**BACKGROUND:**

**Summary**

Community Action Agencies (CAA) are local private and public non-profit organizations that carry out the Community Action Program, which was founded by the 1964 Economic Opportunity Act to fight poverty by empowering low-income communities. The establishment of local CAAs was a key component to President Johnson's War on Poverty. CAAs are intended to effectuate economic opportunity and they depend heavily on community partnerships, grassroots community engagement and volunteer work, especially from the low-income community.

Each CAA is governed by a board of directors consisting of at least one-third low-income community members, one-third public officials, and up to one-third private sector leaders. This board structure is defined by federal statute and is known as a tripartite board. There are currently over 1,000 CAAs, engaged in a broad range of activities; typical activities include promoting citizen participation, providing utility bill assistance and home weatherization for low-income individuals, administration of Head Start pre-school programs, job training, operating food pantries, and coordinating community initiatives.

The federally funded Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) is the core funding agent for CAAs. Agencies also operate a variety of grants that come from federal, state and local sources. Other programs frequently administered by CAAs include Low-Income Home Energy Assistance (LIHEAP), utility grants and Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP), funded through the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE).

Within Riverside County, the division of Community Action Partnership (CAP) which falls under the Department of Housing, Homelessness Prevention and Workforce Solutions (HHPWS), carries out all programming under the federal Community Action Program and serves as the lead anti-poverty agency for the County. CAP joined HHPWS in March 2020 to facilitate greater impact in poverty elimination and economic empowerment through access to housing, homeless and workforce programming which are key weapons in our local fight against poverty. The work of CAP is heavily driven by a Community Needs Assessment and local anti-poverty initiatives currently underway within the community. Per pre-pandemic data, 1 in 6 Riverside

County residents live in poverty which equates to 15.6% of the county's population. The goal of the CAP division is to eliminate poverty for these residents and to amplify the needs of our low-income communities.

The attached 2019 Annual Report details the programming and impact of CAP's programs for the most recent calendar year. In 2019, CAP served a total of 63,746 individuals and families through various programs and activities. The results of this service include: 12,409 households assisted with utility bills; 244 customers received weatherization services; 37,330 residents attended a Cooling or Warming Center; 2,029 cases were mediated through the Dispute Resolution Program; 450 individuals graduated from the asset building program, Savings for Success; 11,298 tax returns were prepared through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program which resulted in \$11.5 million in total refunds; and 25,738 youth mentoring hours were provided and coordinated by the agency's various youth programs.

The CAP division has modified and expanded community programming to address critical community needs during the pandemic, most notably the need for utility assistance and personal computers to address the digital divide. The agency is currently preparing to meet the needs of residents who have fallen into the poverty due to the economic impact of the ongoing pandemic and stands ready to play a critical role in the county's economic response efforts.

