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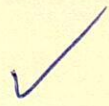

Hello Riverside County Supervisors and 5th District Supervisor Yxstian Gutierrez:

I'm Marshall Locke, a citizen of the 5th District in the community of Nuevo since 1965.

Supervisor Gutierrez, I am pleased to report that your current chief of staff has complied with your directive to provide an updated development project tracking list for proposed or actual developments in the Nuevo area—it's an encouraging first step and you have my thanks.

As a gesture of good faith, I want to let you know you were persuasive and I submitted my application to serve on the Nuview ad-hoc committee for roads.

Progress has been made and I am here to acknowledge and celebrate it with you in a spirit of good faith and partnership.

But authentic partnerships don't come from one-off events—they require relationship, work, and ongoing signs and acts of good faith.

Which is why I am required to notify you that I recently requested assistance from your current chief of staff to procure documentation from a developer meeting that he orchestrated and approved behind the scenes—apart from the awareness of or input from the Nuevo MAC and community—but inexplicably, he failed to take advantage of this opportunity to exhibit good faith.

He unpersuasively protested that the developer meeting was not a county meeting. While this is technically true, it reeks of bad faith and doesn't pass the smell test, because public records have confirmed his direct knowledge, involvement, and approval of the developer meeting.

Here again, your current chief of staff's behind-the-scenes pattern of bad faith conduct, as revealed in public records, and his most recent failure to comprehend and take advantage of an opportunity presented to him to demonstrate good faith destroys trust and is a barrier to cultivating an authentic and effective partnership.

Cultivating an authentic partnership will require effectively addressing the continued pattern of bad faith conduct on the part of your current chief of staff and the mixed messaging concerning development in the Nuevo area between you and him.

Supervisor Gutierrez, you are near the half-way mark of your term of office. Neither you nor the citizens of Nuevo and the 5th District dare waste our limited resources of time, talent, and treasure. Achieving authentic partnerships for the benefit of all concerned is not an option—it's an absolute necessity. As such, it is time to seize the day and take the necessary action to make them happen without further delay.

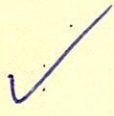

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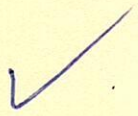

This message is being sent to all counties, SOS staff and VoteCal partners and contains an updated Unresolved EMS list Maintenance (UREM) report attached with statistics per VoteCal as of 4/29/24 6:06 AM. Additionally, and for convenience, I have attached the EMS messages guidance document.

Per this UREM report, VoteCal shows 75,745 total unresolved EMS List maintenance messages older than 5 days across the state. This is 7,101 more unresolved messages statewide than was reported last week. With over 55k new messages sent to counties during this last week, counties have continued to work an extremely high volume of list maintenance messages.

This message is being sent to all counties, SOS staff and VoteCal partners and contains an updated Unresolved EMS list Maintenance (UREM) report attached with statistics per VoteCal as of 4/15/24 4:41 AM. Additionally, and for convenience, I have attached the EMS messages guidance document.

Per this UREM report, VoteCal shows 87,007 total unresolved EMS List maintenance messages older than 5 days across the state. This is 14,424 less unresolved messages statewide than was reported last week. With over 79k new messages sent to counties during this last week, counties have continued to work an extremely high volume of list maintenance messages.

County Request:

1. Continue to resolve your unresolved EMS Messages in the attached report from within your EMS as required by CCR § 19061.
 - a. We encourage counties to reach out directly to their EMS vendors for support as needed, particularly when any cleanup/alignment needs are identified.
 - b. The SOS will, upon request, provide a detailed listing of unresolved EMS messages for your county, including the specific message IDs, voter IDs, and other data that may be helpful to a county to locate and/or resolve these messages.

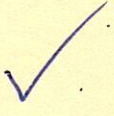

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Proposal for Investment in a Signature Verification Tool

Introduction

As voting processes continue to modernize, maintaining the integrity and security of our elections is paramount. One key aspect of this is the verification of voter signatures, which helps ensure that the person who cast the ballot is the same as the one registered to vote. To improve this process, we propose that the city invest in either building or acquiring a **Signature Verification Tool** powered by machine learning or similar advanced technologies.

Purpose of the Tool

The Signature Verification Tool will automate the identification and flagging of potentially fraudulent or anomalous signatures, making the verification process quicker and more accurate. With a focus on increasing efficiency, the tool will:

- **Enhance Detection:** Identify discrepancies in voter signatures, such as re-used signatures or artificially generated ones.
- **Save Resources:** Free up time for trained election workers by shifting focus from anomaly identification to investigation and validation.
- **Refer Proven Fraud:** Once signatures are identified as fraudulent, the Registrar of Voters (ROV) can escalate the case to law enforcement for further investigation.

Key Features

1. Anomaly Detection

- Automatically flag signatures that deviate from the voter's registration signature for review.
- Assist workers by focusing on questionable cases that warrant manual inspection.

2. Machine Learning Integration

- Utilize machine learning models to analyze voter registration signatures against the signatures submitted with ballots.
- Leverage advanced pattern recognition to detect fraudulent signatures, including cases where the same person signs with different names or reused signatures appear across multiple ballots.

3. Automation of Routine Checks

- Automate the detection of artificially generated signatures and other suspicious activities.

