

BACKGROUND:

Summary

In accordance with the County's Citizen Participation Plan and 24 CFR Section 91.105(e), a public hearing needs to be conducted to obtain citizen's views on community development needs and proposed uses of Community Planning and Development (CPD) funding in the One-Year Action Plan. This is the initial public hearing for the 2022-2023 HUD CPD funding cycle. No formal action by the Board of Supervisors is necessary.

Pursuant to the County's Citizen Participation Plan and 24 CFR Section 91.105, the Department of Housing and Workforce Solutions (HWS) published the required public notices notifying the public of the comment period for both the proposed 2022-2023, One-Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five-Year Consolidated Plan and the public hearing.

At a later date, staff will submit the final 2022-2023, One-Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five-Year Consolidated Plan to the Board of Supervisors for review and adoption. The One-Year Action Plan will identify the specific activities selected for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnership Program (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding. The Federal FY 2022 appropriations have been approved by Congress. Therefore, staff anticipate presenting the final 2022-2023 One-Year Action Plan to the Board of Supervisors no later than June 7, 2022.

Upon completion of the citizen participation process, the review and consideration of comments, and the review and adoption by the Board of Supervisors, the final 2022-2023 One-Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan will be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval.

The proposed activities under the 2022-2023 HUD-funded Community Planning and Development (CPD) programs are attached.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

It is anticipated that the County's 2022-2023 CPD allocation will total \$10,913.00 for the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs.

The Riverside County Department of Housing and Workforce Solutions hereby notifies the public, pursuant to *24 CFR 91.105(e)* that the County of Riverside Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing to: 1) hear comments on community development needs within the County's HUD-funded Urban County program; and 2) hear comments upon the proposed uses of 2022-2023 HUD-funded CPD programs to address the identified community development needs. The public hearing is scheduled for March 29, 2022, at **9:30 a.m.**, in the Board of Supervisors' Chambers, County Administrative Center, 4080 Lemon Street, 1st floor, Riverside, CA. The public may present oral or written comments during the public hearing.

Furthermore, the public may review and comment upon the proposed uses of 2022-2023 HUD-funded CPD programs, as well as comment upon community development needs, beginning February 25, 2022. Comments may be submitted to the addresses below until 5:00 PM on March 28, 2022.

It is anticipated that the Board of Supervisors will approve and adopt the final 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan at its regular meeting of June 7, 2022. The 2022-2023 One-Year Action Plan will then be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval on or about June 8, 2022. Please note that both the meeting date and time are subject to change.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY. The primary objective of the County's CPD programs is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expansion of economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate incomes. The 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan is a component of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan that must be updated annually. It provides detailed information on the resources the County expects to receive and the

specific activities to be undertaken to meet the priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. Upon completion of the Citizen Participation process, the review and considerations of comments, and the approval by the Board of Supervisors, the County will prepare and submit the final 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

ANTICIPATED FUNDS. Anticipated allocations to be received through the FY 2022-23 HUD appropriations are: \$8,000,000 for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, including the Metro City Program; \$2,300,000 for the Home Investment Partnership (HOME) program, including the Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO) program; and \$613,000 for the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program. The County expects to utilize at least eighty-five percent (85%) of the CPD funds for activities that will benefit low and moderate-income persons.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ONE YEAR PLAN ACTIVITIES. The County received eighty-five (85) proposals for the 2022-23 CDBG funding totaling \$8,315,081. The proposed activities included public service, public facility improvements, rehabilitation, economic development, code enforcement, and others. There were eight (8) requests for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding totaling \$2,271,518. Proposals for the HOME program include: HOME New Construction (\$1,825,820); HOME Direct Ownership (\$350,000); HOME/CHDO Set-Aside (\$365,165); and HOME Administration (\$243,442). The combined cost for the oversight of the programs (HOME, CDBG, ESG) general management and administrative activities is estimated to be \$1,844,744.