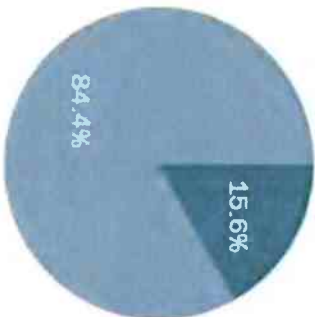

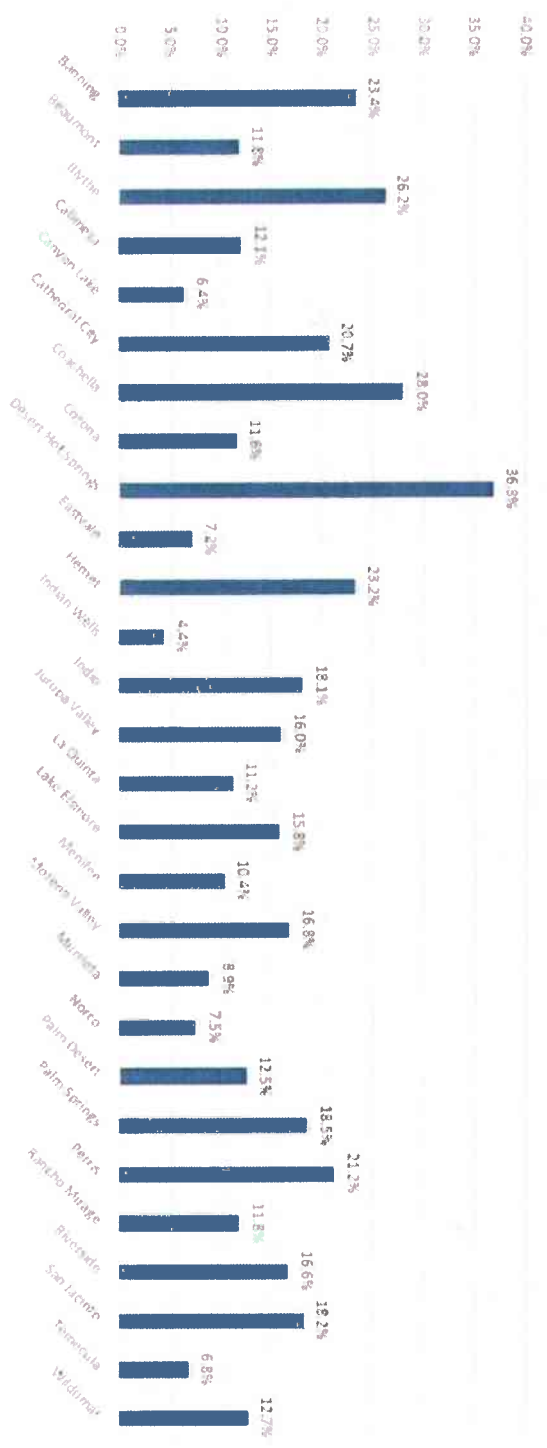

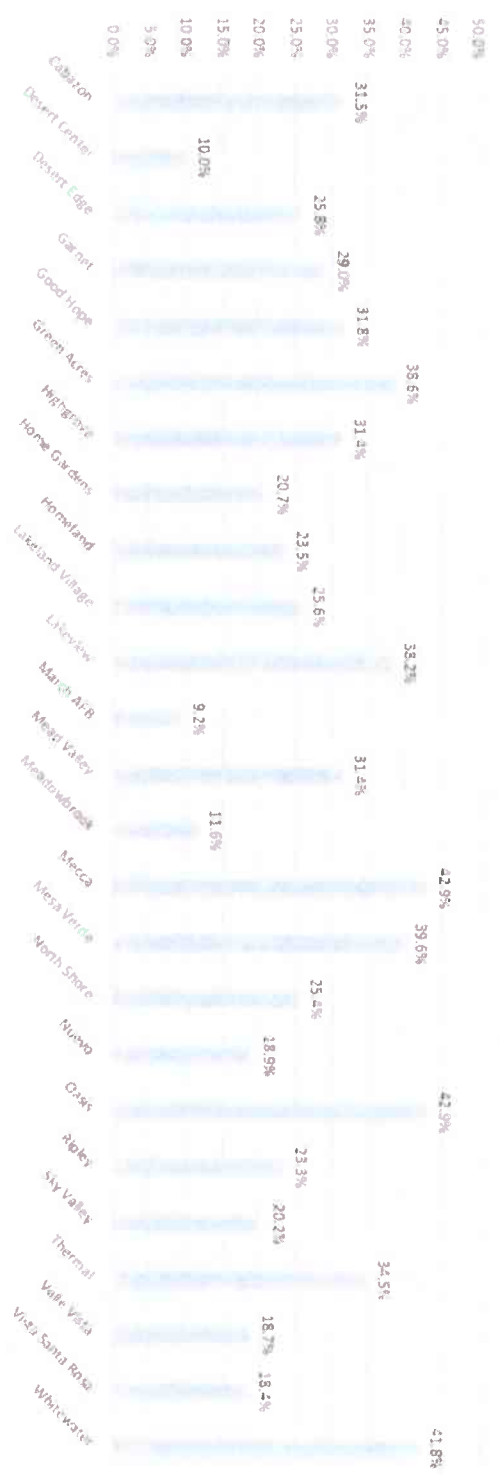
Education Level for Citizens Who  
Fall Below the Poverty Line



