4. Approve and direct the Auditor Controller to make the budget adjustment shown in Schedule A.



BACKGROUND:

Summary

August 26, 2025, Assembly District 63 Special General Election

On April 14, 2025, Governor Gavin Newsom issued a proclamation calling for a Special General Election to fill the vacancy in the 63rd State Assembly District, which was vacated by former Assemblymember Bill Essayli on April 1, 2025. The 63rd Assembly District encompasses the entire cities of Canyon Lake, Lake Elsinore, Norco, and Menifee as well as portions of the cities of Corona, Eastvale, and Riverside. These cities are located across Supervisorial Districts 1, 2, and 3. A Special Primary Election was held on June 24, 2025 and none of the candidates received a simple majority (50% + 1 of the total votes cast). As a result, a runoff election will be held between the top two candidates which is scheduled to be held on August 26, 2025.

Vote Centers

- August 16-August 17: 11-day Vote Centers will be open
A total of 6 Vote Centers will operate in Assembly District 63.
- August 23-August 24: 4-day Vote Centers will be open
A total of 13 Vote Center locations will operate in Assembly District 63.

August 26, 2025, Special District Mail Ballot Election (Land Owner)

California Elections Code §§ 10002, 10402, and 10403 allow jurisdictions to request that the Board of Supervisors approve the Registrar of Voters to conduct a Mail Ballot Election where only property owners will be voting, by submitting a resolution requesting these services. High Valleys Water District has requested the Registrar of Voters to conduct their election. The department has the resources to provide these services. The jurisdiction will reimburse ROV for the cost to conduct the election.

Returning Vote by Mail Ballots

- Voters can mail their voted ballot via the USPS (no postage needed).

Early Voting (Several Dates)

- Registrar of Voters office was open to the public during regular business hours for in-person voting beginning July 28th through August 25, 2024, and on Election Day, August 26, 2025 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Ballot Drop-Off Sites

- Voters have the option to drop off their voted ballots in one of two secure drop boxes outside of the ROV office available 24 hours a day/7days a week.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

Registered voters in the County of Riverside will have the opportunity to vote for the state office which is listed in Attachment A. Landowners in the High Valleys Water District will have the opportunity to elect the Director for their respective district.

Additional Fiscal Information

The Registrar of Voters has refined costs to account for election expenses for both the June 24, 2025, Assembly District 63 Special General Election and the August 26, 2025, Special Mail Ballot Election for High Valleys Water District (Land Owner). Election Expenses include hiring approximately 300 temporary (TAP) employees; approximately 100 election workers to operate 13 Vote Centers; the secure transport of equipment to Vote Centers; materials and supplies to support the operation of both secure Ballot Drop Off Sites and Voter Centers; on site security personnel, and other related election activities.

**SPECIAL ELECTION PROCLAMATION
BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA**


I, **GAVIN NEWSOM**, Governor of the State of California, do hereby proclaim and order that a special election shall be held on the 26th day of August 2025, within the 63rd Assembly District of the State, to fill the vacancy in the office of State Assembly Member from that district resulting from the resignation of Assembly Member Bill Essayli.

Information Sheet Qualifications and Requirements

State Assembly, 63rd District Special Election

The Governor issued the proclamation for a special **GENERAL** election to be held on **August 26, 2025**. The date of the special **PRIMARY** election is scheduled for **June 24, 2025**.

The date of the special primary election is calculated by counting back nine Tuesdays proceeding the day of the special general election at which the vacancy is to be filled. If the ninth Tuesday is the day following a state holiday, the date of the special primary election is calculated by counting back ten Tuesdays preceding the special general election. § 10704(a)¹

I. QUALIFICATIONS

Every candidate shall:

- A. Be a U.S. citizen Cal. Const., art. IV, § 2(c)²
- B. Be a registered voter and otherwise qualified to vote for that office at the time nomination papers are issued to the person. § 201
- C. Not have been convicted of a felony involving accepting or giving, or offering to give, any bribe, the embezzlement of public money, extortion or theft of public money, perjury, or conspiracy to commit any of those crimes. § 20
- D. During their lifetime serve no more than 12 years in the State Senate, the Assembly, or both, in any combination of terms. This subdivision shall apply only to those Members of the Senate or the Assembly who are first elected to the Legislature after 2012 and who have not previously served in the Senate or Assembly. Members of the Senate or Assembly who were elected before June 2012 may serve only the number of terms allowed at the time of the last election before June 2012.

