

**BACKGROUND:**

**Summary**

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors designated the HOPE (Healing, Outreach, Prevention, Education) Collaborative as the County’s Child Abuse Prevention Council (CAPC), with responsibility for the coordination of the community’s efforts to prevent and respond to child abuse and neglect and oversight of the Children’s Trust Fund.

Family Service Association (FSA) provides oversight of the HOPE Collaborative. Pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC), section 18983.6 and the terms of Agreement #CS-03969 between FSA and the Department of Public Social Services, FSA is required to submit an annual report to the Riverside County Board of Supervisors detailing the operations and accomplishments of the HOPE Collaborative.

FSA focuses their efforts to one primary strategy that is adopted by child welfare agencies across the United States that provide direct support for the entire family including providing parents with skills and resources they need.

Some of the annual highlights of the HOPE Collaborative that support these families include:

- 24 Mandated Reporter Trainings facilitated by HOPE staff with a total of 373 individuals trained;
- 16 Educational Workshops were conducted educating a total of 565 individuals;
- 50 Community Outreach Events attended by HOPE staff distributing 24,059 educational materials and reaching 12,720 individuals.

Some of the highlights from the District Collaborative group that met throughout the year with their region-specific strategies include the following:

- District 1 – Hosted Annual Winter Wonderland Resource fair that connected over 100 families with dental care, childcare, and parental education services.
- District 2 – Connected with over 1,200 families, providing back to school supplies which included backpacks and notebooks.
- District 3 – Supported homeless families with 125 survival kits created in collaboration with Community Mission of HOPE.
- District 4 – Supported DPSS to facilitate the six event community connection series all over the Coachella Valley, providing free community resources, car seats, food boxes, diapers, and on-site family service support.

- District 4B (Serving Blythe) – Designed a community Billboard to showcase preventive child abuse efforts. The Billboard is placed on the only busy highway in the community and reads: “Together, we pave the path for children’s safety.”
- District 5 – Orchestrated the creation of the ‘kindness is a Vibe’ playlist.

In order to reach a broader spectrum of families, the HOPE Collaborative leverages several social media platforms, including Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter to share information and resources related to child abuse prevention. Their content is tailored to families with young children, teenagers, young adults, and professionals.

The HOPE Collaborative Annual Report details additional annual efforts and achievements in the areas of training and education, community outreach, public awareness, fundraising and outcomes. Event highlights and numbers of individuals served are included throughout the report.

**Impact on Residents and Businesses**

HOPE Collaborative programs provide much needed assistance to individuals and families considered at-risk and in need of child abuse prevention and intervention services in Riverside County.