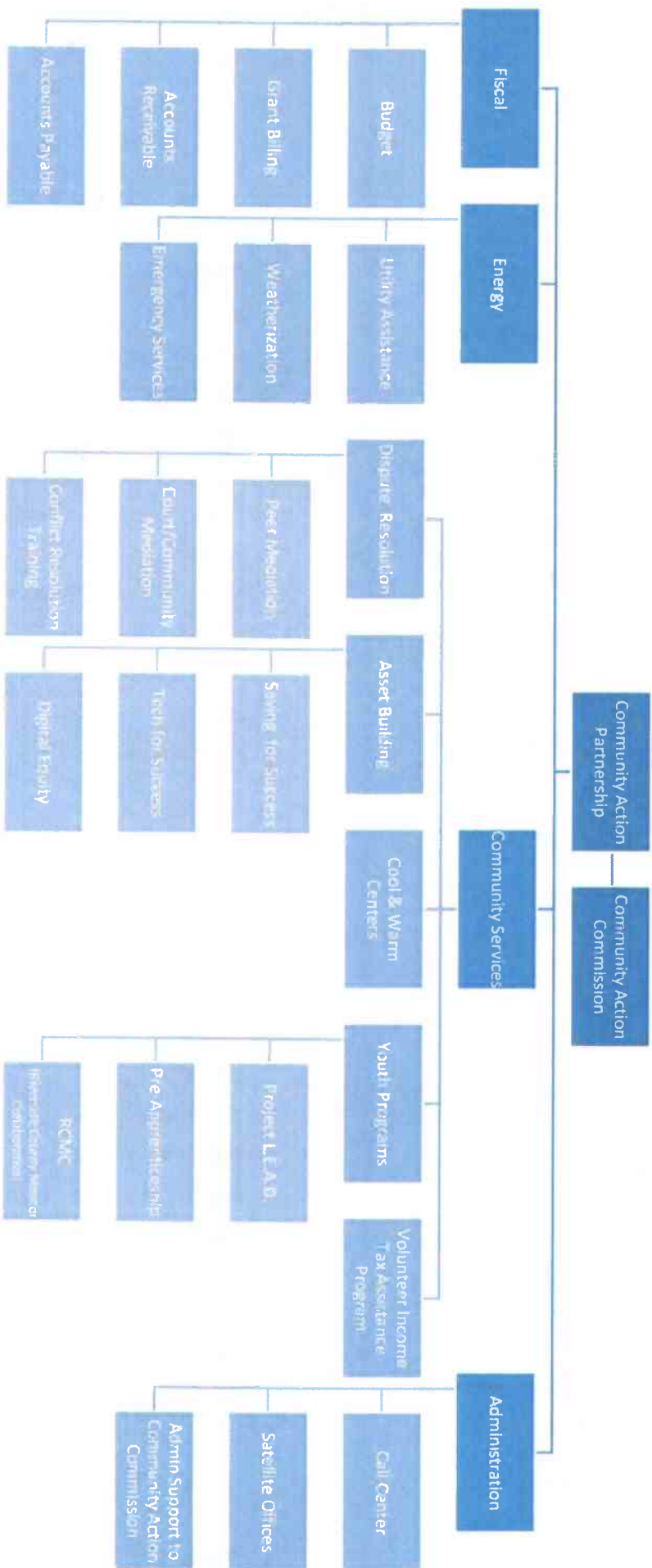
### POVERTY PERCENTAGE BY CITY

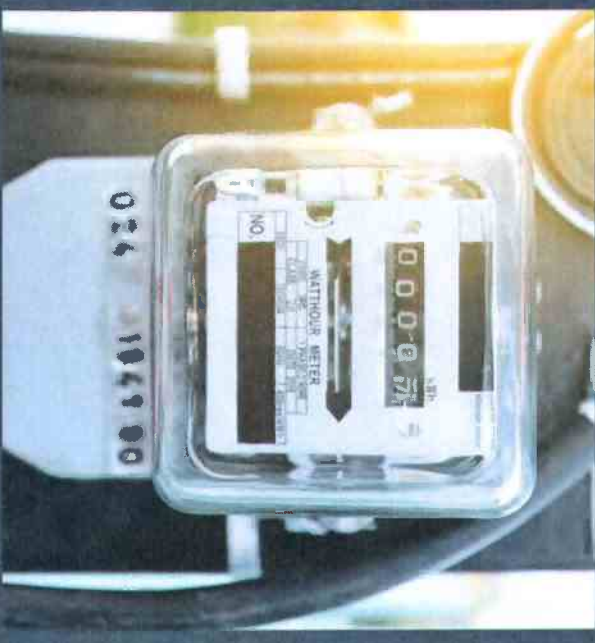
**Established Tax Problem Solving Days**

Community Action partnered with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to establish Tax Problem Solving Days at the CAP Riverside Training and Learning Center. IRS representatives assisted Riverside County residents with difficult tax issues such as past due taxes and installment agreements. Additionally, certified IRS volunteers were available to complete tax returns free of charge for the participants.



