1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

Over the past three years, Riverside County has experienced an increase in pedestrian and bicycle incidents. From 2013 to 2015 in Riverside County, there were a total of 2,643 pedestrian and bicycle collision victims (Transportation Injury Mapping System, UC Berkley, Attachment A, Table 1). Pedestrian and bicycle fatalities were highest among older adults, 65 years and older at 19.5 percent. Current data suggests that certain cities in Riverside County have a higher rate of pedestrian and bicycle injuries than others including Banning, Cathedral City, Desert Hot Springs, Hemet, La Quinta, Palm Springs, Perris, Lake Elsinore, Calimesa, Rancho Mirage, Riverside, San Jacinto (OTS Rankings, SWITRS).

According to the Riverside County 2015 Trauma Report, Riverside County's four trauma centers have experienced an increase in pedestrian and bicycle incidents from 2010 to 2014 (Riverside County 2015 Trauma Report, Attachment B). Teens and young adults experienced the highest incidents of pedestrian related injury accounting for 22.6 percent; while older adults ages 65-74 experienced a high case fatality rate at 14 percent. Bicyclists in the age groups 5-14 years (19.4 percent) and 15-24 years (24.4 percent) attributed for the two highest number of bicycle related incidents, while age groups 25 to 34 years (21.1 percent) and 45 to 54 years old (21.1 percent) had the highest case fatality rate. The report also concluded that pedestrian and bicycle injuries account for the longest length of stay at a hospital in Riverside County, approximately 5 days, where the average length of stay for a patient was 3.8 days.

The local trauma center at Riverside Community Hospital (RCH) experienced 105 pedestrian related incidents and 98 bicycle related injuries in 2017 (Attachment A, Table 2 and Table 3). Of the 105 pedestrian related incidences, 73 patients had injuries and 10 patients resulted in a fatality. Of the 98 bicycle related injuries, 17 patients were under the age of 18, and 9 were 65 and older. The Desert Regional Medical Center (DRMC) trauma center serving residents in the eastern part of the County, experienced 35 pedestrian related incidents and 19 bicycle related incidents for 2017 (Attachment A, Table 4 and Table 5). A total of 17 injuries and 2 fatalities resulted from pedestrian and bicycle related incidents. Remaining cases are yet to be entered for disposition for both trauma centers.

- 12. Reduce the number of bicyclists under age 18 injured in traffic collisions.
- 13. Increase bicycle helmet usage.

3. METHOD OF PROCEDURE

A. Phase 1 – Program Preparation (1st Quarter of Grant Year)

- Develop operational plans to implement the "best practice" strategies outlined in the objectives section.
- All training needed to implement the program should be conducted this quarter.
- All grant related purchases needed to implement the program should be made this quarter.
- Complete and route all necessary forms to the County of Riverside administration and Board of Supervisors for approval of grant activities.
- Identify all target areas where Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Instructor Trainings will be conducted.
- Obtain commitment from cities, local law enforcement agencies, schools, and community organizations/facilities to assist with implementation of PedBikeIT trainings, Pedestrian and Bicycle rodeos, Safe Walk for Seniors and Good Ticket programs.
- Update all educational and evaluation material for Pedestrian and Bicycle Instructor Trainings in English and Spanish, including trainer handbook, instructor tests, and worksheets.
- Update all educational and evaluation material for Safe Walk for Seniors in English and Spanish, including presentation.
- Develop all educational and evaluation material for the Good Ticket Program.
- Conduct helmet usage evaluations at various school locations in high risk areas.
- Coordinate and recruit necessary partners for Pedestrian and Bicycle Instructor Trainings, Safe Walk for Seniors and Good Ticket programs.
- Schedule Pedestrian and Bicycle Instructor Trainings for law enforcement, after school programs, and community partners to become instructors.
- Recruit participants for Pedestrian and Bicycle Instructor Trainings.
- Schedule Safe Walk for Seniors presentations at local facilities targeting the senior population.
- Schedule Good Ticket Program meetings at approximately four schools.
- Research available vendors for quotes on supplies needed for the grant activities.
- Purchase all necessary supplies to conduct grant related activities.
- Update Injury Prevention website listing new traffic safety programs available to county residents.
- Create spreadsheets to monitor all grant activities to ensure adequate reporting to the funding source.
- Participate in Walk to School Day 2019.
- Reserve Pete Walker costume and obtain necessary campaign materials

Media Requirements

• Issue a press release announcing the kick-off of the grant by November 15, but no earlier than October 1. If unable to meet the November 15 date, communicate reasons to your OTS Coordinator. The kick-off press releases and any related media advisories, alerts, and materials must be emailed for approval to the OTS Public Information Officer at pio@ots.ca.gov, and copied to your OTS Coordinator, 14 days prior to the issuance date of the release.