Cal. Const., art. IV, § 2(a)(4)³

¹ All code section references are to the California Elections Code unless stated otherwise.

² Article IV, section 2(c), of the California Constitution requires a one-year residency in the legislative district and three years residency in California; however, it is the legal opinion of this office that these provisions violate the U.S. Constitution and are unenforceable.

³ Term limits for Members of the State Senate or Assembly who were elected prior to June 2012: Senate – not to have served two terms in the State Senate since November 6, 1990; Assembly – not to have served three terms in the State Assembly since November 6, 1990.

II. REQUIREMENTS

A. CAMPAIGN FILINGS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Any individual who intends to be a candidate for an elective state office shall:

1. Candidate Intention Statement

File with the Secretary of State's Political Reform Division a Candidate Intention Statement (Form 501) for the specific state office sought. A separate Form 501 must be filed for each election, including re-election to the same office. This statement shall be signed under penalty of perjury and filed prior to the solicitation or receipt of any contribution or loan, including expenditures made from personal funds used for campaign purposes. Gov. Code § 85200

2. Campaign Contribution Account

a. A Statement of Organization—Recipient Committee (Form 410) shall be filed with the Secretary of State's Political Reform Division within 10 days of qualifying as a committee by receiving contributions totaling \$2,000 or more in a calendar year. Gov. Code §§ 82013(a), 84101

b. Establish one campaign contribution account at an office of a financial institution located in California after filing the Candidate Intention Statement. Gov. Code § 85201(a)

c. All contributions or loans made to the candidate, to a person on behalf of the candidate, or to the candidate's controlled committee shall be deposited in the account. Gov. Code § 85201(c)

d. Any personal funds, which will be used to promote the election of the candidate, shall be deposited in the account prior to expenditure. Gov. Code § 85201(d)

e. All campaign expenditures shall be made from the account. Gov. Code § 85201(e)

3. Exceptions

a. Parts 1 and 2(d) and (e), above, do not apply to a candidate's payment of a filing fee and statement of qualifications fee from his or her personal funds. Gov. Code §§ 85200, 85201(f)

b. Part 2, above, does not apply if the candidate does not receive contributions and makes campaign expenditures from personal funds of less than \$2,000 in a calendar year, excluding payment of the filing fee and statement of qualifications fee. Gov. Code § 85201(g)

c. An individual who raises contributions from others for their campaign, but who raises or spends less than \$2,000 in a calendar year, shall establish a campaign contribution account but is not required to file a Statement of Organization or other statement of bank account information. Gov. Code § 85201(h)

B. FILING FEES

1. Full Payment of Filing Fee

Every candidate must pay a filing fee equal to 1% of the first year’s salary as of the first day on which a candidate may circulate petitions in lieu of filing fees, made payable to the Secretary of State. Currently, the filing fee for State Assembly is \$1,327.03. The filing fee must be paid to the county elections official at the time the candidate obtains the nomination papers from the county elections official.

§§ 8103(a)(3), 8105

2. Signatures In Lieu of Filing Fee

A candidate may choose to submit by **April 22, 2025**, a minimum of **143** valid signatures for State Assembly on petitions in lieu of filing fees.

§§ 8106(a)(1), (b)(3), 8106.5, 10704(a)

a. Petitions for in-lieu signatures may be obtained from the county elections official and circulated between **April 14, 2025**, and **April 22, 2025**. Sections of in-lieu-filing-fee petitions shall be filed with the county elections official of the county in which the signers reside.

§§ 8106(b), 8106.5

b. The candidate may submit signatures to cover all or any prorated portion of the filing fee.

§§ 8106(b)(3), 8106.5

c. Any registered voter may sign an in-lieu-filing-fee petition for any candidate for whom they are eligible to vote.

§ 8106(b)(1)

d. Circulators of in-lieu-filing-fee petitions must be 18 years of age or older.

§§ 102, 8106(b)(4)

e. Within **2 days** after receipt of the petition, the county elections official shall notify the candidate of any deficiency. The candidate shall then, at the time of obtaining nomination documents, pay a pro rata portion of the filing fee to cover the deficiency.

§§ 8106(b)(3), 8106.5

f. Signatures in lieu of the filing fee may be counted toward the nomination sponsor signature requirements.

