BACKGROUND:

Summary

Riverside University Health System – Medical Center provides child abuse victims with trauma-informed, evidence-based Child Advocacy Center services through the Riverside County Child Assessment Team (RCCAT) Center. Two components of these services are mental health therapy and family advocacy. The funds provided by the Child Advocacy Center Program (KC) Grant Subaward help provide the financial resources necessary to provide this care by funding two staff positions, one Clinical Therapist from RUHS Behavioral Health and one Social Service Practitioner III from RUHS Medical Center, both of whom are assigned to work at the RCCAT Center.

Resolution No. 2024-201 would delegate authority to the RUHS-MC Chief Executive Officer, or their designee, to execute the Child Advocacy Center Program (KC) Grant Subaward agreement, execute and submit applications to Cal OES for Child Advocacy Center Program (KC) grant subawards, and execute all award documents to include Amendments that may result from the aforementioned grant application, effective April 1, 2023, through March 31, 2026.

Resolution 2024-201 authorizes the County Manager or designee to sign related Certification of Assurance of Compliance (form VOCA Cal OES 2-104f) on behalf of the county for the duration of Resolution 2024-201. This form affirms that the County will comply with the requirements and restrictions outlined in the Cal OES Subrecipient Handbook.

The authorities granted within this resolution are necessary to meet the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services requirements, as they pertain to state reviews specific to Grant Subawards. These requirements are outlined within the Subrecipient Handbook. The 2023 Subrecipient Handbook introduced new changes and requirements, that are applicable for Grant Subawards with a start date of January 1, 2023, and later. Due to these changes, it is necessary to create a resolution that specifically meets the new requirements.

The Riverside County Child Assessment Team (RCCAT) Child Advocacy Center (CAC) is a dept. of the Riverside University Health System (RUHS) Medical Center, a division of Riverside County. We had been recipients of KC17-21 grant funding under the Subrecipient of Riverside County. This cycle, we are applying under Subrecipient of RUHS Foundation, a 501(c)(3) organization that raises and manages funds for special projects at RUHS Medical Center, including the RCCAT Center. This will allow for a condensed structure for accounting, purchasing, contracting, and human resources with a tighter locus of control for reporting. The RCCAT Center will continue to use KC program funds primarily to fund 2 fulltime positions: 1 Clinical Therapist II (CT) and 1 Social Service Practitioner III (SSP III). The CT II is responsible for the provision of direct therapeutic assessments and interventions and/or linkage to partner-agency mental health services to children and their families who receive services at our center. The SSP III provides direct family advocacy and case management services to caregivers. This includes crisis intervention, education/information, and referrals to services and resources. We have 2 of each position on our staff and having grant funding to help fund 1 of each allows us to maintain our service delivery despite local funding cuts or staff shortages. In 2021, we relocated and expanded our

service provision space along with our volume of children and caregivers served; these funded positions help meet the increasing needs.

Both classifications are in a salary range with automatic annual increase of 4% until maximum is reached. Pay is issued bi-weekly, with 2 months of the year having 3 pay periods, thereby a slight fluctuation in total amount for two quarters' reporting. The projected cost for each position on the budget pages is the average cost across the grant year. These positions are not funded by any other source. They are solely employed to provide service to RCCAT Center consumers and participate in activities that are functions of a CAC, including multidisciplinary teamwork and professional development. The CT II is currently at \$39.83/hour with additional 52.9% of employer paid benefits. The SSP III is currently at \$34.79/hour with additional 44.36% of employer paid benefits.

All proposed operating costs are used in direct service provision and only by the RCCAT Center. The only square footage claimed is the office space for each of the 2 funded personnel, with no claim for the rest of our space. The Equipment cost is to obtain a new all-in-one copy machine that will replace 2 old and failing machines, designed to withstand our volume of printed material for handouts and client charts.

