

BACKGROUND:

Summary near the

Hurricane Kay has impacted jurisdictions and critical infrastructure within Riverside County since it commenced on September 9th. Due to these storms, there was significant rainfall within multiple jurisdictions in the County that caused major damage to transportation, water and critical infrastructure, as well as caused an imminent threat to life, property, and the environment.

The City of Banning and the Banning Heights Mutual Water Company both sustained damage to their critical water infrastructure which includes pipelines, water storage tank, flood protection, and roadways that combined could cost upwards of \$36.4 million to repair. The Riverside County Transportation Department experienced severe damage to Box Canyon Road, which is heavily used by the agricultural industry in the Coachella Valley to transport their products to the rest of the nation.

At the beginning of the incident, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside was not in session, necessitating the Director of Emergency Services to proclaim that a "Local Emergency" exists in Riverside County. It is requested that the Board of Supervisors adopt Resolution No. 2022-190 to ratify the Proclamation of Local Emergency as declared by the Director of Emergency Services.

A copy of the proclamation is to be forwarded to the Governor of California with the request that he proclaim the existence of a State of Emergency throughout the impacted areas of Riverside County, and that the Riverside County Director of Emergency Services and Board of Supervisors are formally requesting California Disaster Assistance Act (CDAA) funding.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

Thousands of residents have been impacted by Hurricane Kay and the remnants of the tropical storm, which has impacted numerous jurisdictions and critical infrastructure within Riverside County. The ongoing tropical storm and aftermath will necessitate resources from both State and local entities. The Proclamation of Local Emergency begins the process to receive resources for assistance to first responders, residents and others impacted by Hurricane Kay.

PROCLAMATION OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY
BY THE DIRECTOR OF EMERGENCY SERVICES

WHEREAS, Ordinance 533.7 of the County of Riverside empowers the Director of Emergency Services to proclaim the existence of a "Local Emergency" when the Board of Supervisors is not in session; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Emergency Services finds:

That at the time of this proclamation the Board of Supervisors is not in session; and,

WHEREAS, conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property have arisen within the County of Riverside caused by the remnants from Hurricane Kay, which has impacted numerous jurisdictions and critical infrastructure within Riverside County; and,

WHEREAS, due to these storms, there was significant rainfall within multiple jurisdictions in the County that caused major damage to transportation, water and critical infrastructure, there exists an imminent threat to life, property, and the environment; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Banning and the Banning Heights Mutual Water Company both sustained damage to their critical water infrastructure which includes pipelines, water storage tank, flood protection, and roadways and combined could cost upwards of \$36.4 million to repair; and,

WHEREAS, the Riverside County Transportation Department experienced severe damage to Box Canyon Road, which is heavily used by the agricultural industry in the Coachella Valley to transport their products to the rest of the nation; and,

WHEREAS, that the potential of the aforementioned conditions of extreme peril warrant and necessitate the proclamation of a "Local Emergency."


NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY PROCLAIMED that a "Local Emergency" exists throughout the County of Riverside; and,

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that during the existence of said "Local Emergency", the powers, functions, and duties of the Director of Emergency Services and the Emergency Management Organization of this County shall be those prescribed by State law and the charter, ordinances, resolutions and approved plans of the County of Riverside in order to mitigate the effects of said "Local Emergency"; and,

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that said "Local Emergency" shall be deemed to continue to exist for the next seven (7) days, and thereafter by ratification of the Board of Supervisors, until its termination is proclaimed by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside; and,

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that a copy of this proclamation be forwarded to the Governor of California with the request that he proclaim the existence of a State of Emergency throughout the impacted area of Riverside County, and that the Riverside County Director of Emergency Services and Board of Supervisors are formally requesting California Disaster Assistance Act (CDAA) funding.

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5 A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF
6 THE COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE RATIFYING EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY

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8 WHEREAS, County Ordinance No. 533 empowers the Director of Emergency Services of
9 the County of Riverside to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of a Local Emergency when the
10 County is affected or likely to be affected by a public calamity and the County Board of Supervisors is not
11 in session. Subject to the ratification by the County Board of Supervisors within seven (7) days; and

12 WHEREAS, conditions of extreme peril to safety of persons and property have arisen
13 within this County, caused by remnants from Hurricane Kay commencing on or about the 9th day of
14 September, 2022.

15 WHEREAS, the Director of Emergency Services of the County of Riverside did proclaim
16 the existence of a Local Emergency within said County on the 16th day of September; now, therefore,

17 IT IS HEREBY PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that the proclamation of a Local
18 Emergency by the Director of Emergency Services of the County of Riverside is hereby ratified, and that
19 said Local Emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist until its termination is proclaimed by the
20 County Board of Supervisors of the County of Riverside.