DISPLACEMENT. All planned CPD-funded activities will be designed to minimize the displacement of persons. The provision of relocation benefits to displaced persons and replacement of low-and moderate- income housing units that are demolished or converted to another use as a result of CDBG funded activities will be consistent with the County's Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan and provisions of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970, as amended.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AND COMMENTS. The County of Riverside initiated the 2022-2023 CPD Funding cycle in August 2021, with the publication of the *Notification of Funding Availability* (NOFA) for the CDBG and ESG programs. The County initiated the *Citizen Participation Process* in August 2021, with the notification to residents, Cooperating Cities, non-profit organizations, service providers, public agencies, and other stakeholders, of the 2022-2023 CPD Funding cycle. The Citizen Participation process consisted of online submissions, public meetings in unincorporated communities to receive input from residents and others to identify and assess economic, community, housing, and social development needs in the communities.

PARTICIPATING COMMUNITIES. The 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Consolidated Plan includes the unincorporated areas of the County, the cities of Lake Elsinore and Murrieta (Metro Cities), and the following Cooperating Cities: Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Coachella, Canyon Lake, Calimesa, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Indian Wells, La Quinta, Norco, San Jacinto, and Wildomar.

IMPLEMENTATION. The goals for the 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan of the Consolidated Plan include: creating affordable housing for those of very low, low, and moderate-income; providing home ownership opportunities for first-time buyers; improving conditions of substandard housing

and rental housing; addressing farm worker housing needs; ensuring the availability of emergency shelters to address the needs of the homeless; creating housing opportunities for the elderly, especially the frail elderly; creating supportive housing or shelter for persons afflicted with HIV/AIDS; creating rental assistance through subsidy programs; providing short-term shelter for the mentally ill homeless; creating a suitable living environment by improving public facilities and services; and providing economic development opportunities for low- and moderate- income families.

Las actividades propuestas incluyeron servicio público, mejoras a instalaciones públicas, rehabilitación, desarrollo económico, aplicación de códigos y otras. Hubo ocho (8) solicitudes de fondos de Subvención para Soluciones de Emergencia (ESG) por un total de \$2,271,518. Las propuestas para el programa HOME incluyen: HOME Nueva Construcción (\$1,825,820); Propiedad directa de HOME (\$350,000); Reserva de HOME/CHDO (\$365,165); y administración de HOME (\$243,442). DESPLAZAMIENTO. Todas las actividades planificadas financiadas por CPD estarán diseñadas para minimizar el desplazamiento de personas. La provisión de beneficios de reubicación para personas desplazadas y el reemplazo de unidades de vivienda de ingresos bajos y moderados que se demuelen o conviertan para otro uso como resultado de las actividades financiadas por CDBG serán consistentes con el Plan de Asistencia para Reubicación y Antidesplazamiento del Condado y las disposiciones de la Ley Uniforme de Asistencia para la Reubicación y Adquisición de Bienes Raíces de 1970, según enmendada.

PARTICIPACIÓN CIUDADANA Y COMENTARIOS. El Condado de Riverside inició el 2022-2023 Ciclo de financiación de CPD en agosto de 2021, con la publicación de la Notificación de disponibilidad de financiación (NOFA) para los programas CDBG y ESG. El Condado inició el Proceso de Participación Ciudadana en agosto de 2021, con la notificación a los residentes, Ciudades Cooperantes, organizaciones sin fines de lucro, proveedores de servicios, agencias públicas y otras partes interesadas, del ciclo de Financiamiento de CPD 2022-2023. El Proceso de participación ciudadana consistió en presentaciones en línea, reuniones públicas en comunidades no incorporadas para recibir aportes de los residentes y otros para identificar y evaluar las necesidades económicas, comunitarias, de vivienda y de desarrollo social en las comunidades.

COMUNIDADES PARTICIPANTES. Una vez finalizado el proceso de participación ciudadana, la revisión y consideración de los comentarios, y la aprobación de la Junta de Supervisores, el Condado preparará y presentará el Plan de acción de un año 2022-2023 final del Plan consolidado de cinco años 2019-2024 al Departamento de Vivienda y Desarrollo Urbano de los Estados Unidos.

