization or an Opportunity to Agree or Object

In specific cases, the County may be required to use and disclose health information without the individual's authorization and without providing the opportunity to agree or object:

- 1. As required by law;
- 2. For public health activities;
- 3. To report victims of abuse, neglect or domestic violence;
- 4. For health oversight activities:
- 5. To the minimum extent necessary to comply with judicial and administrative proceedings when compelled by an order of a court or administrative tribunal, or in response to a subpoena, discovery request or other lawful process as allowed by law;
- 6. For law enforcement purposes;
- 7. To coroners, medical examiners and funeral directors;
- 8. Regarding a deceased person for organ, eye or tissue donation and transplantation;

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- 9. For research purposes in compliance with required conditions approved by an institutional review board;
- 10. To avert serious threats to health and safety;
- 11. On armed forces and foreign military personnel for activities deemed necessary by appropriate military command authorities to assure proper execution of a military mission:
- 12. To determine eligibility for or entitlement to veterans benefits;
- 13. To authorized federal officials for the conduct of lawful intelligence, counter-intelligence, and other national security activities;
- 14. To authorized federal officials to provide protection to the President, other authorized persons, or foreign heads of state, or to investigate threats against the President or other authorized persons;
- 15. To correctional institutions and other law enforcement custodial situations;
- 16. To determine eligibility for or enrollment in a government health plan program, or to coordinate and improve administration of benefits for such government plans; and,
- 17. To the minimum extent necessary to comply with workers' compensation laws or similar programs providing benefits for work-related injuries or illnesses.

The County will not disclose individuals' health information to outside parties for any other reasons not covered by this policy without prior written authorization.

E. Rights and Responsibilities

With regard to health information, the County recognizes and commits to safeguard each individual's:

- 1. Right to request restrictions on certain uses and disclosures;
- 2. Right to restrict disclosure to a health plan if the disclosure is for payment or health care operation purposes, is not otherwise required by law, and such health information pertains solely to a health care item or service paid in full by the individual, or a person (other than the health plan) on behalf of the individual;
- 3. Right to confidential communications;
- 4. Right to request to inspect and copy records;
- 5. Right to amend health records;
- 6. Right to an accounting of certain disclosures;
- 7. Right to obtain a paper copy of the required notice of privacy practices upon request; and,
- 8. Right to file complaints without fear of retaliation.

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F. HIPAA Officers

The federal regulations pertaining to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA) specifically require covered entities, such as the County, to establish HIPAA Privacy and Compliance Officers and HIPAA Security Officers. HIPAA specifies certain roles and responsibilities for each of these separate offices.

The County designates the CISO as the HIPAA Privacy Official and HIPAA Security Official of the County to develop and implement HIPAA policies and procedures for the County in consultation with the County Executive Office, County Counsel, and affected departments. Individuals may choose to direct inquiries and complaints regarding health privacy issues to designees within departments, to the County HIPAA Privacy Official, or to the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services. Under no circumstances will the County allow or enable retaliation or reprisal against individuals who file such complaints.

G. Organized Health Care Arrangement

The County engages and partners with doctors, nurses, and other providers of health care services who participate with the County to provide health care. The County may share or disclose protected health care information to such parties for the purposes outlined above. In such instances, the County requires those entities to agree to abide by all applicable laws and regulations, this policy, and the terms of the County's privacy notice in Attachment 1 of this policy.

H. Business Associates

The County engages and partners with a variety of vendors who perform functions on behalf of the County. The County may share or disclose protected health care information to such parties for the purposes outlined above. In such instances, the County requires those entities to agree to abide by all applicable laws and regulations, this policy, and the terms of the County's business associate agreement substantially as shown in Attachment 3 of this policy. The terms of this agreement may be amended from time to time with the approval of CISO, County Counsel and the Executive Officer. This policy authorizes the County Purchasing Agent to execute on behalf of the Board of Supervisors business associate agreements conforming with Attachment 3 of this policy as necessary to bring existing underlying agreements into compliance with this policy.

I. Effective Date

This policy took initial effect on April 14, 2003.

THIS NOTICE DESCRIBES HOW MEDICAL INFORMATION

YOUR PERSONAL HEALTH INFORMATION AND HOW
YOU CAN OBTAIN ACCESS TO THIS INFORMATION.
PLEASE REVIEW IT CAREFULLY.

EFFECTIVE DATE: APRIL 14, 2003

The County creates records of health care to provide quality care and comply with legal requirements. The County understands your health information is personal and private, and commits to safeguarding it to the extent reasonably possible. The law requires the County to keep your health information private and to provide you this notice of our legal duties and privacy practices. The law also requires the County to follow the terms of this notice.