**Community Action Commission**

Under the leadership of Chairwoman Baker, the CAP Commission revamped the required orientation for new board members, implemented new policies and procedures, and updated the Commission Bylaws and Delineation of Powers. This allowed CAP Riverside to better align with national standards and enabled the Commission to provide the appropriate oversight and guidance necessary to work towards achieving CAP's vision of ending poverty in Riverside County.



**Disengagement Assistance Program**

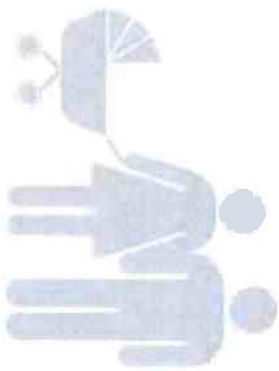
In an effort to help Riverside County residents reduce their energy costs by improving the energy efficiency of their homes, CAP Riverside created the Disengagement Assistance Program. The Disengagement Assistance Program supplemented the already robust Weatherization Program by allowing CAP Riverside to install additional energy saving services for Riverside County residents. These services included the installation of washers, dryers, dishwashers, freezers, new house fans, various lighting fixtures, and electrical panel upgrades.

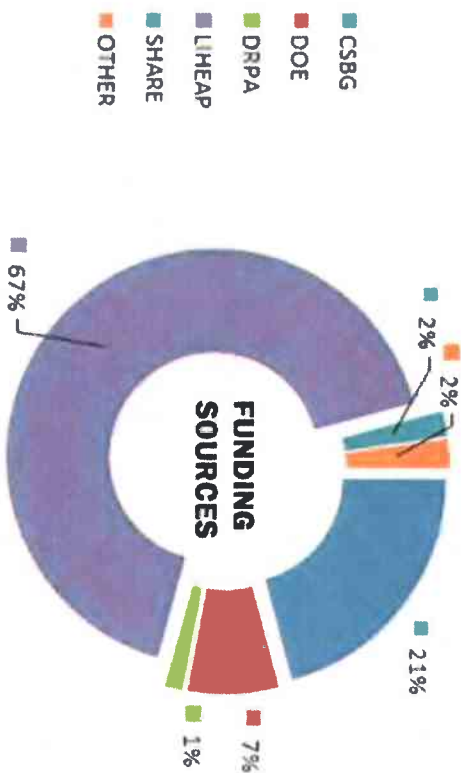

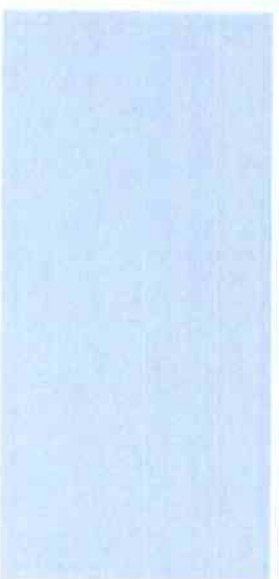

# ENERGY SERVICES

## CALIFORNIA ALTERNATIVE RATES FOR ENERGY (CARE)

The CARE program provides a monthly discount of 20 percent or more on the electric or gas bill for individuals who meet the income eligibility guidelines, hold the utility account in his/her name and are qualified customers.

## ENERGY CRISIS INTERVENTION PROGRAM (ECIP)

The Energy Crisis Intervention Program assists income qualified applicants with one of their utility bills of either gas, electric, wood, propane or oil payment; as well as, heating or cooling equipment repair, or replacement on behalf of those households identified in a crisis situation. For utility assistance (gas, electric, wood, propane or oil), a payment is made when an applicant receives a 24-hour to 48-hours disconnection notice (or other utility service disconnection notice); or the applicant's utility services have been terminated; or the applicant requires assistance with establishing a new account. Emergency assistance for heating and cooling systems is offered to mitigate the immediate need that poses a life threatening situation during extreme weather conditions. After assessment, the unit problem will be addressed and repaired or replaced as deemed feasible.

