BACKGROUND:

Summary

In accordance with the County of Riverside's (County) Citizen Participation Plan and 24 CFR Section 91.105(e), the County must conduct a public hearing to obtain citizens' views on community development needs and proposed uses of Community Planning and Development (CPD) funding in the One- Year Action Plan.

Pursuant to the County's Citizen Participation Plan and 24 CFR Section 91.105, the Economic Development Agency published the required public notices on January 3, 2019 notifying the public of the comment period for the proposed 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five-Year Consolidated Plan and the public hearing.

At a later date, staff will submit the final 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan of the 2019-2020 Five-Year Consolidated Plan to the Board of Supervisors for review and adoption. The One-Year Action Plan will identify the specific activities selected for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnership Program (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding.

Upon completion of the citizen participation process, the review and consideration of comments, and the review and adoption by the Board of Supervisors, the final 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five-Year Consolidated Plan will be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval. The date for presentation of the final 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan to the Board of Supervisors will be determined once the Federal FY 2019 appropriations have been approved by Congress.

The proposed 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan, the Public Notice and Proof of Publication are attached.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

It is anticipated that the County's 2019-2020 CPD allocation will total roughly \$9,300,000 for the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs.

Representative from the Assistance League of Hemacinto will be unable to attend the Board of Supervisor's Public Hearing scheduled February 5, 2019. Please incorporate the following summary of the OPERATION SCHOOL BELL program activity in the record of this meeting.

Project Description: OPERATION SCHOOL BELL

Since 1976 the Assistance League of Hemacinto has and continues to provide a unique community service to the San Jacinto Valley through its Operation School Bell program. Underprivileged children, who are referred by school administrators, nurses and/or teachers from elementary and middle schools in the San Jacinto and Hemet Unified School Districts are provided with new school clothing. Cost to purchase these items is no more than \$85 per student.

OPERATION SCHOOL BELL IS OUR MAIN PUBLIC SERVICE ACTIVITY. We service twenty-eight schools from the communities of Hemet, San Jacinto, Winchester, Aguanga, Anza, and Idyllwild. The program also helps children in crisis due to abandonment or disasters such as fires.

During the present school year, 2018-2019, 1688 children have been provided new school clothes. The \$10,000 the Assistance League seeks from this grant will be applied toward assisting 118 of the disadvantaged children referred to our organization.

The Assistance League is an all-volunteer organization and owns its own building. Therefore, no grant funding will be used to pay salaries or to pay rent. All grant monies received will go solely for the purpose of assisting the children referred to the program.


Information as of January 2019 shows that the Operation School Bell program has clothed over 33,000 children since the chapter was founded in 1976. Most of the children fall into low to extremely-low income categories.

A major goal of Operation School Bell is to raise enough funds to assist all students referred to the Operation School Bell and to be able to staff the program with the necessary number of volunteers. Members of the Assistance League believe that if children have good school experiences, they will develop positive attitudes and skills, which will in turn help them lead productive lives and to become contributing members of their communities. To evaluate the effectiveness of the program teachers who have an opportunity to observe student behavior following the student receiving clothing are asked if they have observed a change in classroom behavior (77% respond "yes"), a change in student confidence (84% responded "yes"), and a change in the level of engagement with peers (77% respond "yes").

The Assistance League appreciates the support the county of Riverside has provided to this project over the years. We hope that you once again support awarding a grant so the Operation School Bell can continue to meet the needs of the underprivileged children who attend schools in the San Jacinto and Hemet Unified School Districts of Riverside County.

The Riverside County Economic Development Agency hereby notifies the public, pursuant to 24 CFR 91.105(e) that the County of Riverside Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing to: 1) hear comments on community development needs within the County's HUD-funded Urban County program; and 2) hear comments upon the proposed uses of 2019-2020 HUD-funded CPD programs to address the identified community development needs. The public hearing is scheduled for February 5, 2019, at 1:30 p.m., in the Board of Supervisors' Chambers, County Administrative Center, 4080 Lemon Street, 1st floor, Riverside, CA.

