BACKGROUND:

Summary

California Elections Code §§ 10002, 10402, and 10403 allow jurisdictions to request that the Board of Supervisors approve the Registrar of Voters to conduct and consolidate elections. The attached Exhibit A lists the jurisdictions that have submitted a resolution as stipulated per the aforementioned California Election Codes to the Registrar to conduct its respective election.

Election Update

The ROV leadership team has met and will continue to meet critical deadlines per Election Code and Law to successfully conduct the March 5, 2024, Consolidated Primary Election. As part of the election cycle operations, the Registrar worked with Human Resources to secure 1,000 Temporary Assignment Program staff (TAP) to undertake and execute a variety of election specific tasks. ROV recruited approximately 1,500 Election Officers to support Vote Center operations prior to the Election and on the day of the Election.

Additionally, the Registrar has implemented new processes including a pilot program to enhance the display of election night results on the ROV website and tours for public observers and the media, to increase transparency, engagement, and voter trust.

Vote By Mail Ballots

January 19: Military and Overseas Ballots were mailed.

Voter Information Guide (English/Spanish)

- January 19-21: The California Secretary of State mailed guides.
- January 25 and January 26: The County Voter Information Guide, English version, was mailed starting January 25th. The Spanish version was mailed starting January 26th.

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Public Logic and Accuracy Testing

 January 31: ROV conducted and tested all components of the voting system to ensure accuracy. The public and media were invited to observe.

Vote by Mail Ballots

• February 5: Ballots mailed to over 1.3 million registered voters.

Early Voting (Several Dates)

 Registrar of Voters office was open to the public for in-person voting beginning February 5th. ROV will be open on the following weekends from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. for in-person voting February 24-25 and March 2-3. Alternatively, voters may drop off their voted ballots in one of two secure drop boxes outside of the ROV office available 24 hours a day/7days a week.

Ballot Drop-Off Sites

 February 5- March 5: A total of 106 ballot drop-off sites throughout the County will be open. To view a full list of sites and hours visit https://voteinfo.net/march-5-2024-election

Observer Tour

• February 15: ROV conducted an Observer Tour which was open to the public.

Last Day to Register to Vote

 February 20: The last day to register to vote or change a political party. Same day voter registration is available through Election Day at Vote Center throughout the County.

Media Tour

 February 20: ROV conducted a Media Tour which was open to members of the media.

Vote Centers

February 24- March 5: 11-day Vote Centers

A total of 17 Vote Centers will operate throughout the County.

March 2-March 5: 4-day Vote Centers

A total of 131 Vote Center locations will operate throughout the County.

It seems there is a disconnect for sharing information in a clear and timely manner. May we all work more diligently and thoughtfully — the public is putting in an effort to let you elected folks and bureaucrats know their concerns and it seems the public is not meeting your expectations and vice versa.
