#### BACKGROUND:

#### Summary

A public hearing is required to obtain citizens and stakeholders views on community development needs and proposed uses of Community Planning and Development (CPD) funding in the One Year Action Plan which includes Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) and HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME). This is the initial public hearing for the 2025-2026 HUD CPD funding cycle. No formal action by the Board of Supervisors is necessary.

The Riverside County department of Housing and Workforce Solutions (HWS) published a Notice of Funding Availability for CDBG and ESG program funding for 2025-2026 on August 21, 2024. HWS received eighty-two (82) proposals totaling \$9,311,029 in CDBG program funds. The proposed activities included public service, public facility improvements, rehabilitation, economic development, code enforcement, and others. The department also received eight (8) requests for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding totaling \$1,352,579. Proposals for the HOME program include: HOME New Construction (\$1,553,638.28); HOME Direct Ownership (\$350,000); HOME/CHDO Set-Aside (\$310,728); and HOME Administration (\$207,151). The combined cost for the oversight of the programs (HOME, CDBG, ESG), general management, and administrative activities is estimated to be \$1,800,000.

Pursuant to the County's Citizen Participation Plan and 24 CFR Section 91.105, HWS published the required public notices notifying the public of the comment period for both the proposed 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the 2024-2029 Five Year Consolidated Plan and the scheduled public hearing.

At a later date, staff will submit the final 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the 2024-2029 Five Year Consolidated Plan to the Board of Supervisors for review and adoption. The One Year Action Plan will identify the specific activities selected for CDBG, ESG and HOME. Congress has not approved the Federal FY 2025 appropriations and, therefore, HWS doesn't have the exact amount of funding the County will be receiving. Staff anticipates presenting the final 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan to the Board of Supervisors no later than July 22, 2025.

### SUBMITTAL TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS COUNTY OF RIVERSIDE, STATE OF CALIFORNIA

Upon completion of the citizen participation process, the review and consideration of comments, and the review and adoption by the Board of Supervisors, the final 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the 2024-2029 Five Year Consolidated Plan will be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval.

The proposed activities under the 2025-2026 HUD-funded Community Planning and Development (CPD) programs are attached.

### Impact on Residents and Businesses

It is anticipated that the County's 2025-2026 CPD allocation is estimated to be approximately \$10,230,000 for the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs.

### **Additional Fiscal Information**

No impact on the County's General Fund and no budget adjustment is required, as the funding is provided by HUD.

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### **Organization History**

Faith in Action of the San Gorgonio Pass (FIASGP) was founded to address the urgent needs of low-income, at-risk, and unhoused individuals in the San Gorgonio Pass region. Recognizing the barriers to stable housing, employment, and healthcare, FIASGP began as a grassroots effort, collaborating with local nonprofits, agencies, churches, and foundations to provide critical resources.

Over time, the organization expanded its services to offer comprehensive support through programs like housing navigation, workforce development, and Community Health Worker (CHW) assistance under healthcare partnerships with Molina Healthcare and IEHP. FIASGP also plays a key role in coordinating community assistance resource events, ensuring individuals receive holistic, wraparound support. Through funding from grants like the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP), FIASGP has successfully helped families remain housed while developing sustainable pathways to self-sufficiency.

### Vision

Faith In Action of the San Gorgonio Pass envision to eliminate poverty and homelessness in the San Gorgonio Pass region so that everyone has the opportunity to be self-sufficient and thrive.

### Mission

The mission of Faith In Action of the San Gorgonio Pass is to help low-income, at-risk, and unhoused individuals obtain and retain resources to address their health, educational, housing, and workforce development needs. We do this through direct services, referrals, public education and partnerships with community organizations.



In 2024, Faith in Action of the San Gorgonio Pass continued its mission to support low-income and unhoused individuals. Through grants, donations, and program revenue, we secured \$472,089 in funding. These resources were strategically allocated to provide emergency assistance, life skills training, housing support, notary services and community health services.