FONDOS ANTICIPADOS. Las asignaciones anticipadas que se recibirán a través de las asignaciones del HUD para el año fiscal 2022-23 son: \$8,000,000 para el programa de Subsidios en Bloque para el Desarrollo Comunitario (CDBG), incluido el Programa Metro City; \$2,300,000 para el programa Home Investment Partnership (HOME), incluido el programa de Organizaciones de Desarrollo de Vivienda Comunitaria (CHDO); y \$613,000 para el programa de Subvención de Soluciones de Emergencia (ESG). El Condado espera utilizar al menos el ochenta y cinco por ciento (85 %) de los fondos de CPD para actividades que beneficiarán a personas de ingresos bajos y moderados.

RESUMEN DE LAS ACTIVIDADES PROPUESTAS DEL PLAN DE UN AÑO. El condado recibió ochenta y cinco (85) propuestas para la financiación de CDBG 2022-23 por un total de \$8,315,081. Las actividades propuestas incluyeron servicio público, mejoras a instalaciones públicas, rehabilitación, desarrollo económico, aplicación de códigos y otras. Hubo ocho (8) solicitudes de fondos de Subvención para Soluciones de Emergencia (ESG) por un total de \$2,271,518. Las propuestas para el programa HOME incluyen: HOME Nueva Construcción (\$1,825,820); Propiedad directa de HOME (\$350,000); Reserva de HOME/CHDO (\$365,165); y administración de HOME (\$243,442). El costo combinado de la supervisión de las actividades administrativas y de gestión general de los programas (HOME, CDBG, ESG) se estima en \$1,844,744.

DESPLAZAMIENTO. Todas las actividades planificadas financiadas por CPD estarán diseñadas para minimizar el desplazamiento de personas. La provisión de beneficios de reubicación para personas desplazadas y el reemplazo de unidades de vivienda de ingresos bajos y moderados que se demuelen o conviertan para otro uso como resultado de las actividades financiadas por CDBG serán consistentes con el Plan de Asistencia para Reubicación y Antideslizamiento del Condado y las disposiciones de la Ley Uniforme de Asistencia para la Reubicación y Adquisición de Bienes Raíces de 1970, según enmendada.

PARTICIPACIÓN CIUDADANA Y COMENTARIOS. El Condado de Riverside inició el 2022-2023 Ciclo de financiación de CPD en agosto de 2021, con la publicación de la Notificación de disponibilidad de financiación (NOFA) para los programas CDBG y ESG. El Condado inició el Proceso de Participación Ciudadana en agosto de 2021, con la notificación a los residentes, Ciudades Cooperantes, organizaciones sin fines de lucro, proveedores de servicios, agencias públicas y otras partes interesadas, del ciclo de Financiamiento de CPD 2022-2023. El Proceso de participación ciudadana consistió en presentaciones en línea, reuniones públicas en comunidades no incorporadas para recibir aportes de los residentes y otros para identificar y evaluar las necesidades económicas, comunitarias, de vivienda y de desarrollo social en las comunidades.

COMUNIDADES PARTICIPANTES. El Plan de Acción de un año 2022-2023 del 2019-2024 el plan consolidado incluye las áreas no incorporadas del condado, las ciudades de Lake Elsinore y Murrieta (ciudades metropolitanas) y las siguientes ciudades colaboradoras: Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Coachella, Canyon Lake, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Indian Wells, La Quinta, Norco, San Jacinto y Wildomar.