The public may present oral or written comments during the public hearing. Furthermore, the public may review and comment upon the proposed uses of 2019-2020 HUD-funded CPD programs, as well as comment upon community development needs, beginning January 4, 2019. Comments may be submitted to the addresses below until 5:00 PM on February 4, 2019.

It is anticipated that the Board of Supervisors will approve and adopt the final 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan, as part of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan (Con Plan), at its regular meeting of May 7, 2019. The 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan will then be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval on or about May 15, 2019. Please note that both the meeting date and time are subject to change.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY. The primary objective of the County's CPD programs is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expansion of economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate incomes. The 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan is a component of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan that must be updated annually. It provides detailed information on the resources the County expects to receive and the specific activities to be undertaken to meet the priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. Upon completion of the Citizen Participation process, the review and considerations of comments, and the approval by the Board of Supervisors, the County will prepare and submit the final 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

ANTICIPATED FUNDS. Anticipated allocations to be received through the FY 2019-20 HUD appropriations are: \$7,749,093 for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, including the Metro City Program; \$2,496,018 for the Home Investment Partnership (HOME) program, including the Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO) program; and \$474,000 for the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program. The County expects to utilize at least eighty-five percent (85%) of the CPD funds for activities that will benefit low and moderate-income persons.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ONE YEAR PLAN ACTIVITIES. The County received 90 proposals for the 2019-20 CDBG funding, totaling approximately \$7,900,000. The proposed activities included public service, public facility improvements, rehabilitation, economic development, code enforcement, and others. There were 22 requests for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding totaling \$1,751,732. Proposals for the use of HOME funds totaled \$2,855,054 including: HOME New Construction (\$1,872,014); HOME Direct Ownership (\$359,035); HOME/CHDO Self-Asside (\$374,404); and HOME administration (\$249,601). The combined cost for the oversight of the programs (HOME, CDBG, ESG) general management and administrative activities is estimated to be \$1,850,270.

DISPLACEMENT. Planned activities will be designed to minimize the displacement of persons. The provision of relocation benefits to displaced persons and replacement of low- and moderate-income housing units that are demolished or converted to another use as a result of CDBG funded activities will be consistent with the County's Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan and provisions of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970, as amended.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AND COMMENTS. The County of Riverside initiated the 2019-2020 CPD Funding cycle in July, 2018, with the publication of the Notification of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the CDBG and ESG programs. The County initiated the Citizen Participation Process in July, 2018, with the notification to residents, Cooperating Cities, non-profit organizations, service providers, public agencies, and other stakeholders, of the 2019-2020 CPD Funding cycle. The Citizen Participation Process consisted of a comprehensive community needs assessment as well as public meetings in unincorporated communities to receive input from residents and others to identify and assess economic, community, housing, and social development needs in the communities.

PARTICIPATING COMMUNITIES. The 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Consolidated Plan will include the unincorporated areas of the County, the City of Lake Elsinore (Metro City), and the following Cooperating Cities: Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Coachella, Canyon Lake, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Indian Wells, La Quinta, Murrieta, Norco, San Jacinto, and Wildomar.

IMPLEMENTATION. The goals for the 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan of the Consolidated Plan include: creating affordable housing for those of very low, low, and moderate-income; providing home ownership opportunities for first-time buyers; improving conditions of substandard housing and rental housing; addressing farm worker housing needs; ensuring the availability of emergency shelters to address the needs of the homeless; creating housing opportunities for the elderly, especially the frail elderly; creating supportive housing or shelter for persons afflicted with HIV/AIDS; creating rental assistance through subsidy programs; providing short-term shelter for the mentally ill homeless; creating a suitable living environment by improving public facilities and services; and providing economic development opportunities for low- and moderate-income families.

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Kehlany



Kehlany was born with Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, and other disabilities all caused by Jazmin's difficult pregnancy. As a Spanish speaker with other children, Jazmin found it overwhelming to try to get help. Angel View was there every step of the way with information, referrals, and help filling out paperwork. Through case management, Angel View also helped the Indio family learn to juggle schedules and better interact as a family.

Sharise



Sharise, 12, has Down syndrome – an intellectual disability – hypothyroidism and cataracts. But the Palm Springs special ed student has a dedicated mom, support from the Inland Regional Center, and friends at Angel View. To assist with Sharise's educational needs, Angel View attends her IEP meetings and helps her mom understand outcomes, documentation needs, and more. Having an advocate greatly reduces stress on the family.