### **Grant Impact Overview**

### **Laura May Stewart Foundation Grant**

The foundation's support allowed us to provide 15 bicycles to employed individuals and job seekers in Banning and Beaumont, overcoming transportation barriers. With the freedom of mobility, recipients are able to work longer hours and travel independently without being restricted by public transit schedules. This initiative directly impacts employment opportunities and stability.

### **Outcome Highlights:**

15 bicycles distributed to employed individuals and job seekers.

Bicycles come with essential safety gear: repair kit, bike light, lock, and helmet.

Increased employment flexibility by removing transportation barriers.

### **Soboba Grant**

The Soboba Grant enabled us to provide crucial support to individuals and families in the Pass community, addressing immediate basic needs. With these resources, we were able to ensure that vulnerable community members had access to the essentials required to focus on long-term stability.

### **Outcome Highlights:**

Purchased food, gloves, hats, and other basic needs for community members.

Direct support to individuals facing hardship, fostering well-being and stability.

### IPP from Molina Healthcare (CalAIM Incentive Payment Program)

Through the IPP program, we continue to engage individuals in health services while building a sustainable infrastructure for care. This initiative helped us support vulnerable individuals with health and housing needs, aligning with our goal of addressing social determinants of health and ensuring lasting stability.

### **Outcome Highlights:**

Enrolled 6 new members in Enhanced Care Management (ECM).

Contracted 15 clinics to expand healthcare access.

Provided housing and rent assistance to 4 individuals, promoting long-term stability.

### Sun Lakes Trustee Grant

The Sun Lakes Trustee Grant supported our efforts to provide essential nourishment to individuals in need. By purchasing and distributing 100 pre-packaged meals, we ensured that community members facing food insecurity could focus on securing housing and employment.



With funding from The Vaccine Equity Campaign, facilitated by The Center at Sierra Health Foundation, Faith in Action of San Gorgonio Pass collaborated with The Center to expand COVID-19 awareness and vaccination efforts. Through strategically scheduled and targeted outreach events, FIASGP partnered with nonprofits, Carol's Kitchen, Table of Plenty and Help Inc and Riverside University Health System Public Health to ensure underserved populations had access to community assistance services, hot meals, medical consultations alongside vaccinations essential health services.

At one event in Cabazon, a mother of three who had been hesitant about vaccines decided to get vaccinated after speaking with a staff member who shared their own vaccination experience. Her decision not only protected her family but also inspired others in the community to seek accurate information and consider vaccination.





### HOMELESS HOUSING, ASSISTANCE AND PREVENTION (HHAP)

County of Riverside Department of Housing and Workforce Solutions - Continuum of Care

### **Program Overview**

The Rapid Rehousing Program is a critical initiative designed to transition individuals from homelessness to stable, permanent housing. FIASGP has successfully executed this program with an **80**% success rate in securing permanent housing for our clients.

### **Program Achievements**

Housing Stability: Assisted over six clients in achieving permanent housing.

Master Lease Approach: Secured and managed two dwellings to facilitate smooth transitions for individuals facing housing insecurity.

Financial & Logistical Support: Provided rental assistance, security deposits and utility transfers to ensure long-term self-sufficiency.

### **Impact**

### **Master Lease Outcomes**

Two individuals transitioned from FIASGPleased housing to independently signed rental agreements, assuming full financial responsibility for rent and utilities. They remain stably housed.

### **Senior & Healthcare Support**

A homeless senior entered our housing program unknown was in urgent need of medical intervention, including an emergency open-heart surgery. Following a period in post-hospitalization transitional housing, he successfully secured permanent housing in Whitewater in August 2024.

### **Youth Housing Support**

Two young adults were connected with Riverside County's non-minor extended foster care services, overcoming barriers related to rental and credit history. By June 2024, they secured their first apartment, fully furnished with essential items provided by FIASGP.

### <u>Veteran Housing Assistance</u>

A female veteran was assisted in obtaining identification documents, accessing VA services, and securing a VASH housing voucher. She now resides in her own apartment in Hemet, demonstrating successful reintegration into stable housing.



