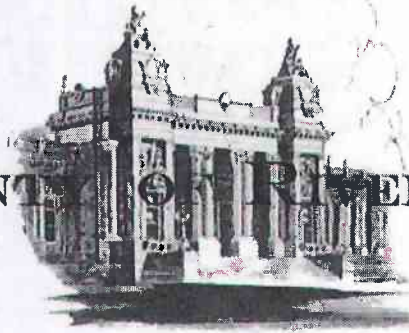
On behalf of Riverside County thank you for your leadership during this critical time and your efforts to address the significant health, safety and economic impacts associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

As Congress negotiates a potential fourth COVID-19 response package, we urge you to provide direct and flexible funding to county governments of all sizes who are at ground-zero of this unprecedented public health and economic crisis.

In Riverside County we operate a public hospital, local public health department, as well as long term care facilities and a behavioral health department. We are also responsible for emergency operations centers, human services, jail management, 911 services, veterans' services and the "last of the first responders" with coroners and medical examiners, among many other essential county functions. Given our role at the front lines of this crisis, we strongly urge you to allocate resources directly to counties as most states mandate the implementation of public health and emergency response responsibilities to county governments.

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
Thus, an additional \$100 billion for hospitals is a welcome opportunity to address our concerns. Specifically, we would propose that a portion of the funds be utilized for direct grants to Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH) hospitals:


- 1) Congress should create a direct grant for DSH hospitals, using states' existing Medicaid DSH allotments as the basis for calculating each state's amount.
- 2) Each state should receive a lump sum, no-strings attached allotment worth at least twice its existing Medicaid DSH allotment, with a requirement that it distribute the funding as grants to DSH hospitals that serve a disproportionate share of Medicaid and uninsured patients in recognition of their critical role in responding to COVID-19 and the adverse impact from associated revenue losses.

Beyond the funding distribution issues above, there are two policy issues which we strongly encourage you to address:

- 1) California urgently needs a 1-year extension of our existing 1115 Medicaid waiver, which expires this year yet must continue through 2021 in order to maintain foundational support for the State's 21 public health care systems.
- 2) California also desperately needs a moratorium on CMS finalizing the proposed Medicaid Fiscal Accountability Regulation (MFAR), such as the moratorium which was included in H.R. 6379, the Take Responsibility for Workers and Families Act. We note that if a moratorium is imposed by Congress before the rule is final, it would not change the budget baseline and require a score.

We thank you for all you are doing on our behalf, and we hope these ideas will be helpful to you as you continue to negotiate the next COVID-19 emergency response bill.

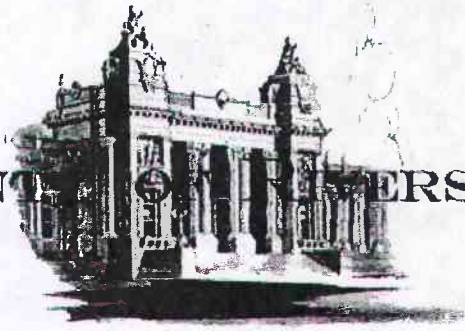



Dear Senators Feinstein and Harris and Reps. Calvert, Takano and Ruiz:

With Congressional leadership currently negotiating legislation to increase the Paycheck Protection Act (aka COVID 3.5), and also laying out the outline for COVID 4.0, we strongly concur with those insisting on the inclusion of additional funding for hospitals and states/localities. We believe this offers an important opportunity to obtain needed assistance for public health care systems. The inclusion of an additional \$100 billion in support for health care systems and state and local governments in the next COVID-19 response bill is needed because California's public health care systems are expending enormous resources and losing revenue each day as they respond to this crisis.

We also have a strong concern that the allocation for the first tranche of CARES-related funding was based on Medicare Fee-for-Service (FFS) volume. Public health care systems, by and large, serve a disproportionately large Medicaid and uninsured population, and this critical safety net role was ignored in the methodology. While we appreciate CMS's assurances that subsequent rounds of CARES Act funding will include other Medicaid providers, that likely comprises a huge group – clinics, nursing homes, children's hospitals, and others – and the diluted funding almost certainly won't meet our emergency needs.

Hospitals - Quick results for inpatients could help preserve PPE which is difficult to find. This is important in allowing the region's hospitals to continue to protect our employees – healthcare workers – vital to help with the expected surge of COVID-19 positive patients and other non-COVID-19 patients such as trauma, stroke and myocardial infarction patients who continue to present to our Emergency/Trauma Centers.

Hospital Emergency Departments - Rapid test results are invaluable in diagnosis and disposition—admitting or treating and discharging.

Healthcare Staff Testing Centers - Rapid results allow essential workers, such as deputies and healthcare workers, who test negative, to return to work more quickly than current testing methodologies, which can take weeks to diagnosis and thereby avoiding service disruption in essential services such as healthcare and law enforcement.

Drive-in Events and Community Health Center's Testing Sites - Allow patients to remain in their vehicle (for drive-in events) and receive screening and testing provided by caregivers in full personal protective equipment (PPE); rapid testing could provide results in less than 15 minutes before the patient leaves the site and without seeking testing in already impacted hospitals. The community health centers in the two-county area are not able to perform rapid testing, yet they are evaluating and screening thousands of individuals. Being able to provide rapid results would also improve overall efficiency as many staff and providers are currently dedicated to the process of following up and communicating test results with patients.