A. Problem Statement Riverside County is in Southern California covering over 7300 sq. miles. With a population of nearly 2.5 million people, it is the 4th most populous and largest area county in California and the 10th most populous in the U.S. 50% of the population is LatinX, 32% Caucasian, 7% Asian/Pac Islander, 6% Black, .5% Native American, and 3.5% multi-racial. The population of children in Riverside County is over .5 million with an even distribution among age categories. Approximately 35% of the population is non-English speaking and approximately 19.5% of children are living in poverty and under 4% have disabilities. (Data USA: Riverside County, CA; US Census Bureau). The Riverside County Child Assessment Team (RCCAT) Child Advocacy Center (CAC) serves all children in the western half of the County (most populous) for any type of child abuse and the entire county for drug endangerment and physical abuse of children under the age of 2. The RCCAT Center is county-hospital based and provides all CAC services on-site: forensic medical evaluation, forensic interviewing, clinical therapeutic services, and family and victim advocacy. The victim advocates are the only people employed by partner non-profit agencies, with all others being employed by County Departments. The RCCAT Center's total cost is approximately \$2 million per year with most of the funding being local. To ensure cost is not a barrier to partners seeking our services, we serve children referred by Law Enforcement

Subrecipient: RUHS Foundation Riverside County and/or Child Protection, both local government partners, at no cost. The KC grant funds 2 RCCAT Center staff who were hired because of KC grant support: Clinical Therapist (CT) and Social Services Practitioner (SSP). Both positions provide direct service and other tasks directly in support of their client service, such as documentation; supervision; MDT partnership, consultation, case review; resource and referral management; and professional development. Operational/equipment portions of the grant are in support of direct service provision, such as CAC-specific software/systems, funded staff's office sq. footage, training, and a new copier/printer better suited to produce our volume of forms, medical charts, pamphlets, and resource handouts. Current challenges/gaps to service provision include not enough staffing to provide more community outreach and education opportunities. Coupled with pandemic precautions, we have had to focus on services that occur within our Center. Additionally, the volume of child abuse reporting in Riverside county has increased by over 25% in the past year, thereby increasing our Center volume. Also, with high staff turnover in our MDT partner agencies, there is a need for continuous partner consultation, education, and relationship building. The 2 grant funded staff are essential in helping with these endeavors, along with

meeting the increasingly complex needs of victims and their families.

B. Plan When fully staffed, the RCCAT Center is comprised of County-employed staff from the Riverside University Health System Medical Center, Child Protection, and Behavioral Health Departments: 3 forensic pediatricians, 2 medical assistants and 1 LVN, 2 office support staff, 2 SSP Ills who provide family advocacy, 2 CTs who provide therapeutic assessment and intervention, 3 Forensic Interviewers, 1 Healthcare Social Services Supervisor, and 1 Manager. Our MOU-established County child abuse MDT includes our Center and RUHS Medical Center, Law Enforcement Agencies (7 Police Departments and Sheriff's Department), office of the District Attorney, Behavioral Health, Child Protection, County Counsel, and 3 community victim advocacy agencies. The RCCAT Center provides training to each MDT partner-agency including: overview of CAC model, MDT investigation and response, recognizing and reporting child abuse, understanding abuse disclosure patterns, and secondary trauma.

Our accredited Center provides exams conducted by board-certified forensic pediatricians; interviews by CFIT-certified interviewers utilizing evidence-based Lyon's Ten-Step Interviewing Protocol; therapeutic assessments and interventions by trained therapists, including 1 Licensed Clinical Social Worker utilizing evidence-based tools and practices including the Trauma Symptom

Checklists for Children and Young Children and Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy. All Center staff and MDT partners complete mandatory ongoing education annually.

The RCCAT Center values equal access of services for all children in Riverside County regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation, spirituality, socioeconomic status, or abuse type. The RCCAT Center and members of the MDT work to operate in a culturally competent and humble manner regarding the children, families, and communities we serve. Cultural humility requires continuous needs assessment, consideration of feedback, and updates to policies, procedures, and resources that responds to such. The RCCAT Center and its MDT partners should have the opportunity to understand and improve their individual attitudes, beliefs, and behaviors towards diversity. The RCCAT Center is comprised of race and age-diverse staff and we have more than 50% Spanish bilingual staff. It is the goal of RCCAT to increase opportunities for staff and MDT partners to attend cultural competence and humility training over the next 3 years. Ideally all staff will have no less than one training opportunity per year regarding cultural diversity, especially regarding race, socioeconomics, and sexual orientation.