### Emergency Food and Shelter Program through United Way (EFSP) Grant Report

Purpose: To provide financial assistance for rental arrears to prevent homelessness. Strengthened financial stability for families at risk of eviction. Coordinate services with landlords to secure housing stability.

### **Program Impact**

**Total Families Assisted: 10** 

**Total Grant Funds Utilized: \$21,588** 

Assistance Breakdown:

Average Rental Assistance Provided per Family: \$2,158.80 Average Months of Back Rent Covered: 1.6 months















The client fell behind on rent after the passing of her mother in February of this year, as she had relied on her mother's income to help cover the monthly rent of \$915. Additionally, due to an administrative error following her mother's passing, the Social Security Administration mistakenly discontinued the client's disability benefits of \$1,182 per month.

With assistance from the ESFP program, the client received rental support to prevent eviction. Since then, her disability benefits have been reinstated and will resume at the end of August. Additionally, her daughter will be moving in to contribute to rent payments, ensuring the client's ability to make timely payments going forward.

The client was diagnosed with Postural **Orthostatic Tachycardia Syndrome** (POTS) and was unable to work while undergoing treatment, resulting in a loss of income and an inability to pay rent. As a single parent with one child, she faced significant financial hardship and accrued three months of rental arrears. Through the ESFP program grant provided by United Way, we were able to assist the client with rental arrears, preventing eviction and ensuring she could remain in her home. Now that her condition has improved, she has returned to work and can sustainably manage her rent payments moving forward.



### FIASGP Life Skills Cohort

The Life Skills Cohort assists individuals experiencing homelessness or impacted by the justice system in overcoming barriers to housing, employment, and well-being. It provides training in financial literacy, employment readiness, soft skills, preventative healthcare, and mental health awareness.

Through grants from the Inland Empire Community Foundation, FIASGP conducted two successful Life Skills Cohorts in 2024.

### **Personal Identifying Documents:**

7 participants successfully obtained crucial personal identifying documents, such as birth certificates,

Social Security cards and state IDs.

#### Certifications Earned:

6 participants earned certifications in Food Handling and Guard Card. These certifications are valuable for employment opportunities in various sectors such as hospitality and security, which can provide immediate job placement potential.

#### **Education Enrollment:**

2 participants enrolled in programs to obtain their high school diplomas, reflecting their commitment to advancing their education and improving their prospects. This also demonstrates a shift towards long-term stability and empowerment.

#### **Referral for Probation Participant:**

Several participants, who were referred to from probation, successfully completed the program and are now actively working toward rebuilding his life.

#### **Financial Literacy:**

Several participants established accounts with Altura Credit Union, learning about credit building, savings, and managing finances.





### Community Health Worker

FIASGP took a significant step toward enhancing the support we provide to Inland Empire Health Plan (IEHP) members by certifying six of our Navigators as Community Health Workers (CHWs). This accomplishment expands our capacity to address the social determinants of health (SDOH) and ensures we are effectively serving members with a comprehensive, community-based approach to healthcare.

### **CHW Services Provide:**

Health Education and Outreach: Educating members on managing chronic conditions, preventive care and health literacy.

Healthcare Navigation: Assisting members in accessing healthcare services, scheduling appointments and understanding insurance benefits.

Social Support Services: Connecting members with resources such as housing, food assistance and employment services to improve their overall well-being.

Cultural Competency: Delivering services tailored to the cultural and linguistic needs of our diverse community, fostering trust and effective communication.

Chronic Disease Support: Providing health coaching and ongoing support for members managing chronic health conditions

### **Performance Metrics**

In 2024, FIASGP made a significant impact by serving 137 IEHP members and submitting 349 claims for services. Additionally, we provided Enhanced Care Management (ECM) for 9 Molina members through wellness calls, care plans, and follow-ups. To support housing stability, we facilitated deposits for 4 individuals and referred 7 members to Molina Community Support. These efforts highlight our commitment to bridging care gaps and improving community well-being.