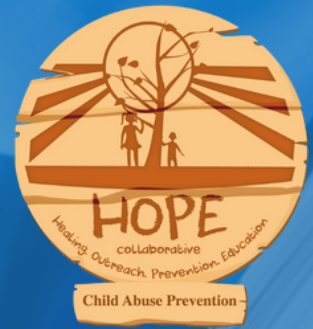

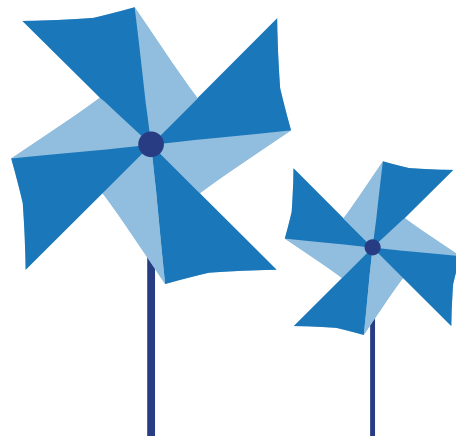

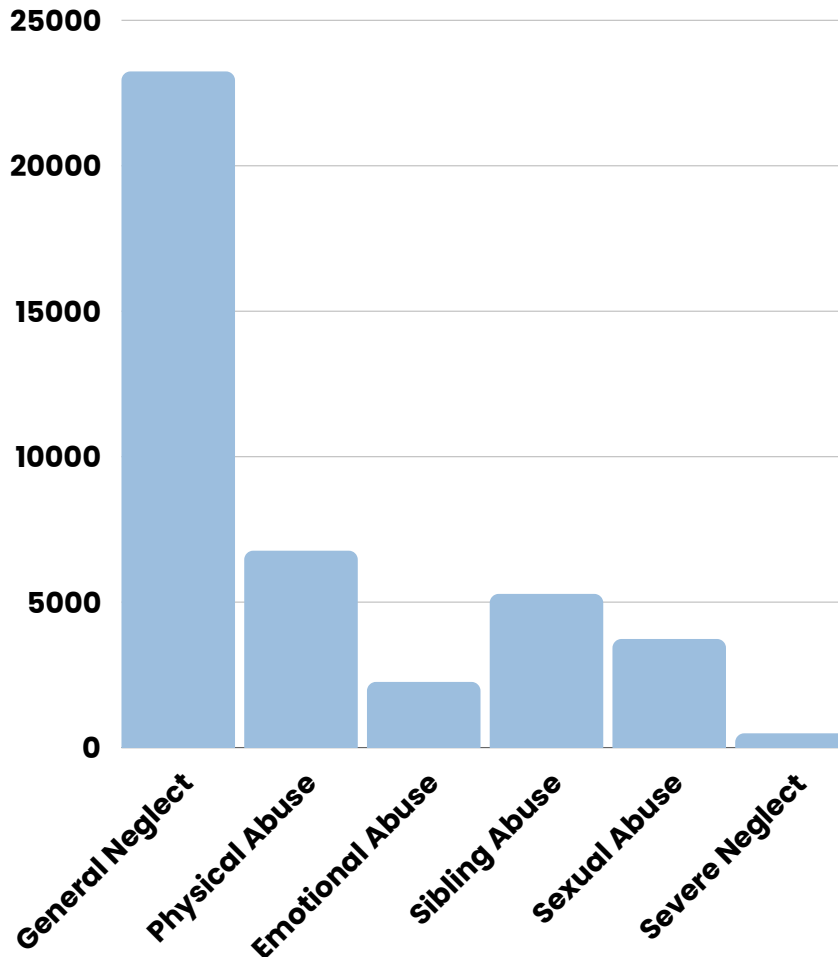

# CHILD ABUSE STATISTICS

Addressing child abuse requires a multifaceted approach, including education, reporting, and support. According to the California Child Welfare Indicators Project (CCWIP), in 2023, Riverside County reported 41,973 child abuse allegations with 5,711 substantiations. Substantiated cases represent instances where allegations of child abuse or neglect have been confirmed by the appropriate authorities.

Understanding the various forms and rates of abuse within the county, provides crucial insight that guides HOPE’s prevention efforts.

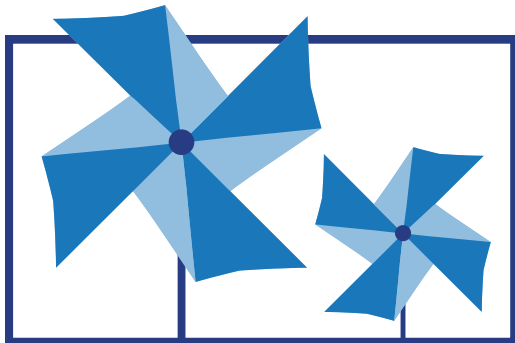

## OUR IMPACT

The HOPE Collaborative fulfills its mission of preventing child abuse through a comprehensive approach that includes collaboration with other agencies, raising awareness in the community, educating professionals, parents, and the public, providing support to child abuse victims and their families, and advocating for policies that protect children.

### Mandated Reporter Trainings

The HOPE Collaborative offers Mandated Reporter Trainings (MRTs) across Riverside County. These educational sessions equip individuals with the knowledge and skills to identify and report signs of child abuse, playing a key role in protecting children and promoting their well-being.

### Community Connection

The HOPE Collaborative participated in 50 community events across Riverside County. By connecting with residents, local organizations, and stakeholders, we raised awareness, built trust, and strengthened our impact.

### HOPE for the Holidays

HOPE for the Holidays is a heartwarming toy drive that goes beyond mere toys. We provide essential items, including hygiene supplies and blankets, to children placed in foster care across Riverside County. HOPE works closely with the Riverside County Department of Public Social Services (DPSS) to ensure that every child receives the items they need. This year, the HOPE Collaborative partnered with the Regional Access Project Foundation (RAP) in Indio to expand our reach and increase access to gifts and hygiene items to foster children residing in Eastern Riverside County.

# NATIONAL CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH

During National Child Abuse Prevention Month in April, HOPE Collaborative organizes educational events and outreach initiatives to raise awareness about child safety and provide support for families.