The RCCAT Center is in a non-descript leased office building at the edge of the county hospital campus. We occupy approximately 6,000 sq. feet of dedicated suite space that was designed and remodeled specifically for our use through generous private-donations that includes calming colors, whimsical art, and child appropriate furnishing and activities. Our Center has a private entrance vestibule, 2 family waiting/meeting rooms, 1 large child/teen lobby, MDT partner workstations, 3 exam rooms, 2 interview and observation rooms, 2 therapy offices, and private office space for the family advocates, doctors, and administrators. We also have a conference room for MDT meetings and trainings that can also be used for support groups, parenting education, or other community meetings. All CAC services are performed on-site. Additionally, we have 2 satellite interviewing locations where advocacy and/or therapeutic services are present during those appointments. This subaward will fund the CT and SSP that meet with children and/or caregivers for assessment, education, resource and referral, and intervention. Their other tasks performed are in direct support of their client service, such as documentation; supervision; MDT partnership, consultation, case review; resource and referral management; and professional development.

For additional wraparound services, we refer to our victim advocacy partners, Riverside Area Rape Crisis Center (RARCC), REACH of Hemet Valley, and SAFE Family Justice Center. All agencies provide victim and family support services, such as victim of crime assistance, protective order applications, and safety planning. In addition to victim advocacy, RARCC and REACH also provide crisis and ongoing counseling, support groups, and education. Families are also referred to other resources as needed, such as food assistance, shelter, domestic violence support, immigration assistance, etc.

The written protocols for case reviews are contained in the RCCAT MOU and Riverside County Protocol on Interagency Investigation of Child Abuse, and guidelines for each are set forth in RCCAT Center policy. We conduct 2 types of case reviews. Weekly center case reviews are held with internal team members and advocacy partners for every child seen during the previous week to ensure services, referrals, and follow-ups have been provided. Case-specific reviews are held at least monthly with all MDT partner case agents to facilitate open sharing of information to guide the best-informed decisions for next steps by each MDT agency and coordinate follow-up items and services. Case-specific reviews can be requested by any member of the MDT and are coordinated and facilitated by the RCCAT Center manager.

The RCCAT Center currently utilizes the NCAtrak database for case tracking, including demographics, with access for Center and advocacy partner staff to obtain case information and input service documentation. Other partner agencies can request case specific or aggregate data as needed for their service provision, quality assurance/improvement, funding, or research purposes. Aggregate data is also shared in Steering Committee, Executive Leadership Board, and other special reports. A Center support staff's primary assignment is to manage the database by ensuring information completion prior to closure, running reports, user access, field customization, etc.

We have tracked client and partner feedback through the NCA Outcomes Measurement System for the past 3 years. Each child over the age of 10 is asked to complete a youth survey, a caregiver for each child is asked to complete the caregiver survey, and MDT partners are asked to complete the partner survey. We review the results on a monthly basis with the Team.

C. Capabilities The RCCAT Center and the MDT approach to child abuse in Riverside County became official in 1991 with an MOU among the MDT partner agencies. NCA Accreditation as a Child Advocacy Center was obtained in 2010, with successful reaccreditation ever since. The RCCAT Center is highly capable of providing quality services to child abuse survivors and their families with most staff having been with the Center for over 10 years, some for 4 years and only 3 having started within the past 6 months. Our recent space expansion has allowed us to increase the volume of services provided and the comfort in which they are offered. Open communication and partnership build and maintain strong MDT partner and County Board of Supervisors' support, which fosters a strong investment and interest in the Center's success. Our direct practices: forensic interviewing, forensic medical evaluation, therapeutic assessment and treatment, and family advocacy are all based in evidence-based, trauma-informed, child/family-centered practices. Our Center provides exams conducted by board-certified forensic pediatricians and each exam is peer reviewed; interviews by CFIT-certified interviewers utilizing evidence-based Lyon's Ten Step Interviewing Protocol and the interviewers participate in no-less-than quarterly peer review; therapeutic assessments and interventions by trained therapists, including 1 Licensed





Clinical Social Worker utilizing evidence-based tools and practices including the Trauma Symptom checklists for Children and Young Children and Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy with regular supervision and peer support. All Center direct service providers complete annual continuing education beyond accreditation requirements, with all staff receiving educational opportunities, particularly regarding secondary traumatic stress and self-care multiple times per year.

When a child is referred to us, we consult with the referring agency to determine if an exam and/or interview are needed. The grant funded positions are involved with every case. Prior to the appointment, the SSP/family advocate asks for an in-person victim advocate accompaniment if there are indicators of high caregiver trauma. At the time of the appointment, the SSP/family advocate meets with the caregiver and the CT meets with verbal children and parents as needed. After the appointment, both positions make referrals as needed and at case review, updates and further follow-up are discussed.