This notice outlines the limits on how the County will handle your health information. Under federal law, the County must provide a copy of this notice when you receive health care and related services from the County, or participate in certain health plans administered or operated by the County. The County reserves the right to change practices and make new provisions effective for all health information it maintains. You may request an updated copy of this notice at any time.

A. Use and Disclosure - General

Generally, except as otherwise specified below, the County may use and disclose the following health information, as allowed by state and federal law:

- For treatment. The County uses and discloses health information to provide you health care and related services. For instance:
 - Nurses, doctors, or other County employees may record your health information, and they may share such information with other County employees <u>involved in your</u> treatment.
 - The County may disclose health information to people outside the County involved in your care who provide treatment and related services.
 - The County may use and disclose health information to contact you to remind you about appointments for treatment or health care-related services.
 - In emergencies, the County may use or disclose health information to provide you treatment. The County will make its best effort to obtain your permission to use or disclose your health information as soon as reasonably practical.
- 2. **For payment.** The County may bill you, insurance companies, or third parties. Information on or accompanying these bills may identify you, as well as diagnoses, assessments, procedures performed, and medical supplies used.
- 3. **For health care operations.** The County may use information in your health record to assess the care and outcomes in your case to improve our services, and in administrative processes such as purchasing medical devices, or for auditing financial data.
- 4. For health plan administration. As administrator of certain health plans, such as Medicare, Medi-Cal, and Exclusive Care, the County may disclose limited information to plan sponsors. The law only allows using such information for purposes such as plan eligibility and enrollment, benefits administration, and payment of health care expenses. The law specifically prohibits use for employment-related actions or decisions.
- 5. Underwriting purposes. County health plan may use or disclose your health information for underwriting purposes, but is prohibited from using or disclosing your genetic information for such purposes.
- 6. Fundraising activities. County may use information about you, or disclose such information to a business associate or foundation related to the County, to contact you in an effort to raise funds for the County. You have the right to opt out of receiving fundraising communications. If you receive fundraising communications, it will tell you how to opt out.

B. Use and Disclosure **Generally** Requiring Your Authorization

On a limited basis Except in certain circumstances, the County may use and disclose health information only with your permission, as required by state and federal law:

1. From mental health records and psychotherapy notes;

- From substance abuse treatment records;
- 3. For marketing purposes; and,
- 4. For sales of health information.

C. Use and Disclosure Requiring an Opportunity for You to Agree or Object

In certain cases, the County may use and disclose health information only if it informs you in advance and provides an opportunity to agree or object, as required by state and federal law:

- 1. The County may include your name, location in the facility, general condition, and religious affiliation in a facility directory while you are a patient so your family, friends and clergy can visit you and generally know how you are doing. Your religious affiliation may be given only to clergy.
- 2. To individuals <u>involved in your health care or</u> assisting with your treatment or payment for your health care.
- 3. To assist with disaster relief efforts to notify your family about you.

D. Use and Disclosure NOT Requiring Permission or an Opportunity for You to Agree or Object

In specific cases, the County may use and disclose the following health information without your permission and without providing you the opportunity to agree or object:

- As required by law.
- 2. For public health activities, which may include the following:
 - · Preventing or controlling disease, injury or disability;
 - Reporting births and deaths;
 - Reporting abuse or neglect of children, elders and dependent adults;
 - Reporting reactions to medications or problems with products;
 - Notifying people of recalls of products they may use; or,
 - Notifying a person exposed to or at risk to contract or spread a disease or condition.
- 3. For mandated reporting of abuse, neglect or domestic violence.
- 4. For health oversight activities necessary for the government to monitor the health care system, government programs and compliance with civil rights laws.
- To the minimum extent necessary to comply with judicial and administrative proceedings when compelled by court order, or in response to a subpoena, discovery request or other lawful process as allowed by law.
- 6. To law enforcement:
 - In response to a court order, subpoena, warrant, summons or similar legal process;
 - To identify or locate a suspect, fugitive, material witness, or missing person;
 - About the victim of a crime if, under certain limited circumstances, we are the County is unable to obtain the person's agreement;
 - About a death we believethe County believes may be the result of criminal conduct;
 - About criminal conduct that occurred on at the hospital County's premises; or,
 - In emergency circumstances to report a crime, the location of a crime or crime victims, or the identity, description or location of a person who may have committed a crime.
- To coroners, medical examiners and funeral directors as necessary for them to carry out their duties.
- 8. For organ, eye and tissue donation once you are deceased.
- For public health research in compliance with strict conditions approved and monitored by an Institutional Review Board.
- 10. To avert serious threats to the health and safety of you or others.