§§ 8061, 8106(d)

C. BALLOT DESIGNATIONS

1. Each candidate who submits a ballot designation shall file a completed ballot designation worksheet that supports the use of that ballot designation by the

candidate. The ballot designation worksheet shall be filed with the elections official at the same time the candidate files their Declaration of Candidacy. § 13107.3

2. The ballot designation shall remain the same for all purposes of both primary and general elections, unless the candidate, at least 54 days prior to the general election, requests in writing a different designation which the candidate is entitled to use at the time of the request. The written request must be accompanied by the ballot designation worksheet. § 13107(h)

D. STATEMENT OF ECONOMIC INTERESTS

1. Each candidate must file a Statement of Economic Interests with the county elections official disclosing investments, interests in real property, and any income received during the immediately preceding 12 months pursuant to the requirements of the Political Reform Act of 1974, As Amended. Gov. Code §§ 87200, 87201, 87500(d)
2. This statement is to be filed by **May 1, 2025**. It is not required if the candidate has filed such statements within the past 60 days for the same jurisdiction. Gov. Code § 87201

E. FOR ALL CANDIDATES (EXCEPT WRITE-IN CANDIDATES)

1. Between **April 25, 2025**, and **May 1, 2025**, obtain nomination documents from the county elections official of the candidate's county of residence. Nomination documents include nomination papers for collecting signatures and a Declaration of Candidacy that must be executed by the candidate. §§ 333, 8020, 8040, 8041, 10704(a)
2. Nomination Papers
 - a. Gather between 40 and 60 signatures for filing the nomination papers. § 8062(a)(2)
 - b. Signatures on the in-lieu filing fee petitions may satisfy the signature requirement. §§ 8061, 8106(d)
 - c. Any candidate may obtain signatures to and sign their own nomination papers. § 106(a)
 - d. All signers must be registered voters in the district or political subdivision in which the candidate is to be voted on. §§ 100, 8068
 - e. The candidate may appoint persons to circulate the nomination papers. Circulators must be 18 years of age or older. §§ 102, 8066
 - f. Between **April 25, 2025**, and **May 1, 2025**, each section of the nomination papers shall be delivered to the county elections official of the county in which the signer resides and is a voter. §§ 8020, 8063, 10704(a)

3. Declaration of Candidacy

- a. The Declaration of Candidacy shall be obtained from, and delivered to, the elections official of the county in which the candidate resides and is a voter.

§§ 8040, 8064

- b. Upon request of a candidate, the county elections official shall provide the candidate with a Declaration of Candidacy. The county elections official shall not require a candidate to sign, file, or sign and file a Declaration of Candidacy as a condition of receiving nomination papers.

§ 8020(d)

- c. The county elections official shall require all candidates filing a Declaration of Candidacy to execute the declaration in their office unless the candidate, in a written statement signed and dated by the candidate, designates a third party to obtain the declaration form from the county elections official and deliver it to the candidate. The written statement shall state that the candidate is aware that the Declaration of Candidacy must be properly executed and delivered not later than 5:00 p.m. on **May 1, 2025**, to the office of the county elections official from whom it was obtained. Any person may return the completed Declaration of Candidacy.

F. FOR WRITE-IN CANDIDATES ONLY AND ONLY FOR THE SPECIAL PRIMARY ELECTION⁴

1. Filing Fees

Write-in candidates are not required to pay filing fees.

§ 8604

2. Nomination Papers

- a. Gather between 40 and 60 signatures for filing the nomination papers.

§§ 8062(a)(2), 8600(b)

- b. The candidate may appoint persons to circulate the nomination papers.

Circulators must be 18 years of age or older.

§§ 102, 8066

- c. Signers must be voters in the district or political subdivision in which the write-in candidate is to be voted on.

§ 8603

- d. Between **April 28, 2025**, and **June 10, 2025**, circulate nomination papers for signatures and leave them for examination with the county elections official of the county in which the signers reside.

§ 8601

⁴ Write-in candidates can only run in the primary election. A write-in candidate from the primary election is eligible to run/have their name on the ballot in the general election if that candidate is one of the top two vote getters at the primary election, unless one candidate receives a majority of the votes (50% +1). (Elections Code §§ 8605, 10705.)