IMPLEMENTACIÓN. 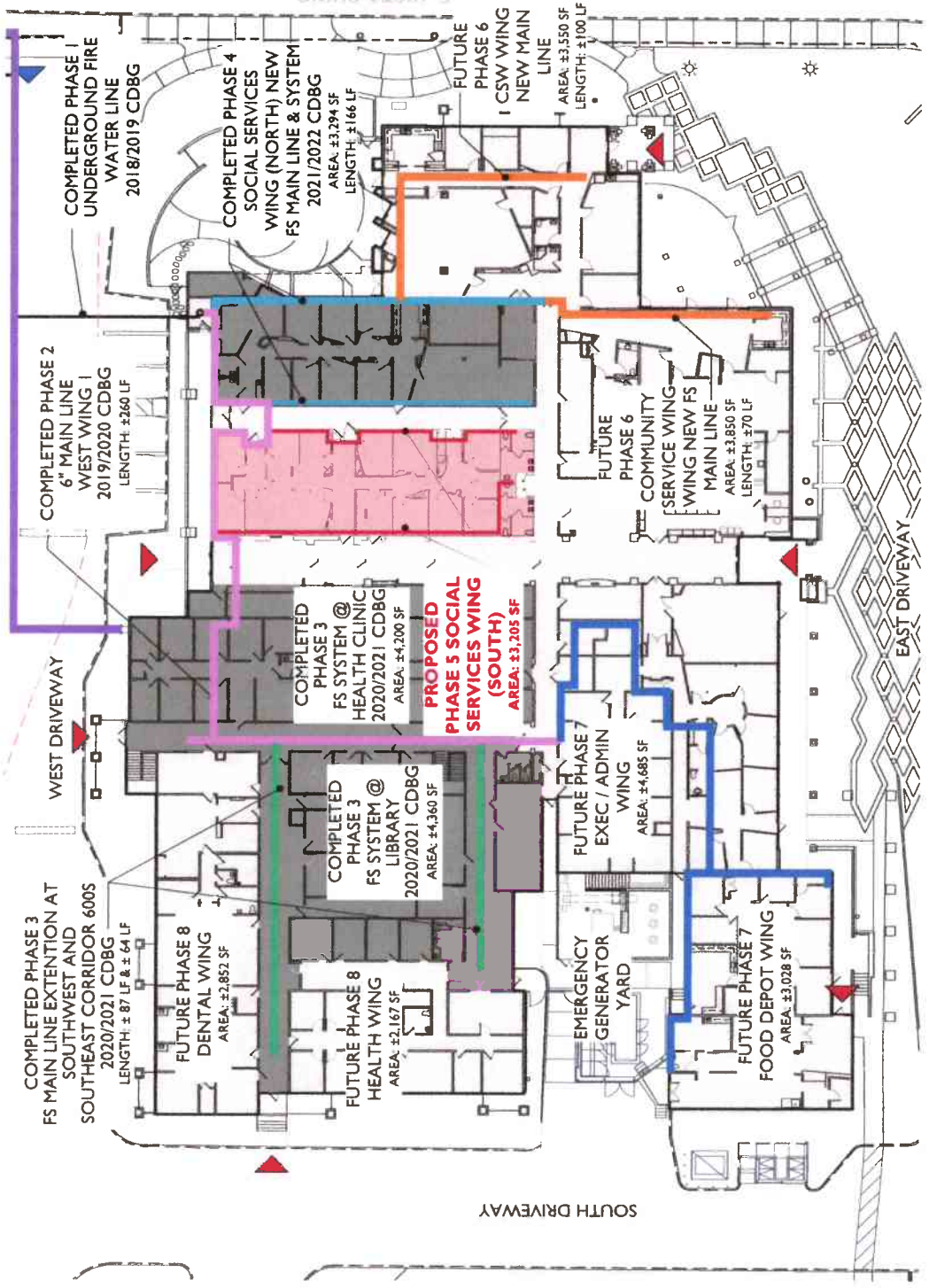

Dear Board of Supervisors,

It is safe to say the past nearly two years were not something any of us could foresee. As a community, we have been through so much and as a country, so much more. From the worry of the virus, the closure of businesses and schools, to the civil unrest and politics that divided a nation, we all carried so much worry. There were many families that were able to stay home and became stronger units, however we saw three very distinct issues facing home life. For many working families, especially those with no help in the area, there was the weight of getting to work and ensuring their children had a safe place to go. Some families had to deal with tight spaces and increasing turmoil in the home, which created an unhealthy living situation, while others simply did not have the means to help their children.

