BACKGROUND:

Summary

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH), Office of AIDS, HIV Prevention Branch has awarded grant funding to Local Health Jurisdictions (LHJs) to provide services consistent with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) funding PS18-1802 entitled Integrated HIV Surveillance and Prevention Funding for Health Departments. Riverside University Health System – Public Health (RUHS-PH) was awarded an allocation for eighteen (18) months to be used for the implementation of public health activities to address HIV Prevention within the LHJ. Amendment No. 2 awards RUHS-PH with \$436,288 in additional funds and extends Agreement No. 22-10790 to July 31, 2024.

Staff and supplies will be funded to provide the following HIV Prevention services: Targeted HIV testing to high-risk populations, linking newly diagnosed HIV positive individuals to services, HIV Partner Services, behavioral interventions, and social marketing. These services will be at various locations throughout the County, including public health clinics, targeted outreach sites, and community-based organizations.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

This grant will allow RUHS-PH to continue to increase access to and the use of high-quality screening and clinical services for potential HIV clients and allow an increase in partner evaluation, treatment, and counseling services.

SUPPLEMENTAL:

Additional Fiscal Information

RUHS-PH has previously received funds from CDPH via Grant Agreement 22-10790 for HIV prevention services to implement the Enhanced Integration Project for the period of performance of January 31, 2023, through May 31, 2024, in the amount of \$1,047,090. The distribution, including the previously awarded funding and the increased funding is listed in the table below. RUHS-PH anticipates all funding to be spent in FY23/24; however, the department is requesting approval to rollover any unspent funds to the next fiscal year.

Contract History and Price Reasonableness

RUHS-PH has received funding from the CDPH for HIV services since 1984. This agreement will continue to provide funding to Riverside County and its residents in support of HIV Prevention Services.

On June 27, 2023, on Agenda item 3.74, the Board of Supervisors approved Grant Agreement No. 22.10790 with CDPH to implement the Enhanced Integration Project for the period of performance of January 31, 2023, through December 31, 2023. Amendment No. 1 to the Grant Agreement was executed to extend the period of performance through May 31, 2024.

Amendment No. 2 aims to extend the period of performance through July 31, 2024, and increase the compensation amount by \$436,288 for a new aggregate amount of \$1,483,378.

Dear Lea,

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH), Center for Infectious Diseases, Office of AIDS (OA), HIV Prevention Branch, intends to grant the Riverside County Public Health Department an additional amount of \$436,287.50 and extend the grant period through July 31, 2024. The additional funding is intended to provide services consistent with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) funding PS18-1802 entitled Integrated HIV Surveillance and Prevention Funding for Health Departments.

The funds must be used for evidence based public health activities to address HIV Prevention within your local health jurisdiction (LHJ). The scope of work for these funds is limited to the activities from the LHJ's approved work plan and based on OA HIV prevention strategies in OA's PS18-1802 guidance: *Enhanced Integration: Guide to HIV Prevention and Surveillance*:

- Strategy 1 – Strengthen disease investigation infrastructure
- Strategy 2 – Expand and provide navigation services
- Strategy 3 – Expand Access to syringe services for people who inject drugs

For the implementation of these strategies, recipients should begin to embed and/or enhance the following priorities and approaches within their funded strategies and activities:

- **Status Neutral Approach:** A status-neutral approach to care means that regardless of HIV status, people have access and support to stay on highly effective public health interventions like PrEP and HIV treatment.
- **Syndemic Approach:** Sexually transmitted infections, viral hepatitis, injection drug use, and HIV are interacting epidemics, or syndemics, that can be addressed using similar strategies.
- **Health Equity:** Health is central to human happiness and well-being and is affected by where people live, learn, work, and play. Health equity is when everyone has the opportunity to be as healthy as possible.
- **Innovative HIV Testing Strategies, including HIV Self-Testing:** The mass distribution of HIV self-test kits is one strategy to increase awareness of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections.

Grant awards from CDPH to LHJs are based on the state fiscal year (July 1 - June 30), for ~~FY 22/23~~ FY 23/24 and FY 24/25 the allocation listed reflects ~~six months~~ **only five months of available funding, with appropriate rounding to eliminate cents as much as possible. All award amounts are dependent upon final funding amounts from the CDC.



**CDC PS18-1802 funding is awarded by CDC on a calendar year basis (January 1 - December 31).
