

BACKGROUND:

Summary

Governmental Code 29802 requires a warrant to become void (stale dated) if it has not been presented for payment to the County Treasurer within 6 months after the issuance date. Warrants will be stale dated after 6 months from the original payment date, and stale dated money will be transferred to the Auditor-Controller's stale dated fund 69008 and 69011.

Per section 337 of the California Code of Civil Procedure, vendor warrants are eligible to be reissued within 4 years from the date the warrant becomes stale. Per section 338 of the California Code of Civil Procedure, property tax warrants are eligible to be reissued within 3 years from the date the warrant becomes stale. Board Resolution 82-278 (amended Board Agenda 3.5 8/6/1996) requires Board of Supervisors approval for amounts \$10,000 and greater.

The total amount in attachment "A" of \$254,263 represents stale dated warrants over \$10,000.

County-Wide Events and Collaborations

2023-2024 Council Year

The Youth Commission engages in strategic partnerships with numerous organizations to bolster community support across the county. By unifying the efforts of all five Youth Advisory Councils, the Commission significantly enhances its capacity to effect positive change within the community and with partner organizations. Commissioners from each of the five Councils serve on the Youth Commission Board, facilitating representation and collective decision-making on behalf of all Councils. The following are the event hosted by the Youth Commission for collaborative engagement during the 2023-2024 council term:

Annual Youth Retreat

The 2023-2024 Youth Commission inaugurated the school year in August with its Annual Youth Retreat, held at the Carriage Room in Crestmore Manor, Jurupa Valley. This event was designed to equip, energize, and train council members for the forthcoming academic year. Celebrating its 25th iteration, the Youth Retreat aimed to prepare both new and returning council members for their roles.

The day featured a series of informative presentations, including "YAC 101" delivered by YAC coordinators and sessions on the Brown Act and Parliamentary Procedures led by County Counsel's Sarah Moore. Additionally, students benefited from presentations by District 3 Supervisor Washington, District 5 Supervisor Gutierrez, and District 2 Supervisor Spiegel.

In addition to the educational components, the retreat incorporated several team-building activities such as icebreakers, "What's in my pocket?", "Getting to Know You" bingo, and an outdoor water balloon toss. These activities facilitated interaction among council members from various districts, fostering camaraderie and collaboration.

Overall, the event was a resounding success, blending learning and enjoyment to effectively prepare YAC students for their responsibilities in the upcoming year.

Annual Youth in Government Day

Youth in Government Day provides council members with a valuable opportunity to engage in job shadowing alongside county employees aligned with their career interests and aspirations. This initiative requires meticulous planning and thoughtful pairing to ensure that participants can explore the diverse career opportunities available within Riverside County. The Human Resources Learning and Organizational Development Department of Riverside County supports the Youth Commission by administering a career assessment survey to participants, analyzing their results to identify their interests, strengths, and potential career matches. Subsequently, the HR department pairs students with registered county mentors who align with their identified interests.

During the event, students gain firsthand insight into the daily responsibilities of county employees, allowing them to explore and consider career paths that may be new to them. The 25th Annual Youth in Government Day was a resounding success, pairing over 45 county employees

with nearly 100 YAC members. The Youth Commission extends its gratitude to the 18 county departments and mentors who generously shared insights into their daily activities, educational journeys, and provided invaluable mentorship, fostering meaningful connections for participating YAC members.

Annual Youth Summit

The Youth Commission annually organizes a Youth Summit for high school students across Riverside County. This event provides a platform for youth to engage in discussions on important topics impacting their lives and communities. Topics are selected through a voting process by the Youth Commission Board, based on suggestions from each Youth Advisory Council.

Expert speakers are invited to conduct workshops where participants can delve into these topics, exchange ideas, and gain diverse perspectives. This year's summit covered themes such as "Unlocking Your Potential," "Elevating Mental Health," and "Generational Change." Hosted by the Third District, the event featured prominent speakers including Board of Supervisors Chair Chuck Washington, Second District Supervisor Karen Spiegel, California Senator Kelly Seyarto, and Youth Commission Coordinator Joseph Mathews.

