

BACKGROUND:

Summary

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program is administered by the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance. The purpose of the JAG program is to provide funds to states and units of government to underwrite projects to reduce crime and improve public safety. The amount of funding is distributed on the basis of population and Part 1 violent crime statistics.

JAG funds may be used for local initiatives, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, and contractual support and information systems for criminal justice for any one or more of the following purpose areas:

- Law enforcement programs
- Prosecution and court programs
- Prevention and education programs
- Drug treatment programs
- Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs
- Crime victim and witness programs

The County of Riverside was notified of a funding disparity that required the eligible units of government to apply for the grant award with a single, joint application through a fiscal agent. The role of fiscal agent has rotated each year since 2012 between the County of Riverside and the City of Riverside due to the funding disparity. The JAG FY 2019 allocation for the County of Riverside resulted in a funding disparity and once again, eligible jurisdictions must apply jointly in order to receive the \$433,959. The County of Riverside will serve as the fiscal agent for JAG FY 2019.

The City of Riverside and the 12 other eligible cities within the County of Riverside have agreed to provide 10% of their respective allocation to the County of Riverside for administering the grant. The funds re-allocated to the County of Riverside will be used to help offset the Riverside County Sheriff's Department costs associated with administering the grant for all the agencies.


The award agreement will be submitted to Board for approval when the grant is awarded. County Counsel has reviewed the documents and approved them as to form.

ABSTRACT**

Project Title: Riverside County Joint JAG 2019

JAG funds in the certified disparate area of Riverside County will be used in the eligible jurisdictions to fund local priorities. The goal of funding these priorities is to minimize the effects of the continuing local budget funding gaps that have resulted from the housing crisis and recession. Grant funding will aid in the purchase of a variety of computer equipment, GPS tracker and surveillance equipment. Additionally grant funds will fund overtime, paying salary and benefits for previously grant funded position to allow critical local services to continue.

The top five project identifiers associated with the project activity for eligible Riverside County jurisdictions are:

Crime Prevention;
Detention (Residential);
Equipment – General, Forensic, GPS Trackers;
Officer Safety;
Traffic Enforcement

PROGRAM NARRATIVE

This is the sixth year that Riverside County has received the designation of a disparate area. The County of Riverside will act as the fiscal agent on the 2019 Justice Assistance Grant on behalf of all eligible jurisdictions in Riverside County. The 14 eligible jurisdictions in Riverside County are the cities of Banning, Beaumont, Coachella, Corona, Desert Hot Springs, Hemet, Indio, Jurupa, Lake Elsinore, Moreno Valley, Palm Springs, Perris, Riverside, and County of Riverside. All of the eligible jurisdictions in Riverside County agreed per Inter-Local Agreement/MOU to reallocate the published JAG formula allocations to provide 10% of their JAG formula allocations to the County of Riverside for acting as the fiscal agent.

As the fiscal agent, the County of Riverside will be responsible for submitting the joint application; preparation and submittal of quarterly financial and performance reports as well as annual programmatic reports; preparation and submittal of Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA) reports as necessary; budget review and the coordination of all pass-through amounts to the eligible jurisdictions. The County of Riverside will release grant funds to each jurisdiction on a reimbursement basis up to the respective adjusted grant allocation and based on expenditure documentation. The funds reallocated to the County of Riverside from the other Riverside County jurisdictions will not be used for administrative costs, but to offset administrative costs. JAG formula allocations and reallocations are summarized on the following schedule by jurisdiction:

Riverside County is located in an area of southern California known as the Inland Empire. The Inland Empire also includes San Bernardino County. The area is considered among the hardest hit in the nation by the housing bust and recession. A high foreclosure rate and declining property assessments continue to negatively impact property tax revenues, a major revenue source for California cities and counties. Sale tax revenues are slowly rebounding but have not fully recovered. Riverside County finances are under strain from a series of new, ongoing and non-optional expenses that outpace projected revenue growth.

In addition to lower revenues, significant increases in pension costs from the California Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) continue to impact local budgets. Pension and benefit reforms have been agreed to by many employee groups in Riverside County and negotiations continue with others in order to try to control future pension expenses.