## Children's Memorial Flag Raising Ceremony

HOPE facilitated its second annual Children's Memorial Flag Raising Ceremony for Riverside County, which honored the memory of children lost to abuse and neglect. We recognized the critical services provided by the Riverside County Child Assessment Team (RCCAT) and the Sexual Assault and Forensic Evaluation Team (SAFE). These teams play a vital role in the community by providing compassionate care and forensic evidence to support child abuse investigations.

We were honored to have the support of key community leaders, including Second District Supervisor Karen Spiegel, Third District Supervisor Chuck Washington, Sheriff Chad Bianco, County Executive Officer Jeff Van Wagenen, and Riverside University Health System Chief of Medical Services Dr. Sophia Grant. The ceremony was a powerful reminder of our commitment to protecting children and ensuring they receive the care they need.





## Family Strengthening Day

With the generous support of the Office of Child Abuse Prevention (OCAP), HOPE hosted a comprehensive Family Strengthening event in Thermal, CA. Families were connected with essential resources, received educational materials, and gained a deeper understanding of the support systems available to them.

## Rally for Prevention

HOPE Collaborative coordinated a Child Abuse Awareness Rally with over 150 attendees in Temecula. Blue signs and pinwheels lined the entire street. Bold messages like 'No Excuse for Abuse' and 'Honk to Stop Abuse' drew attention and inspired action. This event demonstrated the power of community awareness and involvement in preventing child abuse. The rally successfully raised awareness about the prevalence of child abuse and helped families get involved in our local collaborative efforts.

## REGIONAL COLLABORATIVE MEETINGS

To meet the needs of each diverse community in Riverside County, HOPE has established 7 regional collaborative councils. These councils are led and maintained by dedicated community leaders who address the specific needs of their respective communities.

# DISTRICT 1

Serving Riverside, Perris, Highgrove, March Air Force Base, Mead Valley

## Highlights:

### July 12, 2023

Awarded a Certificate of Recognition for dedication to making a difference in the community from State Senator Richard D. Roth of the 31st Senate District.

### August 2023

Played a role in three Back to School events within the district, providing printed internet safety and human trafficking awareness education to over 840 students.

### December 15, 2023

Hosted an Annual Winter Wonderland Resource fair that connected over 100 families with dental care, child-care, and parental education services while providing a safe afternoon of holiday activities. This annual event featured safe family activities and facilitated an environment for bonding and nurturing.

### March 22, 2024

Developed a family resource guide, distributing 5,000 copies through partnering agencies, events, and community connections.

### April 17, 2024

Orchestrated a milestone event for youth, jointly hosted with Courage to Build Knowledge Charter School. This event celebrated academic achievement and served as an affirmation of students' resilience, determination, and potential.



# DISTRICT 2

Serving Corona, Norco, Eastvale, Lake Elsinore, Mira Loma, Jurupa Valley

## Highlights:

### July 2023

Connected with over 1,200 families, providing back to school supplies including backpacks and notebooks. These events support families and can reduce stressors that lead to child abuse.

### February 3, 2024

Organized an all-inclusive Family Fun Day in Jurupa Valley, featuring a family relationship workshop and a self-defense class. This event provided essential resources for the high-need communities, fostering engagement and empowerment. Families came together to learn valuable relationship-building skills, and participants gained practical knowledge in several health topics. By addressing both physical and emotional well-being, we aimed to create a positive impact on the lives of attendees.

### April 20, 2024

Distributed well over 800 educational pamphlets during the annual Corona-Norco Dia de Niño.

### May 2024

Partnered with the Corona Norco Unified School District (CNUSD) Parent Resource Center to provide an essentials basket for roughly 75-graduating homeless and foster youth, ensuring the readiness to receive resources post-graduation.

### May - June 2024

Raised awareness through media advertising, showcasing supportive parent resources on major platforms like FOX News, ABC News, Disney, and Nickelodeon.



# DISTRICT 3

Serving Temecula, Murrieta, Menifee, Wildomar, Romoland, Anza

## Highlights:

### October-December 2023

Partnered with several school districts including Temecula Unified and Murrieta Unified School District to host an art contest for children of all ages. Students were asked to depict "Family Strength", and winners were displayed on a 2024 academic calendar.

### November-December 2023

Supported homeless families with 125 survival kits created in collaboration with Community Mission of HOPE. They were distributed during the longest night nationally recognized in support of the thousands of Americans experiencing homelessness.

### April 27, 2024

Rally for Prevention, an informative and expressive activity to help spread the word about child abuse awareness and prevention. Collaborative raised over \$1,500.00 in donations for this event.