- 11. Regarding military personnel for activities deemed necessary by appropriate military command authorities to assure proper execution of a military mission.
- 12. To determine your eligibility for or entitlement to veterans benefits.
- 13. To authorized federal officials for the conduct of lawful intelligence, counter-intelligence, and other national security activities.
- 43.14. To authorized federal officials so they may provide protection to the President, other authorized persons, or foreign heads of state or investigate threats against the President or other authorized persons.
- To correctional institutions and <u>or</u> other law enforcement <u>officials</u> custodial situations for <u>certain purposes such as protecting your health and safety or the health and safety of others, if you are an inmates of <u>the</u> correctional institutions or <u>for those</u> in custody of a law enforcement official.</u>
- 15.16. To determine your eligibility for or enroll you in government health programs.
- 16.17. For Workers Compensation or similar programs, to the minimum extent necessary.

E. Other Uses and Disclosures of Health Information

The County will not disclose your health information for marketingfundraising, or other reasons not listed above covered by this notice without your prior written permission, and you may withdraw that permission in writing at any time. If you do, the County will no longer use or disclose health information about you for the reasons you permitted. You understand the County is unable to retract disclosures already made with your permission, and must retain records of care already provided.

E.F. Rights and Responsibilities

With regard to health information, the County recognizes and commits to safeguard your:

- 1. Right to request restrictions on certain use and disclosure. You have the right to request a restriction or limitation on the health information the County uses or discloses for treatment, payment or health care operations. Requests must be in writing and state: the information you want to limit; whether to limit use, disclosure, or both; and, to whom limits apply. For instance, you may ask the County not to disclose information about your surgery to a family member. though Except as described below, the law does not require the County to agree to your request. If the County agrees, it will comply except to provide emergency treatment. Unless otherwise required by law, the County will agree to your request to restrict disclosure to a health plan for payment or health care operations purposes if you, or someone else on your behalf (other than the health plan), has paid for the health care item or service out of pocket in full. Requests must be in writing and state: the information you want to limit; whether to limit use, disclosure, or both; and, to whom limits apply. For instance, you may ask not to disclose to your spouse.
- 2. **Right to confidential communications.** You have the right to ask the County to communicate with you in a certain way, or at a certain location. For example, you can ask that the County only contact you at work or by mail.
- 3. Right to request to inspect and copy records. You have the right to request to inspect and obtain copies of your health information. Requests may be required in writing, and the County may charge you a fee for the costs of fulfilling your request. The County may deny requests to inspect or copy psychotherapy notes, mental health records, or materials for legal proceedings. You may ask for review of a denial by another health care professional chosen by the County. The County will comply with the results of that review.
- 4. Right to amend health records. If information the County has about you is incorrect or incomplete, you may ask to amend it. Requests must be in writing, and provide a reason supporting your request. The County may deny your request if it is not in writing, or does not include a reason supporting it. The County may deny requests if the information:
 - · Was not created by the County;
 - . Is not health information kept by or for the County:
 - Is not information you are permitted to inspect and copy; or,
 - Is accurate and complete.

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County of Riverside Notice of Privacy Practices

If County health care provider denies your request for amendment, you have the right to submit a written addendum, not to exceed 250 words, with respect to any item or statement in your record you believe is incomplete or incorrect. If you clearly indicate in writing that you want the addendum to be made part of your medical record, County health care provider will attach it to your records and include it whenever a disclosure is made of the item or statement you believe to be incomplete or incorrect.

- 5. Right to an accounting of certain disclosures. You have the right to ask for a listing of the last six years of disclosures of your health information—since April 14, 2003, not pertaining to treatment, payment or health care operations and other exceptions pursuant to law. Requests must be in writing. The first list you request in a twelve-month period is free. The County may charge you the cost of providing or reproducing additional lists. When told the cost, you may withdraw or modify your request. In addition, the County will notify you following a breach of your unsecured health information as required by law.
- 6. Right to obtain a paper copy of the notice of privacy practices upon request. Even if you have agreed to receive this notice electronically, you are still entitled to a paper copy of this notice.
- 7. **Right to file complaints without fear of retaliation.** Under law, the County cannot penalize you for filing a complaint. If you believe the County violated your privacy rights, you may file a complaint with the department privacy officer, County privacy office, or with the U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services.

- NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the parties agree as follows:
- 1. <u>Definitions</u>. Terms used, but not otherwise defined, in this Addendum shall have the same meaning as those terms in HITECH, HIPAA, Security Rule and/or Privacy Rule, as may be amended from time to time.
 - A. "Breach" when used in connection with PHI means the acquisition, access, use or disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted under subpart E of the Privacy Rule which compromises the security or privacy of the PHI, and shall have the meaning given such term in 45 CFR §164.402.
 - (1) Except as provided below in Paragraph (2) of this definition, acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted by subpart E of the Privacy Rule is presumed to be a breach unless Contractor demonstrates that there is a low probability that the PHI has been compromised based on a risk assessment of at least the following four factors:
 - (a) The nature and extent of the PHI involved, including the types of identifiers and the likelihood of re-identification;
 - (b) The unauthorized person who used the PHI or to whom the disclosure was made;
 - (c) Whether the PHI was actually acquired or viewed; and
 - (d) The extent to which the risk to the PHI has been mitigated.