In addition to the workshops, the summit featured exhibitor booths from youth-related resources, community partners, county programs, and local colleges. Participants engaged in activities such as a photo booth and games. The event successfully accommodated 21 vendors, including notable organizations like the Coalition to End Human Trafficking, California State University, San Bernardino, and the Riverside County Sheriff's Recruiting Unit.

Key speakers included Kimberly Smith Austin on "Unlocking Your Potential" and presentations by the Central Counseling Center on "Elevating Mental Health" and "Generational Change." The Youth Summit remains a crucial platform for fostering youth empowerment and community engagement in Riverside County.

First District Youth Advisory Council
Annual Report 2023-2024

The First District Youth Advisory Council (YAC) is a representative student body comprising members who attend high schools within the First District of Riverside County, represented by Supervisor Kevin Jeffries. The First District includes various cities such as Perris and Riverside, as well as the unincorporated communities of Good Hope, Highgrove, Mead Valley, and Meadowbrook. Additionally, the district encompasses the March Joint Powers Authority (JPA) and the March Air Reserve Base.

Our Youth Advisory Council consists of students from over 21 high schools across the First District, working together to give back to our community through outreach and service projects. This year, the council has made significant strides in addressing digital addiction, substance abuse, and support for English as a Second Language (ESL) learners. These efforts have included a successful book drive, engaging school activities, and a comprehensive digital campaign.

Furthermore, our council has attended over 15 events, contributing more than 100 volunteer hours collectively. We have expanded our outreach beyond Riverside City, participating in city events and community support activities in Mead Valley and Lake Perris.

First District Youth Advisory Council Goals 2023-2024

In order to achieve our 2023-2024 goals, the Council formed three committees. Each committee worked to coordinate and volunteer at events which were related to their goals.

- **Digital Addiction**

Our council established a committee dedicated to addressing digital addiction among high school-aged youth. We recognized the importance of promoting healthy digital habits and raising awareness about the impacts of excessive screen time. Through the formation of this committee, our aim was to offer support and resources to individuals who may have been grappling with digital addiction. Our overarching goal was to foster balanced technology use and diminish digital dependency within our community.

Recently, our council collaborated with RUHS to conduct an educational initiative focused on digital addiction and its effects. As part of this effort, we organized a competition to incentivize reduced phone usage, offering prizes to those who demonstrated the lowest screen time. Additionally, we shared pertinent resources and statistics on our YAC D1 Instagram page to further inform and engage our peers.

- **Substance Abuse**

Our youth equity committee was dedicated to combating substance abuse among high school students. We believed that every young person deserved to feel safe,

respected, and valued. We were committed to creating a culture of inclusivity and support where everyone could thrive.

To promote substance abuse prevention, we organized activities at three high schools—Martin Luther King, STEM Academy, La Sierra, and Ramona High School. These activities included interactive games and educational booths that provided information on narcotics and the dangers of drug abuse. Additionally, we conducted a digital campaign covering facts on drug addiction and overdose in collaboration with RUHS.

- **Assistance for English as a Second Language Learners**

Our council established a committee to support English as a Second Language (ESL) learners. Recognizing the challenges faced by ESL students, we focused on providing resources and support to help them succeed academically.

We organized a successful book drive, donating over 50 bilingual and children's books to our local library specifically to support ESL learners. Our outreach efforts extended to visits at schools where we engaged students in activities designed to promote inclusivity and enhance language learning experiences.

In addition to these initiatives, we offered tutoring services, conducted language workshops, and facilitated cultural exchange programs. These efforts were aimed at fostering a more supportive and inclusive learning environment for ESL students within our community.