As our Camp Kids project continued to extend with Covid, we received more and more calls from parents and guardians, many in tears with no other options. Families had children in cars while they worked, sitting in lobbies, staying home unattended or some parents were simply at the end of their time off and had the difficult decision to quit their job they relied on to support their children.

It has always been the Boys & Girls Club mission to stand in where we are needed. Afterschool is our business, but we continued to run and support Camp Kids the entire length we were needed. As we supported our youth each day through virtual schooling, fun activities including art, fitness, cultural opportunities and so much more, it was apparent our youth were not just surviving in their new normal, they were thriving. Members happily adopted a culture of kindness with daily opportunities to do good. The positive environment, mixed with fun, educational and creative programs helped our youth become more resilient and helped them to navigate their new world as they returned in the fall.

Anyone in the educational world will tell you, things are tough right now. Children have lost so much over the pandemic: education, family, stability, confidence. The list goes on. Our youth have fallen behind and they simply cannot afford any more time away from structure, guidance and caring adults. A \$20,000 grant will help us continue the Camp Kids program during out of school breaks, insulating our youth from additional setbacks and giving them the opportunity the desperately need and deserve.

We want to thank the Board of Supervisors for your ongoing support and please know each and every dollar truly goes to changing and saving lives.

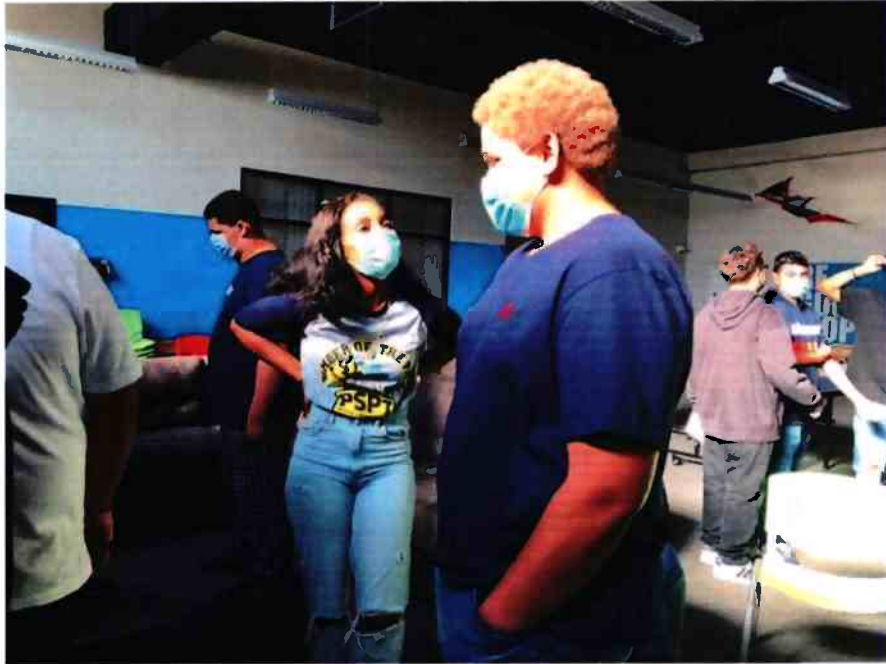
Dear Board of Supervisors,

Being a teen comes with a laundry list of uncomfortable firsts, not to mention the growing anxiety brought on by adulthood quickly approaching. When Covid-19 hit, it brought even more insecurities to the surface, which is why programs like Teens Continue to Lead is more critical now than ever. Luckily, the Boys & Girls Clubs of the San Geronimo Pass continued to engage with members through the lockdown, with some youth receiving in person service and others choosing to connect virtually. Before the pandemic, the Boys & Girls Club staff were key players in our member's lives. The Club helped them make positive decisions, gave daily advice, helped with homework, exposed them to new ideas and culture. For many youth, the Club was their hub for literally everything. As the Club welcomed back all members in person last July, there was an abundance of relief, as youth shared their struggles without the Club and its caring adults who keep them on track, motivated and insulated from struggling alone.