(2) Breach excludes:

1 2

- (a) Any unintentional acquisition, access or use of PHI by a workforce member or person acting under the authority of a covered entity or business associate, if such acquisition, access or use was made in good faith and within the scope of authority and does not result in further use or disclosure in a manner not permitted under subpart E of the Privacy Rule.
- (b) Any inadvertent disclosure by a person who is authorized to access PHI at a covered entity or business associate to another person authorized to access PHI at the same covered entity, business associate, or organized health care arrangement in which County participates, and the information received as a result of such disclosure is not further used or disclosed in a manner not permitted by subpart E of the Privacy Rule.
- (c) A disclosure of PHI where a covered entity or business associate has a good faith belief that an unauthorized person to whom the disclosure was made would not reasonably have been able to retain such information.
- B. "Business associate" has the meaning given such term in 45 CFR §164.501, including but not limited to a subcontractor that creates, receives, maintains, transmits or accesses PHI on behalf of the business associate.
- C. "Data aggregation" has the meaning given such term in 45 CFR §164.501.

- D. "Designated record set" as defined in 45 CFR §164.501 means a group of records maintained by or for a covered entity that may include: the medical records and billing records about individuals maintained by or for a covered health care provider; the enrollment, payment, claims adjudication, and case or medical management record systems maintained by or for a health plan; or, used, in whole or in part, by or for the covered entity to make decisions about individuals.
- E. "Electronic protected health information" ("ePHI") as defined in 45 CFR §160.103 means protected health information transmitted by or maintained in electronic media.
- F. "Electronic health record" means an electronic record of health-related information on an individual that is created, gathered, managed, and consulted by authorized health care clinicians and staff, and shall have the meaning given such term in 42 USC §17921(5).
- G. "Health care operations" has the meaning given such term in 45 CFR §164.501.
- H. "Individual" as defined in 45 CFR §160.103 means the person who is the subject of protected health information.
- I. "Person" as defined in 45 CFR §160.103 means a natural person, trust or estate, partnership, corporation, professional association or corporation, or other entity, public or private.
- J. "Privacy Rule" means the HIPAA regulations codified at 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164, Subparts A and E.
- 19 K. "Protected health information" ("PHI") has the meaning given such term in 45 CFR §160.103, which includes ePHI.
- 21 L. "Required by law" has the meaning given such term in 45 CFR §164.103.
- M. "Secretary" means the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS").
- N. "Security incident" as defined in 45 CFR §164.304 means the attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure, modification, or destruction of information or interference with system operations in an information system.
- O. "Security Rule" means the HIPAA Regulations codified at 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164, Subparts A and C.
- P. "Subcontractor" as defined in 45 CFR §160.103 means a person to whom a business associate delegates a function, activity, or service, other than in the capacity of a member of the workforce of such business associate.
- Q. "Unsecured protected health information" and "unsecured PHI" as defined in 45 CFR §164.402 means PHI not rendered unusable, unreadable, or indecipherable to unauthorized persons through use of a technology or methodology specified by the Secretary in the guidance issued under 42 USC §17932(h)(2).

2. Scope of Use and Disclosure by Contractor of County's PHI and/or ePHI.

- A. Except as otherwise provided in this Addendum, Contractor may use, disclose, or access PHI and/or ePHI as necessary to perform any and all obligations of Contractor under the Underlying Agreement or to perform functions, activities or services for, or on behalf of, County as specified in this Addendum, if such use or disclosure does not violate HIPAA, HITECH, the Privacy Rule and/or Security Rule.
 - B. Unless otherwise limited herein, in addition to any other uses and/or disclosures permitted or authorized by this Addendum or required by law, in accordance with 45 CFR §164.504(e)(2), Contractor may:
 - (1) Use PHI and/or ePHI if necessary for Contractor's proper management and administration and to carry out its legal responsibilities; and,
 - (2) Disclose PHI and/or ePHI for the purpose of Contractor's proper management and administration or to carry out its legal responsibilities, only if:
 - (a) The disclosure is required by law; or,
 - (b) Contractor obtains reasonable assurances, in writing, from the person to whom Contractor will disclose such PHI and/or ePHI that the person will:
 - (i) Hold such PHI and/or ePHI in confidence and use or further disclose it only for the purpose for which Contractor disclosed it to the person, or as required by law; and,
 - (ii) Notify Contractor of any instances of which it becomes aware in which the confidentiality of the information has been breached; and,
 - (3) Use PHI to provide data aggregation services relating to the health care operations of County pursuant to the Underlying Agreement or as requested by County; and,
 - (4) De-identify all PHI and/or ePHI of County received by Contractor under this Addendum provided that the de-identification conforms to the requirements of the Privacy Rule and/or Security Rule and does not preclude timely payment and/or claims processing and receipt.
 - C. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in any instance where applicable state and/or federal laws and/or regulations are more stringent in their requirements than the provisions of HIPAA, including, but not limited to, prohibiting disclosure of mental health and/or substance abuse records, the applicable state and/or federal laws and/or regulations shall control the disclosure of records.