First District Service Events and Projects Completed

Listed below are the key projects the 2023-2024 First District Youth Advisory Council accomplished throughout the year:

Summer BBQ Gala – August 26, 2023

The Summer BBQ Gala was a wrap up of the Summer with the Riverside Medical Clinic (RMC) Charitable Foundation in Riverside. The event's goal was to exceed or reach last year's result of raising close to \$100,000 at their Gala. Our The First district YAC members assisted in live auctions and set up prior to event. The money raised allowed the RMC to continue to build on their commitment to improve health and the quality of life in Inland Southern California. Our volunteer's generosity provided the means to continue RMC's mission with bullying prevention, kindness programs, Traveling Triplets program, scholarship opportunities, and Riverside Project Heart. Overall, the event was a great opportunity to help in the community and be a part of a cause that further develops innovate progression.

TSAPP Training – September 6, 2023

The decision of Youth Advisory Council (YAC) members to undergo Teen Suicide Awareness and Prevention Training is deeply rooted in their commitment to fostering a safe and supportive environment for high school students. This training equips them with the knowledge and skills necessary to identify warning signs, offer support, and advocate for mental health awareness within their communities. Furthermore, it aligns with the YAC's mission to combat substance abuse among high school students, as outlined in their Substance Abuse commission.

Doors Open Riverside – September 9, 2023

District 1 YAC members had the incredible opportunity to lead tours of the Grier Pavilion in City Hall as part of the City of Riverside's Doors Open event. This event, organized in partnership with the Riverside Downtown Partnership and the Mission Inn Museum and Foundation, showcased the city's rich architectural heritage. Through our efforts, we aimed to raise awareness of Riverside's unique architectural treasures and foster a deeper appreciation for our community's shared history.

Latin Heritage Celebration – September 16, 2023

The District 1 YAC members aided in setup, ran education booths, and took on mascot duties during National Hispanic Heritage Month. Riverside's Latino community, deeply rooted in the city's history, is celebrated during this time, recognizing their vibrant culture and invaluable contributions to our community.

OAPP Training – September 27, 2023

The Youth Advisory Council participated in Overdose Prevention and Harm Reduction Training. This training equipped members with essential knowledge and skills to prevent overdoses and reduce harm associated with substance misuse. Through interactive sessions and practical exercises, attendees gained valuable insights into recognizing signs of overdose, administering naloxone, and providing support to those in need. This training aligned with the council's commitment to addressing substance abuse issues and promoting the well-being of their community.

Riverside Citrus Classic – October 7, 2023

This event marked the inauguration of the Civil Rights Institute, where diverse individuals gathered to celebrate civil rights advocacy. Throughout the ceremony, impassioned speeches from leaders, activists, and advocates resonated, highlighting the struggles and triumphs of the civil rights movement. Attendees engaged with interactive exhibits and soul-stirring musical performances, deepening their understanding of civil rights history and contemporary issues. Volunteers played a pivotal role in ensuring the event's success, from warmly greeting guests to running essential stations like rest stops for bikers, embodying the community's commitment to inclusivity and accessibility. Overall, the ceremony served as a poignant reminder of the ongoing

journey towards a more just and equitable society, driven by education, awareness, and collective action.

RISE Training – October 11, 2023

The Youth Advisory Council participated in Resilience Initiative through Support and Empowerment (RISE) Training. Annual Report 2023-2024

The Second District Youth Advisory Council (YAC) is a representative student body composed of members who attend high school within Riverside County Second District. The Second District includes the unincorporated communities of Coronita, El Cerrito, Home Gardens, Temescal Valley, Highgrove, as well as the cities of Corona, Eastvale, Jurupa Valley, Norco, Lake Elsinore, and Canyon Lake. As a team we are dedicated and motivated to give back to our community by participating in community service projects within our district.

Second District Youth Advisory Council Goals 2023-2024

In order to achieve our 2023-2024 goals, the Council formed three committees. Each committee worked to coordinate and volunteer at events related to their goals.

- **Resources awareness to Low Income Families**

The low-income committee felt compelled to bring more service to our less advantaged families and planned to make resource baskets in collaboration with a local non-profit. The committee planned for our council to donate items such as nonperishable food to create baskets filled with items that these families would need.