Local governments who rely heavily upon property and sales tax revenues to provide services to their constituents have made many tough budget decisions in recent years including extending equipment replacement schedules, salary and hiring freezes and reductions in work force. This is expected to continue into the foreseeable future as recovery for local government generally lags behind recovery in non-governmental sectors.

Funding from the Justice Assistance Grant will assist the eligible jurisdictions in Riverside County to provide services that are not currently available with local funding. The fourteen jurisdictions in Riverside County will use Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) funds for local priorities to purchase equipment and supplies, to retain previously grant funded key personnel, and pay overtime for special enforcement projects or as a result of sworn vacancies. The primary use of grant funds is in law enforcement in addition to

prosecution and court programs, corrections and community corrections programs. Proposed expenditures for each jurisdiction follow.

Program plans by Jurisdiction

City of Banning

The City of Banning will utilize grant funds to purchase six (6) X2 Taser electronic control devices with power magazines to replace its aging stock of X26 Tasers. The goal is to provide each officer deployed in the field with access to a Taser regardless of their assignment. Without JAG grant funding, it will be financially difficult for Banning Police Department to upgrade its current stock of Tasers

City of Beaumont

The City of Beaumont will purchase fifteen (15) ballistic helmets and sixteen (16) visors that will ensure each officer deployed in the field has access to a ballistic helmet. Without JAG grant funding, it will be financially difficult for Beaumont Police Department to provide officers with this equipment.

City of Coachella

The City of Coachella will purchase computer software and hardware, GPS trackers and UAV – Surveillance Drone and associated equipment. Additionally, grant funds will be used for NIBRS data collection systems enhancements. Coachella plans to continue to use JAG funds to purchase equipment with up-to-date technologies for greater efficiencies and to enhance officer safety.

City of Corona

The City of Corona will utilize funding to pay for overtime for approximately 21 officers to attend eight (8) hours of Crisis Intervention Training. As first responders to emergency calls, it is of increased importance to the mental health community and the criminal justice system.

City of Desert Hot Springs

The City of Desert Hot Springs will utilize grant funds to partially pay for a Crash Data Retrieval (CDR) Tool Package. This equipment will assist with important traffic collision data. Additionally, grant funds will be used for NIBRS statistics analysis.

City of Hemet

The City of Hemet will utilize the 2019 JAG funds to purchase an advanced imaging laser scanner for crime/collision scene documentation and reconstruction. The scanner will improve accuracy and efficiency.

City of Indio

The City of Indio is requesting FY 2019 JAG grant funds to assist first responders investigate a threat and prevent occurrence of such an incident, by providing support using various investigate capabilities. Indio is proposing to send four (4) sworn staff members to the Commission on Peace Officer Standards & Training (POST) Certified First Aid/CPR/AED Instructor Training Course held in Los Angeles, California. Additionally, grant funds will be used to purchase a Force Option Simulator (FOS) and Virtual Reality (VR) headsets.

City of Jurupa Valley

The 2019 JAG grant will provide funding to add a Deputy to the Traffic Enforcement unit for weekend patrol. Grant funds will assist with the city's on-going efforts to enhance traffic safety and reduce traffic collisions. The goal is to reduce the number of speed violators and encourage motorists to travel at the posted speed limit.

City of Lake Elsinore

The City of Lake Elsinore will purchase zebra printers and stalker Lidar. The purchase of this equipment will assist the traffic bureau with day to day operations in addition to officer safety. Additionally, grant funds will be used for NIBRS statistics analysis.

City of Moreno Valley

The City of Moreno Valley will utilize JAG funds to continue deployment of two (2) part-time code officers on weekends. Since 2009, the Code and Neighborhood Services Division has experienced reductions in staffing due to the City's budget challenges while community demand for services increased due to the proliferation of home foreclosures and deferred property maintenance by areas residents. Code personnel will target specific violations that primarily occur on weekends such as unlicensed vendors, illegal automotive sales, theft of recyclable materials, posting of signs in the public right-of-way, illegal commercial vehicle parking and garage sales. The NIBRS component an Office Assistant II position will collect, review and process local crime data

City of Palm Springs

The City of Palm Springs plans to use the 2019 JAG funds to purchase thirty-four (34) helmets equipped with riot face shields and storage bags. The ballistic helmets are essential and potentially life-saving pieces of equipment which can mitigate the likelihood of injury or death to an officer in the event of an attack or assault.