3. Prohibited Uses and Disclosures.

- A. Contractor may neither use, disclose, nor access PHI and/or ePHI in a manner not authorized by the Underlying Agreement or this Addendum without patient authorization or de-identification of the PHI and/or ePHI and as authorized in writing from County.
- B. Contractor may neither use, disclose, nor access PHI and/or ePHI it receives from County or from another business associate of County, except as permitted or required by this Addendum, or as required by law.

- 1 C. Contractor agrees not to make any disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI that County would be prohibited from making.
- D. Contractor shall not use or disclose PHI for any purpose prohibited by the Privacy Rule, Security Rule, HIPAA and/or HITECH, including, but not limited to 42 USC §17935 and §17936. Contractor agrees:
 - (1) Not to use or disclose PHI for fundraising, unless pursuant to the Underlying Agreement and only if permitted by and in compliance with the requirements of 45 CFR §164.514(f) or 45 CFR §164.508;
 - (2) Not to use or disclose PHI for marketing, as defined in 45 CFR §164.501, unless pursuant to the Underlying Agreement and only if permitted by and in compliance with the requirements of 45 CFR §164.508(a)(3);
 - (3) Not to disclose PHI, except as otherwise required by law, to a health plan for purposes of carrying out payment or health care operations, if the individual has requested this restriction pursuant to 42 USC §17935(a) and 45 CFR §164.522, and has paid out of pocket in full for the health care item or service to which the PHI solely relates; and,
 - (4) Not to receive, directly or indirectly, remuneration in exchange for PHI, or engage in any act that would constitute a sale of PHI, as defined in 45 CFR §164.502(a)(5)(ii), unless permitted by the Underlying Agreement and in compliance with the requirements of a valid authorization under 45 CFR §164.508(a)(4). This prohibition shall not apply to payment by County to Contractor for services provided pursuant to the Underlying Agreement.

4. Obligations of County.

- A. County agrees to make its best efforts to notify Contractor promptly in writing of any restrictions on the use or disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI agreed to by County that may affect Contractor's ability to perform its obligations under the Underlying Agreement, or this Addendum.
- B. County agrees to make its best efforts to promptly notify Contractor in writing of any changes in, or revocation of, permission by any individual to use or disclose PHI and/or ePHI, if such changes or revocation may affect Contractor's ability to perform its obligations under the Underlying Agreement, or this Addendum.
- C. County agrees to make its best efforts to promptly notify Contractor in writing of any known limitation(s) in its notice of privacy practices to the extent that such limitation may affect Contractor's use or disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI.
- D. County agrees not to request Contractor to use or disclose PHI and/or ePHI in any manner that would not be permissible under HITECH, HIPAA, the Privacy Rule, and/or Security Rule.
- E. County agrees to obtain any authorizations necessary for the use or disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI, so that Contractor can perform its obligations under this Addendum and/or Underlying Agreement.

- 5. Obligations of Contractor. In connection with the use or disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI, Contractor agrees to:
- A. Use or disclose PHI only if such use or disclosure complies with each applicable requirement of 45 CFR §164.504(e). Contractor shall also comply with the additional privacy requirements that are applicable to covered entities in HITECH, as may be amended from time to time.
- B. Not use or further disclose PHI and/or ePHI other than as permitted or required by this Addendum or as required by law. Contractor shall promptly notify County if Contractor is required by law to disclose PHI and/or ePHI.
- 9 C. Use appropriate safeguards and comply, where applicable, with the Security Rule with respect to ePHI, to prevent use or disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI other than as provided for by this Addendum.
- D. Mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known to Contractor of a use or disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI by Contractor in violation of this Addendum.
- E. Report to County any use or disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI not provided for by this Addendum or otherwise in violation of HITECH, HIPAA, the Privacy Rule, and/or Security Rule of which Contractor becomes aware, including breaches of unsecured PHI as required by 45 CFR §164.410.

