BACKGROUND:

Summary

On July 15, 2014, Item 9-4, the Board of Supervisors approved a revision to Ordinance 640, Environmental Health Service Fees. The revised ordinance authorizes Environmental Health to seek adjustment to the fees in Ordinance 640 each year to reflect the change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The Ordinance also requires Environmental Health to file a report to the Board of Supervisors, no later than April 15th of each year, reporting the new fees. As required by Ordinance 640, the Department of Environmental Health (DEH) must certify in the report that "(1) the new required fees produce sufficient revenue to support the proposed costs of providing the services in the upcoming fiscal year for which required fees are being charged and (2) the new required fees will not produce revenue that exceeds the proposed costs of providing the services in the upcoming fiscal year for which the new required fees are charged."

DEH has submitted its FY 22/23 recommended budget to the Executive Office. In accordance with budget policies presented by the Executive Office, DEH is required to absorb increases in ISF rates, salary and benefits (including CalPERS), and increased private commercial lease costs for the department's five area offices.

It should be noted that no new or revised fees outside the scope of the Board-approved CPI adjustment methodology are included in the revision to this ordinance. However, DEH in conjunction with the ACO, is currently reviewing development-related fees because of their most recent audit of the department (Audit #2022-011). Any revised or new fees outside the scope of CPI adjustment will follow Board Policy B-4 Rates Charged for Current Services and the Auditor-Controller's Policy 1101, which explains proper procedures for establishing or updating a rate/fee.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

Some businesses/industries will be moderately impacted by increased fees for food market permits, plan checks, solid waste and hazardous material-related activities, septic tanks, and water well permits. Please reference Attachment B and C for further information on specific categorical increases.

<u>Additional Fiscal Information</u>

DEH references the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics report for the Riverside Area as the relevant CPI. As shown in Attachment A, the CPI increase for 2021 was 8.6%. Due to increased operating costs, DEH is requesting a CPI adjustment of 4.0%. The department has benefited from efficiencies, allowing us to absorb cost increases, not needing to

pursue the full 8.6%. Therefore, and in accordance with Ordinance 640, DEH certifies that the 4.0% adjustment in fees will be sufficient to meet FY 22/23 budget needs of the programs funded by those fees, as submitted to the Executive Office, and that the revenue produced by the adjusted fees are not more than what is necessary to provide services in FY 22/23. The Ordinance 640 Fee Adjustment Comparison Schedule and Fee Schedule are attached as Attachment B and C respectively. DEH expects that the revenue generated by the CPI increase will total approximately \$900,000.



Consumer Price Index, Riverside Area – January 2022 Area prices were up 1.5 percent over the past two months, up 8.6 percent from a year ago

Prices in the Riverside area, as measured by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), advanced 1.5 percent for the two months ending in January 2022, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. (See table A.) Regional Commissioner Chris Rosenlund noted that the January increase was influenced by higher prices for household furnishings and operations and shelter. (Data in this report are not seasonally adjusted. Accordingly, bi-monthly changes may reflect seasonal influences.)

Over the last 12 months, the CPI-U rose 8.6 percent. (See **chart 1** and **table A.**) Food prices rose 5.8 percent. Energy prices jumped 35.3 percent, largely the result of an increase in the price of gasoline. The index for all items less food and energy rose 6.3 percent over the year. (See **table 1**.)



Food

Food prices advanced 1.2 percent for the two months ending in January. (See table 1.) Price changes for food at home sub-categories were mixed, with an overall increase of 1.5 percent. Prices for food away from home advanced 0.9 percent for the same period.

Over the year, food prices rose 5.8 percent. Prices for food at home rose 7.2 percent, influenced by higher prices for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs (11.7 percent) and other food at home (10.5 percent). Since a year ago, prices for food away from home increased 4.2 percent.

Energy

The energy index advanced 2.3 percent for the two months ending in January. The increase was mainly due to higher prices for natural gas service (12.0 percent). Prices for electricity advanced 2.6 percent, and prices for gasoline rose 0.8 percent for the same period.

Energy prices jumped 35.3 percent over the year, largely due to higher prices for gasoline (42.8 percent). Prices paid for natural gas service increased 31.3 percent, and prices for electricity increased 24.4 percent during the past year.

All items less food and energy

The index for all items less food and energy rose 1.4 percent in the latest two-month period. Higher prices for household furnishings and operations (8.3 percent) and shelter (0.8 percent) were partially offset by lower prices for education and communication (-1.3 percent) and new vehicles (-1.1 percent).

Over the year, the index for all items less food and energy rose 6.3 percent. Components contributing to the increase included used cars and trucks (38.6 percent), household furnishings and operations (11.4 percent), and shelter (5.5 percent). Partly offsetting the increases was a price decrease in recreation (-1.0 percent).

The March 2022 Consumer Price Index for the Riverside area is scheduled to be released on April 12, 2022.

Technical Note

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measures of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPIs for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 93 percent of the total U.S. population and (2) a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers approximately 29 percent of

the total U.S. population. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Each month, prices are collected in 75 urban areas across the country from about 6,000 housing units and approximately 22,000 retail establishments—department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date; for most of the CPI-U the reference base is 1982-84 equals 100. An increase of 7 percent from the reference base, for example, is shown as 107.000. Alternatively, that relationship can also be expressed as the price of a base period market basket of goods and services rising from \$100 to \$107. For further details see the CPI home page on the Internet at www.bls.gov/cpi and the CPI section of the BLS Handbook of Methods available on the internet at www.bls.gov/opub/hom/cpi/.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights that represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Because the sample size of a local area is smaller, the local area index is subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. In addition, local indexes are not adjusted for seasonal influences. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar. **NOTE: Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices between cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.**

The Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario, CA metropolitan area includes Riverside and San Bernardino Counties in California.