Harman



Harman lives in a mostly silent world, unable to express his needs, desires, thoughts and emotions. The Cathedral City teen has autism and ADHD. He doesn't understand safety issues. Angel View helped his family, which was struggling with Harman's medical needs as well as his big brother's autism. Harman now has a therapeutic communication device, both boys have received activity sponsorships, and mom has found resources to lighten her load.

Sandra and Sarah



Twins often share everything, even their diagnoses. That can mean double stress for parents whose girls have intellectual disabilities and vision problems. But Sandra and Sarah, 11, also share identical beautiful smiles. When their family moved to Desert Hot Springs, they needed help learning the California system. Angel View helped them enroll with Inland Regional Center, assisted with dental services, and helped their parents find other assistance.

The Inland Empire Women's Business Center (IEWBC) opened its doors in 2003; Coachella Valley Women's Business Center (CVWBC) in 2006. Their mission is to counsel, teach, encourage, and inspire women business owners at every stage of development and expansion. Since their inception, the two centers—both of which are part of the Jack H. Brown College of Business and Public Administration's Inland Empire Center for Entrepreneurship (IECE)—have taken the organization's mission seriously, providing training to 57,459 women, and counseling 3,515 women business owners for 21,176 hours to get started or grow.

Michelle Skiljan, executive director of both centers since 2009, says that helping women start and expand businesses is very rewarding. "Women are smart, hard-working, and dedicated," she says. "They have great ideas and the drive to succeed, but often they don't have the business background, know-how or resources to move from concept to completion—and that's where we come in."

The WBCs focus on helping women, especially socio and economically disadvantaged women, but the business non-profit helps everyone, including men. "Our vision," explains Skiljan, "is that economic prosperity happens through entrepreneurship—and entrepreneurship knows no gender, color, age, or financial wherewithal."

Funded in part by the Small Business Administration, Ms. Skiljan spends a portion of her time fund raising, "as all of our government grants must be matched with private dollars." "We've had excellent support from Bank of America, Citi, Union, and Wells Fargo Banks, and now we're trying to expand our reach to other established organizations."

Skiljan says that the Women's Business Centers are among the best investments a community can make in itself. "Economic prosperity gives life and energy to a community," Skiljan says. "When women are successful, we all win."



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

NEW EXPOSED FIRE SPRINKLER SYSTEM





Representative from the Assistance League of Hemacinto will be unable to attend the Board of Supervisor's Public Hearing scheduled February 5, 2019. Please incorporate the following summary of the OPERATION SCHOOL BELL program activity in the record of this meeting.

Project Description: OPERATION SCHOOL BELL

Since 1976 the Assistance League of Hemacinto has and continues to provide a unique community service to the San Jacinto Valley through its Operation School Bell program. Underprivileged children, who are referred by school administrators, nurses and/or teachers from elementary and middle schools in the San Jacinto and Hemet Unified School Districts are provided with new school clothing. Cost to purchase these items is no more than \$85 per student.

OPERATION SCHOOL BELL IS OUR MAIN PUBLIC SERVICE ACTIVITY. We service twenty-eight schools from the communities of Hemet, San Jacinto, Winchester, Aguanga, Anza, and Idyllwild. The program also helps children in crisis due to abandonment or disasters such as fires.

During the present school year, 2018-2019, 1688 children have been provided new school clothes. The \$10,000 the Assistance League seeks from this grant will be applied toward assisting 118 of the disadvantaged children referred to our organization.

The Assistance League is an all-volunteer organization and owns its own building. Therefore, no grant funding will be used to pay salaries or to pay rent. All grant monies received will go solely for the purpose of assisting the children referred to the program.

Information as of January 2019 shows that the Operation School Bell program has clothed over 33,000 children since the chapter was founded in 1976. Most of the children fall into low to extremely-low income categories.