## ENERGY EDUCATION

The purpose of the energy education is to teach the customer about the costs of energy, the benefits of energy conservation measures and practices and available resources, such as rebates, appliance safety and discount programs.



## SHARING HOUSEHOLDS ASSIST RIVERSIDE'S ENERGY (SHARE)

SHARE is funded by the city of Riverside and is specifically for Riverside Public Utilities customers. In order to leverage services received, SHARE customers may also apply for LIHEAP.

## UTILITY ASSISTANCE

The utility assistance program is a one-time assistance program that helps low and moderate-income individuals and families with utility payment assistance. Funding for the program is provided by the federal LIHEAP (Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program) and the City of Riverside SHARE (Sharing Households Assist Riverside's Energy).

## WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE

The program provides free home energy conservation services to low-income Riverside County homeowners and renters. These services reduce energy use and lower utility bills, creating a safe and more efficient household. Energy-saving services include measures such as attic insulation, caulking, water heater blanket, heating/cooling system repair or replacement and other energy-efficient measures. A trained inspector assesses eligible dwellings for measures needed.

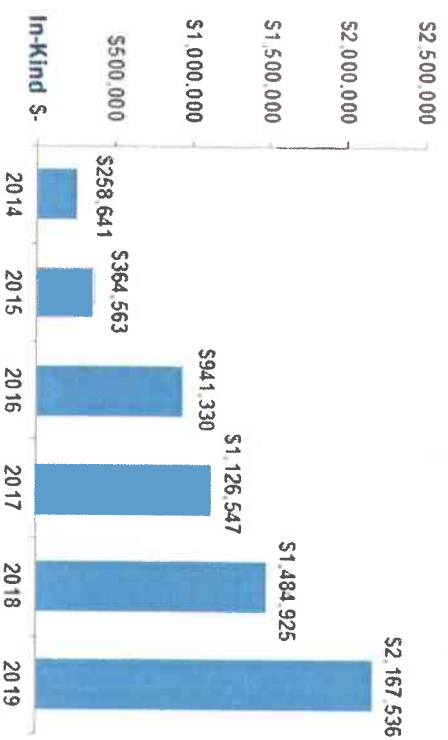
# COOL & WARM CENTERS

Community Action facilitates cool and warm centers throughout the region that provide a safe place for people, especially those most vulnerable, to escape extreme seasonal temperatures and save money on their utility bills. Cool Centers are active June 1 through Oct. 15, and Warm Centers are active Dec. 1 through March 31. In 2019, there were 60 Cool Centers and Warm Centers operating throughout Riverside County, serving 37,330 visitors.