City of Perris

The City of Perris will utilize 2019 JAG funds to fund overtime for the Robbery Suppression Team to conduct surveillance on areas/businesses that have been identified by the Crime Analysis unit as being crime targets. Additionally, grant funds will be used for NIBRS statistics analysis.

City of Riverside

The City of Riverside Police Department will utilize JAG funding for the salary and benefits of one (1) previously grant-funded civilian Senior Forensic Specialist position. This position will assist with meeting deadlines and complying with mandates. Additionally, the City of Riverside will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance and implementation. Various Records Specialist personnel will work on an overtime basis for data entry and review of statistics to ensure the new system is working properly.

County of Riverside

The County of Riverside plans to use the 2019 JAG funds to partially fund the Fugitive Warrant Extradition Team (FWET). The objective of this unit is to reduce the number of violent and serious offenders at large in Riverside County through investigation, arrest and prosecution. Additionally, the Sheriff department will purchase night vision binoculars.

The District Attorney's office coordinates with the Sheriff Department's FWET team regarding extradition of fugitives who have fled the jurisdiction of the State of California and some cases; fled the country. Riverside County will continue to partially fund a Deputy District Attorney for this purpose.

In addition, to the coordinated efforts of the Sheriff's Department and District Attorney's Office mentioned above, Riverside County will continue to use JAG funds to partially fund a Supervising Probation Officer position in the Probation Department. This position will manage the electronic dashboards that interface with the department Juvenile and Adult Management systems. This information will be used to assist staff, supervisors and managers in making effective data-driven decisions to enhance facility safety and youth programming.

The FY 2019 Joint JAG Grant for the eligible jurisdictions in Riverside County will be used primarily in the law enforcement planning and evaluation purpose areas and technology improvement purpose areas as outlined below. A portion of the grant funds will be used in the purpose area of prosecution and corrections.

The following jurisdictions will use the JAG funding in the law enforcement and/or technology improvement purpose areas.

City of Banning: Will utilize JAG funds to purchase six (6) Taser X2 devices with power magazines. Additionally, the City of Banning will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance. The Police Department will follow Banning City's established purchasing policies and anticipates completing the purchase and deploying the new equipment within a year of award.

City of Beaumont: The City of Beaumont will purchase fifteen (15) ballistic helmets and sixteen (16) visors that will ensure each officer deployed in the field has access to a ballistic helmet. Additionally, the City of Beaumont will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance. established purchasing policies and anticipates completing the purchase and deploying the new equipment within a year of award.

City of Hemet: Utilize grant funds to purchase an advanced imaging laser scanner for crime/collision scene documentation and reconstruction. Additionally, the grant will provide funds for mobile radio antennas for patrol vehicles. Additionally, the City of Hemet will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance. The Police Department will follow Hemet City's established purchasing policies and anticipates completing the purchase and deploying the new equipment within a year of award.

City of Indio: The City of Indio is proposing to send four (4) sworn staff members to the Commission on Peace Officer Standards & Training (POST) Certified First Aid/CPR/AED Instructor Training Course held in Los Angeles, California. Additionally, grant funds will be used to purchase a Force Option Simulator (FOS) and Virtual Reality (VR) headsets. Additionally, the City of Perris will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance. The Police Department will follow Indio City's established purchasing policies and anticipates completing the purchase and deploying the new equipment within a year of award.

City of Jurupa Valley: Utilize JAG funding to pay the overtime salary of a Deputy Sheriff for traffic enforcement and mileage for patrol car. City of Jurupa expects to begin using this year's JAG allocation in FY 2020. Additionally, the City of Jurupa Valley will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance.

City of Lake Elsinore: The City of Lake Elsinore will purchase zebra printers and stalker Lidar. The purchase of this equipment will assist the traffic bureau with day to day operations in addition to officer safety. Additionally, grant funds will be used for NIBRS statistics analysis. The Police Department will follow Elsinore City's established purchasing policies and anticipates completing the purchase and deploying the new equipment within a year of award.