The Club gives endless amounts of opportunity to teens in the Pass Area, from exposure to arts and culture, to snowboarding trips in Big Bear, however it is these opportunities combined with leadership focuses that help create well rounded individuals ready to give back to their community. Staff regularly mentor our teens in communication, healthy relationships, good character and community through individual and group sessions, as well as through our pointed classes with curriculum like Adulthood 101, which helps youth learn to become healthy, balanced adults with a plan for the future, Be a Star that helps youth with emotional intelligence and SMART Girls and Passport to Manhood, which are preventative programs that teach youth self-respect and healthy boundaries.

The Teens Continue to Lead program will ensure these opportunities stay available to our members and youth of the Pass during out of school times. Teens will receive full day courses for free during the summer break, as well as camps, programs and field trips during fall, winter and President's Week Camp.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit a comment on behalf of my non-profit organization, the Corona-Norco United Way regarding item Public Hearing item #19.1 for the March 29, 2022 meeting. We are an applicant for 2022-2023 CDBG funding through Riverside County Housing and Workforce Solutions and sincerely appreciate your consideration in approving the funding.

Our organization supports families exposed to domestic violence, poverty, and homelessness in the communities of Corona, Norco, Eastvale, Home Gardens, El Cerrito, Temescal Valley, and Coronita. At times, we will even accept clients from outside our jurisdiction if the need is urgent. It is our goal to not simply provide a band aid to their situation, but to teach them how to heal and become independent for themselves and their families. This is accomplished through our free, confidential and judgement free programs and is open people of all kinds.

In mid-2020, we saw two things happen 1.) we saw more homeless, reports of domestic violence, and families fall well below the poverty line, and 2.) a loss of CDBG funding from the City of Corona. The merging of these two factors left our organization strained and financially vulnerable. Thankfully, we were able to seek and secure alternate one-time funding sources, however, fiscal sustainability is still of concern—especially when considering the increased need in the Northwest.

We genuinely believe that these types of grants are paramount to supporting the efforts of not only our non-profit, but for the many that are being considered for funding. This is especially significant since the cost of living has increased exponentially, and the average home is no longer able to donate as they once were.

It is anticipated that the Board of Supervisors will approve and adopt the final 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan at its regular meeting of June 7, 2022. The 2022-2023 One-Year Action Plan will then be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval on or about June 8, 2022. Please note that both the meeting date and time are subject to change.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY. The primary objective of the County's CPD programs is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expansion of economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate incomes. The 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan is a component of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan that must be updated annually. It provides detailed information on the resources the County expects to receive and the

specific activities to be undertaken to meet the priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. Upon completion of the Citizen Participation process, the review and considerations of comments, and the approval by the Board of Supervisors, the County will prepare and submit the final 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Five Year Consolidated Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

ANTICIPATED FUNDS. Anticipated allocations to be received through the FY 2022-23 HUD appropriations are: \$8,000,000 for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, including the Metro City Program; \$2,300,000 for the Home Investment Partnership (HOME) program, including the Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO) program; and \$613,000 for the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program. The County expects to utilize at least eighty-five percent (85%) of the CPD funds for activities that will benefit low and moderate-income persons.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ONE YEAR PLAN ACTIVITIES. The County received eighty-five (85) proposals for the 2022-23 CDBG funding totaling \$8,315,081. The proposed activities included public service, public facility improvements, rehabilitation, economic development, code enforcement, and others. There were eight (8) requests for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding totaling \$2,271,518. Proposals for the HOME program include: HOME New Construction (\$1,825,820); HOME Direct Ownership (\$350,000); HOME/CHDO Set-Aside (\$365,165); and HOME Administration (\$243,442). The combined cost for the oversight of the programs (HOME, CDBG, ESG) general management and administrative activities is estimated to be \$1,844,744.