- **Transitioning into Adulthood**

The Third District Youth Advisory Council (YAC) is a representative student body of members who attend high school within the Third District of Riverside County. Communities within the Third District include the unincorporated communities of Aguanga, Anza Valley, De Luz, East Hemet, French Valley, Green Acres, Homeland, La Cresta, Lake Riverside, Romoland, Sage, Tenaja and Winchester, parts of Valle Vista and the cities of Temecula, Murrieta, Menifee and Wildomar.

Third District Youth Advisory Council Committees 2023-2024

In order to achieve our 2023-2024 goals, the Council formed three committees. Each committee worked to coordinate and volunteer at events which were related to their goals.

- **Mental Health Committee**

The Mental Health Committee in collaboration with Riverside University Health System, agreed to focus on the mental health of students. The goal was to inform and educate youth about different ways to manage mental health, stress and anxiety. In order to meet this goal, the committee created a series of slides to post on social media. These posts gave tips to high school students on different ways to manage stress and handle anxiety from home. Our Youth committee also distributed stress balls at our outreach event at the French Valley Community Fair to offer a different method to alleviate stress.

- **Environmental Committee**

The Environmental Committee agreed to focus on the environmental health of our community. The goal was to inform and educate youth about different ways they can contribute to improve our environment. In order to meet this goal, the committee launched a social media campaign. Our committee filmed a video as media that included our YAC members explaining small changes students can make daily to help protect our planet and lead the way to a brighter, greener future.

- **Youth Outreach Committee**

The Outreach Committee was inspired to help with homelessness in our community. The goal of this committee was to educate and provide resources and services to unhoused individuals in our district. Our Youth Outreach committee was able to partner with a local non-profit Project TOUCH to achieve these goals. The committee was able to volunteer at the shelter located in Murrieta and help maintain the facilities for the residents. The Committee was also able to raise funds for Project TOUCH at the Veterans Park Opening Ceremony.

Third District Service Events and Projects Completed

Listed below are the key projects the 2023-2024 Third District Youth Advisory Council accomplished throughout the year:

College & Vocational Fair – September 23, 2023

The Third District Youth Advisory Council hosted a table at Temecula's annual College and Vocational fair. This event brings together over 200 colleges, trade schools, U.S forces, and local organizations to promote their programs. Third District YAC was able to promote the Youth Commission to over 500 attendees. We received over 20+ names of students interested in hearing more about the 3rd district council. This event was located at the Temecula Promenade mall and was a successful event.

Winchester Days Community Fair – October 7, 2023

3rd District YAC volunteered at Winchester Days Community Fair. At this event YAC members participated by directing traffic and parking control for attendees of the event. Additionally, students were able to assist with 3rd District Supervisor Chuck Washington's booth by distributing pamphlets and brochures. This event was a great turn out and gave the students the opportunity to interact with the public.

Animal Friends of the Valley Spooktacular – October 28, 2023

Just before Halloween, the 3rd District YAC had the opportunity to volunteer for a local non-profit, Animal Friends of the Valley. They were hosting their annual Spooktacular event at the Temecula promenade mall. During this event YAC members led the dog costume parade that walked through the mall to promote humane care of animals through education and a humane, proactive animal services program and prevent the suffering of animals. YAC members collected gift baskets for raffles, and distributed prize plaques for the animal costume contest. The students mentioned this as being one of their favorite events of the year due to the high animal presence.

VSSN Winter Wonderland – December 7, 2023

Third District Youth Advisory council volunteered for VSSN's Winter Wonderland, hosted at the Temecula Promenade mall. This event was established to give veteran and active-duty families an opportunity to come together as a community. YAC members assisted by distributing Cinnabon's out to those in attendance. After that task was completed, YAC members were able to assist other volunteers, which included: supervising the slide area for children and obstacle courses for all in attendance. Finally, they ended the night by assisting with event closure and take-down.

Youth Court – December 14, 2023

In collaboration with southwest county youth court, YAC students had the opportunity to participate in trial activities and be a juror for over 10 cases. Youth Court programs are structured to allow youth to actively learn the roles and responsibilities of the various parts of the judicial system. It provides positive alternative sanctions that allows young people to take responsibility, be held accountable for their actions, and make restitution.