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B. Phase 2 – Program Operations (Throughout Grant Year)

- Coordinate the Pedestrian and Bicycle Instructor Trainings with community partners.
- Promote Pedestrian and Bicycle Instructor Trainings within Riverside County through community events, media outlets, and partnerships.
- Hold Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Instructor training for community members, program staff, and law enforcement.
- Conduct evaluation of Pedestrian and Bicycle Instructor Trainings.
- Create a Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Instructor contact list for future community events.
- Coordinate and conduct Safe Walk for Seniors presentations at senior centers.
- Promote Safe Walk for Seniors, Good Ticket programs, and bike rodeos within Riverside County through community events, media outlets, and partnerships.
- Supply school community including security guards, campus supervisors, crossing guards and School Resource Officers with materials to implement Good Ticket program.
- Complete vendor applications for 6 community events.
- Coordinate necessary arrangements to utilize Pete Walker costume.
- Conduct (3) Pedestrian and Bicycle Rodeos at community events for youth and their families.
- Properly fit and distribute helmets at schools and scheduled community events.
- Track all activities in appropriate spreadsheets for reporting.
- Participate in Bike to School Month in May and Pedestrian Safety Month in September.
- Participate in quarterly meetings with countywide pedestrian and/or bike safety stakeholders
- Conduct post evaluation of helmet usage.

Media Requirements

- Send all grant-related activity press releases, media advisories, alerts and general public materials to the OTS Public Information Officer (PIO) at pio@ots.ca.gov, with a copy to your OTS Coordinator. The following requirements are for grant-related activities and are different from those regarding any grant kick-off release or announcement.
- If an OTS-supplied, template-based press release is used, there is no need for pre-approval, however, the OTS PIO and Coordinator should be copied when at the same time as the release is distributed to the press.
- If an OTS-supplied template is not used, or is substantially changed, a draft press release shall be sent to the OTS PIO for approval. Optimum lead-time would be 10 days prior to the release distribution date, but should be no less than 5 working days prior to the release distribution date.
- Press releases reporting the immediate and time-valued results of grant activities such as enforcement
 operations are exempt from the recommended advance approval process, but still should be copied to the
 OTS PIO and Coordinator when the release is distributed to the press.
- Activities such as warrant or probation sweeps and court stings that could be compromised by advanced
 publicity are exempt from pre-publicity, but are encouraged to offer embargoed media coverage and to
 report the results.
- Use the following standard language in all press, media, and printed materials: Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
- Email the OTS PIO at <u>pio@ots.ca.gov</u> and copy your OTS Coordinator at least 30 days in advance, a short description of any significant grant-related traffic safety event or program so OTS has sufficient notice to arrange for attendance and/or participation in the event.
- Submit a draft or rough-cut of all printed or recorded material (brochures, posters, scripts, artwork, trailer graphics, etc.) to the OTS PIO at pio@ots.ca.gov and copy your OTS Coordinator for approval 14 days prior to the production or duplication.
- Space permitting, include the OTS logo, on grant-funded print materials; consult your OTS Coordinator for specifics and format-appropriate logos.
- Contact the OTS PIO or your OTS Coordinator, sufficiently far enough in advance of need, for consultation when deviation from any of the above requirements might be contemplated.

C. Phase 3 - Data Collection & Reporting (Throughout Grant Year)

- Invoice Claims (due January 30, April 30, July 30, and October 30)
- Ouarterly Performance Reports (due January 30, April 30, July 30, and October 30)

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- Collect and report quarterly, appropriate data that supports the progress of goals and objectives.
- Provide a brief list of activity conducted, procurement of grant-funded items, and significant media activities. Include status of grant-funded personnel, status of contracts, challenges, or special accomplishments.
- Provide a brief summary of quarterly accomplishments and explanations for objectives not completed or plans for upcoming activities.
- Collect, analyze and report statistical data relating to the grant goals and objectives.

4. METHOD OF EVALUATION

Using the data compiled during the grant, the Grant Director will complete the "Final Evaluation" section in the fourth/final Quarterly Performance Report (QPR). The Final Evaluation should provide a brief summary of the grant's accomplishments, challenges and significant activities. This narrative should also include whether goals and objectives were met, exceeded, or an explanation of why objectives were not completed.

5. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT

This program has full administrative support, and every effort will be made to continue the grant activities after grant conclusion.