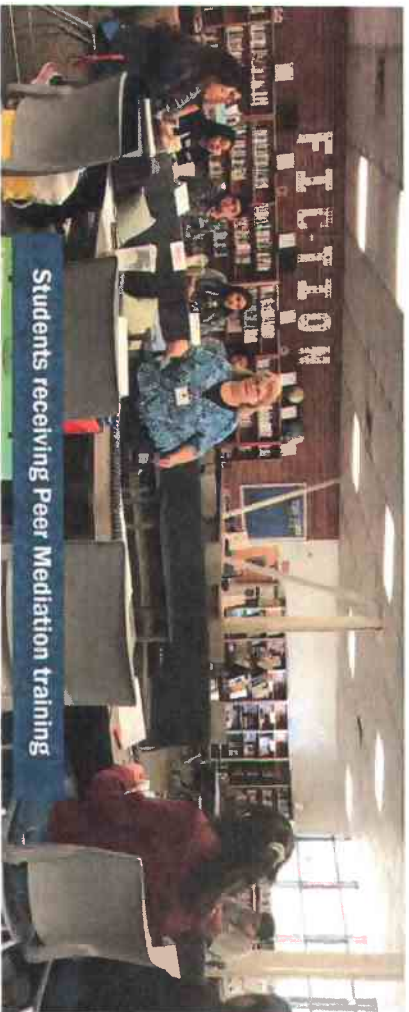

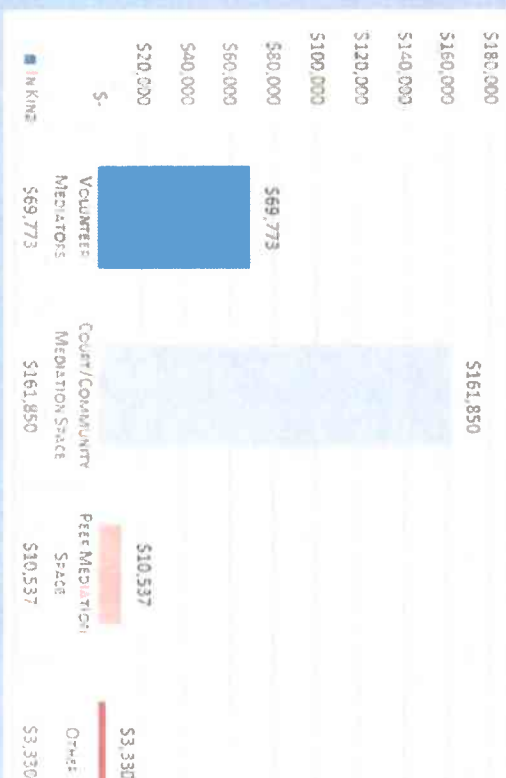


# DISPUTE RESOLUTION

The Dispute Resolution Program provides mediation services and conflict resolution workshops and training to students and adults. Mediation is conflict resolution assisted by a neutral third party achieved through active listening, understanding, exploration of options and compromise. Mediation is a win-win alternative to small claims court. Through the mediation process, the individuals involved in a dispute work out their own solutions with the help of a mediator. Mediation saves money and time, and allows for a workable relationship, whereas, the court procedure is time-consuming, expensive and places the parties in adversarial positions. Additionally, Community Action offers Peer Mediation workshops to various school districts to help the youth resolve conflict and become peace ambassadors.

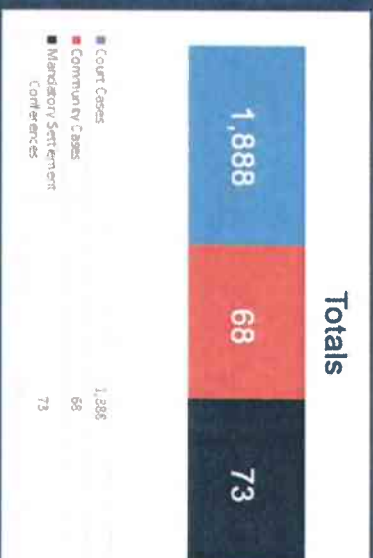


Students receiving Peer Mediation training

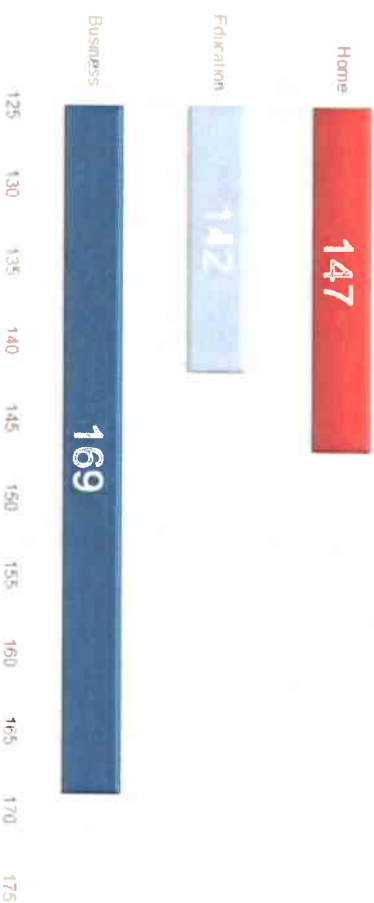

# ASSET BUILDING

The Savings for Success Program is a matched savings incentive program for residents of Riverside County seeking economic stability. Participants must have income to be eligible for the program. Participants attend a series of mandatory and elective workshops to increase financial knowledge as well as to become better prepared to reach their goal. Participants open a savings account, contribute to reach the goal in savings to be matched by Community Action, and choose to pursue one of the three goals: purchase a first home, college or vocational school or start or expand a business.



There have been over 450 individuals who have graduated from the program. Category breakdown is reflected above.



### Tech for Success

The Tech for Success program provides laptops to families that participate in a series of workshops where they acquire skills and learn about community resources. The participants in these series complete workshops where they learn about financial literacy, raising money smart children, child support and conflict resolution. Each of the participants are presented with a laptop and certificate for completing course requirements that help them and their families thrive and prosper in their lives.