# WEDNESDAY GROCERY DISTRIBUTION



In collaboration with HELP Inc., FIASGP hosts a distribution event every Wednesday, providing essential resources to the unhoused and those at risk of homelessness. On weekly average, 45 individuals benefit from this initiative, receiving:

Grocery bags with non-perishable meals and canned goods
Clothing and hygiene supplies
Basic needs assistance

Additionally, FIASGP serves as an agency host for the Probation Department's check-in program, supporting unhoused individuals with essential services.

Taqueria Orozco, located at 1987 W Ramsey Street, Banning, CA, generously donates burritos for the unhoused clients of FIASGP, ensuring they receive warm, nutritious meals during distribution events.

Together, these efforts reflect a strong commitment to alleviating hunger and fostering dignity within the local community, showcasing the power of organized kindness and collaboration.

### From Hardship to Hope: Michelle's Journey to Stability

For many years, Michelle lived a fulfilling life with a successful career and a loving family. But when tragedy struck and was followed by a series of difficult choices, her world unraveled. She lost her home and found herself unhoused, moving from one uninhabitable location to another for over five years. Survival became her daily focus, and she struggled to see a way out.

One day, Michelle visited Faith In Action of San Gorgonio Pass (FIASGP) in search of basic necessities. At the time, she was not ready to make any significant changes in her living situation. However, with each visit to the Navigation Center, she engaged in conversations with the dedicated navigators, who provided encouragement and support. Over time, Michelle began to see the possibility of a different future—one where she could regain stability and independence. With newfound determination, Michelle made the courageous decision to reclaim her life. FIASGP stepped in to help her navigate the complex process of restoring her identity and securing essential services. The team assisted her in obtaining:

- Her birth certificate and Social Security card
- . BenefitsCal enrollment to access essential aid
- Reinstated medical care for her health needs
- Social Security Retirement benefits to provide financial security

Recognizing that Michelle needed long-term support, FIASGP collaborated with Riverside County Adult Protective Services (APS) and In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) to ensure she had a safe place to live. Thanks to these efforts, she now resides independently in a senior residential home, where she receives the care and support she needs to thrive.

Michelle's story is one of resilience, transformation and hope. Through the compassionate guidance of FIASGP and its partners, she found the courage to break free from homelessness and rebuild her life. Today, she enjoys the stability and dignity she deserves, proving that with the right support and determination, a new beginning is always possible.

I had planned on addressing you in person. However, I've fallen ill to a bad flu bug so I write to express my wish that you look favorably on our applications for both an ESG and CDBG grants, included in your One Year Action Plan.

Since 1989, Valley Restart has been assisting homeless families, children, seniors, and veterans in obtaining upper-level housing throughout the cities of Hemet, San Jacinto, and surrounding communities. During our last fiscal year, ending 6/2024, we served over 235 families and individuals. Of those, 100 were children. We ended up with a 93% placement rate.

Although we serve the bulk of our families in district 5, many come from district 3, and throughout the county. We are an active (and voting) member of the Continuum of Care and retain great partnerships with many agencies, nonprofits, faith-based organizations, and others throughout the region.

It is through funding like this that allows us to provide services to the homeless year in and year out. We are the only homeless shelter in the mid-county area and continue to see many families, seniors and veterans experiencing homelessness that we will serve with continued financial support.

Young Scholars for Academic Empowerment dba TruEvolution, Inc. ("TruEvolution") is located on Brockton Avenue of District 1 in Riverside County. We are a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that provides services in transitional housing, infectious disease prevention and education outreach, behavioral health support, and case management.

I am writing to formally urge for your support and approval for TruEvolution's CDBG activity, which is focused on our transitional housing program, Project Legacy. Project Legacy offers five residential housing units capable of accommodating up to 48 clients. We currently have over 800 people on our waitlist, emphasizing the need for improvements and upgrades to our campus.

Our activity, *Project Legacy Improvement Project*, will serve people experiencing homelessness, low-income individuals, seniors, veterans, and people with severe disabilities. We have carefully observed the high influx of people from these priority populations, including new clients and community members. The CDBG funds will help with 1) the development of a canopy infrastructure throughout our community campus and 2) the installation of a public address (PA) system on our campus.