DISPLACEMENT. All planned CPD-funded activities will be designed to minimize the displacement of persons. The provision of relocation benefits to displaced persons and replacement of low-and moderate- income housing units that are demolished or converted to another use as a result of CDBG funded activities will be consistent with the County's Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan and provisions of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970, as amended.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AND COMMENTS. The County of Riverside initiated the 2022-2023 CPD Funding cycle in August 2021, with the publication of the *Notification of Funding Availability* (NOFA) for the CDBG and ESG programs. The County initiated the *Citizen Participation Process* in August 2021, with the notification to residents, Cooperating Cities, non-profit organizations, service providers, public agencies, and other stakeholders, of the 2022-2023 CPD Funding cycle. The Citizen Participation process consisted of online submissions, public meetings in unincorporated communities to receive input from residents and others to identify and assess economic, community, housing, and social development needs in the communities.

PARTICIPATING COMMUNITIES. The 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan of the 2019-2024 Consolidated Plan includes the unincorporated areas of the County, the cities of Lake Elsinore and Murrieta (Metro Cities), and the following Cooperating Cities: Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Coachella, Canyon Lake, Calimesa, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Indian Wells, La Quinta, Norco, San Jacinto, and Wildomar.

IMPLEMENTATION. The goals for the 2022-2023 One Year Action Plan of the Consolidated Plan include: creating affordable housing for those of very low, low, and moderate-income; providing home ownership opportunities for first-time buyers; improving conditions of substandard housing

and rental housing; addressing farm worker housing needs; ensuring the availability of emergency shelters to address the needs of the homeless; creating housing opportunities for the elderly, especially the frail elderly; creating supportive housing or shelter for persons afflicted with HIV/AIDS; creating rental assistance through subsidy programs; providing short-term shelter for the mentally ill homeless; creating a suitable living environment by improving public facilities and services; and providing economic development opportunities for low- and moderate- income families.

Dear Board of Supervisors,

It is safe to say the past nearly two years were not something any of us could foresee. As a community, we have been through so much and as a country, so much more. From the worry of the virus, the closure of businesses and schools, to the civil unrest and politics that divided a nation, we all carried so much worry. There were many families that were able to stay home and became stronger units, however we saw three very distinct issues facing home life. For many working families, especially those with no help in the area, there was the weight of getting to work and ensuring their children had a safe place to go. Some families had to deal with tight spaces and increasing turmoil in the home, which created an unhealthy living situation, while others simply did not have the means to help their children.

As our Camp Kids project continued to extend with Covid, we received more and more calls from parents and guardians, many in tears with no other options. Families had children in cars while they worked, sitting in lobbies, staying home unattended or some parents were simply at the end of their time off and had the difficult decision to quit their job they relied on to support their children.

It has always been the Boys & Girls Club mission to stand in where we are needed. Afterschool is our business, but we continued to run and support Camp Kids the entire length we were needed. As we supported our youth each day through virtual schooling, fun activities including art, fitness, cultural opportunities and so much more, it was apparent our youth were not just surviving in their new normal, they were thriving. Members happily adopted a culture of kindness with daily opportunities to do good. The positive environment, mixed with fun, educational and creative programs helped our youth become more resilient and helped them to navigate their new world as they returned in the fall.

Anyone in the educational world will tell you, things are tough right now. Children have lost so much over the pandemic: education, family, stability, confidence. The list goes on. Our youth have fallen behind and they simply cannot afford any more time away from structure, guidance and caring adults. A \$20,000 grant will help us continue the Camp Kids program during out of school breaks, insulating our youth from additional setbacks and giving them the opportunity the desperately need and deserve.

We want to thank the Board of Supervisors for your ongoing support and please know each and every dollar truly goes to changing and saving lives.