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- F. In accordance with 45 CFR §164.502(e)(1)(ii), require that any subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, transmit or access PHI on behalf of the Contractor agree through contract to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to Contractor with respect to such PHI and/or ePHI, including the restrictions and conditions pursuant to this Addendum.
- G. Make available to County or the Secretary, in the time and manner designated by County or Secretary, Contractor's internal practices, books and records relating to the use, disclosure and privacy protection of PHI received from County, or created or received by Contractor on behalf of County, for purposes of determining, investigating or auditing Contractor's and/or County's compliance with the Privacy Rule.
- H. Request, use or disclose only the minimum amount of PHI necessary to accomplish the intended purpose of the request, use or disclosure in accordance with 42 USC §17935(b) and 45 CFR §164.502(b)(1).
- I. Comply with requirements of satisfactory assurances under 45 CFR §164.512 relating to notice or qualified protective order in response to a third party's subpoena, discovery request, or other lawful process for the disclosure of PHI, which Contractor shall promptly notify County upon Contractor's receipt of such request from a third party.
- J. Not require an individual to provide patient authorization for use or disclosure of PHI as a condition for treatment, payment, enrollment in any health plan (including the health plan administered by County), or eligibility of benefits, unless otherwise excepted under 45 CFR §164.508(b)(4) and authorized in writing by County.
- 38 K. Use appropriate administrative, technical and physical safeguards to prevent inappropriate use, disclosure, or access of PHI and/or ePHI.

- 1 L. Obtain and maintain knowledge of applicable laws and regulations related to HIPAA and HITECH, as may be amended from time to time.
- M. Comply with the requirements of the Privacy Rule that apply to the County to the extent Contractor is to carry out County's obligations under the Privacy Rule.
 - N. Take reasonable steps to cure or end any pattern of activity or practice of its subcontractor of which Contractor becomes aware that constitute a material breach or violation of the subcontractor's obligations under the business associate contract with Contractor, and if such steps are unsuccessful, Contractor agrees to terminate its contract with the subcontractor if feasible.

6. Access to PHI, Amendment and Disclosure Accounting. Contractor agrees to:

- A. Access to PHI, including ePHI. Provide access to PHI, including ePHI if maintained electronically, in a designated record set to County or an individual as directed by County, within five (5) days of request from County, to satisfy the requirements of 45 CFR §164.524.
- B. Amendment of PHI. Make PHI available for amendment and incorporate amendments to PHI in a designated record set County directs or agrees to at the request of an individual, within fifteen (15) days of receiving a written request from County, in accordance with 45 CFR §164.526.
- C. Accounting of disclosures of PHI and electronic health record. Assist County to fulfill its obligations to provide accounting of disclosures of PHI under 45 CFR §164.528 and, where applicable, electronic health records under 42 USC §17935(c) if Contractor uses or maintains electronic health records. Contractor shall:
 - (1) Document such disclosures of PHI and/or electronic health records, and information related to such disclosures, as would be required for County to respond to a request by an individual for an accounting of disclosures of PHI and/or electronic health record in accordance with 45 CFR §164.528.
 - (2) Within fifteen (15) days of receiving a written request from County, provide to County or any individual as directed by County information collected in accordance with this section to permit County to respond to a request by an individual for an accounting of disclosures of PHI and/or electronic health record.
 - (3) Make available for County information required by this Section 6.C for six (6) years preceding the individual's request for accounting of disclosures of PHI, and for three (3) years preceding the individual's request for accounting of disclosures of electronic health record.
- 7. Security of ePHI. In the event County discloses ePHI to Contractor or Contractor needs to create, receive, maintain, transmit or have access to County ePHI, in accordance with 42 USC §17931 and 45 CFR §164.314(a)(2)(i), and §164.306, Contractor shall:
- A. Comply with the applicable requirements of the Security Rule, and implement administrative, physical, and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of ePHI that Contractor creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of County in accordance with 45 CFR §164.308, §164.310, and §164.312;

- B. Comply with each of the requirements of 45 CFR §164.316 relating to the implementation of policies, procedures and documentation requirements with respect to ePHI;
- 3 C. Protect against any reasonably anticipated threats or hazards to the security or integrity of ePHI;
- D. Protect against any reasonably anticipated uses or disclosures of ePHI that are not permitted or required under the Privacy Rule;
- 6 E. Ensure compliance with the Security Rule by Contractor's workforce;

