On motion of Supervisor Spiegel, seconded by Supervisor Hewitt, and duly carried by unanimous vote, IT WAS ORDERED that the meeting of Tuesday, January 12, 2021, be adjourned in memory of RADM Allen Edward Hill, who peacefully passed away on December 21, 2020, at the age of 92.

Admiral Hill was born July 6, 1928 in Riverside, California. At an early age he was determined to be an aviator. He was Student Body President at University Heights Junior High School and 11th grade Class President at Poly High School. At the age of 24, he was a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley, a commissioned Navy pilot, and newly married to Jacqueline Ellen Brechin.

Naval War College, National War College, Joint Chiefs of Staff, Commander of Squadrons, Air Wings, Naval Warships, Training Command for the Pacific Fleet, and concluding his assignments as Director of Tactical Readiness. He became the first Admiral to be totally responsible for Naval Warfare Doctrine. No challenge was too great. He held the record for the first all jet and highest altitude dog fight as he battled multiple MiG jets over Korea. He established and instructed at the the Fighter Weapons School, which became known as Topgun. His greatest personal achievement was surviving a surface to air strike, wounded and on fire, he eventually ejected and was rescued in Haiphong Harbor.

Admiral Hill retired in Riverside, California in 1982. Great friends played a major role in his love for Riverside. Whether it was spending time with his lovely wife Jacqueline, golfing, fishing, hunting, gardening, reading or writing, he was truly at home. Much of his activity centered around Victoria Club, a one-time President, he enjoyed the environment immensely. He and Jacqueline were married at the Mission Inn and celebrated their 65th Wedding Anniversary there in 2017. Admiral Hill would add the honor of having his "Wings" placed on the famed Aviators Wall. He was California City College Alumnus of the Year, Grand Marshall at Veterans Day Parades, a mentor to many that sought military careers, the Admiral stayed busy. He recently had his name dedicated to the newly remodeled Innovation Space at West Riverside Elementary, his alma mater, brought him great honor and fulfillment.

Admiral Hill's memory and passionate spirit will live forever in the hearts of those who knew and loved him, he will be greatly missed but never forgotten.

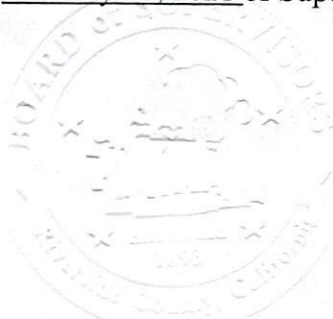

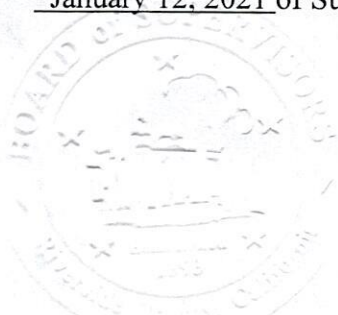
Stan was predeceased by his wife, Dr. Marian Jane Scheer, who passed away on December 7, 2020, six days before he did.

Joseph was born at the Soboba Indian Hospital in San Jacinto, California, on February 18, 1935. He started his life from the humblest of beginnings on an arid and undeveloped reservation. He grew up in a one-bedroom home without air conditioning, running water or heat.

Joe was a talented athlete and he graduated from Coachella Valley high School and attended Riverside City College and College of the Desert. He married his high school sweetheart, Gayle Emmerling, together they had their son Marc Devery, in 1958. Gayle preceded him in death, and he remarried in 1975 to his wife Diana, and together they had three more children, Michael, Lisa and Trayci.

In 1960, Joe became chairman of the Cabazon Band of Mission Indians, a role in which he served for 24 years. As chairman, Joe Benitez led his Tribe to prosperity, working with the California Rural Indian Health Board and the National Indian Health Board and testifying before Congress, Joe was instrumental to securing increased funding for health care for Native American Tribes across the country.

Joe helped many organizations and served on numerous boards. For more than 40 years, he was an active mentor in the recovery community, helping people in recovery live a sober life and working with those who needed help to find the tools, guidance and support they need to get back on track.

Joe was a leader in his church, St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, and served as a Tribal Elder. He was a respected leader in the Coachella Valley who devoted his life to helping others, and he celebrated all humanity.