A major goal of Operation School Bell is to raise enough funds to assist all students referred to the Operation School Bell and to be able to staff the program with the necessary number of volunteers. Members of the Assistance League believe that if children have good school experiences, they will develop positive attitudes and skills, which will in turn help them lead productive lives and to become contributing members of their communities. To evaluate the effectiveness of the program teachers who have an opportunity to observe student behavior following the student receiving clothing are asked if they have observed a change in classroom behavior (77% respond "yes"), a change in student confidence (84% responded "yes"), and a change in the level of engagement with peers (77% respond "yes").

The Assistance League appreciates the support the county of Riverside has provided to this project over the years. We hope that you once again support awarding a grant so the Operation School Bell can continue to meet the needs of the underprivileged children who attend schools in the San Jacinto and Hemet Unified School Districts of Riverside County.

It is anticipated that the Board of Supervisors will approve and adopt the final 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan, as part of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan (Con Plan), at its regular meeting of May 7, 2019. The 2019-2020 One-Year Action Plan will then be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval on or about May 15, 2019. Please note that both the meeting date and time are subject to change.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY. The primary objective of the County's CPD programs is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expansion of economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate incomes. The 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan is a component of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan that must be updated annually. It provides detailed information on the resources the County expects to receive and the specific activities to be undertaken to meet the priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. Upon completion of the Citizen Participation process, the review and considerations of comments, and the approval by the Board of Supervisors, the County will prepare and submit the final 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

ANTICIPATED FUNDS. Anticipated allocations to be received through the FY 2019-20 HUD appropriations are: \$7,749,093 for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, including the Metro City Program; \$2,496,018 for the Home Investment Partnership (HOME) program, including the Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO) program; and \$678,000 for the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program. The County expects to utilize at least eighty-five percent (85%) of the CPD funds for activities that will benefit low and moderate-income persons.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ONE YEAR PLAN ACTIVITIES. The County received 90 proposals for the 2019-20 CDBG funding, totaling approximately \$7,900,000. The proposed activities included public service, public facility improvements, rehabilitation, economic development, code enforcement, and others. There were 22 requests for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding totaling \$1,751,732. Proposals for the use of HOME funds totaled \$2,855,054 including: HOME New Construction (\$1,872,014); HOME Direct Ownership (\$359,035); HOME/CHDO Set-Aside (\$374,404); and HOME administration (\$249,601). The combined cost for the oversight of the programs (HOME, CDBG, ESG) general management and administrative activities is estimated to be \$1,850,270.

DISPLACEMENT. Planned activities will be designed to minimize the displacement of persons. The provision of relocation benefits to displaced persons and replacement of low-and moderate-income housing units that are demolished or converted to another use as a result of CDBG funded activities will be consistent with the County's Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan and provisions of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970, as amended.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AND COMMENTS. The County of Riverside initiated the 2019-2020 CPD Funding cycle in July, 2018, with the publication of the *Notification of Funding Availability* (NOFA) for the CDBG and ESG programs. The County initiated the *Citizen Participation Process* in July, 2018, with the notification to residents, Cooperating Cities, non-profit organizations, service providers, public agencies, and other stakeholders, of the 2019-2020 CPD Funding cycle. The Citizen Participation Process consisted of a comprehensive community needs assessment as well as public meetings in unincorporated communities to receive input from residents and others to identify and assess economic, community, housing, and social development needs in the communities.

PARTICIPATING COMMUNITIES. The 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Consolidated Plan will include the unincorporated areas of the County, the City of Lake Elsinore (Metro City), and the following Cooperating Cities: Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Coachella, Canyon Lake, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Indian Wells, La Quinta, Murrieta, Norco, San Jacinto, and Wildomar.

IMPLEMENTATION. The goals for the 2019-2020 One Year Action Plan of the Consolidated Plan include: creating affordable housing for those of very low, low, and moderate-income; providing home ownership opportunities for first-time buyers; improving conditions of substandard housing and rental housing; addressing farm worker housing needs; ensuring the availability of emergency shelters to address the needs of the homeless; creating housing opportunities for the elderly, especially the frail elderly; creating supportive housing or shelter for persons afflicted with HIV/AIDS; creating rental assistance through subsidy programs; providing short-term shelter for the mentally ill homeless; creating a suitable living environment by improving public facilities and services; and providing economic development opportunities for low- and moderate- income families.