Being a teen comes with a laundry list of uncomfortable firsts, not to mention the growing anxiety brought on by adulthood quickly approaching. When Covid-19 hit, it brought even more insecurities to the surface, which is why programs like Teens Continue to Lead is more critical now than ever. Luckily, the Boys & Girls Clubs of the San Geronimo Pass continued to engage with members through the lockdown, with some youth receiving in person service and others choosing to connect virtually. Before the pandemic, the Boys & Girls Club staff were key players in our member's lives. The Club helped them make positive decisions, gave daily advice, helped with homework, exposed them to new ideas and culture. For many youth, the Club was their hub for literally everything. As the Club welcomed back all members in person last July, there was an abundance of relief, as youth shared their struggles without the Club and its caring adults who keep them on track, motivated and insulated from struggling alone.

The Club gives endless amounts of opportunity to teens in the Pass Area, from exposure to arts and culture, to snowboarding trips in Big Bear, however it is these opportunities combined with leadership focuses that help create well rounded individuals ready to give back to their community. Staff regularly mentor our teens in communication, healthy relationships, good character and community through individual and group sessions, as well as through our pointed classes with curriculum like Adulting 101, which helps youth learn to become healthy, balanced adults with a plan for the future, Be a Star that helps youth with emotional intelligence and SMART Girls and Passport to Manhood, which are preventative programs that teach youth self-respect and healthy boundaries.

The Teens Continue to Lead program will ensure these opportunities stay available to our members and youth of the Pass during out of school times. Teens will receive full day courses for free during the summer break, as well as camps, programs and field trips during fall, winter and President's Week Camp.

Pass Area teens deserve quality programs despite their financial limitations. We have created a culture where youth embrace kindness, express gratitude, except challenge and opportunity and give back to their community. The Club has never been more proud of our teens and we are committed to develop future leaders. Some of the earliest records of the founding of Thermal date back to 1888, making it one of the oldest continuous communities in the Coachella Valley. Originally settled as a railroad camp, Thermal pivoted its industry base in the 1950's to become an agricultural epicenter for Southern California, and in the process has drawn thousands of farm workers to move to the region. Many of the residents that call Thermal home live at or below the poverty level and struggle to access some of the most basic standard of living resources afforded to other residents in the valley. Among these resource needs is access to public spaces, such as parks, a library and youth center. While neighboring communities have historically been prioritized to receive funding for multiple parks and added infrastructure to build affordable housing and attract businesses, Thermal has yet to see its first park built in the past 134 years of its existence as a community.

Your support of the Thermal Community Park Project proposal will not only provide equitable access to resources for a community that has been forgotten over the years, but it can also be a catalyst that brings our community into the 21st century. We ask for your full support of the Desert Recreation District's proposal to build Thermal's first community park. Thank you in advance for your consideration.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit a comment on behalf of my non-profit organization, the Corona-Norco United Way regarding item Public Hearing item #19.1 for the March 29, 2022 meeting. We are an applicant for 2022-2023 CDBG funding through Riverside County Housing and Workforce Solutions and sincerely appreciate your consideration in approving the funding.

Our organization supports families exposed to domestic violence, poverty, and homelessness in the communities of Corona, Norco, Eastvale, Home Gardens, El Cerrito, Temescal Valley, and Coronita. At times, we will even accept clients from outside our jurisdiction if the need is urgent. It is our goal to not simply provide a band aid to their situation, but to teach them how to heal and become independent for themselves and their families. This is accomplished through our free, confidential and judgement free programs and is open people of all kinds.

In mid-2020, we saw two things happen 1.) we saw more homeless, reports of domestic violence, and families fall well below the poverty line, and 2.) a loss of CDBG funding from the City of Corona. The merging of these two factors left our organization strained and financially vulnerable. Thankfully, we were able to seek and secure alternate one-time funding sources, however, fiscal sustainability is still of concern—especially when considering the increased need in the Northwest.

We genuinely believe that these types of grants are paramount to supporting the efforts of not only our non-profit, but for the many that are being considered for funding. This is especially significant since the cost of living has increased exponentially, and the average home is no longer able to donate as they once were.
