BACKGROUND:

Summary

On May 14, 1991, the Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution 91-265 to collect a one-dollar fee added to all vehicle registrations in the County and a two-dollar fee added to all commercial vehicles weighing 10,001 lbs. or more, pursuant to California Vehicle Code Section 9250.14. Per Section 9250.14, the fees collected were earmarked for programs designed to enhance the deterrence, investigation and prosecution of vehicle theft crimes. Based on the recommendation of the Riverside County Law Enforcement Administrators Association (RCLEAA), these funds were directed in equal amounts to the Sheriff's Department and the District Attorney. The Sheriff's Department created Trust Fund 5097 (now sub-fund 321147) to account for its share. In August 9 1993, the Sheriff's Department received Board approval (3.58) to use the trust funds to create the Riverside Auto-Theft Interdiction Detail (RAID), a multi-jurisdictional vehicle theft task force. Per its most recent Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), RAID interfaces with the California Highway Patrol (CHP), the Department of Insurance, the National Insurance Crime Bureau, and all agencies in Riverside County for the sharing of information related to vehicle theft.

The RAID MOU specifies that the Sheriff, or his designee, shall serve as Director and Chairperson of the Task Force Executive Committee. A full-time CHP Lieutenant is specified as the Task Force Coordinator. The Sheriff's Department contributes a Sergeant, who serves as the Task Force Supervisor. The Task Force has Investigators from the following agencies: Riverside County Sheriff's Department, California Highway Patrol, Department of Insurance, National Insurance Crime Bureau, District Attorney's Office, Murrieta Police Department, Riverside Police Department and Cathedral City Police Department. Currently, the Sheriff's Department and the Murrieta, Riverside and Cathedral City Police Departments sworn personnel costs of salaries and benefits are reimbursed from the sub-fund at 70%.

In February of 2009, Assembly Bill 286 was approved by the Legislature, which amended California Vehicle Code Section 9250.14 to ensure continued funding for RAID until January 1, 2018. On September 6, 2013, Governor Brown approved Assembly Bill 767, which amended Vehicle Code Section 9250.14. The amended Vehicle Code Section authorizes every county,

upon adoption of a resolution by its County Board of Supervisors, to increase its motor vehicle registration fee from one dollar to two dollars. Additionally, it authorizes every county to increase its commercial motor vehicle registration fee from two dollars to four dollars. The passage of AB 767 removed the January 1, 2018, date of repeal, thereby, making these provisions operative indefinitely. The operative date of the fee changes must be at least six months after the date of submission of the resolution to the Department of Motor Vehicles.

The source of revenue and the distribution of funds to both RAID and the District Attorney's Office has not changed over the 25-year history of the Task Force. The number of registered vehicles in the County has risen slightly over time, however, rising personnel costs caused by salary and benefit increases have far outpaced the growth of RAID's budget. The current revenue received through vehicle registration fees is not adequate to meet the workload generated by the criminal activity of vehicle theft suspects. Additionally, due to budgetary constraints affecting municipalities throughout the County, participation in RAID by allied law enforcement agencies has slightly decreased in recent years. In an effort to stay within its operational budget, RAID has reduced overtime hours allotted to its investigators, and has decreased salary and benefits reimbursement rates to the parent agencies of RAID investigators. Further reductions, if necessary, will likely result in the loss of additional personnel currently assigned to RAID.

Recently, Los Angeles and San Bernardino Counties have approved similar resolutions and are now receiving increased vehicle registration fees and have increased the size of their vehicle theft task forces. As of July 2018, a total of twelve (12) counties have approved resolutions to receive additional vehicle registration fees used to combat vehicle theft. The counties include: Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Sacramento, Marin, Santa Cruz, Sonoma, San Mateo, Solano, Kings, Alameda, Napa, and Santa Clara.

Due to the rising number of vehicle thefts occurring throughout Riverside County, numerous city councils, Chiefs of Police, and Law Enforcement Executive Associations have provided written support in favor of the additional one-dollar fee as outlined in AB 767 for the RAID Task Force. Additionally, several regional auto insurance companies have provided written support for an expansion of the RAID Task Force.

The additional revenue generated from vehicle registration fees will increase the effectiveness of RAID and would allow for an expansion of Task Force personnel.

One additional sergeant position and four additional investigator positions would be added to the Task Force. Each added position, along with current positions from the Sheriff's Department, and Murrieta, Riverside and Cathedral City Police Departments, would be reimbursed from the sub-fund at 80%. The purchase of additional equipment would also be necessary to support the additional positions.