City of Murrieta Valentines Ball – February 9, 2024

The city of Murrieta hosted their alternative recreation Valentines Ball and YAC was able to volunteer their time. During the event YAC students cheered on guests entering the ballroom to build up excitement for the evening and assisted with all the needs for event closure. Additionally, they participated at the photobooth by handing out props and guiding guests to the booth.

Project T.O.U.C.H. Clean up – February 23, 2024

Third District YAC described this event as being one of the most rewarding of the year. Project T.O.U.C.H is a local non-profit shelter for those that are currently experiencing homelessness and in need of assistance with resources. YAC students had the opportunity to volunteer at the shelter located in Murrieta and helped to maintain the facilities for the residents.

French Valley Community Fair – March 2, 2024

At the French Valley Community Fair D3 YAC hosted a booth to inform youth about different ways to manage mental health through stress management, social media posts, and education. The Fourth District Youth Advisory Council (YAC) is a representative student body of members who attend high schools within the Fourth District of Riverside County represented by Supervisor V. Manuel Perez. The Fourth District comprises the beautiful cities of Blythe, Cathedral City, Coachella, Desert Hot Springs, Indian Wells, Indio, La Quinta, Palm Desert, Palm Springs, Rancho Mirage, and surrounding unincorporated communities. Our Youth Advisory Council is composed of students from high schools across the Fourth District. As a team we strive to give back to our community by participating in outreach and community service projects within our district.

Fourth District Youth Advisory Council Committees 2023-2024

In order to achieve our 2023-2024 goals, the council formed three committees. Each committee worked to coordinate and volunteer at events which were related to their goals.

- **Educational/Professional Development**

The Educational/Professional Development Committee was created to share information that isn't easily accessible to high school students. Therefore, this committee worked on creating resources that could be available to students out of school as well. Together, they worked on creating a brochure that will be handed out to upcoming students that are applying to universities. This brochure contains useful information such as steps on how to apply for aid and tips on the application process. Students also posted scholarships and educational information on social media for their peers to be view.

- **Youth Awareness**

The Youth Awareness Committee was a general committee that focused on the well-being of young students. Students felt that their peers go through stressful and difficult situations that affect their mental health, which is why they wanted to make a change by spreading awareness. Students collaborated with RUHS on creating a presentation that could be presented to students. The presentation included helpful tactics on how to cope in stressful situations and what young students can do when they are feeling overwhelmed. Students handed out slime and calming coloring books for students to practice different methods that tend to help thousands of people deal with stress.

- **Childhood/Community Poverty Reduction**

The Childhood/Community Poverty Reduction committee had the goal of helping those in our community that do not have the same resources that we do. Their goal was for them to feel safe and comfortable, which is why students decided to host a clothing drive. Students collaborated with Martha's Village and place donations boxes at their

local schools and chosen centers. After the bins were full, students took them back to Martha's Village for them hand the clothing to those who needed them at their center.

Fourth District Service Events and Projects Completed

Listed below are the key projects the 2023-2024 Fourth District Youth Advisory Council (YAC) accomplished throughout the year.

FIND Food Bank – September 9, 2023

We volunteered at FIND Food Bank on Saturday September 9th. There were 9 students in total to help pack boxes for the senior citizens in the Coachella Valley. This program is designed to train youth how to address the issues of suicide with their peers. The program focus is to bring awareness and offer resources to youth in need. This includes coordinating two (2) awareness campaigns throughout the year helping to reduce the stigma surrounding seeking mental health services.

RUHS OAPP Training – February 23, 2024

Youth Advisory Council participated in Overdose Prevention and Harm Reduction Training. This training equipped members with essential knowledge and skills to prevent overdoses and reduce harm associated with substance misuse. Through interactive sessions and practical exercises, attendees gained valuable insights into recognizing signs of overdose, administering naloxone, and providing support to those in need. This training aligned with the council's commitment to addressing substance abuse issues and promoting the well-being of their community.