### June 28, 2024

The clothing drive benefiting survivors of assault successfully collected \$600 worth of new and gently used clothing for individuals of all ages, from newborns to adults. The initiative directly benefits the Riverside County Child Assessment Team (RCCAT) and provides essential resources to the community.





# DISTRICT 4

Serving Palm Springs, Desert Hot Springs, Mecca, Coachella, Palm Desert

## Highlights:

**February 3, 2024**

Cohosted the 3rd annual Be a Hero 5K, in partnership with Barbara Sinatra and Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation. This themed walk (Heroes Bringing Hope), focuses on everyday people and their impact on children's lives. Efforts and proceeds from this event directly impacted children who have experienced abuse.

**February 24, 2024**

Hosted a Family Self-Care Resource Event in Thousand Palms, focusing on mental health awareness and all-inclusive sensory friendly activities for the community. Direct services were provided with the assistance of the Desert Recreation District.

**April 2024**

Provided essentials to over 600 families including sun safety items, and educational material regarding identifying child abuse.

**June 2024**

Supported DCSS to facilitate the six event community connection series all over the Coachella Valley, providing free community resources, car seats, food boxes, diapers, and on-site family service support.

# DISTRICT 4B

Serving Blythe

## Highlights:

### September 9, 2023

Showcased Child Abuse prevention resources at the impactful Peace from Chaos: Suicide Awareness Community Candlelight Vigil.

### January 2024

Provided a revised HOPE Community Resource Booklet specific to the Blythe community. This booklet was curated to facilitate connections between families and available resources. It is regularly revised, updated and distributed to cater to the quickly changing environment of service providers. They are distributed through the Blythe city hall, Palo Verde school district, and community partners.

### June 1, 2024

HOPE supported and collaborated with Blythe's Police Activities League and Riverside County Probation Department to host the annual Summer Safety Extravaganza, an event full of resources, fun family activities, games, and water safety for the entire Blythe community.

### June 2024

Designed a community Billboard to showcase preventative child abuse efforts and encourage child safety. The Billboards is placed amongst the one and only busy highway in the community and reads "Together, we pave the path for children's safety"





## DISTRICT 5

Serving Moreno Valley, Beaumont, Banning, Cabazon, Calimesa, Cherry Valley

### Highlights:

#### August 2, 2023

Partnered with Moreno Valley Unified School District to showcase winners of the "Hearts YOUNited Be a Friend, not a Bully" sticker contest. Stickers were distributed in unison with educational bullying awareness posters.

#### September 2023

Orchestrated the creation of the 'Kindness is a Vibe' playlist. This playlist is a compilation of motivational and uplifting music, assembled for and by teenagers. The playlist is distributed through QR codes for easy access.

#### October 2023

Received the State of California Senate Certificate of Recognition and the Assembly Certificate of Recognition for hosting the community back to school resource event in collaboration with Community Health Systems, Inc.

#### May-June 2024

Developed a community resource card titled "Your Community is Here for You," which was distributed across local school districts. In addition to the resources, hygiene kits were also constructed to aid middle and high school students facing difficult times.

# DISTRICT 5B

Serving Hemet, San Jacinto, Nuevo, Lakeview

## Highlights:

### August 2023

Collected donations to create "Essentials Bags" filled with personal hygiene items, clothing items, school supplies, and blankets for Foster Youth in the Hemet and San Jacinto Unified School District.

### November 2023

Organized a comprehensive 6-week educational workshop series for parents. Parents gained practical tools for communicating with their children, in addition to deepening their understanding of Human Trafficking warning signs. Parents left feeling empowered to address difficult situations.

### February 10, 2024

Established a strategic partnership with Hemet Unified School District's (HUSD) Saturday School. This event provided targeted education for families with struggling youth.

### April 13, 2024

Partnered with HUSD to create a "Family Festival". This event was open to the community and provided vital information about family support.

### June 7, 2024

Hosted an interactive Summer Kick Off resource fair, this event serviced over 300 community members, and showcased 30 supportive resources including CalFresh, housing support, immunizations, food support, and mental health resources.



# COUNTY CHILDREN'S TRUST FUND

In 1983, the Legislature passed Assembly Bill 2994 which established the County Children's Trust Fund (CCTF.) Its purpose is to fund child abuse prevention services, intervention programs led by both non-profit and public institutions of higher education, and established child abuse prevention councils within the communities

Since 2013, Family Service Association has received funding by CCTF for HOPE Collaborative, the Child Abuse Prevention Council for Riverside County.
