



1. The American Legion 21<sup>st</sup> District produces the Legionnaire Newspaper that provides readers with up-to-date information regarding Post activities, along with vital veterans issues, legislation, and information regarding special events.
2. All Things Are Possible provides music and motion therapy for special needs children, such as children with autism, bi-polar disorder, hearing and vision impairments in addition to physically disabled children. All Things Are Possible is collaborating with three school districts to provide music and motion therapy for special needs students.
3. The Blythe Emergency Food Pantry serves 25 to 30 low-income and homeless families every day.
4. The Boys and Girls Clubs of Coachella Valley give youth the education, exposure and experience to help overcome the many obstacles they face on a daily basis. Together the Indio, La Quinta, Coachella, Mecca and Desert Hot Springs sites currently house 7,000 members who are offered encouragement and tools to succeed. These sites keep the children in a safe and fun environment.
5. The Boys and Girls Club of Cathedral City inspires and enables all young people, especially those who are disadvantaged, by providing them with educational services. These educational services include "power hour" homework help, "project learn," reading programs, and the club's new college resource center.
6. The Boys & Girls Club of Palm Springs is expanding the Club Tech program to incorporate a STEM Robotics Program. This program incorporates science, technology, math and engineering (STEM) in a fun hands on learning experience.
7. The Desert AIDS Project celebrated its 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Dancing with the Desert Stars on November 14. The fundraiser benefitted the Desert AIDS Project.
8. The Galilee Center provides food, clothing, and other basic needs to low-income families and farm/migrant worker families in the eastern Coachella Valley communities of Coachella, Thermal, Mecca, and Oasis.
9. The General George S. Patton Memorial Museum was established to honor the late General George S. Patton and the thousands of men who served with him at the Desert Training Center and overseas.
10. Give BIG Riverside County is a 24-hour web-a-thon to raise needed funds for local nonprofits and to develop new donors for nonprofit organizations in Riverside County.
11. Blythe Harmony Kitchen provides hot meals five days a week for senior citizens, low-income and homeless people in the community of Blythe and the surrounding communities of Mesa Verde and Ripley.
12. The LGBT Community Center of the Desert held the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Center Stage fundraiser on November 7. This event benefitted the LGBT Community Center and the LGBT community.
13. Palm Springs Pride is a 501 (c)(3) non-profit community enhancement organization founded to promote the public education and awareness of individual rights and civil liberties of the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community.
14. Palm Springs Pride Parade (registration) was held November 9, 2014. The largest equal rights celebration in Palm Springs, the pride parade attracted an estimated 20,000 people who celebrated the history, diversity and future prosperity of the Greater Palm Springs LGBT community.
15. The County of Riverside, Mecca Family & Farmworker Service Center annually sponsors a community resource fair which provides activities and services designed to improve the well-being of children and families in the Mecca service area.

16. The Foundation on Aging will provide holiday gift cards to seniors who have financial needs. The Foundation will work with the local senior centers to identify seniors that qualify.
17. The Ranch Recovery Center is dedicated to providing needed services to individuals and families who are seeking help from alcoholism and drug dependency.
18. The Red Hot Ballroom is collaborating with three local school districts in the Coachella Valley to provide students the opportunity to participate in dance instructions.
19. Smiles for Seniors Foundation serves low-income seniors in need of emergency financial assistance to pay for food, housing, utility payments, prescriptions and medical equipment.
20. Desert Hot Springs Elk Club held a fundraiser on November 8 to raise funds for charitable activities.
21. The 18<sup>th</sup> Annual Palm Springs Veterans Day Parade took place on November 11 in downtown Palm Springs. This event honors all who Served and gives the community an opportunity to pay tribute to all of our veterans.
22. The YMCA provides childcare and programs throughout the Coachella Valley for more than 3,500 children and families each day at four sites from the city of Palm Springs to the unincorporated community of Thermal.
23. FIND Food Bank is dedicated to relieving hunger and the causes of hunger through awareness, education, and mobilization of resources and community involvement. FIND Food Bank serves residents across eastern Riverside County.
