On motion of Supervisor Washington, seconded by Supervisor Jeffries, and duly carried by unanimous vote, IT WAS ORDERED that the meeting of Tuesday, March 27, 2018, be adjourned in memory of Jack Everette Williams, an 85-year-old prominent resident of Temecula, California who passed away on March 16, 2018.

Born on January 20, 1934 in Plainview, Texas, Jack will always be remembered for his legacy of hard work, honesty, integrity, and helping others. He attended Clovis High School in New Mexico and married his high school sweetheart Linda Marie Maples in 1954. They moved to Southern California where he joined the Marine Corps.

After proudly serving his country, Jack entered the food service industry in the 1960's and joined Collins Foods Service, where he worked with Jim Collins, a franchisee of Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurants. Jim Collins had acquired an independent steak house in Culver City in 1958, which was the beginning of Sizzler Restaurants. Jack was instrumental in growing the Sizzler brand across the country. His dedication and enthusiasm paved the way for him to become a Sizzler franchisee in the early 1970's. He operated 36 locations in Southern California and became its largest franchisee. His innovative leadership led the renovation of the iconic American brand and brought him great notoriety and awards in the restaurant industry.

In the late 1980's, Jack retired from Sizzler and together with his wife Linda, they founded Richie's Real American Diner. Their diners continue to please customers in Temecula and Murrieta, along with the Diner in Rancho Cucamonga, owned by their daughter and son-in-law. Jack's Texas roots and Linda's Alabama roots are the inspiration for their home-style recipes, wood-smoked steaks, and delicious desserts.

Jack is survived by his wife Linda and their children Sally Myers (Gary), Gregory Williams (Gabi), James Williams (Cindee), and Cindy Horist (Terry). He also leaves behind 12 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren. Jack's memory and passionate spirit will live forever in the hearts of those who knew and loved him. He will be greatly missed but never forgotten.

On motion of Supervisor Perez, seconded by Supervisor Washington, and duly carried by unanimous vote, IT WAS ORDERED that the meeting of Tuesday, March 27, 2018, be adjourned in memory of James Ralph Houston, an 84-year-old prominent resident of Palm Desert, California who passed away on March 23, 2018.

Born on September 28, 1933 in Walla Walla, Washington, "Jim" was a successful athlete, entrepreneur, and philanthropist. He received an Engineering Degree at the University of Washington, worked for Alcoa, and served two years active duty in the U.S. Air Force. He was assigned to the Air Research and Development Command in Baltimore when he married Jackie Lee on a 10-day leave in 1955.

Following his discharge, Jim's primary career in British Columbia was in real estate development. He started several projects including housing, industrial, retail, office buildings, and public markets in the U.S. and Canada. At times, he owned an excursion train, a solar panel company, and a gold mine. In 1985, he acquired the rights for the Red Robin restaurants throughout British Columbia and Alberta, which he sold after expanding from one to 14 stores. He bought an excursion train that ran across Canada each summer called the Rocky Mountaineer. He also bought a gold mine near Laughlin, Nevada. In 1999, he sold most of his businesses.

Jim and Jackie Lee lived in Vancouver for 42 years and had a second home in Palm Springs, which became their primary home in 2001. Jackie Lee soon became a creative presenter of charity fundraising parties in the Coachella Valley, while Jim was content to be the man behind the curtain. They were often honored together for their efforts. The Desert AIDS Project gave them a Partners For Life Award for their support of the fight against HIV in 2007.

An inspirational force in the desert, Jim will always be remembered for carrying the Coachella Valley across troubled waters and helping to save the McCallum Theatre. He also donated or served on boards of most of the major desert charities, including the Palm Springs International Film Festival, the Palm Springs Art Museum, and the Eisenhower Medical Center.

Jim was a loving and devoted husband, father, grandfather, brother, and friend. He is survived by his daughters Tamara and Jaimi, his son Jim II, his grandchildren Houston, Holt, Hudson, Halstyn, and JT, and his sister Carol Ann Haney. He was preceded in death by his wife Jackie Lee in September 2011.

Jim's memory and passionate spirit will live forever in the hearts of those who knew and loved him. He will be greatly missed but never forgotten.