Additional personnel assigned to the RAID Task Force would foreseeably result in an increase in apprehension rates of vehicle theft suspects, an increase in successful recoveries of stolen vehicles, and conceivably a reduction to insurance premiums currently paid by County residents. Task Force members would also provide training to allied law enforcement agencies and much needed vehicle theft awareness and preventative measure education to the residents of Riverside County, in an effort to further reduce the incidence of vehicle theft.

Previously, neither the Sheriff nor the District Attorney has requested that the Board resolve to impose an increase in vehicle registration fees as outlined in AB 767. However, pursuant to AB 767, both the Sheriff and the District Attorney recommends the imposition of the one-dollar increase of registration fees to address the rising rate of vehicle theft throughout Riverside County.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

Since 1993, the RAID Task Force has provided an essential crime fighting service to the county residents and businesses. As stated in the RAID MOU: "Vehicle theft continues to be widespread throughout the county and requires our continuing efforts to curtail this criminal activity. It is recognized that the continued existence of the RAID Task Force is a valuable resource to county law enforcement agencies in their collective efforts to deter vehicle theft activity, increase the apprehension and identification of the professional vehicle thief, increase the recovery of stolen vehicles, and educate the citizens of Riverside County in vehicle theft prevention."

If approved, the additional revenue generated will be approximately \$2 million, with funds being divided equally between the Sheriff's Department and the District Attorney's Office used to deter, investigate, and prosecute vehicle theft crimes. There will be no fiscal impact to the County's budget. At the time of vehicle registration, vehicles registered in Riverside County will be assessed an additional \$1.00 fee.

Additional Information

Current Vehicle Theft Trends

In 2017, 175,351 vehicles were stolen statewide. The estimated total value of the vehicles is approximately \$1.3 billion. In 2017, Riverside County experienced 10,414 vehicle thefts. One vehicle is stolen every 50 minutes in Riverside County.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE INCREASING FUNDS RECEIVED UNDER SECTION 9250.14 OF THE VEHICLE CODE

WHEREAS, on May 1, 1991, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution No. 91-265 pursuant to Section 9250.14 of the California Vehicle Code, authorizing a fee of one dollar (\$1.00) to be paid at the time of registration or renewal of registration of every vehicle registered to an address within the County, except those expressly exempted from payment of registration fees;

WHEREAS, on September 6, 2013, the Governor of the State of California signed Assembly Bill 767 amending Section 9250.14 to authorize every county to increase said fee to two dollars (\$2.00) by adopting a resolution; and


WHEREAS, a resolution to increase the service fees shall be submitted to the Department of Motor Vehicles at least six months prior to the operative date of the fee increase;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, DETERMINED, AND ORDERED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside, State of California (the "Board"), in regular session assembled on October 30, 2018, at 9:00 A.M., or soon thereafter in the meeting room of the Board of Supervisors located on the first floor of the County Administrative Center, 4080 Lemon Street, California, this Board does hereby find and determine that a fee of two dollars (\$2.00) shall be paid at the time of registration or renewal of registration of every vehicle registered to an address within the County, except those expressly exempted from payment of registration fees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, DETERMINED, AND ORDERED that any money allocated to the County of Riverside under Section 9250.14 of the California Vehicle Code shall be expended to fund programs which enhance the capacity of local police and prosecutors to deter, investigate and prosecute vehicle theft crime.





This letter is being sent on behalf of the Coachella Valley Chiefs (CV Chiefs) Executive Board, comprised of all law enforcement agency heads located in the Coachella Valley region, as well as those agencies with county-wide jurisdiction. I have the privilege of being the elected chair for 2017, and would like to impress upon you the importance of the following topic.

The most recent CV Chiefs meeting on May 10, 2017 bore witness to a motion passed with unanimous backing in an effort to support Assembly Bill 767, which would increase the DMV's Vehicle License Fee (VLF) from \$1.00 to \$2.00 per registered vehicle, assessed annually at the time of registration. The funds generated by this bill would enable the Riverside Auto Theft Interdiction Detail (RAID) Task Force to bolster their eastern region team with new personnel, hire regional supervisors, manage ever-increasing costs of operation, and purchase equipment to replace their antiquated hardware. The entire RAID annual budget is dependent upon the VLF collection.

Several counties in California have already approved fee increases per vehicle, including San Bernardino, Marin, Sonoma, Sacramento, Santa Cruz, San Mateo, Solano, Kings, Los Angeles, and Alameda. Riverside County has not yet taken a position on the proposed bill. We are urging discussion and action from the Board of Supervisors to support this endeavor. At optimal staffing levels, RAID can maintain a county-wide vehicle recovery rate of 89.3% which equals a recovery value in excess of \$5 million for the victims of vehicle theft in Riverside County. Currently as a county we rank #9 nationally in the number of vehicle thefts per 100,000 citizens, and #4 state-wide.