The Inland Empire entities have expressed the need for this rapid response testing equipment through the current protocol and direct purchase request and have been told that this equipment is currently unavailable.


We firmly believe the Abbott ID Now COVID-19 devices, if allowed to be deployed as outlined above in sufficient numbers can uniquely be a significant breakthrough in addressing outbreaks, increasing community testing, returning essential workers back to the workforce faster, preserving precious PPE and assisting the region's recovery.

We respectfully thank you for this unique request for the region in our unprecedented emergency situation and request your support for accessing this critically needed rapid response test. We stand ready to provide any related data to support the success of this testing modality. **RE: Urgent Request for COVID-19 Rapid Response Testing**

Dear Dr. Dean:

On behalf of the undersigned counties, health plan, community health association, and hospital we request your urgent attention to the Inland Empire's desperate need for Rapid Response COVID-19 testing units and supplies based on the recent COVID-19 outbreaks in both Riverside and San Bernardino counties, collectively known as the Inland Empire.

The Inland Empire is home to more than 4.7 million residents and larger than 10 states in America. To serve this population, the undersigned are initially requesting your support to bring 30 testing units, 7,200 testing kits and 1,800 boxes of Controls to the region.

We are uniting as a region to tackle the unprecedented challenges that the rapid spread of COVID-19 cases has brought to our community, including outbreaks in the correctional health settings, as well as outbreaks in multiple skilled nursing facilities, classifying the region as a "hot spot."

Currently, there are outbreaks in four skilled nursing facilities in the region. These facilities are in a critical state with more than 180 positive cases. The delay in obtaining test results has resulted in staffing shortages and delayed patient disposition. Access to rapid response tests would have allowed for early risk mitigation efforts.

The Abbott ID Now COVID-19 is a sophisticated point-of-care test that can return a result in less than 15 minutes and is small enough to be placed where care is provided. This type of innovation would alleviate some of the testing barriers and the numerous access to care challenges that the Inland Empire is confronting. Barriers, besides lack of testing equipment and supplies, include those relating to the region's outbreaks, vast geography of the county, lack of personal protective equipment (PPE), healthcare workforce needs and hospital capacity. Early access to COVID-19 testing is critical for our region if we are to mitigate the spread.

COVID-19 cases in the Inland Empire are growing exponentially at a steady doubling rate of 4 days. As of April 9, 2020, COVID-19 incidents for the two-county region are: 1,820 positive cases and 52 deaths.

By May, the region is projected to experience more than 93,000 infections, 15,280 hospitalizations and possibly more than 1,700 COVID-19 related deaths, based on current trends.

The Inland Empire must be prioritized for Abbott ID Now COVID-19 Rapid Response tests to serve residents across the vast region of 27,000 square miles in the following settings:







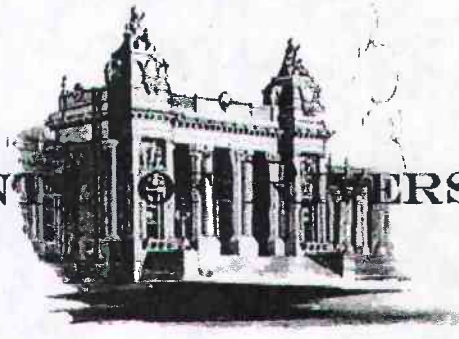
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In the currently discussed supplemental package to CV3, it appears that Congress wishes to appropriately direct aid to cities with populations less than 500,000. In the strongest possible terms, we urge you to also include Independent Special Districts in that package either as direct recipients or as preferred claimants on funds specially distributed to the states expressly for Independent Special Districts.

Independent Special Districts and the communities and regions that rely on their services across the nation will be further harmed should the pandemic continue, and they not be considered for inclusion in resources readily provided to other entities. On behalf of all the Independent Special Districts in Riverside County and our mutual constituents, we request that you:

- 1) Expand the Coronavirus Relief Fund's eligibility for "local forms of government" to receive a portion of the funds and appropriate \$1 billion specifically for Independent Special Districts to utilize so that they may continue to provide services and/or to mitigate lost revenue;
- 2) Include local governments in the COVID-19 payroll tax credit. All public agencies are required to provide paid COVID-19 Emergency Sick and Family Leave, however special districts, cities, counties and states as well as other public agencies and educational institutions are excluded from using the tax credit for repayment, imposing upon us an injurious unfunded mandate at the very time that we are looked to provide additional community services;
- 3) Restore advance refunding of tax-exempt bonds, as outlined in H.R. 2772. Doing so would allow flexibility for states and local governments to access billions of dollars to reallocate and spend on other projects, which, in turn, strengthens local infrastructure networks; and
- 4) Increase access to capital for small borrowers, as is included in H.R. 3967. This would increase the bank-qualified borrowing limit from \$10 million to \$30 million and allow it to apply at the borrower level. Taking this measure would grant small issuers – both government and non-profit, who may be hardest hit during the downturn, access to capital for immediate project needs.
