

**BACKGROUND:**

**Summary**

I established a Blue Ribbon Committee comprised of building industry trades, contractors, and commercial and residential builders to determine how the county can assist these job creators in navigating the county permitting and inspection process.

One idea, among many, was the formalization of a weekend and holiday inspection program.

Such a program would help builders with the timely completion of commercial and residential projects. A fee for this service would be required to cover overtime and transportation costs of the county to offer this inspection service outside the normal workweek. These services would be provided by all agencies within county government providing inspections and permits, including the Transportation & Land Management Agency, Department of Environmental Health and Fire Department.

This program should be implemented on or before January 1, 2018.

**Additional Fiscal Information**

This program would be revenue-neutral and cover its costs, therefore, no adverse fiscal impact will occur. Additionally, it is conceivable that more sales and property taxes will be generated when commercial establishments can be open for business sooner.