City of Moreno Valley: Continue paying the salary and benefits of the two (2) part time personnel for weekend code enforcement, in addition to office supplies, cell and office phone and fuel/vehicle maintenance. Additionally, funds will be used for NIBRS compliance, an office assistant will collect, review, and process local crime data. Moreno Valley PD expects to begin using this year's JAG allocation in FY 2020.

City of Palm Springs: Utilize JAG funding to purchase thirty-four (34) helmets equipped with riot face shields. Additionally, the City of Palm Springs will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance. The Palm Springs Police department will follow the established purchasing policy of the City of Palm Springs and anticipate completing the purchase and deploying new equipment within a year of award.

City of Perris: Utilize JAG funding to pay overtime salary of a Deputy Sheriff for the Robbery Suppression Team. Additionally, the City of Perris will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance.

City of Riverside: Utilize JAG funding for salary and benefits of one (1) previously grant-funded civilian Senior Forensic Specialist position for approximately nine (9) months. Additionally, the City of Riverside will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance and implementation. Various Records Specialist personnel will work on an overtime basis for data entry and review of statistics to ensure the new system is working properly.

County of Riverside: Continue partial funding of one position on the Fugitive Warrant Extradition Team and partial funding of one position in the District Attorney Office Fugitive Apprehension Unit to locate, apprehend and prosecute dangerous and serious offenders. The Riverside Probation department will use JAG funds to partially fund a position that manages the electronic dashboards that interface with the department Juvenile and Adult Management systems. Also, purchase night vision binoculars. Additionally, Riverside County will use JAG 19 grant funds towards NIBRS compliance. The Sheriff Department will follow Riverside County's established purchasing policies and anticipates completing the purchase and deploying the new equipment within a year of award.

This Agreement is made and entered into this ___ day of _____, 2019, by and between THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, acting by and through its governing body, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors (hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY"), and named CITIES (hereinafter referred to as "CITIES"), acting by and through their respective governing bodies, the City Councils, all of whom are situated within the County of Riverside, State of California, as follows:

WHEREAS, each governing body, in performing governmental functions or in paying for the performance of governmental functions hereunder, shall make that performance or those payments from current revenues legally available to that party; and

WHEREAS, each governing body finds that the performance of this Agreement is in the best interests of all parties, that the undertaking will benefit the public, and that the division of costs fairly compensates the performing party for the services or functions under this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the COUNTY agrees to release to CITIES their respective grant allocation from the JAG Award, less ten percent (10%) re-allocated to COUNTY, as reflected on Appendix 1 here attached and hereby incorporated by reference as part of this agreement, on a reimbursement basis; and COUNTY agrees to provide the administration of COUNTY's and CITIES' programs during the entire permissible duration of said programs; and additionally the COUNTY and CITIES each agree that it is their responsibility to ensure these funds are expended in accordance with JAG guidelines; and

WHEREAS, the COUNTY and CITIES believe it to be in their best interests to reallocate the JAG funds,

NOW THEREFORE, the COUNTY and CITIES agree as follows:

Section 1.

COUNTY agrees to release to CITIES up to their respective grant allocation from the JAG Award, less ten percent (10%) re-allocated to COUNTY, as reflected in Appendix 1 here attached and hereby incorporated by reference as part of this Agreement, on a reimbursement basis, from the JAG Award within (45) days upon receipt of fully documented reimbursement request, and; COUNTY agrees to provide the administration of COUNTY's and CITIES' programs during the entire permissible duration of said programs.

Section 2.

COUNTY and CITIES each agree that it is their responsibility to ensure these funds are expended in accordance with JAG guidelines.

Section 3.

CITIES agree to provide COUNTY with sufficient timely information as necessary within five business days after receiving written request from COUNTY to meet JAG requirements for quarterly and annual financial and performance reports.

Section 4.

Nothing arising from this Agreement shall impose any liability for claims or actions against COUNTY other than what is authorized by law.

Section 5.

Nothing arising from this Agreement shall impose any liability for claims or actions against CITIES other than what is authorized by law.

Section 6.

Each party to this Agreement will be responsible for its own actions in providing services under this Agreement and shall not be liable to any other party to this Agreement for any claim or action arising from the services provided under this Agreement.

Section 7.


The parties to this Agreement do not intend for any third party to obtain a right by virtue of this Agreement.

Section 8.