In Riverside, where extreme heat waves are common, developing a canopy shading structure across our community campus is essential for weather protection. During the summer, many seek shelter from the intense heat by coming to our campus which often serves as a cooling station. The new canopy development will provide protection not only in the heat, but also during rain and severe weather conditions. Additionally, a PA system to be installed on our campus is crucial for safety and security. The PA system will allow us to facilitate communication during emergencies and improve our ability to maintain a secure environment for all clients, staff, and visitors. This system will serve as a critical tool in emergency preparedness and response.

The approval of CDBG funds will directly benefit over 500 people from all 5 districts of Riverside County, including clients and visitors. Your support will enable us to expand our housing and health services to better serve Riverside County. I extend my deep gratitude for your time and consideration.





Proposed One Year Action Plan 2025-2026 of the Five-Year Consolidated Plan 2024-2029





It is anticipated that the Board of Supervisors will approve and adopt the final 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan at its regular meeting on or about July 22, 2025. The 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan will then be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval on or about July 30, 2025. Please note that both the meeting date and time are subject to change.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY The primary objective of the County's CPD programs is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expansion of economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate incomes. The 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan is a component of the 2024-2029 Five Year Consolidated Plan that must be updated annually. It provides detailed information on the resources the County expects to receive and the specific activities to be undertaken to meet the priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. Upon completion of the Citizen Participation process, the review and consideration of comments, and the approval by the Board of Supervisors, the County will prepare and submit the final 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the 2024-2029 Five Year Consolidated Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

ANTICIPATED FUNDS Anticipated allocations to be received through the FY 2025-2026 are estimated to be \$7,500,000 for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, including the Metro City Program; \$2,130,000 for the Home Investment Partnership (HOME) program, including the Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO) program;

and \$600,000 for the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program. The County expects to utilize at least eighty-five percent (85%) of the CPD funds for activities that benefit low and moderate-income persons.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ONE YEAR PLAN ACTIVITIES The County received eighty-two (82) proposals for the 2025-2026 CDBG funding totaling \$9,311,029. The proposed activities included public service, public facility improvements, rehabilitation, economic development, code enforcement, and others. There were eight (8) requests for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding totaling \$1,352,579. Proposals for the HOME program include HOME New Construction (\$1,825,820); HOME Direct Ownership (\$350,000); HOME/CHDO Set-Aside (\$365,165); and HOME Administration (\$243,442). The combined cost for the oversight of the programs (HOME, CDBG, ESG), general management, and administrative activities are estimated to be \$1,800,000.

<u>DISPLACEMENT</u> All planned CPD-funded activities will be designed to minimize the displacement of persons. The provision of relocation benefits to displaced persons and replacement of low-and moderate-income housing units that are demolished or converted to another use as a result of CDBG-funded activities will be consistent with the County's Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan and provisions of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970, as amended.

<u>CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AND COMMENTS</u> The County of Riverside initiated the 2025-2026 CPD Funding cycle in August 2024, with the publication of the Notification of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the CDBG and ESG programs. The County initiated the Citizen Participation Process in August 2024, with the notification to residents, Cooperating Cities, non-profit organizations, service providers, public agencies, and other stakeholders of the 2025-2026 CPD Funding cycle. The Citizen Participation process consisted of online submissions, public meetings in unincorporated communities to receive input from residents and others to identify and assess economic, community, housing, and social development needs in the communities

<u>PARTICIPATING COMMUNITIES</u> The 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the 2024-2029 Consolidated Plan includes the unincorporated areas of the County, the cities of Lake Elsinore, Murrieta, Palm Desert (Metro Cities), and the following Cooperating Cities: Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Coachella, Canyon Lake, Calimesa, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Rancho Mirage, La Quinta, Norco, San Jacinto, and Wildomar.

<u>IMPLEMENTATION</u> The goals for the 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the Consolidated Plan include: creating affordable housing for those of very low, low, and moderate-income; providing homeownership opportunities for first-time buyers; improving conditions of substandard housing and rental housing; addressing farm worker housing needs; ensuring the availability of emergency shelters to address the needs of the homeless; creating housing opportunities for the elderly, especially the frail elderly; creating supportive housing or shelter for persons afflicted with HIV/AIDS; creating rental assistance through subsidy programs; providing short-term shelter for the mentally ill homeless; creating a suitable living environment by improving public facilities and services; and providing economic development opportunities for low- and moderate-income families.