3. Statement of Write-In Candidacy

- a. Between **April 28, 2025**, and **June 10, 2025**, file a Statement of Write-In Candidacy with the county elections official of the candidate's county of residence. § 8601
- b. The Statement of Write-In Candidacy shall contain the following information:
 - i. Candidate's name,
 - ii. Candidate's complete residence address,
 - iii. A declaration stating that the candidate is a write-in candidate,
 - iv. The name of the office for which the candidate is running,
 - v. The date of the election, and
 - vi. Candidate's 10-year political party preference history.

§§ 8600, 8601, 10704(a)

- 4. In order to be nominated at the special primary election, the write-in candidate must receive the highest number of votes cast for this office or the second highest number of votes cast for this office, unless there is a tie or a vacancy, or unless another candidate has been elected to the office by winning a majority of the votes.

§§ 8142, 8605, 10705

III. GENERAL INFORMATION

- A. Each of the forms mentioned above is available free of charge from the county elections official. § 8101
- B. The State Assembly has a membership of 80 members elected for two-year terms. This election is for the remainder of the term. Cal. Const., art IV, section 2(a)(1)
- C. Because of the requirements of the Political Reform Act, As Amended, a candidate should visit the website of the Fair Political Practices Commission at www.fppc.ca.gov for the most recent copy of the Information Manual on Campaign Disclosure Provisions of the Political Reform Act, which gives the filing requirements for reporting campaign contributions, etc.

This information sheet of candidate qualifications and procedures is for general information only and does not have the force and effect of law, regulation, or rule. In case of conflict, the law, regulation, or rule will apply. The candidate should obtain the most up-to-date information available because of possible changes in law.

Requests to Address Board on "Agenda" Items:

You may request to be heard on a published agenda item. Requests to be heard must be submitted to the Clerk of the Board before the scheduled meeting time.

Requests to Address Board on items that are "NOT" on the Agenda:

Notwithstanding any other provisions of these rules, member of the public shall have the right to address the Board during the mid-morning "Oral Communications" segment of the published agenda. Said purpose for address must pertain to issues which are under the direct jurisdiction of the Board of Supervisors. YOUR TIME WILL BE LIMITED TO THREE (3) MINUTES. The Board may limit the public input on any item, based on the number of people requesting to speak and the business of the Board.

Power Point Presentations/Printed Material:

Speakers who intend to conduct a formalized Power Point presentation or provide printed material must notify the Clerk of the Board's Office by 12 noon on the Monday preceding the Tuesday Board meeting, ensuring that the Clerk's Office has sufficient copies of all printed materials and at least one (1) copy of the Power Point CD. Copies of printed material given to the Clerk (by Monday noon deadline) will be provided to each Supervisor. If you have the need to use the overhead "Elmo" projector at the Board meeting, please ensure your material is clear and with proper contrast, notifying the Clerk well ahead of the meeting, of your intent to use the Elmo. **Speakers are prohibited from bringing signs, placards, or posters into the hearing room.**

Individual Speaker Limits:

Individual speakers are limited to a maximum of three (3) minutes. The Board may limit the public input on any item, based on the number of people requesting to speak and the business of the Board. Please step up to the podium when the Chair calls your name and begin speaking immediately. Pull the microphone to your mouth so that the Board, audience, and audio recording system hear you clearly. Once you start speaking, the "green" podium light will light. The "yellow" light will come on when you have one (1) minute remaining. When you have 30 seconds remaining, the "yellow" light will begin flash, indicating you must quickly wrap up your comments. Your time is up when the "red" light flashes. The Chair adheres to a strict three (3) minutes per speaker. ***Note: If you intend to give your time to a "Group/Organized Presentation", please state so clearly at the very bottom of the reverse side of this form.***

Group/Organized Presentations:

The organizer of the presentation will automatically receive the first three (3) minutes, with the remaining six (6) minutes relinquished by other speakers, as requested by them on a completed "Request to Speak" form, and clearly indicated at the front bottom of the form.

Addressing the Board & Acknowledgement by Chair:

The Chair will determine what order the speakers will address the Board and will call on all speakers in pairs. The first speaker should immediately step to the podium and begin addressing the Board. The second speaker should take up a position in one of the chamber aisles to quickly step up to the podium after the preceding speaker. This is to afford an efficient and timely Board meeting, giving all attendees the opportunity to make their case. Speakers are prohibited from making personal attacks, and/or using coarse, crude, profane or vulgar language while speaking to the Board members, staff, the public and/or meeting participants. Such behavior, at the discretion of the Board Chair may result in removal from the Board Chambers by Sheriff Deputies.
