# **BACKGROUND**

# Summary

California has the largest number of older adults of any state. There are over 4 million people aged 65 and older in California, representing 12.5% of the population. The total elderly population is expected to double in the next 20 years and elders of color become a majority of the older population during the same time frame (California Department of Aging, 2014).

Riverside County- the primary performance site for our proposed project is the largest county in the Inland Southern California. It has a population of approximately 3 million people. Of the 58 counties within the State of California, Riverside County is the fourth largest county with only Los Angeles, Orange and San Diego counties having larger populations. Riverside county is the eleventh largest county in the nation, with more residents than 15 of the U.S. states. Its aging population is growing at a rate that outpaces that of the average rate for California. The 2010 U.S. Census showed that 357,560 adults age 60+ are living in the county and that the 85+ cohort is growing at the fastest rate (75% growth rate compared to 69% for 60+ group according to the Riverside County Office on Aging, 2012).

There were 1,831 patients over the age of 65 who were admitted to RCRMC just in the first three quarters of 2014 and this number is growing. Yet, RCRMC has only one board certified and fellowship-trained geriatrician, Dr. Wael Hamade. Not only is the geriatric workforce lacking, but geriatric services are limited and RCRMC is in need of improved care continuum in nursing facilities, rehab centers, palliative care and hospice services. We propose to transform the clinical training environment of three primary care clinics serving older residents of an underserved area through the systematic integration of evidence-based geriatric care into its clinical and teaching structures. The catalyst for this transformation will be the Cognition and Mobility Care Manager (CMCM or CM<sub>2</sub>) who will be embedded into these teaching clinics, perform home visits, facilitate interprofessional collaboration and bridge medical care with community-based resources. The focus for this grant period will be on *cognition and mobility issues*, two areas of highest priority identified by regional representatives, and for which the applicant organization has extensive experience and resources through ongoing and successfully completed federal grants. Older persons with certain geriatric conditions have been found to receive suboptimal care and specifically, those with dementia or falls receive approximately 1/3 of recommended care for these conditions (Wenger et al., 2003).

During the three-year grant period, UCLA MPGMG as the applicant organization will collaborate with the Riverside County Collaborative to apply evidence-based care management programs to improve the care of community-dwelling geriatric patients with cognition and/or mobility issues. This will be accomplished through the modification and application of care management protocols for falls and dementia that have been developed at UCLA and nationally.

The model integrates trainees in all aspects of intervention including screening/case identification, data collection, patient education and dissemination. The CMCM will be joined by trainees that include nursing students, social work trainees, medical students and residents. We will develop and deploy an interprofessional geriatrics curri8culum aided at trainees in medicine, nursing, social work and other health professions, and work with RCRMC and the Riverside County Collaborative to ensure trainees are well prepared to practice.

# **PROJECT STAFFING**

# Co-Project Director, PICATE Program

Wael Hamade, MD, FAAP, Department of Family Medicine, RCRMC will serve as Co-Project Director for the PICATE program and will lead all training efforts at RCRMC, its teaching clinics and satellite clinical sites.

Dr. Hamade will be Medical Director of the Falls and Dementia Care Management (FDCM) Program and primary supervisor of the Falls and Dementia Care Manager. He will serve as a member of the PICATE Executive Committee and participate in the PICATE administrative core activities, including attendance at monthly conference calls, recruitment of trainers and participants for training activities; serve as faculty upon request, and review and provide feedback on all program activities.

Dr. Hamade will oversee RCRMC's efforts in the PICATE activities. RCRMC will assist with integration of geriatrics in primary care clinical settings, including the recruitment of patients into the FDMC Program, data collection, Internal Review Board (IRB) application and the coordination of trainees at other RCRMC clinics. He will oversee the fiscal management of the RCRMC subcontract and assure that expenses are spent appropriately per budget. He will serve as the RCRMC liaison to the PICATE Director and represent the PICATE at RCRMC.

# Registered Nurse – Cognition and Mobility Care Manager (CMCM or CM<sub>2</sub>)

The CMCM will report to Dr. Hamade, PICATE Co-Project Director. They will sedrve as the Cognition and Mobility Care Manager (CMCM or CM<sub>2</sub>) for the geriatrics integration into primary care project at RCRMC and other Riverside County Health system teaching clinics.

The CMCM will be embedded into the RUHS clinics and oversee proper screening of older patients for cognition and/or mobility issues and evaluate referrals t the program. They will develop and implement individualized Cognition and Mobility care plans based on needs assessments; communicate care plans and changes in condition to families and primary care physicians. They will ensure continuity of care; provide in-person sessions, resources, and implement care plans; teach dementia/fall education and management skills to caregivers through individual counseling; and provide telephone follow-up to monitor implementation of dementia/fall care plans.

The CMCM will assist in developing evidence based, collaborative care protocols for dementia and fall; maintain components of a dementia/fall registry and case management system; will additionally perform home visits, facilitate interprofessional collaboration, and bridge medical care with community-based resources and teach students/trainees.

# **Program Coordinator – RCRMC PICATE**

The Program Coordinator at RCRMC will coordinate all training activities under the direction of Dr. Wael Hamade and the CMCM to aid in student and resident training, CMCM Program implementation and liaise with the UCLA Administrative Core on the collection and analysis of program outcome data.

# Impact on Citizens and Businesses

Article 6: Reporting Requirements

- C) Business Automobile Liability (Minimum Limits) for owned, scheduled, non-owned or hired automobiles with combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
- D) Workers' Compensation as required under California State law.
- E) Subrecipient, upon execution of this Subaward, shall furnish UCLA with a certificate or certificates of insurance, signed by an Authorized Representative of Subrecipient's insurer(s) or of Subrecipient, if self-insured, evidencing compliance with the above requirements. It should be expressly understood, however, that the coverages and limits required above shall not in any way limit the liability of Subrecipient. - C) In the event the Prime Sponsor for any reason terminates its award to UCLA, then performance by Subrecipient may be terminated by UCLA at any time by written notice to Subrecipient.

That course is to be completed at least once every four (4) years or more frequently as determined by the Subrecipient organization. - E) Failure by an individual to file a complete and truthful disclosure statement or failure to comply with a plan put in place to manage an FCOI shall be handled under Subrecipient's policies for sanctions and discipline. It may also cause UCLA to require the Subrecipient to undertake a retrospective review designed to determine if the ongoing PHS Research activity was biased in its design, conduct or reporting.