It is anticipated that the Board of Supervisors will approve and adopt the final 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan at its regular meeting on or about July 22, 2025. The 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan will then be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for review and approval on or about July 30, 2025. Please note that both the meeting date and time are subject to change.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY The primary objective of the County's CPD programs is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expansion of economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate incomes. The 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan is a component of the 2024-2029 Five Year Consolidated Plan that must be updated annually. It provides detailed information on the resources the County expects to receive and the specific activities to be undertaken to meet the priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan. Upon completion of the Citizen Participation process, the review and consideration of comments, and the approval by the Board of Supervisors, the County will prepare and submit the final 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the 2024-2029 Five Year Consolidated Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

<u>ANTICIPATED FUNDS</u> Anticipated allocations to be received through the FY 2025-2026 are estimated to be \$7,500,000 for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, including the Metro City Program; \$2,130,000 for the Home Investment Partnership (HOME) program, including the Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO) program;

and \$600,000 for the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program. The County expects to utilize at least eighty-five percent (85%) of the CPD funds for activities that benefit low and moderate-income persons.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ONE YEAR PLAN ACTIVITIES The County received eighty-two (82) proposals for the 2025-2026 CDBG funding totaling \$9,311,029. The proposed activities included public service, public facility improvements, rehabilitation, economic development, code enforcement, and others. There were eight (8) requests for Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funding \$1,352,579. Proposals for the HOME program include HOME New Construction (\$1,825,820); HOME Direct Ownership (\$350,000); HOME/CHDO Set-Aside (\$365,165); and HOME Administration (\$243,442). The combined cost for the oversight of the programs (HOME, CDBG, ESG), general management, and administrative activities are estimated to be \$1,800,000.

<u>DISPLACEMENT</u> All planned CPD-funded activities will be designed to minimize the displacement of persons. The provision of relocation benefits to displaced persons and replacement of low-and moderate-income housing units that are demolished or converted to another use as a result of CDBG-funded activities will be consistent with the County's Anti-Displacement and Relocation Assistance Plan and provisions of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Act of 1970, as amended.

<u>CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AND COMMENTS</u> The County of Riverside initiated the 2025-2026 CPD Funding cycle in August 2024, with the publication of the Notification of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the CDBG and ESG programs. The County initiated the Citizen Participation Process in August 2024, with the notification to residents, Cooperating Cities, non-profit organizations, service providers, public agencies, and other stakeholders of the 2025-2026 CPD Funding cycle. The Citizen Participation process consisted of online submissions, public meetings in unincorporated communities to receive input from residents and others to identify and assess economic, community, housing, and social development needs in the communities.

<u>PARTICIPATING COMMUNITIES</u> The 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the 2024-2029 Consolidated Plan includes the unincorporated areas of the County, the cities of Lake Elsinore, Murrieta, Palm Desert (Metro Cities), and the following Cooperating Cities: Banning, Beaumont, Blythe, Coachella, Canyon Lake, Calimesa, Desert Hot Springs, Eastvale, Rancho Mirage, La Quinta, Norco, San Jacinto, and Wildomar.

<u>IMPLEMENTATION</u> The goals for the 2025-2026 One Year Action Plan of the Consolidated Plan include: creating affordable housing for those of very low, low, and moderate-income; providing homeownership opportunities for first-time buyers; improving conditions of substandard housing and rental housing; addressing farm worker housing needs; ensuring the availability of emergency shelters to address the needs of the homeless; creating housing opportunities for the elderly, especially the frail elderly; creating supportive housing or shelter for persons afflicted with HIV/AIDS; creating rental assistance through subsidy programs; providing short-term shelter for the mentally ill homeless; creating a suitable living environment by improving public facilities and services; and providing economic development opportunities for low- and moderate-income families.
