BACKGROUND:

Summary

Waste Collection Franchise Agreements covering most unincorporated portions of Riverside County were phased in between 1997 and 1998. Within each of the existing eleven Franchise Agreements is a provision for an annual adjustment of the rates effective each July 1st. Franchise area 10 is generally the unincorporated county area within the upper Coachella Valley as shown in Attachment C.

This includes adjustment of pass-through item costs including any changes to landfill costs including the Alternative Daily Cover surcharge or transfer station fees, and an increase based on Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the balance of the rate. Costs are adjusted by the CPI for the Riverside/San Bernardino/Ontario, California, as published by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics as shown in Attachment D. The proposed rates were adjusted as delineated in the franchise agreement using a CPI of 8.6% for the change from January 2021 to January 2022. DVD is subject to other increases that are dictated by their waste delivery agreements with Burrtec who operates the transfer stations at Edom Hill and Coachella and is reflected in the 8.274% increase in disposal costs, and the 8.588% increase in green waste tip fees, and the 13.333% increase in food waste tip fee noted on their rate sheets. The proposed rates for traditional mixed recycling have been reduced by 23.61%.

The detailed rate calculation worksheets factoring in the CPI increase have been reviewed for accuracy and the updated rate sheets are maintained by the Department of Environmental Health.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

The current typical residential accounts pay \$27.49 a month. The approval of the proposed CPI increase and diversion fee decrease would result in a rate of \$29.52 per month an actual overall increase of \$2.03 per month. Commercial customers rates vary based on the size of bins and frequency of services provided. The rates attached include an increase to

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disposal costs which are addressed in a separate request from the Department of Waste Resources to adjust the landfill tipping fees for solid waste disposal by 8.59%.

The approval of this change will result in no cost to the County; implementation expenses are borne by the franchisee.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-101

A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE ESTABLISHING WASTE HAULER FEES FOR DESERT VALLEY DISPOSAL, INC. IN FRANCHISE AREA 10

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 25827 authorizes the Board of Supervisors to prescribe terms and conditions for the collection of solid waste in the unincorporated areas of Riverside County; and

WHEREAS, California Public Resources Code section 40059 authorizes the County of Riverside to determine all aspects of solid waste handling which are of local concern, including whether the services are to be provided by nonexclusive franchise, and the charges and fees for such service; and

WHEREAS, Riverside County Ordinance 745 has established that a solid waste hauler, duly permitted or franchised by the County of Riverside, shall be entitled to payment for services rendered in the amounts as specified in a Resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors recognizes the benefits of entering into Waste Hauler Franchise Agreements for the efficiency of solid waste management; and

WHEREAS, the County of Riverside has entered into Waste Hauler Franchise Agreements with Desert Valley Disposal, Inc. (DVD) to cover Franchise Area 10; and

WHEREAS, the Waste Collection Franchise Agreement covering Franchise Area 10 contains a provision for an annual adjustment of the rates customers are charged based on the consumer price index ("CPI");

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors acknowledges the need for the CPI increase of the hauler fees to address the costs of providing these services; and

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside, State of California, in regular session assembled on May 10, 2022 finds that the waste hauler fees in Franchise Area 10 shall receive an increase based on the CPI of 8.6% to the service component of their fees and approve the rates for fiscal year 2022-2023.





Consumer Price Index, Riverside Area – January 2022 Area prices were up 1.5 percent over the past two months, up 8.6 percent from a year ago

Prices in the Riverside area, as measured by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), advanced 1.5 percent for the two months ending in January 2022, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. (See table A.) Regional Commissioner Chris Rosenlund noted that the January increase was influenced by higher prices for household furnishings and operations and shelter. (Data in this report are not seasonally adjusted. Accordingly, bi-monthly changes may reflect seasonal influences.)

Over the last 12 months, the CPI-U rose 8.6 percent. (See chart 1 and table A.) Food prices rose 5.8 percent. Energy prices jumped 35.3 percent, largely the result of an increase in the price of gasoline. The index for all items less food and energy rose 6.3 percent over the year. (See table 1.)



Food

Food prices advanced 1.2 percent for the two months ending in January. (See table 1.) Price changes for food at home sub-categories were mixed, with an overall increase of 1.5 percent. Prices for food away from home advanced 0.9 percent for the same period.

Over the year, food prices rose 5.8 percent. Prices for food at home rose 7.2 percent, influenced by higher prices for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs (11.7 percent) and other food at home (10.5 percent). Since a year ago, prices for food away from home increased 4.2 percent.

Energy

The energy index advanced 2.3 percent for the two months ending in January. The increase was mainly due to higher prices for natural gas service (12.0 percent). Prices for electricity advanced 2.6 percent, and prices for gasoline rose 0.8 percent for the same period.

Energy prices jumped 35.3 percent over the year, largely due to higher prices for gasoline (42.8 percent). Prices paid for natural gas service increased 31.3 percent, and prices for electricity increased 24.4 percent during the past year.

All items less food and energy

The index for all items less food and energy rose 1.4 percent in the latest two-month period. Higher prices for household furnishings and operations (8.3 percent) and shelter (0.8 percent) were partially offset by lower prices for education and communication (-1.3 percent) and new vehicles (-1.1 percent).

Over the year, the index for all items less food and energy rose 6.3 percent. Components contributing to the increase included used cars and trucks (38.6 percent), household furnishings and operations (11.4 percent), and shelter (5.5 percent). Partly offsetting the increases was a price decrease in recreation (-1.0 percent).

The March 2022 Consumer Price Index for the Riverside area is scheduled to be released on April 12, 2022.

Technical Note

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measures of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPIs for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 93 percent of the total U.S. population and (2) a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers approximately 29 percent of

the total U.S. population. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Each month, prices are collected in 75 urban areas across the country from about 6,000 housing units and approximately 22,000 retail establishments—department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date; for most of the CPI-U the reference base is 1982-84 equals 100. An increase of 7 percent from the reference base, for example, is shown as 107.000. Alternatively, that relationship can also be expressed as the price of a base period market basket of goods and services rising from \$100 to \$107. For further details see the CPI home page on the Internet at www.bls.gov/opub/hom/cpi/.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights that represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Because the sample size of a local area is smaller, the local area index is subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. In addition, local indexes are not adjusted for seasonal influences. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar. **NOTE: Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices between cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.**

The Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario, CA metropolitan area includes Riverside and San Bernardino Counties in California.
