BACKGROUND:

Summary

On September 23, 2017, the Governor signed AB 1401 adding Section 340 to the Welfare and Institutions Code. The new law which became effective on January 1, 2018, authorizes a court to issue a protective custody warrant without first filing a petition in the juvenile dependency court under specified conditions, including that there is a risk to the child's safety and no reasonable means to protect the child without removal from the home. The law further provides that any child taken into protective custody be immediately delivered to a social worker who shall investigate the facts and circumstances of the case and attempt to maintain the child with the child's family through the provision of services.

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 3 of the current Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the County of Riverside and the Riverside County Deputy District Attorney Association, the Board of Supervisors may authorize standby or professional call duty pay for deputies that are placed on standby at the direction of the Department Head. Deputies are to be paid one (1) hour of pay for every eight (8) hours of standby duty beyond the regular work period in addition to their regular salary. The MOU also provides that they shall be entitled to pay (at the regular rate) for work performed while on standby in addition to the standby pay.

In this case, deputies assigned to the Child Welfare Division of the County Counsel's Office will be placed on a one (1) week standby rotation in order for an attorney to be available after-hours to review protective custody warrants for social workers assigned to Child Protective Services for the Department of Public Social Services (DPSS). It is anticipated that deputies may review as many as 2 - 3 such warrants per week but that estimate is likely to ebb and flow throughout the fiscal year.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

The work of Child Protective Services and the Child Welfare Division of the County Counsel's Office is critically important to protecting at-risk children throughout the County. After-hours warrants authorized by AB 1401 are a valuable tool in performing this important responsibility.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE AUTHORIZING STANDBY OR PROFESSIONAL CALL DUTY PAY FOR DEPUTIES OF THE COUNTY COUNSEL'S OFFCE FOR AFTER-HOURS PROTECTIVE CUSTODY WARRANT REVIEW

WHEREAS, on September 23, 2017, the Governor signed AB 1401 adding Section 340 to the Welfare and Institutions Code. The new law which became effective on January 1, 2018, authorizes a court to issue a protective custody warrant without first filing a petition in the juvenile dependency court under specified conditions, including that there is a risk to the child's safety and no reasonable means to protect the child without removal from the home; and

WHEREAS, the law further provides that any child taken into protective custody be immediately delivered to a social worker who shall investigate the facts and circumstances of the case and attempt to maintain the child with the child's family through the provision of services; and

The MOU also provides that they shall be entitled to pay (at the regular rate) for work performed while on standby in addition to the standby pay; and

WHEREAS, it is proposed that deputies assigned to the Child Welfare Division of the County Counsel's Office be placed on a one (1) week standby rotation in order for an attorney to be available afterhours to review protective custody warrants for social workers assigned to Child Protective Services for the Department of Public Social Services (DPSS). It is anticipated that deputies may review as many as 2-3 such warrants per week but that estimate is likely to ebb and flow throughout each fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the work of Child Protective Services and the Child Welfare Division is critically important to protecting at-risk children throughout the County and further, that after-hours warrants authorized by AB 1401 are a valuable tool in performing this important responsibility; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside, assembled in regular session on Tuesday, January 9, 2018, that standby or professional call duty pay is authorized for deputies of the County Counsel's Office for after-hours protective custody review in conformance with the terms of the current MOU and any successor MOU that may be negotiated by the parties.