Primary Use Cases

- **Compare Signatures:** The tool will compare voter registration signatures with those on ballots to confirm they match, ensuring that the person who registered is the one who voted.
- **Identify Reused Signatures:** The system will flag reused signatures that appear across multiple ballots, indicating potential fraud.
- **Detect Alias Signatures:** The tool will detect instances where the same individual signs using different names.
- **Spot Fake Signatures:** Machine learning algorithms will assist in identifying artificially generated signatures that attempt to mimic genuine voter handwriting.

Options for Development

1. **Third-Party Solutions:** Evaluate commercially available signature verification tools that could integrate with our existing infrastructure.
2. **In-House Development:** Explore the possibility of building a custom tool using cloud and Platform-as-a-Service (PaaS) technologies, which may provide more flexibility and scalability.

Expected Benefits

- **Increased Accuracy:** Machine learning will minimize human error in signature comparison and flagging of anomalies.
- **Improved Efficiency:** Workers will spend less time identifying suspicious signatures, allowing them to focus on validation and investigations.
- **Cost-Effectiveness:** Automating routine checks reduces the cost and time associated with manual signature verification.

Beyond Signature Verification

Additional benefits and use cases that a machine learning model, paired with voter signature datasets, could offer beyond the immediate scope of signature validation are vast. Additional use cases include, but are not limited to:

1. Voter Behavior Analytics (Anonymized Data):

- **Turnout Prediction:** By analyzing patterns in voter signatures and ballots over time, the system could help predict voter turnout trends, helping election officials better prepare in terms of resources and staffing.
- **Voter Fraud Pattern Analysis:** The system could identify larger trends in fraud attempts (e.g., repeat offenders, common times, or locations of fraudulent activity), allowing for proactive steps in future elections.

2. Adaptive Learning for Signature Changes:

- **Learning Voter Signature Evolution:** Over time, people's handwriting and signatures naturally evolve. The machine learning model could continuously adapt to these changes, reducing false positives by recognizing slight variations in legitimate signatures, such as those due to age, injury, or other factors.

3. Predictive Signature Health:

- **Assistance for Voters with Disabilities:** The system could flag cases where a voter's signature may have significantly changed over time (e.g., due to illness or age-related issues). Election officials could then reach out proactively to provide assistance, ensuring accessibility and accurate voter registration records.

4. Fraud Prevention Training:

- **Training Data for New Workers:** The system could generate datasets of both valid and fraudulent signatures, which could be used for training election workers and auditors in spotting potential fraud and handling edge cases in verification.

5. Election Audit Efficiency:

- **Post-Election Audits:** The model could be leveraged to help automate parts of post-election audits, validating signatures en masse while flagging only anomalies for manual review. This would reduce the time and labor needed for audits and ensure greater confidence in election integrity.

6. Historical Record Analysis:

- **Longitudinal Fraud Detection:** By maintaining historical data, the system could look for patterns of fraud or irregularities across multiple election cycles, helping to build a case against organized fraud efforts or to identify specific regions where fraud is more prevalent.

7. Data Integrity Alerts:

- **Signature Data Breach Detection:** The system could be used to monitor the integrity of voter signature datasets themselves, raising alerts if it detects any unauthorized changes or tampering with the signatures within the database.

8. Cross-Regional Voter Duplication:

- **Duplicate Voter Detection Across Jurisdictions:** If integrated with a broader network of voter databases, the system could potentially detect cases where a person registers or votes in more than one jurisdiction, which could be crucial in preventing cross-regional voting fraud.

9. Signature-Based Voter Identity Matching:

- **Preventing Duplicate Registrations:** The tool could also be used to prevent voters from registering multiple times under slightly different names (e.g., using middle names or initials), by cross-referencing signature patterns across voter registration databases.

10. Enhanced Public Trust & Transparency:

- **Voter Confidence:** The use of machine learning for signature verification can serve as a public-facing feature, offering voters greater confidence that fraudulent votes will be caught, thus boosting trust in the electoral process.

Implementing machine learning in voter signature verification opens many potential avenues to enhance both the security and efficiency of the election process, while also providing deeper insights for future elections.

Next Steps

We propose that the city:

- Allocate resources for a feasibility study to evaluate third-party tools versus custom development.
- Engage with technology vendors or consultants who specialize in election security and machine learning to explore options.
- Identify necessary budget allocations for the procurement or development of the tool.

Conclusion

Investing in a Signature Verification Tool will greatly improve the accuracy and efficiency of our voter signature validation process. By leveraging modern technologies like machine learning, we can better safeguard our elections and ensure that each vote cast is legitimate.

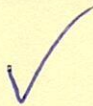

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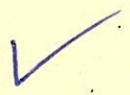

My name is Paloma Serna. I am from the North County Equity & Justice Coalition and the Saving Lives In Custody California. My daughter Elisa Serna died in the Los Colinas jail in San Diego on Nov 11, 2019, by the hands of the sheriff deputies and medical staff.

In 2022, Riverside County had 18 in-custody deaths. In 2023, the Riverside Sheriff Chad Bianco had 13 deaths from what the sheriff states.

This year, there has been 5 in-custody death. Scott Lowder died on Sept 5th and an unknown individual died on the 7th. Riverside County needs to hold the Riverside County Sheriff and his employees, deputies and medical staff accountable. Impacted families deserve to know the truth and received justice for their loved ones.