### Lingafelter Development Fund

The Lingafelter Development Fund provides small grants to grassroots organizations to help them with start up costs, such as, helping them obtain their 501(c)(3) status.

# VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE



The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program provides FREE tax preparation services to low to moderate income filers. During tax season, there are free sites across Riverside County. All sites are staffed by IRS Certified Volunteers.

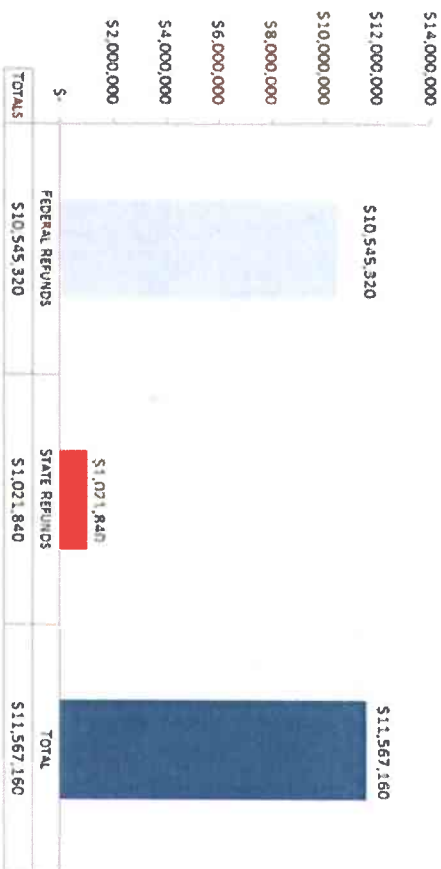

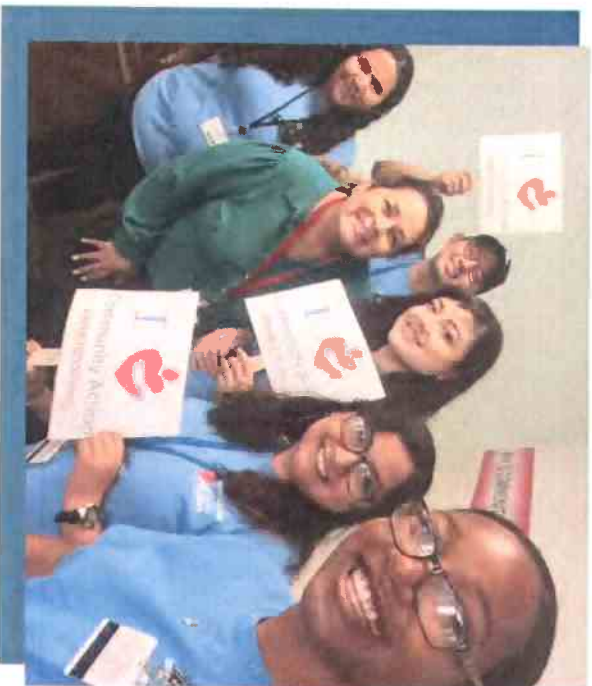


# YOUTH PROGRAMS

## PROJECT L.E.A.D.

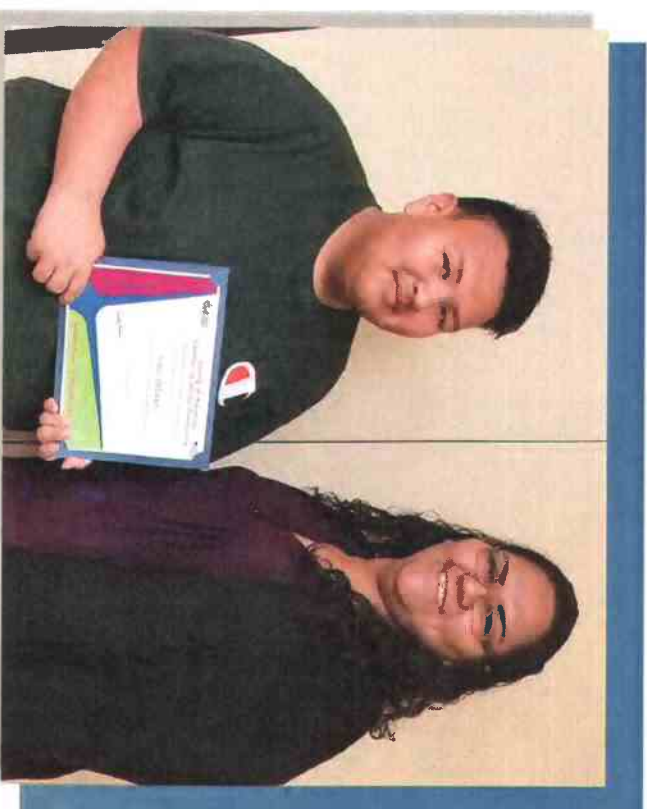
### (LINKING EDUCATION, ADVOCACY AND DEVELOPMENT)

