# BACKGROUND:

## Summary

The Bloomberg American Health Initiative - Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health is awarding Riverside University Health System - Public Health (RUHS-PH) with funding for the development of a Riverside Overdose Prevention Advisory (RODA) Advisory Board comprised of individuals with lived experiences of substance use. The advisory board will aim to improve RUHS-PH's understanding, attitudes, and behaviors towards persons who use drugs, overdose, substance use disorder, treatment including medication for opioid use disorder, harm reduction, and recovery. Members of the board will be encouraged to join the Riverside University Health System - Behavioral Health's Cultural Competency Subcommittees, where they can guide the feasibility, acceptability, and sustainability of overdose prevention efforts taking place in Riverside County.

## Impact on Residents and Businesses

The RODA Advisory Board will provide positive program opportunities and assist with developing rapport with the community in Riverside County.

## **Additional Fiscal Information**

This grant does not require any county matching funds. The total aggregate amount awarded to RUHS-PH is \$25,000. There is no impact to County General Funds. All costs are 100% local grant-funded and will be reimbursed by the Bloomberg American Health Initiative at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health.

## **Contract History and Price Reasonableness**

This is a new contract with the Bloomberg American Health Initiative at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. With this agreement, the development of an Advisory Panel for individuals with lived experiences will ensure that policies and services meet the specific needs of people who use drugs (PWUD). The expectation is that the RODA Advisory Board input will lead to increased engagement in beneficial services and improve and expand harm reduction outreach and education. RUHS-PH is unable to compensate community members with lived experience to serve on an advisory board. Implementing these services through County work alone would require many staff hours and be immensely expensive.

Riverside County Public Health has used and shared HPI, County social determinants of health data, and enhanced overdose surveillance data to create and implement overdose prevention activities in collaboration with community partners to address the root causes of substance use disorder and overdoses in Riverside County. An Overdose Prevention Advisory Board will help address the inequities that many people who use drugs (PWUD) face by guiding other agencies and programs on how to best address stigma, overdose, drug treatment, and other methods of harm reduction.

- 9. City/State/Territory/Tribal Locale impacted by work (if work is on a National scale, please note)
  - Riverside County in Southern California. With a population of 2.5 million people, Riverside County is the fourth largest county in California and the 10th most populous in the nation. Riverside County includes urban, suburban, resort, and rural communities, across 7,207 square miles, and is one of the nation's fastest- growing and diverse metro areas. In 2021, Riverside County experienced 789 unintentional overdose deaths—the highest rate in Southern California and a higher rate than the State of California (32.1 vs. 26.7 per 100,000). Except for COVID-19, the number of unintentional overdose deaths had the most significant increase of all causes between 2019 and 2021. Unintentional overdose was the 7th leading cause of death for all age groups and was among the top five leading causes of death for those less than 60 years old and the top cause of death for younger adults.
- 10. Partnering organizations, other than the Collaborating Organization (if applicable):
  - Riverside University Health System-Behavioral Health (Riverside County Behavioral Health) As the lead department responsible for Riverside County mental health services and substance abuse/treatment, Riverside County Behavioral Health will integrate substance use prevention objectives addressing stigma and harm reduction for at least two (2) Behavioral Health Cultural Competency Subcommittees.
  - Inland Empire Harm Reduction (IEHR) As a grassroots, peer led organization, IEHR seeks to empower individuals who use drugs by providing education and access to recovery options. As of October 2020, IEHR became the first authorized SSP in the IE. IEHR support services include safer drug use supplies (syringes, smoking supplies, ancillary equipment), fentanyl test strips, condoms, local drug treatment referrals, food, clothing and linkage to other County services
  - University of Riverside (UCR) School of Medicine Center for Health Disparities Research, aims to build interdisciplinary research in health disparities, and this includes engaging investigators that are new to the field that can include biomedical researchers with no clinical research backgrounds, and social science researchers with experience in to qualitative or survey-based research.

  - Development of a Riverside Overdose Prevention Advisory Committee comprised of individuals with lived experience of substance use.
- 12. The goal or goals of the proposed activities

- The advisory board will aim to improve the Riverside Department of Health's understanding, attitudes, and behaviors towards persons who use drugs, overdose, substance use disorder, treatment including medication for opioid use disorder, harm reduction, and recovery. Members of the board will also be encouraged to join the County of Riverside, Department of Behavioral Health's Cultural Competency Subcommittees, where they can provide guidance on the feasibility, acceptability, and sustainability of overdose prevention efforts taking place in Riverside County.
- 13. A description of proposed activities
  - With the assistance of Inland Empire Harm Reduction (IEHR), a community-based harm
    reduction non-profit organization, The Public Health Department will recruit people with lived
    experience to develop and implement an advisory board. This advisory board will assist with
    developing rapport with the community to create access to drug paraphernalia for drug testing
    in partnership with UCR laboratory. The advisory board will also assist with the development of
    videos with stigma and harm reduction messages to inform and educate the community.
    Another activity will be for the advisory board members is to attend Cultural Comptency
    subcommittees where they can share their experiences and expertise in substance use and
    provide recommendations services and resources to the community in a meaningful way.
- 14. The plan for involvement of the JHU faculty adviser
  - The JHU faculty adviser, Carl Laktin, will bring his expertise in peer education approaches to harm reduction as well as social diffusion and network approaches to overdose prevention and treatment. He will review all grant related reporting and budgets, as well as get regular updates and provide his feedback.
- 15. Value of the project
  - Development of an Advisory Panel for individuals with lived experience will ensure that policies and services meet the specific needs of PWUD. The expectation is that the advisory board input will lead to increased engagement in beneficial services and improve and expand harm reduction outreach and education. The Riverside Health Department is unable to compensate community members with lived experience to serve on an advisory board. It is critical to have their perspective but unreasonable to ask for participation without minimal compensation. Participation in the Cultural Competency meetings will provide opportunities for attendees from diverse sectors of the community to engage in meaningful discussions that promote equitable outcomes and low barrier access to services.