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- F. In accordance with 45 CFR §164.308(b)(2), require that any subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, transmit, or access ePHI on behalf of Contractor agree through contract to the same restrictions and requirements contained in this Addendum and comply with the applicable requirements of the Security Rule;
- G. Report to County any security incident of which Contractor becomes aware, including breaches of unsecured PHI as required by 45 CFR §164.410; and,
- H. Comply with any additional security requirements that are applicable to covered entities in Title
 42 (Public Health and Welfare) of the United States Code, as may be amended from time to time,
 including but not limited to HITECH.
- 8. Breach of Unsecured PHI. In the case of breach of unsecured PHI, Contractor shall comply with the applicable provisions of 42 USC §17932 and 45 CFR Part 164, Subpart D, including but not limited to 45 CFR §164.410.
- A. **Discovery and notification.** Following the discovery of a breach of unsecured PHI, Contractor shall notify County in writing of such breach without unreasonable delay and in no case later than 60 calendar days after discovery of a breach, except as provided in 45 CFR §164.412.
 - (1) **Breaches treated as discovered.** A breach is treated as discovered by Contractor as of the first day on which such breach is known to Contractor or, by exercising reasonable diligence, would have been known to Contractor, which includes any person, other than the person committing the breach, who is an employee, officer, or other agent of Contractor (determined in accordance with the federal common law of agency).
 - (2) **Content of notification.** The written notification to County relating to breach of unsecured PHI shall include, to the extent possible, the following information if known (or can be reasonably obtained) by Contractor:
 - (a) The identification of each individual whose unsecured PHI has been, or is reasonably believed by Contractor to have been accessed, acquired, used or disclosed during the breach;
 - (b) A brief description of what happened, including the date of the breach and the date of the discovery of the breach, if known;
 - (c) A description of the types of unsecured PHI involved in the breach, such as whether full name, social security number, date of birth, home address, account number, diagnosis, disability code, or other types of information were involved;

(d) Any steps individuals should take to protect themselves from potential harm resulting from the breach;

- (e) A brief description of what Contractor is doing to investigate the breach, to mitigate harm to individuals, and to protect against any further breaches; and,
- (f) Contact procedures for individuals to ask questions or learn additional information, which shall include a toll-free telephone number, an e-mail address, web site, or postal address.
- B. Cooperation. With respect to any breach of unsecured PHI reported by Contractor, Contractor shall cooperate with County and shall provide County with any information requested by County to enable County to fulfill in a timely manner its own reporting and notification obligations, including but not limited to providing notice to individuals, prominent media outlets and the Secretary in accordance with 42 USC §17932 and 45 CFR §164.404, §164.406 and §164.408.
- C. **Breach log.** To the extent breach of unsecured PHI involves less than 500 individuals, Contractor shall maintain a log or other documentation of such breaches and provide such log or other documentation on an annual basis to County not later than fifteen (15) days after the end of each calendar year for submission to the Secretary.
- D. Delay of notification authorized by law enforcement. If Contractor delays notification of breach of unsecured PHI pursuant to a law enforcement official's statement that required notification, notice or posting would impede a criminal investigation or cause damage to national security, Contractor shall maintain documentation sufficient to demonstrate its compliance with the requirements of 45 CFR §164.412.
- E. **Payment of costs.** With respect to any breach of unsecured PHI caused solely by the Contractor's failure to comply with one or more of its obligations under this Addendum and/or the provisions of HITECH, HIPAA, the Privacy Rule or the Security Rule, Contractor agrees to pay any and all costs associated with providing all legally required notifications to individuals, media outlets, and the Secretary. This provision shall not be construed to limit or diminish Contractor's obligations to indemnify, defend and hold harmless County under Section 9 of this Addendum.
- F. **Documentation.** Pursuant to 45 CFR §164.414(b), in the event Contractor's use or disclosure of PHI and/or ePHI violates the Privacy Rule, Contractor shall maintain documentation sufficient to demonstrate that all notifications were made by Contractor as required by 45 CFR Part 164, Subpart D, or that such use or disclosure did not constitute a breach, including Contractor's completed risk assessment and investigation documentation.
- G. Additional State Reporting Requirements. The parties agree that this Section 8.G applies only if and/or when County, in its capacity as a licensed clinic, health facility, home health agency, or hospice, is required to report unlawful or unauthorized access, use, or disclosure of medical information under the more stringent requirements of California Health & Safety Code §1280.15. For purposes of this Section 8.G, "unauthorized" has the meaning given such term in California Health & Safety Code §1280.15(j)(2).
 - (1) Contractor agrees to assist County to fulfill its reporting obligations to affected patients and to the California Department of Public Health ("CDPH") in a timely manner under the California Health & Safety Code §1280.15.

(2) Contractor agrees to report to County any unlawful or unauthorized access, use, or disclosure of patient's medical information without unreasonable delay and no later than two (2) business days after Contractor detects such incident. Contractor further agrees such report shall be made in writing, and shall include substantially the same types of information listed above in Section 8.A.2 (Content of Notification) as applicable to the unlawful or unauthorized access, use, or disclosure as defined above in this section, understanding and acknowledging that the term "breach" as used in Section 8.A.2 does not apply to California Health & Safety Code §1280.15.