Project L.E.A.D. is a program that recruits, trains and deploys mentors and tutors to assist students enrolled in after school programs at middle schools. Project L.E.A.D. provides mentoring and tutoring through character development activities such as recreation, crafts, arts and academic coursework.



## PRE-APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

The Pre-Apprenticeship Program is a workplace mentoring program that matches high school juniors and seniors with small businesses throughout the county. The youth are provided an opportunity to learn marketable job skills while still attending high school.



Congratulations to Luis Infante for completing the Pre-Apprenticeship program!

Luis started the Pre-Apprenticeship program during his Junior year in High School. Luis was matched with Galilee Center, Inc. in Mecca. When he started, he said he wanted to learn to interact with people because he was shy. He set his three goals when he started in the program: 1) Improve communication skills; 2) Customer Service; and 3) Listen actively / Improve listening skills.

Luis expressed how the program has helped him develop a strong work experience foundation, break through his shyness, and learned the responsibility of managing money, the value of his community his community and the importance of Galilee's volunteers.

Congratulations LaShanae for completing the Pre-Apprenticeship program!

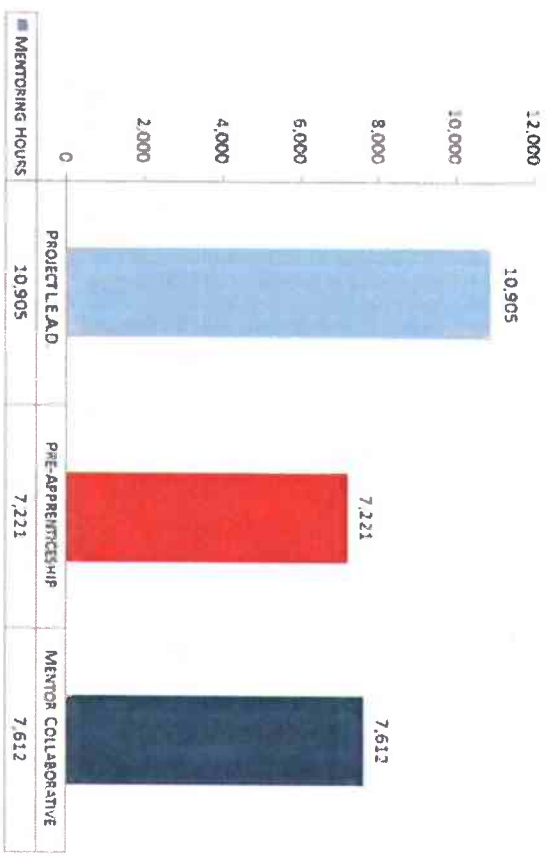


LaShanae started the Pre-Apprenticeship program during her Junior year in High School and was matched with Operation SafeHouse, in Riverside. She learned about the Pre-Apprenticeship Program through City of Riverside Youth Opportunity Center. 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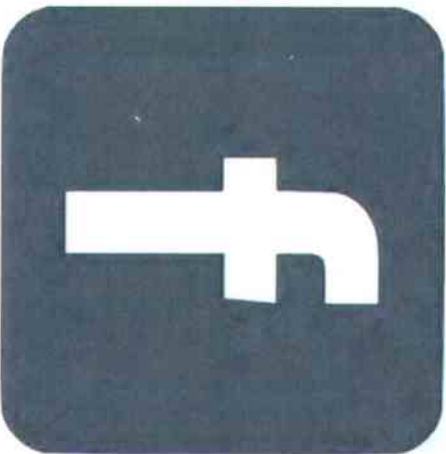