RUHS RISE Training – March 6, 2024

The Youth Advisory Council participated in Resilience Initiative through Support and Empowerment (RISE) Training. This program focused on building resilience and empowering youth to overcome challenges they may face in their lives. Through interactive workshops and discussions, attendees learned practical strategies for coping with stress, developing healthy

relationships, and building self-confidence. The RISE Training underscored the council's commitment to supporting the well-being and personal growth of its members, equipping them with valuable skills for navigating life's obstacles with resilience and strength.

A Day in Her Shoes Conference – March 8, 2024

The YACs high school Jr's and Sr's were invited to participate in the A Day in Her Shoes Conference in Murrieta. The focus of the event was to bring talented women of the greater Inland Empire area together in a day-long immersive experience that exposes them to employment and career opportunities they may have never considered. Science, engineering, hospitality, medical, culinary, agriculture, viniculture, public service, first responders, elected officials – all these careers provide different shoes and paths to success. Over the course of the day, the students interacted with women from many different backgrounds and professions, and had the opportunity meet many of the presenters.

Tack Sale at the Moreno Valley Equestrian Center – March 9, 2024

The Youth Advisory Council assisted the TrailSeekers of Moreno Valley with their annual Used Tack Sale event. This event focused on vendors selling used Tack, which is a term for horse riding equipment, and featured equestrian demonstrations. The students were tasked with directing traffic and assisting with the horses, once the event fully started.

The Her Drive Packing Event – March 15, 2024

Over the course of the school year, the YAC students held small hygiene collection events at their schools to donate those items to the local UCR Women's Shelter. Once they collected the supplies, the students met up and packed up over 200 small bags to be donated to the shelter.

Springtastic with City of Moreno Valley – March 23, 2024

Our students participated in Moreno Valley's Annual Springtastic event at the Sunnymead Park. The students assisted with the free Easter egg hunt, Youth Fun Zone, and as safety observers in support of the event staff.

Carol's Kitchen Food Outreach – March 21, 2024, April 1, 2024

Our YAC students stayed busy during their Spring Break time, by collaborating with Carol's Kitchen once again, to serve hot lunch to the local community members in need.

Spring Fest with City of Moreno Valley – April 6, 2024

YAC students participated in the Moreno Valley Unified School District's Spring Fest '24. The event consisted of an Easter Egg hunt along with Community Resource Booths. During this event, the students manned the District 5 outreach booth.

Moreno Valley Horse Show – April 13, 2024

The YAC partnered with the Moreno Valley Equestrian Center for their Itty-Bitty Horse Show. The students participated in the event by handing out award ribbons and directing traffic, along with various other tasks throughout the day.

Super Mario Movie Night at Valley View Elementary – April 19, 2024

The YAC students supported the 5th District Supervisor’s Office at the Valley View Movie Night. The students operated the outreach and informational booth, along with passing out popcorn vouchers and directing people to the correct locations.

We Mean Green Committee Event at Towngate Park – May 18, 2024

The students partnered with the City of Moreno Valley, to host their very own We Mean Green Park clean up. The students organized and executed the event under the supervision of city staff.

Total number of community service projects and hours:

Council Members participated in 43 projects, webinars, workshops, and training as well as dedicated 855 hours of community service to the Fifth District of Riverside County. YAC members felt that they excelled in accomplishing their expectations and goals for the year.

The Fifth District Youth Advisory Council would like to thank the Board of Supervisors for their ongoing support throughout the year.

Cumulatively, they volunteered for over 4,162 hours of community service during the past year. If those students were paid California’s minimum wage of \$16/hour, they donated the equivalent of over \$66,000 in free services to their communities. The website “Independent Sector” places a value of over \$33.49 per hour for volunteer work and using this figure the YAC donated nearly \$140,000 this year. While it is not possible to place a dollar value on the services they provide, it is important to understand that they are accomplishing real goals, learning incredibly valuable life lessons, and making Riverside County a better place for all of us.