9. Hold Harmless/Indemnification.

- A. Contractor agrees to indemnify and hold harmless County, all Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments of County, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives from any liability whatsoever, based or asserted upon any services of Contractor, its officers, employees, subcontractors, agents or representatives arising out of or in any way relating to this Addendum, including but not limited to property damage, bodily injury, death, or any other element of any kind or nature whatsoever arising from the performance of Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, subcontractors, agents or representatives from this Addendum. Contractor shall defend, at its sole expense, all costs and fees, including but not limited to attorney fees, cost of investigation, defense and settlements or awards, of County, all Agencies, Districts, Special Districts and Departments of County, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents or representatives in any claim or action based upon such alleged acts or omissions.
- B. With respect to any action or claim subject to indemnification herein by Contractor, Contractor shall, at their sole cost, have the right to use counsel of their choice, subject to the approval of County, which shall not be unreasonably withheld, and shall have the right to adjust, settle, or compromise any such action or claim without the prior consent of County; provided, however, that any such adjustment, settlement or compromise in no manner whatsoever limits or circumscribes Contractor's indemnification to County as set forth herein. Contractor's obligation to defend, indemnify and hold harmless County shall be subject to County having given Contractor written notice within a reasonable period of time of the claim or of the commencement of the related action, as the case may be, and information and reasonable assistance, at Contractor's expense, for the defense or settlement thereof. Contractor's obligation hereunder shall be satisfied when Contractor has provided to County the appropriate form of dismissal relieving County from any liability for the action or claim involved.
- C. The specified insurance limits required in the Underlying Agreement of this Addendum shall in no way limit or circumscribe Contractor's obligations to indemnify and hold harmless County herein from third party claims arising from issues of this Addendum.
- D. In the event there is conflict between this clause and California Civil Code §2782, this clause shall be interpreted to comply with Civil Code §2782. Such interpretation shall not relieve the Contractor from indemnifying County to the fullest extent allowed by law.
- E. In the event there is a conflict between this indemnification clause and an indemnification clause contained in the Underlying Agreement of this Addendum, this indemnification shall only apply to the subject issues included within this Addendum.

10. <u>Term</u>. This Addendum shall commence upon the Effective Date and shall terminate when all PHI and/or ePHI provided by County to Contractor, or created or received by Contractor on behalf of County, is destroyed or returned to County, or, if it is infeasible to return or destroy PHI and/ePHI, protections are extended to such information, in accordance with section 11.B of this Addendum.

11. Termination.

- A. **Termination for Breach of Contract.** A breach of any provision of this Addendum by either party shall constitute a material breach of the Underlying Agreement and will provide grounds for terminating this Addendum and the Underlying Agreement with or without an opportunity to cure the breach, notwithstanding any provision in the Underlying Agreement to the contrary. Either party, upon written notice to the other party describing the breach, may take any of the following actions:
- 12 (1) Terminate the Underlying Agreement and this Addendum, effective immediately, if the other party breaches a material provision of this Addendum.
 - (2) Provide the other party with an opportunity to cure the alleged material breach and in the event the other party fails to cure the breach to the satisfaction of the non-breaching party in a timely manner, the non-breaching party has the right to immediately terminate the Underlying Agreement and this Addendum.
 - (3) If termination of the Underlying Agreement is not feasible, the breaching party, upon the request of the non-breaching party, shall implement, at its own expense, a plan to cure the breach and report regularly on its compliance with such plan to the non-breaching party.

B. Effect of Termination.

- (1) Upon termination of this Addendum, for any reason, Contractor shall return or, if agreed to in writing by County, destroy all PHI and/or ePHI received from County, or created or received by the Contractor on behalf of County, and, in the event of destruction, Contractor shall certify such destruction, in writing, to County. This provision shall apply to all PHI and/or ePHI which are in the possession of subcontractors or agents of Contractor. Contractor shall retain no copies of PHI and/or ePHI, except as provided below in paragraph (2) of this section.
- (2) In the event that Contractor determines that returning or destroying the PHI and/or ePHI is not feasible, Contractor shall provide written notification to County of the conditions that make such return or destruction not feasible. Upon determination by Contractor that return or destruction of PHI and/or ePHI is not feasible, Contractor shall extend the protections of this Addendum to such PHI and/or ePHI and limit further uses and disclosures of such PHI and/or ePHI to those purposes which make the return or destruction not feasible, for so long as Contractor maintains such PHI and/or ePHI.

12. General Provisions.

A. **Retention Period.** Whenever Contractor is required to document or maintain documentation pursuant to the terms of this Addendum, Contractor shall retain such documentation for 6 years from the date of its creation or as otherwise prescribed by law, whichever is later.
